Dear Sir:—In acordance with an act of Legislature, I have the honor to submit, in the accompanying tables, the results of my analysis of the commercial fertilizers offered for sale in this State during the year 1898.

For the purpose of easy comparison I have given, side by side, the analysis of the various fertilizers as made in the laboratory and the guaranteed analysis as stamped on the bags. The figures represent per cent. or parts in a hundred.

The results of the chemical examination of commercial fertilizers during the past year have been, on the whole, quite satisfactory. The majority of the brands offered to the farmers of our State yielded results quite in accord with the guaranty of the manufacturers as the figures given in the appended tables will show,

The "comparative values" given in the last column of the tables are based on the following schedule for the various fertilizing ingredients:






