





New Tomato Variety Shows Promise In Delaware

Southern Lands, a new variety of to mato shows promise as a commercial and home garden tomato, According to Robert F. Stevens, extension horti-culturist for the University of Dela-ware, this variety recently introduced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, has been tested for the first time

in Delaware this year. The advantages of this new tomato are that it is resistant to Collar Rot, immune to Fusarmon Wilt and shows a moderate resistance to carly blight. Tests this year by the Delaware Agri-Tests this year by the Delivate Agri-cultural Experiment Station in co-operation with the Libby, McNeill and Libby plant at Wyoming, indicated that Southern Lands yields as well as pres-ent varieties and has the advantage of some disease resistance. Tests were also continued at the Georgetown Agricul-tural Substation with similar results. In appearance the Southern Land resembles the Marglobe but it contains

some of the characteristics of Rutgers Although this variety cannot be recom-mended for planting until it has been lested further. Stevens says that farm-ers might want to use it on a trial basis next year.
