## Chrysler Recalls Workers Ahead Of Time Gain Four Days On 1961 Model Output

The bulk of the layoffs are said to be in the Detroit area. Chrysler estimates its total employment at about 107,000 in plants throughout the country.

The 3,500 affected in varying degrees by the layoff at Newark constitute the plant's entire complement of hourly assembly workers.

Chrysler made public its own figures on the layoff after a previous estimate by the trade paper, *Automotive Reports*, that 20,000 workers would be laid off.

## Local Pastor Dies After Heart Attack At Newark Home

The Rev. Nelson J. Greenley, pastor of St. John's A. U. M. P. Church, Newark, was pronounced dead on arrival last Thursday at Delaware Hospital where he was taken after a heart attack at his home.

Mr. Greenley, 2 Terry Lane, Newark, had served at St. John's Church since 1957.

Born in Wilmington, he was a graduate of Wilmington High School. For 20 years he served as superintendent of the Sunday School of St. John's A. U. M. P. Church. During that time he was employed by the Pullman Company.

Retiring from the company because of ill health, he enrolled in the A. U. M. P. School of Religion, Seventh and Spruce Streets, Wilmington, then took a post in 1954 at St. John's A. U. M. P. Church on the campus of Lincoln University, Pa.

He is survived by his wife, Annette; his mother, Mrs. Ella Cephas, Cleveland, O.; a sister, Mrs. Bertha Rodgers, Cleveland; a brother, Arthur, Wilmington; and several nieces and nephews.

Services were held last Tuesday afternoon at Mother A. U. M. P. Church, Wilmington, with interment in Mt. Zion Cemetery.

## Coast Guard Aids Three Local Men, Boy With Boat Tow In Dismal Swamp Canal

The U. S. Coast Guard won a win spot deep in the hearts of three Newark men and a 12-year-old boy on the dark night of July 22, as the Newark voyagers occupied a 28-ft. cruiser, dead on the water of the Dismal Swamp Canal, between Great Bridge and Norfolk, Va.

A fuel line failure silenced the 188-horse in the marine engine just as darkness enveloped the Inter-Coastal Waterway, with some 12 gallons of gas remaining in the tank—and what had appeared to be an easy, short cruise to the Great Bridge suddenly developed into a difficult situation—a late wait and some night fright with the nearby passage of big tugs pushing bigger barges through the inland waterway.

A passing pleasure boat was hailed, and its friendly crew agreed to phone for assistance—assistance that appeared within less than 30 minutes with the questing beam of a searchlight from the pilothouse of a Coast Guard Cutter probing through the blackness from Berkeley, Va.

## Mary Raub Evans Estate Offers UD Gift Of \$700,000

Major Share To Maintain  
Evans Hall; Civic Leader  
Wills College Avenue Home

A gift of some \$700,000 has been provided for the University of Delaware, from the estate of Mrs. Mary Raub Evans, Newark civic leader who died July 1.

Mrs. Evans requested that the bulk of the money be applied to the maintenance and rebuilding of Evans Hall, which houses the school of engineering on the Newark campus.

Also left to the university was Mrs. Evans' home which adjoins the campus at 19 North College Avenue.

The will also provides that \$6,000 be placed in trust for the First Presbyterian Church of Newark, where Mrs. Evans taught Sunday School for many years.

Mrs. Evans became associated with the university in 1885 when her father, Albert N. Raub, was appointed head of Newark Academy. Mr. Raub was later named president of Delaware College which is now the University of Delaware.

Evans Hall was constructed in 1929 and contains the offices, classrooms, laboratories, and shops of the engineering school.

The hall was named in honor of Mrs. Evans' husband, Charles B. Evans, a Wilmington attorney who died in 1933, and his father, George B. Evans. Both served as trustees and treasurers of the university and the Evans family contributed a portion of the funds for the construction of the hall.

Other bequests included \$1,000 to be applied to scholarships for students designated by the alumnae association of the Women's College; \$500 for the purchase of books for the Newark Public Library; and several scholarships for engineering students.

In urging participation of Delaware's young people, Governor Boggs called attention to the fact that "boys and girls who make good use of their leisure time strengthen the moral fibre of the community in which they live and build happier and more productive lives."

## Three Top Corn Growers To Aid Research In Comparing Crop Harvesting Methods

Three of Delaware's leading corn growers are teaming up with the University of Delaware Agricultural Experiment Station to compare the picker-sheller-drier corn harvesting systems against the conventional corn picker-direct sale or crib storage system, according to extension agronomist William H. Mitchell.

The three farmers are James Knotts, Smyrna; Francis Winkler, Harrington; and Marshall Wooten, Millsboro. Each plot has eight acres of corn planted at different seeding rates and with four different fertilizer treatments. These range from no fertilizer at all to the amount recommended for 100 bushel crops in Delaware.

Plans are being made for a field day at each of the demonstration sites in early September, depending on how fast the corn grows, Mitchell said.

## Avon To Construct \$2,000,000 Plant On Ogletown Road

Ground Breaking Marks  
Start Of New Facility  
For Chapel Street Firm

Ground was broken Wednesday of last week for a \$2,000,000 Avon Products plant on Route 273 near Newark.

Ralph Madden, general manager of the Newark office, said that the one-story brick and steel structure will replace Avon's present Delaware offices on South Chapel Street, which the firm has outgrown.

Construction will be on the 178,000-sq. ft. site opposite the Motor Wheel Corporation.

Frontage will include some 800 ft. on the Ogletown-Newark Road, with some 800-ft. of Baltimore & Ohio Railroad siding.

The Suffern, N. Y. firm, which purchased the 47-acre tract in June, 1959, has named Whiteside, Buckel & Carbone of Wilmington as architects, and Frederic G. Krapp & Son as builder.

Krapp was contractor for Avon's original Delaware facility which was established in 1951.

The Route 273 site, selected after survey of available property in the Newark area, was bought from David A. McMullin and Floyd and Rose E. Mays.

## First Scottish Games At Delaware Park To Feature Saturday Contests, Bagpipes

A totally new form of entertainment—at least for Delaware—will be unveiled this Saturday, at Delaware Park, the Delaware State Development Department reports.

While the sound of the bagpipe will be comparatively new to many in attendance at the first annual Delaware Scottish Games, it undoubtedly will be a most welcome sound to all Scots of this area, who, with their families and friends, are expected to turn out at the Stanton racing oval and help make this "Scottish Day" one long to be remembered.

According to officials of the Scottish Games Association of Delaware, there will be something doing at Delaware Park throughout the day.

In addition to piping contests and marching contests, there will be Highland dances, feats of strength, bicycle races, and a series of track events.

Attracting much attention will be the "tossing the caber," a traditional Scottish test of strength in which a contestant first balances a huge heavy log against his body and then tosses the log through the air. Competition in this event will be divided into two classes—one involving youth between the ages of 15 and 20, and the other including contestants who have passed their 20th birthday.

Track events include the 100-yard dash, 440-yard run, a Highlander Invitational Mile, a two-mile run, and a two-and-a-half-mile medley relay.

Cycling events will be a two-mile distance race for boys 15 and over, and a one-mile race for girls 15 and over. Standard two-wheel bicycles will be used.

Pipe bands, pipers and dancers will compete for prizes totaling several thousand dollars. Delaware's only Scottish musical unit, the Gordon Pipe Band, under Pipe Major Robert Gilchrist, will be host for the musical and dancing competition and will receive part of the proceeds for new uniforms.

## Retirement For Police Chief Announced At Council Meeting

The retirement of Newark Police Chief William H. Cunningham after 32 years of service was announced at the regular meeting of City Council on Tuesday of last week, and an ordinance to retain the police veteran as a special consultant was approved at an initial reading, with a final reading scheduled for next Tuesday night.

The date of Chief Cunningham's retirement was not disclosed, nor was a successor named. He is not old enough to qualify for the municipal pension plan, and terms of the contract to retain him as a police consultant were not disclosed, either.

## Louviers Employees Win Safety Award For Non-Injuries

4,500,000 Hours Worked  
Without Lost Time Hurt  
Wins Top Du Pont Award

Dr. George E. Holbrook, Du Pont Company vice-president presented the company's highest safety award to employees of the Louviers Building in ceremonies last week at the engineering department's headquarters near Newark.

This makes the 10th safety award received by this group.

Charles E. Daniels, assistant chief engineer, accepted the award for his associates.

The Louviers unit numbers 2,100 men and women, including some employees at other locations.

They worked 4,500,000 hours during the period from June 15, 1959, to July 25 of this year, a total of 407 calendar days without a single lost-time injury. Had they followed the accident frequency rate of industry, 29 lost-time injuries might have resulted.

## Chrysler Receives Army Green Light To Finish Tanks

The U. S. Army has given the green light to complete 180 M-60 tanks being made by Chrysler Corporation at the Delaware Tank Plant in Newark, at Scranton, Pa., and in Detroit.

A \$3,100,000 letter contract for completing work on the vehicles was signed in the Philadelphia Ordnance District office.

Work on the tanks is scheduled for completion by Sept. 31 in Newark.

After that, an official of the Newark plant said, no contract is in sight. However, Army spokesmen said Chrysler will receive \$2,000,000 more to finish work on the tanks.

The Delaware plant had lost out on a \$60,000,000 tank contract which went to Detroit.

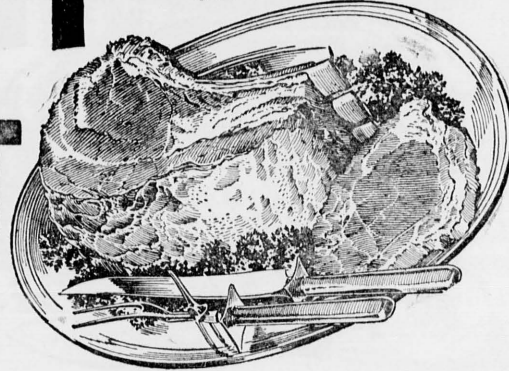

## Delaware Fullback John Walsh Wins Coaching Position

Former Blue Hen Star  
Named To Pilot Archers  
In Football And Track

Johnny Walsh, former Delaware fullback star, has been appointed football and track coach at Archmere Academy.

Walsh will succeed John J. Kappes, former West Chester State athlete who is resigning at the end of the school year.

Walsh, 25, a native of Philadelphia, graduated from Delaware two years ago. Since then, he has been teaching at Central Catholic High in Pittsburgh, where he was backfield coach of football under Jimmy Flynn, and baseball coach.

For Thoroughbred

In all fairness, however, this treatment isn't half so tender as that enjoyed by a horse of another era. Incitatus, owned by the Roman Emperor Caligula, lived in an ivory manger and drank wine from a golden pail.

About A.D. 40, the "mad emperor" made him a priest and a consul.

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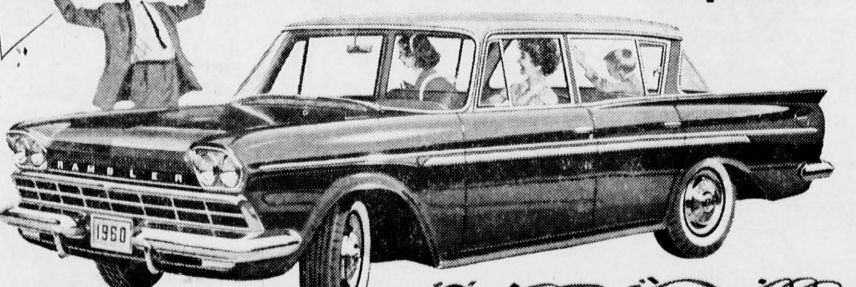
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## Newark All-Stars Lose In State Finals For Babe Ruth League Championship, 5-4

The Northern Delaware All-Stars became the state champions in the seventh when John Devenney smashed a line drive through the middle to score a man from second base.



From the Diamond State to the Diamond Shoals off Cape Hatteras to the Ocracoke Islands and of Blackbeard, Edward Teach and Arnold "Ducky" Stewart — from Ocracoke to Cape Lookout and the Core Sound paradise of Genial Jim Etheridge—four men and a small boy made the big trip in a small boat through the Intercoastal Waterway to the blue, blue, blue of the Gulf Stream last week, encountering a bit of everything from the U. S. Coast Guard, to fighting, golden dolphins, king mackerel, blues and rockfish, to Hurricane Brenda on Pamlico Sound.

That's a long sentence, but it was a long trip—a tremendous trip that will live in pleasant retrospect for all hands—one of those once-in-a-lifetime, perfect experiences for a dream-come-true vacation.

Leaving the Pen-Mar Marina at North East, Md., late Thursday evening aboard the 28-ft. Henry Lühr Jersey Sea Skiff "Young Un II," we trailed into camp for the night with one hickory shad taken off the Canary Islands below the Bay Bridge. And off Cove Point, just above the mouth of the Patuxent River the next day, we interrupted our Carolina cruise to boat 23 beautiful rock from the countless schools of fish chopping alewives and the calm surface of Chesapeake Bay beneath clouds of shrieking terns and gulls at noon.

### Chesapeake Rock

Little Bill, with a handy boat rod and a tiny shad spoon, caught 12 of the 12 rock, and Cap'n Gibby Young managed to catch three strippers while attempting to untangle his flapping undershirt from a reel handle amid a backlash of line in some frantic fishing.

Salvaged by the Coast Guard at Great Bridge, Va., that night, we took aboard Jim Etheridge from Plymouth, N. C., the next morning, and Mr. Etheridge, a master mariner, piloted us through the Dismal Swamp and into the very narrow entrance of the Cape Hatteras breakwater well after dark and some rough, roaring water over Pamlico Sound.

We had one particularly bad moment in this crossing—one of several, including Currituck and Albemarle which belie the term "Inland waterway."

Francis Neide appeared on the flying bridge with a thoughtful frown to report that the boat was leaking.

With the cruiser pounding in the narrow troughs between six-ft., white-fanged breakers rolling beneath a whistling wind out of a leaden, sunset sky, this bit of news added little to the gaiety of the occasion.

Quick inspection disclosed that the craft had not sprung a leak, but that the bilge pump hose had come off. There was plenty of water aboard, but it had splashed, not leaked in—and with the hose restored to the pump, the bilgewater was reduced to a more comforting level.

### Safe At Hatteras

In some needle-threading navigation, Jim Etheridge brought us safely into the Hatteras harbor, and after a seafood supper ashore at the Channel Bass Inn, we dropped anchor for the night to catch croak-

er, spot, and pigfish until sleep took over, just outside the breakwater. Trolling over the famed Diamond Shoals of Hatteras the next day, we watched the lighthouse drop over the eastern horizon as the blue, blue water of the Gulf Stream foamed white in our wake—and Billy lost some enthusiasm for big game fishing when some big, burly, fast, fish nearly pulled him over the stern in snapping a steel line trolling from a tightly-set reel.

Golden sargassum weed floated in a tideline on the blue of the Stream, but our initial pass failed to produce the expected dolphin strike. That came a few moments later, beside a red bell buoy.

### Green-Gold Dolphin

Jim Etheridge, trolling with a Calcutta surf rod from the flying bridge, gave a Carolina rebel yell—a Calcutta pole whirled into a semicircle and an unbelievable green and gold fish hurtled high above a roaring, white hole in the blue water after flashing out from beneath the buoy at the squid-baited feather lure.

We caught nine dolphin—magnificent fish from four to six pounds—rainbow-hued gamsters that jumped time and again, and fought in sizzling, sweeping, surface surges for all to see.

Moored at Ocracoke that night, we feasted on dolphin steak after giving away more than half our catch to dockside fishermen—campers who welcomed big fish fresh from the sea as they might have greeted old dollar bills.

Francis delivered the accolade for dolphin steaks with his reply concerning dessert after supper.

"I think I'll fix a dolphin sandwich," Mr. Neide said. And he did—probably the first of its kind.

Plugging

Some plug casting and bottom bait fishing in Pamlico Sound on our way south to Cape Lookout the next day resulted in bluefish, pinfish, a Carolina "porry" or angel fish, and a couple of thrilling but lost trout strikes.

We anchored that afternoon at Marshallberg for a four night stay ashore at Jim Etheridge's wonderful, modern cottage on a bluff above the blue water of Core Sound with the Cape Lookout lighthouse beyond on the far, Outer Banks.

Jim's sister Jean, with cousins John and Dottie Hewlett and their two youngsters, Susie and Chris, greeted the youngsters at the cottage, and fresh fish, tossed salad, cold steamed crabmeat, and hot, baked potatoes featured a super supper.

Billy remained ashore the next day with young Susie, Chris, and the two ladies in what was unquestionably a pleasant switch from confined, adult, male companionship, and John Hewlett joined us with Francis, Gibby, and Jim for a day in the Gulf Stream that resulted in two beautiful, yard-long king mackerel that caused hearts and reels to sing.

### In The Surf

And in the roaring white surf over the bars at the mouth of the inlet, we caught bluefish and Spanish Mackerel until we got tired of catching them, and departed for some flounder fishing in the bay. And we caught flounder, too.

Our hosts and hostesses headed home the next morning, leaving us with the cottage for the next two days—two days of perfect fishing, water and weather.

The neighboring Jones Brothers—Neil, Archie, and Pel—veteran watermen who were putting the finishing touches on their great 40-ft. Core Sound cabin cruiser with the proud bow they had built—proved helpful, delightful friends—and we met Neil in his fishing cruiser beyond the eastern horizon from Cape Lookout in our last day of fishing.

Francis Neide copped all honors for this day and the entire trip with a great 40-inch, green-gold dolphin, and a 15-lb. blue-silver albacore torpedo—and we wound things up with a dozen satin-silver, gold spotted Spanish mackerel from the white surf's thunder.

Going, Going... Gone!

With good reason, the annual auction sales of yearlings at Lexington, Ky., Saratoga, N.Y., and Del Mar, California, in late July and August, are called the greatest gamble of all. Many owners who would never bet on their horse in a race will, in effect, bet thousands of dollars on their judgment of a young Thoroughbred.

This year's noddled heads, fingered ears, hand waves, vocal response to the auctioneer and an occasional swatted fly will be translated by alert bid-watchers into close to \$7,000,000 in yearling transactions. Last year, at the three

major sales, 653 youngsters brought bids totaling \$65,123,367.

An interesting puzzle to many is why one yearling will attract bids of over \$50,000 while another, seemingly better looking and equally well bred, will make the auctioneer work hard to fetch a bid of \$5,000. All yearlings may look alike, and the inexperienced might choose a well-polished but toneless factory-made fiddle to an unlabeled Stradivarius. 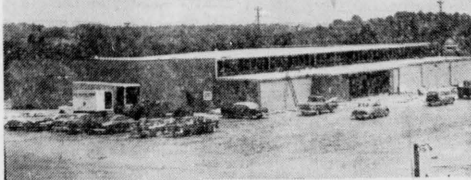

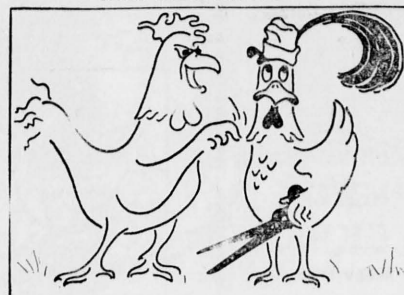

## Old Danish Skull Provides Original Kick For Football

Cheering coeds and klieg lights have brought football a long way from the days when the English stubbed their toes kicking around the skull of a Dane.

That's one theory of how the game started, according to research experts with the World Book Encyclopedia.

The Danes occupied England from 1016 to 1042. A few years after they left, some workmen digging in an old battlefield uncovered a Danish skull and started kicking it back and forth. Several boys who had been watching dug up another skull and soon everybody was "kicking the Dane's head."

They were also getting bruised toes. Some precocious youngsters substituted an inflated cow bladder and the game of football was born.

In the 1100's, the "game" was more of a riot. Teams from neighboring towns—sometimes with hundreds of players on each side—met at some midway point. The bladder was thrown down and the free-for-all was on. The object of the game was to kick the ball into the center of the rival town. When the yelling horde descended on the town, pedestrians ran for their lives and shopkeepers bolted their doors.

Eventually, the players were ordered to play in some vacant area or give up the sport. The teams retired to a field marked off with boundaries similar to those of a soccer field.

And the towns—and football—were saved.
