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# Fire sprinklers now required in Newark

Does not affect existing homeowners unless they convert to rentals or other uses

ll new construction, as well as some existing structures, are now subject to the city of Newark's requirement for sprinklers in the event of fires.

City council spent three hours on Monday night discussing the amendment to the city's BOCA National Building Code. The city ordinance now requires sprinkler systems in all new structures and houses, as well as all prefabricated structures moved into Newark or movedwithin the city, existing structures which undergo a change in primary use or which receive renovations to more than 50 percent of their area at any one time, and any single-family homes converted to rentals in the

and an employee of New Castle County Emergency Management Services, sponsored the amendment in Newark. Farrell gave an impassioned and detailed presentation to support his proposal.

"I know what goes on at fire scenes," said Farrell. "For 33 years I've watched it happen, but the general public doesn't know other than watching TV."

Farrell said sprinklers in build-

Farrell said sprinklers in buildings, especially residences, where the greater percentage of fires start during the night, would reduce risks for firefighters as well as occupants.

"Fire is relentless," Farrell said while showing a film demonstrating that smoke detectors only help those who wake up to heed them. "Temperatures at floor level can be 375 degrees when we arrive (minutes after a fire alarm is called in)," he said. "The carpets are already starting to smoulder as we enter the home. We're expected to do magic – and we do – but not always."

Farrell reminded those at the council meeting of a recent fire in Newark in which two Aetna fire-fighters became trapped in a home and almost lost their lives.

into the city do not have to be sprinklered, but become subject to the ordinance after that time. Accessory structures, like sheds, which do not exceed 500 square feet, do not have to be sprinklered.

Councilmember John H. Farrell IV, a former fire chief for Aetna Hose, Hook and Ladder themselves to descend stairs' where the temperatures had reached 1000 degrees," said Farrell. "Ladies and gentlemen, the fact is, they threw themselves headfirst down the stairs – one of them lost his helmet as he fell."

# Apartment complexes busy with students moving in for new year

# Almost all locations full in downtown area of Newark

hh, that familiar smell of bagels, perfume, pizza, coffee, sweat socks and beer, mixed with that scent of whatever that is stuck behind the refrigerator.

Yes, the fragrance of college life has seeped back into town, with the fall semester upon us, and with it an influx of more than 19,000 students.

This year, the dorms are overflowing once again, with 7,187 students, including 3,220 freshmen registered to live in them as of Aug. 24, said Linda Carey, director of housing assignments for the university. The total number of dorm dwellers has

increased by about 350 students since last year.

One hundred and fifty-four rooms are doubles converted into triples this year, Carey said, but since this week marks the dropoff date for students who are signed up for a dorm room but not yet registered for classes, the number of converted triples will go down within the next few weeks.

"Some people decide that the University of Delaware is just not what they expected and for whatever reason, they decide not to attend."

But even though students will soon have the choice to be in doubles instead of triples, many still decide to live together for the academic year, she said

According to property managers, students are moving in rapidly at local apartment complexes throughout the city as well.

The 880 beds in the one-year-old University Courtyard apartments at Delaware Avenue and Chapel Street are completely full, according to Masha Sapper, property manager. She said moveins are hectic right now, but staff at the complex try to get a system going so students move in throughout the year, not all at once.

The Courtyard apartment complex on East Main Street is also full for the fall, and students are even on a waiting list for next year, said Karen DeVenney, spokesperson for the Commonwealth

Commonwealth has 42 apartments in The Courtyard with another 34 apartments in other buildings on Main Street and 48 in the Mill at White Clay on Paper Mill Road.

DeVenney said all of the Main Street properties, except for two of the four apartments which will open in October above Happy Harry's, are full. One hundred percent of the tenants are college students, she said.

At The Mill at White Clay complex, however, tenants are college students, young professionals

and families, according to DeVenney.

Commonwealth staff have been busy this week helping students in the downtown locations get their utilities hooked up, Devenney said. But for the most part, things have not been overly hectic.

"All of our leases run from June 1 to May 31, so it was more hectic in June when (students) were turning over their keys," she explained. "Students pay rent for the apartments all summer; whether they choose to stay in town for that time is up to them."

Main Street Court, a complex of 48 apartments between Main Street and Delaware Avenue on the former Newark Lumber site, still some apartments available, according property manager Brian Lorom, though he opted not to say how many.

Nonetheless, the rental office has been busy all week. "Busy is an understatement," Lorom said.

#### Aggressive driving targeted in Newark

# Men threatened with gun on Ritter Lane

# Man selling crack cocaine in Kimberton

Acting on a tip, New Castle County Police arrested and charged a man for allegedly trafficking cocaine, possession with the intent to deliver cocaine and resisting arrest. in the area of the Kimberton Apartments on Thursday, Aug. 23 around 7:30 p.m. County Police found 23-year-old Michael L. # **Tolls are doubling** on Maryland roads

Tolls are expected to double on Interstate 95, Route 40 and Route 301, pending a final decision next month by the Maryland Transportation Authority.

Current \$2 tolls would become \$4 on the John F. Kennedy Memorial Highway and at the Hatem Memorial Bridge, and be hiked from \$1.50 to \$3 at the Nice Memorial Bridge.

A study conducted by the MdTA in 1999 calculated that more than \$4.7 billion will be needed for capital improvement projects throughout the next 20 years.

Nearly \$1.7 billion of the estimated costs will go toward improvements along the John F. Kennedy Memorial Highway alone. The three tolls that will be affected by the increase are located near the 50-mile stretch of Kennedy highway.

Lori Vidil, director of media and customer relations for the MdTA, admitted the Hatem bridge was chosen for a price hike to discourage traffic diversion from Interstate 95 to Route 40 to avoid the toll on the Kennedy highway.

The cost of Automatic Vehicle Identification tags on the Hatem bridge used by commuters will remain at \$4 a year. The cost of discounted commuter passes valid for trips on the Kennedy highway and Hatem bridge will also remain the same price, \$20 for a set of 50 trips. "We made every effort to minimize the impact on those people who have to frequent the facility," Vidil said.

The last time tolls on the Hatem bridge increased was in 1989, when the cost to cross was raised from 50 cents to \$1 in each direction. The toll had been set at 50 cents for 14 years before the last change. Tolls along the Kennedy Highway were last raised in 1975, from 90 cents to \$1 in each direction.

However, in 1991, toll collections were only taken from motorists going in one direction, thus making the tariff \$2.

Even if the \$4 toll is approved, Vidil claimed, "by 2005 we are projecting negative unencumbered cash balances."

# Stories about fires put out by sprinklers seldom make the front page

serious injury because a third fireman risked his life to stand inside the front door and spray the stairs with a hose to improve their chances.

Farrell said in cases where fires are extinguished by sprinklers, firefighters merely "mop up" the scene. "When we enter a building with 'cold smoke' we do a systematic search for possible occupants of the building," he explained. "A few squirts of the hose take care of any remaining embers of fire and a firefighter on a stepladder uses a pine wedge to stop the flow of water from the sprinkler head. Then we remove any burned property in debris buckets, vent the smoke and squeegee the floor to remove any water.

Farrell said this is a success story that seldom makes the front page of a newspaper, "No 'Film no firefighter injuries."

Firefighters from other local jurisdictions urged city council to approve the ordinance. "The lack of fire suppression devices killed two people in the house next door to mine," said Thomas Minton, a lifemember of the Elsmere Fire Company. "I ran out, but no one could do anything - fire exploded out of their split level home."

One resident expressed concern that persons subletting their homes temporarily would be subject to the sprinkler requirement. However, building director Junie Mayle said homes rented during sabbaticals of one year or less are not considered conversions to rentals under city regulations.

John Baucher, president of the Newark Landlords Association, said he believed the ordinance is discriminatory toward rentals. "This will make single-family homes unavailable to low income people," he said. "I'm going to

However, Dwayne Wayland, who installs fire protection devices, said he has installed thousands of sprinklers in HUD homes. "They're required in Section 8 homes in some areas," Wayland told council.

According to Farrell, sprinklers are individually heat-calculated and supplied with water at a predetermined pressure through a network of small bore piping in much the same way as the domestic heating system. "When the heat from a fire raises the temperature of the operating element to approximately 155 degrees Fahrenheit, the sprinkler releases water in a controlled pattern directly over the source of the fire."

Unlike scenes in some movies, Farrell said merely lighting a match does not set off a rain of water all over a building.

Farrell noted that many people killed or injured in fires are the elderly, disabled, person impaired by drugs or alcohol or young children. "Often these people are unable to react to a smoke alarm," he said.
"Sprinklers take that extra step – they not only detect fire but also react on the person's behalf. In addition, we have mandated smoke detectors in all homes, but we have yet to figure out how to get occupants to maintain the bat-

Sprinklers use about 210 gallons of water to douse a fire. while firefighters can use almost 3,300 gallons for the average fire. With sprinklers, an average fire will cause \$1,945 in damage," Farrell said. "Without sprinklers, an average fire can cost \$17,067."

#### **Delaware State** Police in process of reaccreditation

in 1988 and re-accredited in 1993 and 1998. Maintaining this status is an on-going process and requires constant monitoring and updating of policies and procedures. Re-accreditation is a formal recognition of the agency's professional excellence.

The Delaware State Police were the first law enforcement agency in Delaware to receive International Law Enforcement Accreditation. There are approximately 450 Accredited agencies in the United States, Canada, and Barbados.

CALEA was formed in 1979 by the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP), the National Organization of Black Law Enforcement executives (NOBLE), the Police Executive Research Forum (PERF) and the National Sheriff's Association to find the best police practices and policies and use them to ensure better training and education of police officers and to form professional standards to be utilized on a national level.

Property managers at Main Street Court meet with the tenants and give them some pointers to keeping their living space safe. "For a lot of the kids, it's their first apartment, so we try to let them know that if they have a problem, they need to let us know right away and not come to us when they're moving out and say, 'Oh, it was like that when I moved in," Lorom said.

The majority of tenants are either graduate or undergraduate students, he said.

The 135-unit University Garden Apartments, on the corner of Elkton and Beverly roads, have only about 10 units that are not occupied by students, said Grace Watts, the office manager.

Shirly Graves, who works at West Knoll apartments on Elkton Road, said about 70 percent of the tenants there are students this year. "We kept a lot of the students who were living here last year," she

Nearby Park Place Apartments are filled with more graduate students than undergrads, according, to managers. "We lost some tenants to all of the new apartments, but graduate students definitely took up the slack this year," said Sarah Madanat, manager of the 276-apartment complex. "I think it's because (the apartments) are a lot cleaner and not as noisy."

Directly across the street, however, the 430-unit Towne Court complex houses more undergrads than graduate students, said assistant property manager Tonya Watts. The complex is about 95 percent fullright now, she said. "We have a lot of students coming in at the last minute:"

Staff at apartments at Christina Mill and Victoria Mews apartments nearer Suburban Plaza, said theircomplexes are hardly impacted by the inpouring of students. About 30 percent of tenants at Victoria Mews are students, and Christina Mill has a minimal amount of student renters.





# There are times you can only tell a book by its second cover

## Is safety worth it?

As a parent, I would like to think that we are concerned enough about the lives of our children to spend the money and effort to ensure they are protected at home, in the community, in our vehicles and on our roadways.

I was shocked to read a recently published article in the National Safety Council's magazine, "Traffic Safety." Progressive Insurance Company conducted an opinion survey which collected the alarming news is that most people who purchase cars do not consider safety factors a priority when choosing the family car. According to the survey: 47 percent of consumers considered the color of the car more important than whether the vehicle had side airbags; 22 percent considered a CD player more

important than the choice of ABS brakes; 24 percent said the choice of leather seats was more important than the choice of four-wheel drive; those with children were nearly twice as likely to say the monthly payment figure was more a deciding

than the safety features of the car; those who have had more than one accident in the past three years were six times more likely to drive fast after purchasing a new car; those who were asked about their change in driving behaviors after purchasing a new vehicle were more likely to be concerned with eating and drinking less in the car than they were about speeding or tailgating less often; and men were more than three times more likely than women to report they drove faster after buying a new vehicle.

It appears from these statistics that most people people consider a vehicle a toy. Many children are left unattended in vehicles, which can cause some hazardous results. Within 30 days in the summer of 1998, 11 children died after trapping themselves inside the car trunk. In 1999, 29 children died from intense heat while trapped in cars during the months of June, July, and August. Other hazards that occur when we let children play in vehicles are ill-




(Top) The cover of Hoffecker's new book shows Memorial Library which opened on the Mall in 1924 with the single largest contribution from P. S. du Pont.


(Inset) Harter and Wolf halls were among the first buildings on the newly created University Mall - made pos-



Most of these players will play both offensively and defensively this season.


