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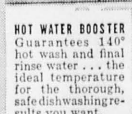
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Christmas Caroling Slated At Local Shopping Center

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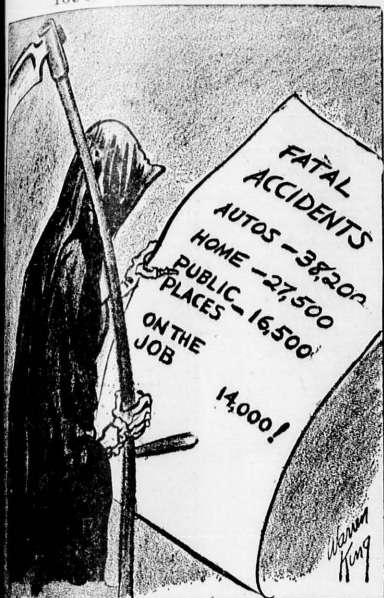

ask your luncheon companions this question: "Where's the safest place for workers to be—at home, in a public place, or on the job?"

Today, American working men and women are safest where they are at their jobs.

The startling facts come from the Insurance Information Institute, which has a solid business reason for coming up with correct figures.

They are safer on the job than at home, safer than in public places and most certainly safer than in traffic.

In 1960, some 14,000 on-the-job industrial fatalities were reported for the entire United States as against approximately 38,200 motor vehicle fatalities, 27,500 fatalities in public places and 16,500 fatalities in homes.

The III gives American industry a pat on the back: "There is good reason to cheer such progress in making factories, plants, mills and offices safe places in which to work."

Half a century ago accidents were commonplace. In 1911, 100,000 workers out of every 100,000 employed in manufacturing were killed at their jobs.

Twenty years later, in 1933, the ratio was 25 killed per 100,000 workers. Today, the figure is approximately 11 per 100,000.

Roland Warrington Killed In 30-Ft. Construction Fall

Newark Man Dies After Falling In Construction Project At Oil Refinery

A Newark man was fatally injured Tuesday in a 30-ft. fall while working on a construction project at the Tidewater Oil Refinery at Delaware City.

Roland P. Warrington, 59, of 74 East Delaware Avenue, died at St. Francis Hospital at 1:35 p.m. where he had been taken in the company ambulance. The accident occurred at 9:45 a.m.

Death apparently was caused by head injuries. Dr. Philip J. G. Quigley, state medical examiner, said an autopsy will be conducted.

State Police said Warrington, employed by the Catlytic Construction Co., Philadelphia, was helping lash an overhead pipe. Upon completion of the job, they said, Warrington slipped from a pipe on which he was standing and fell to the ground.

Son of the late Stephen and Margaret Hudson Warrington of Georgetown, Mr. Warrington had lived in the Newark area for 25 years.

Surviving are his widow, Edith M. Warrington; a daughter, Mrs. Alta Buckingham of Newark; a son, Harold E., at home; two grandchildren; a brother, Stephen Warrington, of Marcus Hook, Pa., and a sister, Lottie Warrington of Georgetown.

Funeral services will be held Friday at 2 p.m. at the R. T. Jones Funeral Home, Newark, with the Rev. J. Calvin Alt, pastor of Wesleyan Methodist Church, officiating. Interment will be in Newark Cemetery.

Arnold Saunders Named All-State First Team End

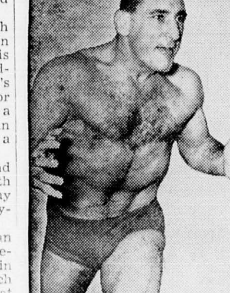
