# Electric rate hike likely

The Newark City Council is moving toward an increase in electric rates as a way to deal with a \$4.6 million revenue shortfall.

The move came on Monday night as the Mayor and City Council hosted a budget workshop aimed at addressing financial challenges facing the municipality.

Councilmen viewed the 2010/2011 financial forecast for governmental funds, the 2011 Capital Improvement Program for governmental funds, and the possibility of cutting city services and programs to reduce the budget shortfall.

An increase in the electric rate will come up for a vote in an upcoming council meeting.

City Finance Director

City Finance Director Dennis McFarland suggested to the council that the electric rate hike be increased from an additional \$.017 per kilowatt hour to \$.026 per kilowatt hour to \$.026 per kilowatt hour to help ensure that the utility budget goal of \$4.6 million is met. Due to a cool summer, last year's electric consumption was down considerably from years past, thus creating a shortfall in city revenues. By instituting the increase as early as May, McFarland told the council that the revenue goal could be met for the year.

He also stated that the increase will only be used to ensure that revenue levels are met and that the rate could be adjusted downward when consumption reaches normal, anticipated levels. The average household would see an increase of about \$12 per month at the new rate.

# **Pelicans head back to Maryland**

Three months after their arrival at Tri-State Bird Rescue & Research, Newark, 16 brown pelicans are being prepared for their return to the wild. These pelicans were brought to Tri-State from southern Maryland in early January, suffering from frostbite and starvation as a result of the early freeze in December. The birds were given medical care as well as a steady diet of fish, and have continued to be housed at Tri-State awaiting warmer weather. A sizable number of pelicans did not survive the effects of winter.

In anticipation of their upcoming departure, Tri-State staff gave each bird a final medical evaluation to ensure that it is healthy and will be able to survive in the wild. Each pelican was fitted with a permanent metal band, so it can be identified and tracked if spotted by the public or wildlife biologists.

In cooperation with the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service and the Maryland Department of Natural Resources, Tri-State returned the birds to their home in the Chesapeake Bay this week. With the help of U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service biologists, the pelicans were transported by boat and released into an island colony. By introducing them to an existing flock that migrated, Tri-State and local officials hope that these birds will not stay too long in the area next winter.

"It is heartwarming to give these beautiful creatures a second chance to soar freely over the gentle waves of the bay," said Tri-State's executive director, Heidi Stout, VMD. With the last of the release plans in place, Stout reflected, "This couldn't have been done without the support of our dedicated volunteers who cared for the pelicans rain or shine and the generosity of the donors who enabled us to purchase thousands of pounds of fish to feed the pelicans."

Tri-State Bird Rescue & Research is a licensed, nonprofit wildlife rehabilitation organization that cares for nearly 3,000 injured, orphaned, and oil-covered native wild birds each year ranging from hummingbirds to eagles. For more information about Tri-State, visit www.tristatebird.org.



# Couple accused of doing door-to-door scam

New Castle County Police have arrest warrants on file for John and Deborah Reilly, both 46, who are wanted for scamming J. Reilly several citizens as they solicited money for a fictitious fundraiser for juvenile diabetes.



Police received D. Reilly information about

two suspicious persons who were going door to door in the Meadowdale community soliciting money for research for juvenile diabetes. After speaking with several witnesses/victims, officers reached out to the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation and discovered the alleged fundraising effort was a hoax. Meadowdale is northeast of Newark.


The investigation determined that the couple were walking throughout the Meadowdale Community knocking on each door. They would immediately identify themselves as the new neighbors in the community who had a daughter who was suffering from diabetes. They told the victims they were soliciting money for an upcoming fundraiser to support research for the disease.

After receiving money from

area resident became suspicious and was able to obtain the tag number from their minivan as they drove off. Based on the tag, police discovered the true identities of the couple and discovered they reside in the 3000 block of Charing Cross Drive in Hockessin.

The investigating officer determined the couple did not live in the community, and no such fundraiser had been planned. Based on this information, arrest warrants were issued for both John and Deborah for criminal impersonation, theft by false pretense, and conspiracy.

University of Delaware Police have announced the arrests of three suspects in the robbery of a University of Delaware student that occurred at 3:13 a.m., Thursday, April 8, near Memorial Hall.

One adult and two juveniles have been charged with the following offenses: robbery in the second degree, conspiracy in the second degree, assault in the third degree and criminal

Police said Elijah S. Smith, 18, of New Castle, was arrested at his residence. He was arraigned before the Justice at least three neighbors, one of the Peace Court and committed to the Howard Young Correctional Facility in lieu of \$2,000 secured bond.

Two juveniles, whose names are not being released, were arrested at the residence of one of the juveniles in Newark. One of the juveniles was additionally charged with possession of marijuana. Each was committed to the Camelot Juvenile Facility in lieu of \$2,000 secured bond.

## Chase, capture after cariacking

A Wilmington area man has been charged with a carjacking and chase that started Sunday night at the Hess Station at 5801 Kirkwood

Highway, east of Newark. The suspect was identified by Delaware State Police as Daniel Cohee, 27, of Zebley Road

Officers arrived on the scene and were told by the 37-year-old male victim that a subject had just stolen his Toyota Camry. The investigation revealed suspect Daniel Cohee had received a ride from an acquaintance, a 40 yearold male, to the Hess Station. When Cohee and this subject arrived, an argument ensued and Cohee brandished a knife, allegedly held it to the throat of the acquaintance and threatened him. Cohee got out of the car and the acquaintance fled

With no ride, Cohee walked around the Hess Station parking lot before he approached the 37-year-old victim, who was washing his car, and asked him for a ride. The 37 yearold declined and Cohee again pulled his knife. The victim ran away at the sight of the knife and Cohee fled in the Camry.

A witness at the Hess Station witnessed the incident and followed the Camry as it fled westbound on Kirkwood Highway. This witness called into 911 dispatch (RECOM) and provided information.

Newark Police officers received a dispatch identifying the vehicle.

The car was seen by Newark police traveling southward on Elkton Road and crossing Route 4 when pursuit began.

The suspect's vehicle sped down Elkton Road with officers in pursuit. The car crossed into Maryland and turned into the Petro service station, near I-95, to evade pursuers. The car managed to turn around and get back onto Elkton Road and the driver merged onto I-95, going northbound. Newark police broke off the pursuit when DSP troopers notified them that the suspect had fled the car at Route 896 and Old Baltimore Pike. State troopers reported he crashed the vehicle and fled on foot.

Officers conducted an exhaustive search and eventually located Cohee hiding in the area shortly after midnight on April 12th.

Cohee was transported back to Troop 6 where he was formally charged with the following offenses: Carjacking (felony), Aggravated Menacing (felony), Resisting Arrest (misdemeanor) and Criminal Mischief (misdemeanor).

Bail was set at \$5,600.00 secured and Cohee was committed to the Delaware Department of Corrections.

# **Burglar gets away** with jewelry, coins

Police are investigating a home break-in of a private residence on Elm Ave. in Newark. The victim, a 72 year-old man, told officers that while he was out at dinner, an unknown suspect had entered the house through a rear door and had taken several items of men's jewelry and some antique coins.

The total value of the merchandise is approximately \$1,300. Police found no evidence of forced entry and no damage inside the house.

When police returned for a follow-up interview later that day, the man said that while he was in the shower he heard a noise similar to someone hitting the front door. Police performed an additional search, but found no new evidence.

# Thieves make off with fan

An aluminum exhaust fan was found missing from a construction site at 133 E. Main St. The building is being remodeled for a future tenant, Slider Sandwich Shop. The fan is valued at \$2,000.

Contractors at the site were contacted and told police that the fan was stored on a wooden crate behind the building. It was left unsecured because the unit weighs almost 200 pounds. Police found the crate about 50 feet away from the site, on the southwest corner of 135 E. Main St. Several area recyclers have been notified to be on the lookout for the fan. Video surveillance is being reviewed from a nearby business in order to gain further information.



Since 2005, when the U.S. Mayors Climate Protection Agreement was initiated by Seattle Mayor Greg Nickels, over 1,000 U.S. cities have made the commitment to reduce their greenhouse gasses and adopt policies that protect our environment. By endorsing this agreement, Newark joins Wilmington and Dover as Delaware's other two "Cool

Festivities will include a green ribbon cutting, the presentation of a certificate to Mayor Vance Funk, and a variety of local organizations that will be on hand to share infor-

Partner organizations for this event include Bike Delaware, Center for Energy and Environmental Policy, Delaware Bicycle Council, Delaware Center for Horticulture, Newark Bicycle Committee, Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Newark, Water Resources Agency, White Clay Watershed Association, and Wild and Scenic White Clay Creek.

Newark is already addressing many of the twelve action items of the agreement, thanks to the efforts of our Conservation Advisory Commission (CAC) and the leadership of Newark's elected officials

For example, last year the CAC began a greenhouse gas emissions inventory of city operations by working closely with city departments to determine the emissions of Newark's vehicles, parks equipment, buildings, street lighting and other energy uses. The first action item of the agreement is to conduct a greenhouse gas inventory and create a climate action plan.


The other action items include: (2) land use policies that reduce sprawl, preserve open space and create compact walk-able communities: (3) transportation options such as bicycle trails, commuter reduction,

carpooling and transit; (4) renewable energy programs; (5) energy efficiency in municipal buildings; (6) Energy Star procurement policy; (7) land use planning and building codes that promote energy efficiency; (8) increasing the efficiency of government-owned vehicles; (9) water and wastewater pump efficiency; (10) recycling programs; (11) urban forests and habitat protection; and (12) public education and outreach.

While Newark is well on its way to addressing all of the action items in the U.S. Mayors Climate Protection Agreement, energy sustainability, environmental stewardship and clicesses that will require continued action and public involvement in the



# **Battling the perfect budget storm**

Despite its efforts to rein in costs, the City of Newark is battling a perfect storm that is being felt in the wallets of residents.

A cool- summer in 2009 and sluggish tax and fee revenues that continue to this day have the City Council dealing with tough choices as demonstrated in this week's workshop meeting.

The result of this cool and wet

The result of this cool and wet weather has been rate increases to plug the gap. This week, the council seemed to be moving in the direction of an electric rate increase to plug a \$4.6 million revenue gap. Earlier, it had done the same when it came to water rates. The city is also paying the price for a city reservoir project and a financial settlement that followed over a construction dispute.

Even if the reservoir had never been built, the pressure on the budget would be intense.

That was clear as council members were presented with two possibilities for the upcoming 2011 budget. Neither are pleasant.

One would slash the capital improvement budget and leave a small surplus. The other outcome would lead to a \$1.5 million deficit and put more pressure on the city's bond rating. Neither option leaves room for a pay increase for city workers.

To its credit, the council has asked city staff to look at the possibility of further cuts ranging from contracting out mowing chores to reducing the size of the Police Department.

While the discussion was healthy, it is clear that any major cut in police staffing is unlikely. The crime rate is down, despite a tough economy and the department deserves at least some of the credit.

With that said, further cuts that are necessary for the city's long term health are hard to find, unless layoffs are ordered, or a wide array of services are outsourced, with employment dropping by attrition. After all, personnel costs make up 69 percent of the budget.

It may be that a property tax increase is the least painful option, as long the federal deduction remains in place. It will rile the fiscal hawks and is clearly unpalatable to councilman.

But other options, one possibility being a quarterly bill for trash collection, would be just as painful.

# OUT OF THE ATTIC



This week's Out of the Attic item is an undated picture of the Jacob Thomas Wallpaper Company located along the north side of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad tracks between New London Road and North College Avenue. In 1897, Jacob Thomas acquired the building that had been the Knauf Organ Factory since 1889 and had been built in 1886 as the Bedwell Hammock Manufactory. The wallpaper business prospered into the 20th century until both the business and the building were destroyed by a "spectacular" fire in 1918. These businesses along with the Meteer/Curtis Paper Mill (1780's – 1990's), Dean Woolen Mill (1845 – 1886), and the American Hard Fibre Company (1894 – 1980's) led the transition of agricultural Newark to become an industrial town by the early 20th century.



# Police unhappy with plan that would cut jobs

With the increase, the Newark rate would be on par with New Castle County residential electric rates. McFarland cautioned that if the rate hike does not go into effect, an additional \$4.6 million would need to be raised or an equal amount would have to be cut from the operating budget.

In anticipation of reviewing budget cuts, Director McFarland and City Manager Kyle Sonnenberg presented to council a list of proposed service level cuts that the city could enact to trim spending. Several cuts and adjustments have already been enacted, and council congratulated Sonnenberg on his success of reducing excess expenditures.

One that drew the most attention was a proposal to cut police officers. According to the list, an elimination of one police officer from each platoon (five officers in total) would garner an additional \$496,080 for Newark. Over a dozen officers from the Newark Police Department were present at the meeting to demon-

strate their opposition to the proposed cuts. Master Corporal Scott Rieger, representing the Newark Police Department, spoke before the council to warn about the safety dangers of enacting a reduction in force. Councilman Jerry Clifton voiced his opposition to considering such a move and his admiration for the job the police department has done in reducing crime in the area.

Despite the vocal support, the council has not been afraid to tinker with the police budget. This year's budget had originally called for an increase of three officers, but due to budget adjustments, only one policeman was added to the force. The Newark Police Department presently has 63 officers.

In addition, McFarland prepared two possible budgets for 2011 for consideration. In one version, the budget would be adjusted forward for higher pension expenses, outof-pocket employee benefits, a 10 percent health care cost increase, a 2 percent inflation rate, keeping costs at their present levels, and funding proposed capital improvement projects. In this budget, the 2011 deficit would be \$1.5 million.

In the second budget, a deferral past 2011 of major capital improvements would give the city a projected surplus of \$600,000. Projects such as the Curtis Mill/Paper Mill improvement, the Annual Street Fund Program, and the ADA handicap ramp plan could be shelved in order to help Newark get back into the black.

Councilman David Athey stated that this additional money could not be put back into the general fund to reduce taxes because the city must increase its cash on hand in order to improve its bond rating, which has suffered due to a severe reduction of cash reserves.

McFarland emphasized the importance of achieving a good bond rating and that it will take approximately four to five years to increase reserves to \$18 million, a number that might boost the debt rating.







# **Travel Insurance – Is it Necessary?**

According to the U.S. Travel Insurance Association's new Travel Insurance Market Survey for 2006-2008, nearly 120 million people were covered by various types of travel-related insurance and emergency services, reflecting a growth of over 35%. Policies with trip

cancellation/interruption benefits proved the most popular, accounting for 90% of total sales, while medical and medical evacuation policies showed huge growth. But, do you need Pippidis



it? Deciding if you need it is the first step, and choosing the right amount of coverage for the right risks

Do I need insurance? If the risk of financial loss is low, you probably don't need it. For example, if you've paid a discounted rate for airfare and you can cancel the hotel reservations in a timely manner and all you lose is a few hundred dollars if you unexpectedly need to cancel the trip, travel insurance

is probably not necessary.

Another consideration is what is covered by your other insurance policies or credit cards. Does your auto policy

cover collision and liability for a rental car in the state or country you are visiting? Does your homeowner's policy cover property or baggage loss, money loss, or property damage when you are away from home or in another country? How about your health insurance? What's covered when you're away from home or abroad? If an accident happens and the medical care isn't up to snuff, who covers getting you to better care? Does your credit card cover emergency assistance or lost luggage?

So if the financial risk is high enough to support insurance, what types of insurance coverage are there? Generally it can be classified in three areas:

Luggage/Car Rental Protection - protects you if there is an accident or if luggage or personal items become lost or stolen. Check to see if the policy covers all items or only items under a certain value or if the loss occurs during the flight. It's very important to read the fine print about what's covered and under what circumstances.

Trip Protection - this coverage comes in three parts. Cancellation coverage covers cancellation of your trip due to illness of you or a family member. It will cover your prepaid expenses. Delay coverage handles transportation delays and will cover your prepaid hotel expenses in the case you can't get to your destination.

Trip interruption protection

covers you if you get sick while away, or a family member falls ill or dies. It also covers your trip if it's cut short due to bad weather, travel company bankruptcy, an airline strike and even

Terrorist Attacks or Civil Unrest policy provides trip cancellation insurance if the U.S. State Department issues a travel advisory recommending that Americans avoid a certain country, or if your destination becomes the target of a terrorist attack within 30 days of your

A Medical or Health policy covers medical and dental expenses incurred because of injury or illness. Depending on where you are going, you may want to include evacuation coverage that will cover the costs of transporting you to better health resources. If you have a health problem of any sort, make sure the policy covers you for that condition. Bear in mind that you usually must purchase a policy within a week or so of the date that you make the first payment on your trip to be covered for pre-existing health conditions.

Some companies bundle these protections, while others offer single trip, single type policies. As I said before, shop around and read the fine print. If the policy you're reviewing has a ridiculously long list of exceptions -- say, one sentence outlining the coverage followed



by paragraphs outlining all the exclusions -- consider buying another policy. If you're on an adventure trip or like to do exciting and risky things, be sure you're covered.

A comprehensive travel insurance policy that includes medical coverage, medical evacuation, and trip-cancellation/interruption insurance will cost between 3 and 8 percent of the price of your trip. Cancellation/interruption coverage should be calculated on the non-refundable portions of your trip. For example, if you can get your airline ticket reissued for a small fee, it doesn't make sense to buy coverage based on the total cost of the ticket.

Though we never know what may happen and we can't plan for every contingency, you may feel more financially secure if you have a bit of travel insurance as part of your vacation safety net.
