Cheaters rate 'excellent'

Don't stop looking over your neighbor's shoulder.

A recent campus-wide study by university officials showed that of the 78 percent of the students who admitted cheating, 73 percent rated "excellent" on eye-hand coordination tests.

"It's all that good rubbernecking," said University President E.T. "the Extra-Terrestrial" Trampoline. "Our students show fine flexibility in the Smith lecture halls. We're very proud."

The researchers studied eyeball reflexes, neck extension and rapid finger movement during the two-day testing period at the Clay Blimp. "The atmosphere at the Blimp," said Dr. Paula Pollster, survey head, "is extremely similar to the typical test-taking environment."

"The ability of some of the subjects to raise a full beer mug to their lips while scoping out some of the finest sights in Newark," she said, "was remarkable."

Janitors pledge cleaner urinals

How many times have you woken up and struggled to the bathroom to relieve yourself only to find out that the last person to use the "throne" the night before didn't have that good of aim.

After careful consideration from both the Delaware Undergraduated Slob Committee and the National Board of Custodial Directors, the controversial custodial evaluations were approved late last night.

"It was a big plus for our janitorial staff here at Delaware," said DUSK spokesman Kris Pisty. "Now our staff can go to work knowing that the whole university is behind them."

Pisty said that janitors were under a lot of pressure from the administration lately for "failure to act properly in emergency and routine" custodial calls.

The evaluations became almost inevitable said Pisty, after last semester's tragic explosion of Central Campus urinals. In that accident, two students suffered severe urine inhalation when 24 urinals suddenly blew up causing hallways to flood.

"It was a terrible scene,"

said Jani Torial university plumber. "The students were all coming out the doors and windows of Mythe Hall lookin' like they seen hellfire. Lord Almighty!"

According to Pisty, the evaluations stirred controversy throughout the university because there were so many important topics at stake.

Among the most crucial of the evaluation points were: overtime pay for janitors willing to clean up after campus parties; tenure for any janitor who cleans more than 250 urinals a semester and performance above and beyond the call of duty.

Pisty cited the well documented incident last year when DUSK Vice President Jill "Clean 'Em Up" Lalosky rescued three suffocating co-eds from a blazing inferno sparked by severe gastritis leaking from shower heads in Farter Hall.

"Incidents such as these clearly show that these janitors here deserve to be compensated for their efforts," Pisty said. "The passing of these evaluations will go down as a precedent in the

Review staff to begin mandatory prayer

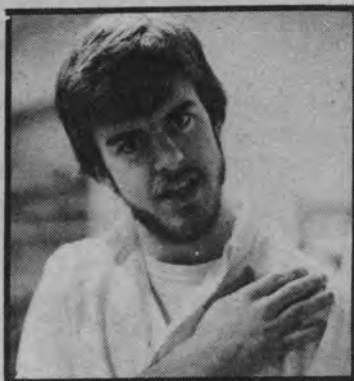
There will be mandatory prayer at The Review starting April 1, according to the Editor-in-Chief, Kan't Worry.

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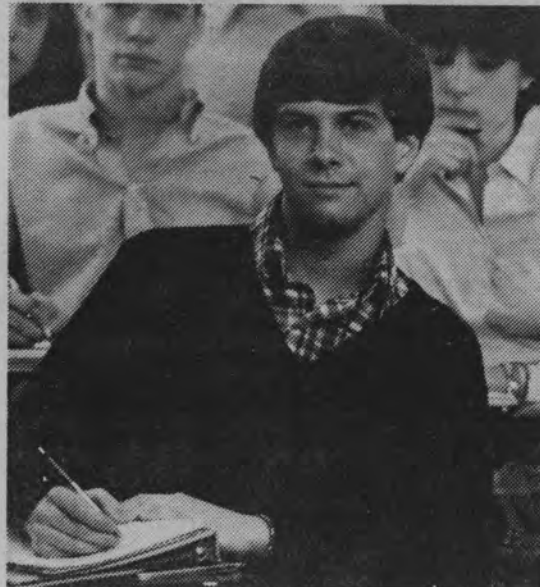

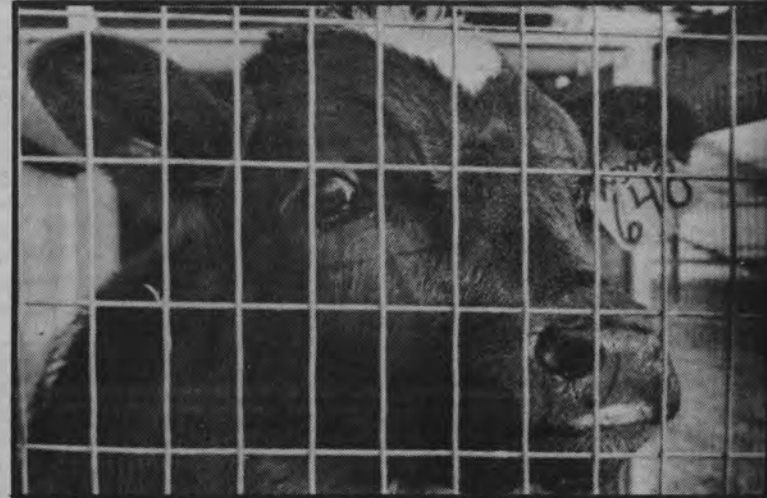
Marylanders' favorites. "If there's one thing we love," said Jo Bob, "it's our dogfish. It even barks when you bite it."

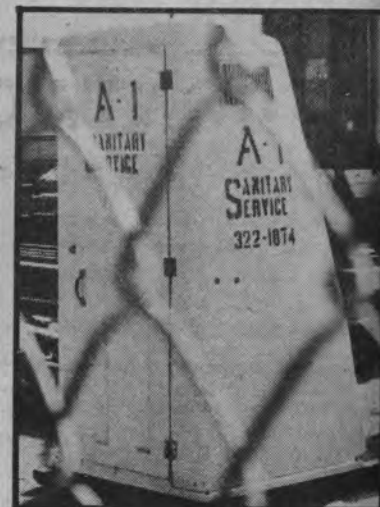
Mayor Freenhead is well aware of the perjorative view

Club Clap Trap, Nov. 31, 1983. Interdenominational Easter Egg Hunt and Annual Brunch. Newark's latest punk sensation, Damn Painful, is belting out its big hit, "The Dissection of the Hunchback Clydesdale." Suddenly, a fried egg sails Frisbee-style past bass player Ken Dahl and splatters across the chest of drummer Johannes Beethoven.

Beethoven stops playing and calls for quiet. The rest of the band dribbles to a halt. Beethoven mutters, "Oh, wow," and removes his shirt, revealing on his chest an intricate tattoo of the entire Atlantic City boardwalk.

The band resumes playing, accompanied by the frenzied belching of a drunk at the bar.

"A Damn Painful show is always pretentious, yet soporific," says WXDR disc jockey James Shiny. "The guys are abstruse without being piquant; insipid, and yet cacophonous. Altogether, a fine band and a great little dessert wine."

Snott Phunnie is the brains behind Damn Painful. Phunnie penned most of the band's six-song repertoire and, though he appears to do nothing on stage, he actually supplies the voice for lead singer Beethoven.

"I left a promising career as a ventriloquist to form this band," Phunnie explains. "I always wanted to work with Johannes, ever since I saw him in 1979 at the American Red Cross Punk/Funk Dunk-a-Hunk in New York." That biannual event, in which celebrities agree to soak in the East River until their skin gets all pruny, draws pledges from the entire United States. Past participants have included Johnny Annoying, the Shroom Casualties, Lester Leather and the Man-Made Uppers and Tommy Conwell's Young Rumlbers.

In addition to his many other talents, Phunnie has an aptitude for electronics. He recently invented the automatic

reed sucker used by Painful's clarinetist, Cosmo "The Trained" Seal.

Seal defected from the Kiev Philharmonic last year to become America's foremost punk clarinetist. Phunnie invited "The Trained" to join Painful in spite of Seal's 10 years of music lessons. "I figure any guy who has a haircut like that and who doesn't speak English is Damn Painful material," Phunnie says.

The most flamboyant member of the group is guitarist Butch BoPeep, whom doctors have diagnosed as a homicidal schizophrenic with a cleanliness fetish. Under the name of Limm Berger, BoPeep led the Philadelphia-based Odeurs to the top of the punk charts with their album "Chee' Whiz," which has sold nearly a dozen copies since 1978.

The Odeurs dissolved when bassist Dunno Wye left in 1980 to join Testicular Cancer. BoPeep then formed Damn Painful with Phunnie. In a fit of anger against Wye, BoPeep began the Damn Painful tradition of wearing human-hand neck warmers.

"Those hands were Butch's best idea," says drummer/non-singer Johannes Beethoven, whose real name is Dolores Beethoven. "As a guitarist, he really sucks."

BoPeep has the same admiration for Beethoven's talent. "Johannes couldn't keep a beat in a cage."

Damn Painful's bass player, Ken Dahl, recently made headlines with his scandal-filled divorce from pop star Holly Mackerel. Mackerel claimed the couple had not had marital relations since their wedding night eight years earlier. Dahl's countersuit, filed in Family Court, said in pertinent part, "I tried, but..."

However, things are firming up for the band as a whole. Damn Painful plays regularly at area bars at least four times a year. Between gigs they support themselves by collecting welfare and scavenging from trash cans.

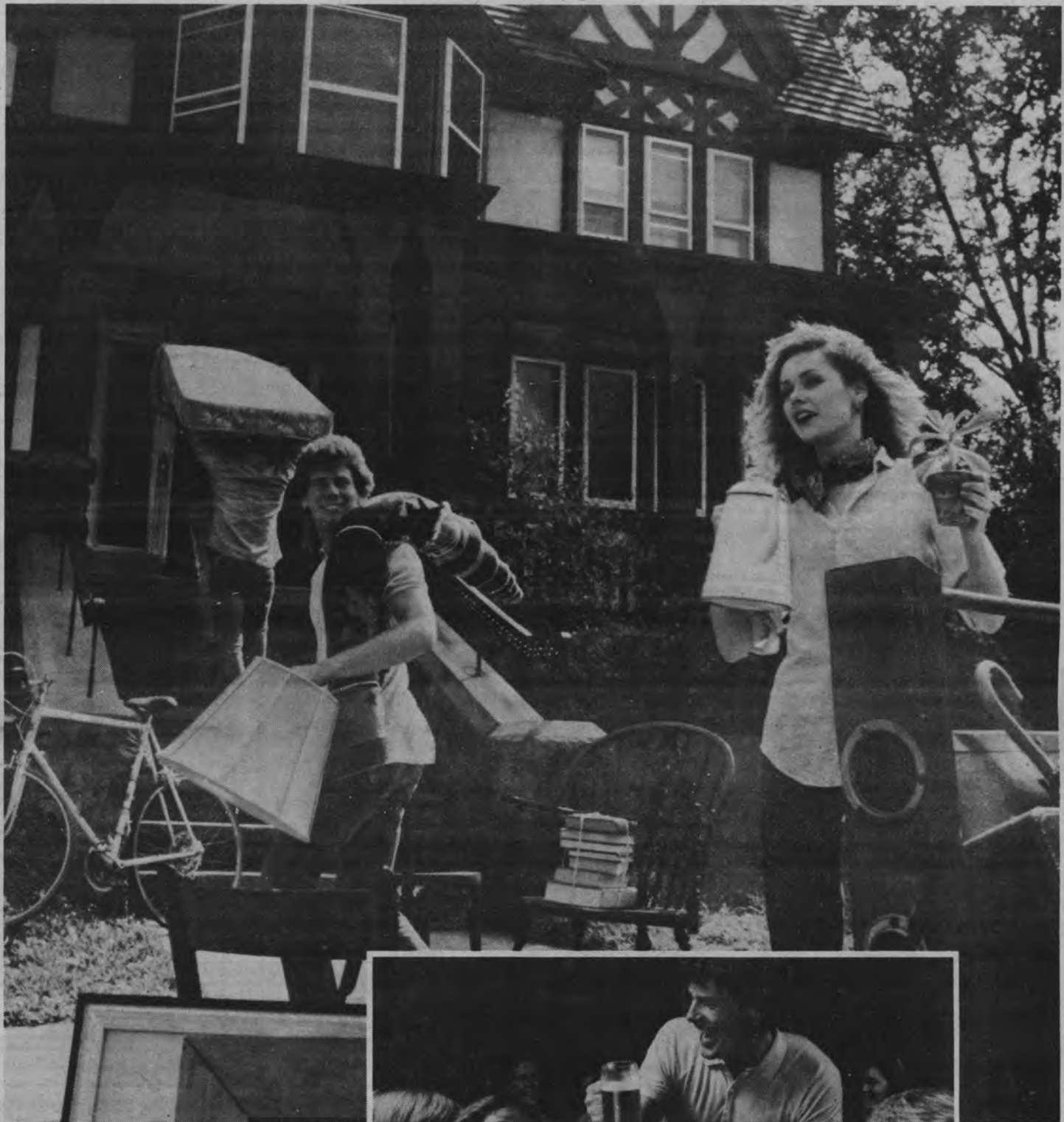
glamorous world of custodial service."
