Dear Raymond:

I have your note of May 21 with which you send me a copy of a letter you have received from Williams with regard to the visit to Berlin in 1933 of certain Christian Scientists. I am very glad to have the information which you give me which is helpful. The matter has lost its actuality and you may tell Mr. Williams that I am doing nothing further in the matter. My own interest was to refresh my memory. I am particularly interested in the last sentence of Mr. Williams' letter in which he states that his information from other sources does not lead him to support unreservedly my interpretation of Lord Astor's later attitude toward the Third Reich. I can only say in this connection that my opinion of Lord Astor's attitude is based on a conversation which I had with him in London several years ago. I think by this time he has somewhat changed his views but I regret to say that the change came somewhat late.
