Memorial Parade On May 26 To Honor Delaware War Dead

Mayor's Committee Headed By C. Vernon Steele Plans Annual Ceremonies To Be Held In Newark With 1200 Military Personnel Joining Vets; June 2, Rain Date

Plans for Newark's annual memorial parade and ceremonies honoring the state's war dead are being completed by the mayor's committee, with some 1200 military personnel from the Army, Navy, Marines and Air Force to join hundreds of veterans from all service branches in the parade on Sunday, May 26.

The following Sunday, June 2, has been set as the alternate date in the event of bad weather.

Newark Councilman C. Vernon Steele, committee chairman, announced that the parade will be held at 10 a.m. on Sunday, May 26, at the City Hall. The parade will start at 10 a.m. and will end at 1 p.m. at the City Hall.

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19-Year-Old Coed At U. of D. Killed In Auto Accident

Sophomore, Daughter
Of State Golf Champ,
Gail Marquette Dies

A sophomore at the University of Delaware, Gail Cheryl Marquette, 19, was killed Sunday in a one-car accident near Somers Point, N.J.

Private funeral services were held Wednesday morning in Grace Episcopal Church, Talleyville.

Miss Marquette and her companion, Gerald Plish, 24, of Ocean City, N.J., died after the car in which they were riding swerved off Route 32 on the Ship Channel Bridge and plunged into about four feet of water.

Somers Point police said the automobile landed upside down and the couple was probably trapped inside.

The bodies were recovered about 20 minutes after the accident and taken to Shore Memorial Hospital, Somers Point.

Miss Marquette is the daughter of Ray and Lydia Marquette of Blue Rock Manor. Her father is the Delaware State amateur golf champion.

In addition to her parents, she is survived by a sister, Linda Carol Marquette, at home, and her paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Howard Marquette, Havertown, Pa.

Interment was in Ivy Hill Cemetery, Mount Airy, Pa.

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Robert Chambers Cited In NHS Selection With Nation's Top 10 Physics Programs

Newark High School is one of 10 secondary schools in the United States selected by the American Association of Physics Teachers for "outstanding physics programs." The announcement was made this week by the American Institute of Physics.

The person largely responsible for this honor, according to Newark High School Principal Frederick B. Kutz, is Robert Chambers, a quiet man whose knowledge of his field and understanding of young people and dedication to his work have won respect of teachers and students alike.

"We don't follow a textbook, but try to develop our program in terms of the needs of the students at Newark High School," Chambers said.

To accomplish this, he has poured energy, personal funds, and hours into developing demonstration and laboratory equipment. His electronic equipment has cost close to \$2000, and the magnetic resonance apparatus he constructed last summer while attending the University of Delaware on a National Science Foundation Scholarship would cost \$300.

Even the casual observer realizes that this complex, sophisticated equipment is designed to challenge class interest.

When pressed, though, he came up with such names as Donald Woodmansee, Fred Cray and Luke Luckman — honor students in science at Newark; Nancy Hall and Nancy Weinberg, girls who have won honors at Swarthmore and at Reed College; Wilson Cooper for graduate work in nuclear physics at the University of Arizona; and Joe Shields in medicine at the University of Pennsylvania — and "so many other fine students I couldn't possibly name them all."

Chambers came to Newark in 1956 after eight years in Milton and several years of teaching in West Virginia.

A graduate of Salem College, W. Va., he has done graduate work at the University of Delaware, Cornell, and West Virginia Institute of Technology.

He has worked with H-Y groups, and his current hobby is "helping my neighbor coach a Babe Ruth baseball team."

Mr. Chambers resides with his wife, Wilma, a mathematics instructor at Oglethorpe, at 504 Beverly Road, Newark.

SPEAKING OF INSECTS

with DALE BRAY

Several people have called me lately because they were concerned about the tiny red "insects" crawling around on window sills and walls inside their homes. These "insects" are clover mites. They are smaller than the head of a pin, and sometimes thousands will invade a home.

They don't bite people or pets, and they don't feed on most house plants, household furnishings or pantry supplies. They are just a nuisance. Don't crush them — a blood-red stain will deface the fabric or woodwork if you do.

Most of the year the clover mite lives on plants out of doors. In the fall they lay eggs in cracks of walls, under shingles, and other protected places. In early spring the eggs hatch and the mites wander about — some ending up inside of homes. With the first hot days of summer

another batch of eggs is laid but these don't hatch until autumn.

So, whether you spray or not, most of the mites will leave your homes by June and they won't be back until the following spring.

It is interesting to note that these are only female clover mites.

To control this pest inside the house, use a spray containing pyrethrum (pyrethrin). This will kill only the mites that it hits. Others creeping around later will not be affected. Outside the house, spray

Do this all around the house, especially where it is sunny most of the day. Cover the foundation as well as a strip of the lawn out to 20 ft. from the house. Make sure some spray gets up under overhanging shingles, and into cracks.

Although these spray materials are considered rather safe, it is well to remember that all insecticides should be used with caution and common sense. Follow label directions. Store them out of reach of children and pets.

He served in World War II as a lieutenant colonel.

Tom Kibler's experience in the world of professional sports was a big factor in his collegiate coaching. He played professional basketball in the old Eastern League, and professional baseball from 1909 until 1916, in the Ohio State, Texas, New York, Pacific Coast, and International Leagues. The Chicago White Sox bought him in 1910, and he was sent to San Francisco. The Cincinnati Reds drafted him in 1914, but a broken leg ended his playing career.

PUSHMOBILE ENTRY GE Aids UD In Purchase Of X-Ray Equipment

A joint educational venture by the University of Delaware and General Electric Company has enabled the university to obtain x-ray equipment for the department of geology at a fraction of its commercial cost.

Purchase of the equipment was announced today by Dr. Johan Groot, chairman of the department, and N. L. Whitecotton, GE regional vice-president.

The equipment will be for undergraduate use in teaching mineralogy and petrology.

"The x-ray will be a great asset to our department," Groot said. "We didn't have equipment like this before. There's no doubt that this will improve our teaching resources."

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Miss Jones Cites Control Measures For Moth, Beetle

Many women have woolens ruined by clothes moths or carpet beetles. However, with a careful program of prevention and control, a homemaker can keep her home and its contents virtually free from moth and beetle damage, according to Al Katharine Jones, New Castle County extension agent in home economics.

Two species of clothes moths and four species of carpet beetles commonly infest homes, and when you realize that each female moth and beetle lays from 100 to 300 eggs as often as four times a year, it is evident that the problem can become serious in a very short time, Miss Jones warns.

Various housekeeping practices have a direct bearing on the control of fabric pests in the home," Miss Jones advises. An especially thorough cleaning job should be done in out-of-the-way places, such as corners, cracks, baseboards, moldings and behind and under radiators and heavy, seldom moved furniture.

Rugs should be rotated occasionally, since moths and beetles usually feed where cleaning is inconvenient and where they will be undisturbed.

Shelves and drawers should be cleaned out periodically in order to remove the moths and beetles which may be living there, and to remove material on which they might feed.

Dry cleaning kills all stages of clothes moths and carpet beetles, but it gives no protection against the return of the pests. However, protective treatment is available from most dry cleaners.

Protection from feeding damage by moths and beetles can be obtained by spraying with DDT, methoxychlor, chlordane, lindane, or certain fluoride insecticides.

One of the most common methods of protecting woolens is the use of crystals or naphthalene flakes or balls. The containers should be completely airtight with all cracks tightly sealed. A common fault when using this type of moth protection is not using enough of this material. The mere odor does not repel insects and is no indication that there is enough vapor to kill them.

"Follow directions on the container, and don't skimp on the amount used," Miss Jones says.

Cedar chests are of value primarily because of their airtight construction, and all articles placed in them should be completely free of larvae, since the cedar-oil vapor can kill only the smaller larvae.

Cedar chests which are several years old should be treated the same as any other garment container, and moth balls, flakes or crystals should be used.

Easter Flowering Plants Offered Life In Garden

Many a home is brightened at Easter time with a flowering plant from the florist, and although many of these plants should be discarded after flowering, others can be moved to a permanent location in the garden.

The traditional Easter lily should be kept inside until after the plant has finished flowering and the foliage has died. If the bulbs are planted in a sunny spot in the garden, and protected with a mulch during the winter, they may survive and bloom the following year.

Azalea plants may be set in a partially shaded area of the garden. Some varieties are not hardy, however, and will not survive the winter unless brought back indoors.

Hydrangeas should be cut back to a height of about three inches after flowering, and removed to a sunny yet sheltered location in the garden.
