HOPE STILL EXISTS FOR EARLY LIFTING OF RACE BAN FOLLOWING V-E DAY

Retention of Restrictions Still Valuable to Public Morale, New President Definitely A Friend Of All Types of Sports

An Associated Press release last week somewhat clarified the sports muddle that existed following a recent terse statement by the President that racing, the brownout and midnight curfew would not be lifted until V-E Day. According to this release President Truman's refusal to lift the racing ban before V-E Day does not mean that he will be severe on sports.

He will be firm but understanding, keeping sports in perspective with other matters under changing war conditions.

And, generally, Mr. Truman will carry out suggestions made by James F. Byrnes in his last report to the late President. Roosevelt and Congress before resigning as War Mobilizer.

Persons close to Mr. Truman on Capitol Hill and at the White House said today they felt confident that summation represents the President's attitude toward sports, based on actions in his first week as Chief Executive.

Mr. Truman's terse remarks on racing—that he did not intend to lift the ban soon and that he did not want the answer as to whether it will be removed after V-E Day—left the sports world somewhat bewildered, but his friends say:

"He really is a 'natural' for sports. He's quite a fan, and he'll be in there watching when the time comes."

Mr. Byrnes had suggested that the racing ban be revoked V-E Day. Whatever Mr. Truman does on this point probably will be guided by the prospects of speedy redeployment of armed forces to the Pacific and reconversion.

When Mr. Truman mentioned that the midnight curfew, brownout and racing had done a lot for the country's moral well being, he was thinking, his friends say, of manpower, absenteeism, and conduct of workers—war factors which still must be considered.

U. S. To Cut Airplane Production 15 Percent

Aircraft production will be reduced about 15 per cent for the remainder of 1945 to permit greater concentration on planes "vital to the war effort."

It is planned that the jet plane and newer models of the Thunderbolt and Mustang will replace P-38s and older models of the P-47 and P-51, the Army Air Forces said in a statement this week.

Full production will be continued on many types of planes including the B-29 Super-Fortress, B-32 Dominator, A-26 light bomber, the jet-propelled fighter and two cargo types, the C-82 and C-54.

W. L. PHIPPS HERD HIGH FOR MARCH

**Wins Honors
For Milk And
Fat Averages**

In his report for the month of March, Larry Williams, Supervisor of the New Castle County Dairy Herd Improvement Association, revealed that the 23 cow herd of W. Lewis Phipps of Centerville had made a clean sweep of the monthly honors, leading the association in both fat and milk production and placing 3 cows in the "Four Hundred Club." Mr. Phipps' average fat production of 45.3 pounds was particularly outstanding in this month, when all other high herds were over a 30 percent average. Mr. Phipps' winning milk average was 1161 pounds.

The next 3 high herds in fat production were Mitchell Bros., Jerseys; Henry C. Mitchell, Jerseys; and Berkley Farms, Guernseys. Seven cows qualified for the honors of the "Four Hundred Club," two of these, owned by W. Lewis Phipps and Berkley Farms, exceeded 400 pounds in the 10 months.

High individual cow in fat production was a Jersey owned by Mitchell Bros. of Hockessin. Mr. Phipps had the top cows in milk production, the highest producing 2161 pounds for the month W. D. Wheatley of Clayton had the most 1000 pound cows for the month with 23.

NEW RATION BOOK READY

**No. 5 To Appear
Late This Year**

There's nothing tentative about food rationing continuing after V-E Day. War ration book five already is being prepared.

OPA plans to put it into use late this year or early in 1946. Along with nearly everyone else, OPA expects V-E Day long before that time.

There has been no final decision yet whether the new book will be for a one or two-year period. Those preparing it think, however, that probably it will follow the pattern of the current book four and be good for about 24 months—just in case.

"We certainly hope food rationing won't last into late 1947, but it would be more economical to plan on the pessimistic side than to have to print a sixth book," an OPA official said.

At the present rate of use, book four red stamps for meat and dairy products will last until about Dec. 1. Blue processed food stamps will do themselves until around Oct. 1.

Triumph reported net sales of \$20,903,606 for the six months ended Jan. 31, 1945.
