Senate met pursuant to adjournment at 11 a.m., Thurs.,

May 8, 1951, Lt. Gov. Bayard presiding.

Mr. Cannon presented to the Senate a statement of operations of the Joint Legislative Finance Committee of the 116th General Assembly as follows:

STATEMENT OF OPERATIONS OF THE JOINT LEGISLATIVE FINANCE COMMITTEE OF THE 116TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY

TO ALL MEMBERS OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

The first meeting of the Joint Legislative Finance Committee was held on February 2, 1951 and with few exceptions, continued daily until March 7, 1951. During this period, budget requests of all State agencies and schools were carefully examined, which involved discussion, in detail, of financial problems of over 160 agencies and schools, covering more than 1,000 budget categories, any one of which may involve one to fifty items. Also, 134 authorized representatives of 40 agencies and schools appeared before the Committee to discuss their budget requests. Each agency or school representative was granted ample time to discuss his problems. There was no disposition on the part of the Committee to hurry the representatives. Some were requested to appear more than once to provide additional information so the Committee could determine their needs more intelligently.

Due to the present world conditions, the Governor requested this Committee to give consideration to reducing expenditures included in the Budget as prepared by the Budget Commission. Therefore, every item in each budget was considered, and where it was possible to reduce or eliminate the item without jeopardizing the proper functioning or efficiency of the agency or school, it was done; in cases where it was considered the budget was too low, additional sums were recom-

mended.

The Committee's action on Educational appropriations was confined to recommending the amounts for "All Other"

Costs" under the Unit System of \$550 per unit as included in the Budget based on recommended "All Other Costs" of \$525 per unit by the State Board of Education. The difference of \$25 per unit was allowed to cover price increases.

The State Board of Education had proposed a supplemental bill for Capital Outlay of \$89 per unit for all State schools. Instead, this Committee is recommending that \$50 per unit be placed in the Emergency Fund to cover this Capital Outlay.

It was brought to the Committee's attention that under the present Law, each additional teacher had to be hired at the rate required for inexperienced teachers of \$2,400 per annum. Some schools found it impossible to hire teachers at this rate. Therefore, this Committee has recommended that schools be permitted to hire teachers at an average rate of \$3,000 per annum for each additional teacher, basing their individual salary upon their degree and experience as required by Law. It is recommended that the financial provision for meeting this average rate for teachers be placed in the Emergency Fund.

The salaries of personnel and the number of teachers for schools are fixed by Law. Therefore, the Committee acted only on the number of janitors, clerks and nurses, except as

otherwise requested by the school in question.

Although not a part of the Joint Legislative Finance Committee's assignment, this Committee also heard representatives of the Delaware Association of School Administrators, representing the schools throughout the State and individuals representing various organizations who were interested

in the education of handicapped children.

Requests received by the Budget Commission amounted to \$43,772,701.63 for 1952 and \$38,943,173.56 for 1953. Anticipated revenue compiled from information given by revenue producing agencies amounted to \$23,644,233.00 in 1952 and \$23,292,922.00 in 1953. The Budget prepared by the Budget Commission called for \$27,393,561.07 for 1952 and \$27,786,945.74 for 1953. This Budget would reduce the cash surplus to an estimated amount of \$7,313,409.18 as of June 30, 1953. This latter figure would be reduced by the passage of bills for the Emergency Fund and other supplemental appropriations. At the time the Budget was prepared, these were estimated to be \$4,313,409.18, which would reduce the estimated surplus to approximately \$3,000,000.00 as of June 30, 1953.

The Joint Legislative Finance Committee recommends that the budget appropriation for 1952 be reduced to \$26,201,527.22 and for 1953 be reduced to \$26,313,666.97, or a total reduction for the biennium of \$2,665,312.62, and we believe, after considerable study, that these appropriations will be sufficient for the efficient operation of the State for the coming

biennium.

The Committee suggests that the next Legislature, after both Houses are organized and members have been appointed to the Finance Committee in the Senate and the Appropriation Committee in the House, notices be sent to agencies and schools for hearings, and when it is determined that there is sufficient work for the Committee, the Legislature should adjourn for three to four weeks, so the Budget could be worked on by the Committee without interruption. In this way, there would be a considerable savings in expenditures for the State, due to the fact that there would be no need to have the numerous attaches present; there would be a saving in mileage of other members of the Legislature who were not members of the Joint Legislative Finance Committee, also, the numerous other costs incident to maintenance of the building.
