## Testing of Curtis Mill site to begin next month

Site plan to be completed this year

A recent decision by the state attorney general regarding the former Curtis Paper Mill site will allow the city to move on to the next step in the of redevelopment of the site, according to city officials.

Carol Houck, assistant to the city manager, said the decision enables city officials to go ahead with testing of the site for environmental pollutants.

"We can see what is there and then see what, if any, remediation we need to do, and hopefully plan for efforts to be made to re-beautify the site," Houck said.

Testing is expected to begin next month and will consist of drilling holes through the concrete foundation of the old mill in order to access and sample the ground below. The city will pay \$36,000 for the testing; a cost city officials are hoping will be reimbursed by the state.

The testing will put the city one step closer to its goal of redeveloping the site of the historic paper mill, which the

city purchased in 1999.

Last fall, the state declared the site a "brownfield," which is defined by the Environmental Protection Agency as a property where the presence, or potential presence, of contaminants may hinder redevelopment.

Afterward, Houck said, the city applied to join the state's Brownfield Volunteer Cleanup Program, which would provide funds for testing and remediation.

The attorney general signed off on the city's application last week.

Houck said she hopes to get the results of the tests within a few months.

The ultimate goal is to make the site into a park, but she said, the city would like to at least plant grass at the site by the spring.

"If everything is OK, we would puncture lots of punctures all throughout the hard surfaces so it can get adequate drainage and then it would be covered with soil, seeding and maybe some landscaping based on the funding that's available at the time," she said.

If the testing indicates a problem, a clean up of the site would be required, although in some cases, capping the site

## City Council raises parking meter fees

Newark City Council voted on Monday night to raise its hourly parking meter fees for the first time since 1998, but delayed voting on a proposed water rate hike until next month.

Council was slated to approve the city's first water rate hike in eight years during its meeting on Monday, but held off after city staff requested more time to notify customers of the proposed increase.

"We've only notified about 30 percent of our customers and in the interest of fairness, we wanted to give proper notice of the change," City Finance Director Dennis W. McFarland told council.

The proposed water rate hike would

Principal named at new unnamed elementary

Christina School District staff, school board members, elected officials and others recently got a sneak peek at the district's new elementary school at Porter Road and Route 40 in Bear.

Participants were required to wear hard hats during the tour of the construction site, which will not be fully completed until late spring. The walk-through included classrooms, offices and hallways, as well as the school library, cafeteria, gymnasium, art and music rooms and other areas.

The district also announced a staff transition plan for the new school, which is scheduled to open its doors in August. The school district is accepting nominations for names for the new school through Feb. 17.

Richelle Talbert, currently the principal of Brader Elementary School in

# Police nab alleged homeless flasher

A homeless man who allegedly exposed his genitals to at least three women on Jan. 23 is now behind bars, according to police.

Newark Police Lt. Brian Henry said all three of 28-year-old Derek Maloney's alleged victims reported his activities to the department within minutes of each other.

The first victim reported being flashed by a man, later identified as Maloney, near the intersection of Elkton Road and Amstel Avenue, while the second two victims reported a man exposing himself near the intersection of North College and Cleveland avenues.

All three women told

police that a man wearing a ski mask approached them on the street while making motions with his hands, indicating he was fondling himself.

A responding officer found

Maloney walking along the railroad tracks near North College and Cleveland avenues. After being detained, Maloney was positively identified by one of the victims, Henry said.

Maloney was charged with three counts of lewdness, two counts of indecent exposure and one count of trespassing on CSX property.

Henry said Maloney, who has no fixed address, was committed to the Howard Young Correctional Facility in Wilmington in default of a \$2,000 bond.

# Candidates named for County Council seat

The Democratic and Republican committees for New Castle County's Fifth District have both named their candidates for a Feb. 19 special election to fill the seat recently vacated by Democrat Stephanie McClellan.

Last week, the Democrats chose Newark resident Elisa Diller, a 53-year-old pastor at the Christiana Presbyterian Church. Diller lives with her husband John Tobin and their daughter Mei in the Williamsburg Village neighborhood.

"I greatly appreciate the support of this group in selecting me to be their candidate for the upcoming special election," Diller said. "It's going to be hard work, but I'm ready to get started."

Diller, a former administrator for the State of Delaware's Office of Volunteerism, identified some top issues as con-

stituent services, cost effective service delivery, development of regional partnerships to bring jobs and transportation to residents, and sustainable growth.

She graduated from the University of Delaware and was a volunteer for VISTA, America's domestic Peace Corps. She later received her theological education, including her doctorate, at Princeton Theological Seminary. She most recently was appointed to serve on Governor-elect Jack Markell's transition team for the Department of Services for Children, Youth and Their Families.

"My experience with non-profit organizations and government agencies gives me both management experience and an understanding of the importance of constituent services," Diller said. "I have the knowledge and experience to work to find solutions for the problems that are most important to residents of the 5th district."

The Republican committee announced this week that

it has selected James "Jamie" Moulthrop, a Glasgow-area tax preparer, to run against Diller.

Moulthrop, 41, got his start at MBNA before transitioning into the non-profit sector where he managed a loan program for low-income working families at a Wilmington-based nonprofit agency.

He currently works as a tax preparer out of the Old Post Farm neighborhood home he shares with his wife Kathy and their children, ages 9 and 5.

An Eagle Scout himself, Moulthrop has been an adult leader with Freedom Trail

District Scout Troop 283 and Cub Scout Pack 444 for more than a decade.


"We're excited to have Jamie as our candidate for County Council," Republican State Chairman Tom Ross said. "Taxpayers know that the county is facing some serious financial shortfalls in the coming years. With Jamie's professional experience, I know he'll be an independent voice for taxpayers and can help the county navigate the financial challenges we face."

Moulthrop said he's honored for the opportunity to campaign for the seat.

"I believe that I can bring a new perspective to County Council, as someone who understands finances and is committed to watching out for every taxpayer dollar," he said. "I look forward to spending the weeks until Feb. 19 meeting the voters of the Fifth Council District and earning their support."

McClellan announced her resignation on Jan 19 to take a new job as Markell's policy director. She also will step away from her full-time job as an assistant professor in the University of Delaware's School of Urban Affairs and Public Policy.

## UD Police investigating Dec. rape of UD student



The University of Delaware announced on Monday afternoon that campus police are investigating the rape of a student that reportedly occurred last month.

In a statement released on UD's news Web site, www.Udaily.com, campus officials said the student reported the incident to University Police on Jan. 25.

The assault is alleged to have occurred around 1:30 a.m. on Dec. 13, 2008 in a wooded area behind the Christiana East Tower residence hall on the northern end of the university's Newark campus.

Three men allegedly participated in the student's rape. Two of the suspects are described as 6-foot-1-inch tall, clean shaven, with large builds. One of them was wearing a black puffy jacket and dark pants and may have been armed with a handgun. A second suspect reportedly had a chain around his neck and was wearing dark clothes, while a third suspect is described as

having a small build and wearing work boots and a dark-colored beanie hat.

## Knowledge of Power

In Delaware there is a fine line of access to information about where our electricity comes from.

It divides those who have full disclosure about fuel mix from those who are kept in the dark. This line is easy to identify on a map – it's the municipal boundary of the City of Newark.

Nearly a decade ago, our state legislature passed an electricity disclosure law that requires utilities to inform customers about the fuels that are used to generate the electricity they sell. An insert included with the bill every three months lists the percentages of electricity generated from coal, natural gas, nuclear, hydroelectric, solar, wind, biomass, geothermal and other fuels.

Newark, however, is special.

Our electric company is

able to exempt itself from fuel mix disclosure, along with most of our state's other utility laws. This is because our state's Public Service Commission, whose role is to supervise and regulate utility companies in Delaware, does not have authority over municipally owned utilities. Instead, our city council has this responsibility.

Fuel mix is important for understanding the environmental and ecological impacts of the electricity we use. Without this knowledge, we cannot appreciate how we individually contribute to the vast array of environmental damages caused by dirty fuels, nor can we value any efforts being made to lessen those damages.

The higher the proportion of polluting fuels – such as coal – the greater impact our electricity consumption has on climate change, acid rain, smog, mercury-contaminated seafood, asthma triggers and the many other land, air and water pollution effects of this fuel source.

Carbon dioxide emissions are often used as a

measurement of these negative impacts. One thousand kilowatt hours of electricity

generated from coal mined in the eastern United States releases over 2,000 pounds of carbon dioxide. For that same amount of energy, emissions are cut almost in half if natural gas is used, and are eliminated if solar or wind energy is used.

The higher our proportion of renewable energy, such as solar and wind power, the less we are harming our planet and the more we are promoting renewable energy development. This benefits not only the environment, but creates jobs and helps our economy.

We have had our fair share of wake-up calls in the news about the importance of fuel mix. The coal ash catastrophe in the Tennessee Valley on Dec. 22 was 92 times larger than the Exxon Valdez oil spill and discharged one billion gallons of toxic, carcinogenic coal-fired power plant waste into a local river. This, along with a second coal-ash spill in Alabama on Jan. 9, may serve as a warning of our carelessness and complacency about transforming our current energy system.

It may be inconvenient for our municipal electric utility to disclose fuel mix to its customers. It may even be undesirable from a budget

standpoint, particularly given the revenue generated from electricity sales by the City of Newark.

I am sure that the city will enjoy the \$11.7 million in net electricity profits that it anticipates in 2009, particularly if wholesale costs are kept low through the use of the cheapest fuels available, primarily dirty coal.

Sure, renewable energy costs more, but perhaps we don't need such high electricity profits driving our city budget.

Ultimately, fuel mix disclosure is a political decision that could be mandated by our city council. The state already took this step in 1999, which begs me to question why the City of Newark is so far behind the times.

As a voter, this is something that I want from my elected officials.

Whereas, open government is a nonpartisan issue and is supported by members of our

own Newark state delegation;

Now, therefore, be it resolved by Newark City Council, that the Mayor and the Council of the City of Newark support and encourage the adoption by the General Assembly of legislation which furthers the cause of uniform, open and transparent government at all levels in Delaware.



with soil could serve as proper remediation, Houck said.

The city's Parks and Recreation Department is currently in the process of hiring an outside company to design a redevelopment plan for the site.

The final plan will include ideas submitted at the public hearings held last year by the city and Paul Bauernschmidt, a consultant hired by the city to help facilitate public input.

"It seems like a park is what the community wants," Houck said. "There's a strong push for a skateboard park. No funding has been set aside, no firm decisions have been made, but everybody agrees they would like to see it look better."

The plan, which is expected to be complete by the end of the year, would be subject to approval from city council. Houck said the city will apply for grants to help fund the final project, but she cautioned that the project might have to be done in phases based on the availability of funding.

In the meantime, Bauernschmidt's group, Friends of Curtis Mill Park, is trying to raise the \$200,000 needed to restore the historic smokestack, the only part of the original mill still remaining after the rest of the building was torn down in 2007.

So far, the fundraising efforts have had limited success, bringing in less than \$500, Bauernschmidt said. A 5K fundraiser to support the smokestack-saving effort is planned for March 28.







## Hoops a big deal at DFD

Usually when you walk into a basketball game and see the coach flailing his arms on the sideline, it's his way of reiterating what he is verbally yelling to his players.

"Nobody else was willing to coach the team," said Pelletier, speaking through an interpreter, when asked why he would take on such a monumental task. "I didn't want the kids to suffer, so I jumped in."

"I've always been a big basketball fan, but have relied on coaching mentors to learn the strategies of the game."

The Blue Hawks play a full schedule as the only "deaf" team in the Mid-Atlantic League, which is made up of small "hearing" schools in the region with enrollments similar to the DSD.

"Once the game starts, there really is no difference between teams who can hear and ones who can't," Pelletier said. "The refs are not deaf and most can't sign, so my players have to rely on their acute sense of movement around them to know when a play has stopped."

The Blue Hawks (4-6) play a full 18-game schedule against "hearing" and "deaf" teams and will travel as far as Buffalo and Vermont to do so. The season ends with the Eastern Schools for the Deaf Athletic Association tournament, held in Scranton, Pa., in late February.

The DSD's homecoming game was held on Friday night, a 58-49 win over the Mill Neck Manor SFD. Junior Reggie Saunders poured in a game-high 21 points, much to the delight of the crowd.

The bleachers at their home games are filled with parents, friends, peers and even a pep club. And while many casual observers might think parents don't take the games seriously, Pelletier is quick to dismiss that notion.

"Our parents take it very seriously," the coach said with a grin. "I have complaints about playing time like any other coach, but for the most part our parents are very supportive."

Pelletier stresses that while there is a slight difference in the talent level of his team compared to a traditional varsity team, the goal of his program is the same as that of any well-coached high school team.

"Our students need to be given the same opportunity to compete," Pelletier says. "They need to experience winning and losing, success and failure, and how to overcome challenges."

Playing basketball is just one more way to help prepare them for life.

One thing is for certain, Pelletier's mission and commitment as a coach is loud and clear ... in any language.

# Final vote on water rate hike slated for Feb. 23

increase customers' annual bills by about 15 percent for in-town customers and 30 percent for out-of-town customers. Town official estimate in-town customers would end paying an additional \$30 per year for water, while out-of-town customers would see their annual bills increase by about \$60.

If approved the rate increase would take effect on March 1.

McFarland said the increase would be applied retroactively dating back to December for some customers due to limitations in the city's billing system.

"Under the city's current billing system, we can't charge different rates for different bills in the same cycle," he said. "And since about one-third of our customers get meter readings every month, that means about one-third will have the new rate apply to their bills going back to December, one-third going back to January and one-third for just February."

McFarland said each month that the rate increase is delayed would cost the city between \$70,000 and \$80,000 in lost revenue, meaning that delaying the proposed rate

increase until April 1 so that all residents would be charged the new rate in June bills could cost the city close to \$240,000.

City Council ran into a similar issue when it retroactively imposed an electric rate increase last August because all of the city's utility bills are handled by the same system.

"This all leads us to the fundamental question: Is there a system that allows us to do split billing and if so why don't we have it," asked City Councilman Jerry Clifton.

McFarland indicated that the cost of purchasing a new billing system for the city could be costly, which would only further add to the demand for additional utility revenue.

"It would be nice to tell someone that if we're increasing their bills on Feb. 1 that it won't go back and take effect in December," City Councilman Paul Pomeroy said. "This is an upgrade that we have to make. I think we owe it to the rate payers."

City Council on Monday did approve a hike to its parking meter fees, under a proposal supported by downtown merchants.

Starting on Feb. 2, Newark parking meters that currently charge 25 cents for 15 and 20

minutes of on-street parking will be readjusted to provide only 12 minutes of parking at the same price.

"The intent is to simply the parking meters' fee structure so that all of our meters charge \$1.25 per hour citywide, so customers and staff know what rate applies at what location,"

City Planning Director Roy Lopata told City Council.

At the urging of City Council members, Lopata said the city staff would begin looking at ways to better display the new parking meter rates throughout downtown.

"To say the signage that's there now is inadequate

would be putting it politely," he said.

City Councilman Ezra Temko cast the lone vote of dissent against the parking meter fee hike.

"I support making it simpler, but I don't support making it over \$1 per hour," he said.





# Burst pipes flood Newark homes and restaurants

Newark officials are reminding commercial and residential property owners to cut their water or leave their heat on, after a rash of burst pipes caused damages throughout the city last week.

The tenants of two apartments at The Millyard on Elkton Road had to be put up in hotels by the building's owner, while Buffalo Wild Wings was forced to close temporarily on Jan. 16 after a sprinkler pipe burst in the attic, according to city officials.

On Jan. 17, two apartments in the Christiana Mills Apartment complex on Elkton Road also suffered water damage from pipes that burst after a tenant turned off the heat in their unit while on vacation.

The same day an open window at a home on Courtney Street caused pipes supplying hot water throughout the building to burst, rendering the home temporarily uninhabitable. A similar

situation played out at a home on West Park Place when three people had to be relocated after a sprinkler pipe in the attic of their home burst.

The Saigon Restaurant in the Newark Shopping Center might have suffered the worst from broken pipes so far this winter, however.

Employees there said they attempted to relocate diners before being forced to close altogether when water began flooding into the restaurant from one of the shopping center's nearby vacant units.

According to city officials, the new owners of the Newark Shopping Center — Spectrum Properties of Bethesda, Md. — had shut off the heat in the vacant unit, which caused a sprinkler pipe to burst, damaging three of the units in total.

To help avoid further damages from burst pipes, city officials said they would begin mailing out reminders to property owners through its municipal newsletter, Channel 22 and on the city's Web site at [www.cityofnewarkde.us](http://www.cityofnewarkde.us).
