

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The year of living through the impossible

ost of this edition comprises our traditional year in review, as reported on the pages of the community's 91-year-old newspaper. Our issue-by-issue recap of the top headlines each week is the only true "index" of Newark's history.

The "big" story of any year, of course, always depends on who you are. Death, new life, loss of employment as a business closes, personal health problems, or a child's success in school can mute or magnify the impact of other people's weekly news.

The terrorism attacks and aftermath of Sept. 11, still with us as this is written, is undoubtedly the story of the decade in Newark as in the world.

Among those killed within minutes of each other during the tragedy were a Newark High School graduate who died in his Navy uniform at the Pentagon, and the son of the owner of one of Main Street's best-known businesses, who died during his second week on the job in the World Trade Center.

In a look at more "ordinary" news, Delaware got its first female governor when Ruth Ann Minner took office in January.

Closer to home, the site at 59 East Main Street, still known as the old

Gino's location to some Newarkers, continued to be jinxed as a Charcoal Pit restaurant came and went in months, only to be followed by a Italian Bistro struggling to gain a foothold as 2001 ended.

The Newark Charter School, coasting on a temporary permit in January, had opened and surpassed its dreams by October when staff arranged to lease additional space for the coming year.

The Catholic Diocese also started construction on a new school in Glasgow which should be ready for students in 2002.

Although Keene Elementary School opened in Glasgow in September, Christina and Red Clay school districts lost ground this year when voters refused to approve tax referendums which would allow needed repairs as well as more school buildings for expanding numbers of students.

Adding even more complications, school districts were still trying to reinvent themselves to meet both standards for accountability in education and facilities in neighborhoods as 20001 came to a close.

Newarkers will see improvements when both a reservoir and a share in an electric generator are up and running in a few years. The utility bills to fund And, the Department of Justice award-these benefits already kicked in 2001. ed a community group a \$100,000

The economy began sliding even before Sept. 11. Chrysler announced plans to cut 26,000 jobs over three years nationwide but only about 500 were targeted in Delaware.

As the days dwindled into December, burglaries and robberies not surprisingly began to increase in conjunction with a multitude of job losses and a recession.

The Deer Park closed to the roar of a thousand disgruntled patrons in May, only to reopen in September as a new and improved version of its former self. The centuries-old tavern was again a roaring success as the year closed.

Alcohol continued to be a major problem in Newark as a community coalition announced the "party town" image was fading in the same week four teenagers were killed by a drunk driver.

City officials worked through the year on proposals to tackle the problem, but put them on hold while an Alcohol Commission recommends a city-wide policy for the issue.

Meanwhile, the state of Delaware has yet to pass a law reducing the BAC level for driving under the influence.

And, the Department of Justice awarded a community group a \$100,000 grant in November to reduce drug and alcohol use in high schools.

Throughout the spring and summer, Americans watched anxiously as foot and mouth disease brought tourism to a halt in Europe and Great Britain. Little did anyone realize that much worse could happen – and did on Sept. 11.

Newark and Delaware managed to avoid extended water restrictions this summer even though hot, dry conditions were briefly felt. However, ongoing dry weather in the eastern United States, already causing drought warnings in the area in the fall of 2001, mean next summer may not be so comfortable here.

The Newark Library finally began long-promised expansion, which delights and dismays patrons, since the facility will be closed for six months before the work is complete in October 2002

Mundane, difficult, usual and extraordinary, for many Newarkers and many Americans this was a year of learning how to go on when the worst happens.

January 5, 2001

According to news reports, the IRS is reviewing 16 taxable municipal bond transactions totaling about \$350 million, to finance college housing projects in several states, including Newark's University Courtyard project.

Within the next couple of weeks, five brothers who own La Casablanca Restaurant in New Castle will also be dishing out Middle Eastern cuisine in Newark. Alibaba Middle Eastern Restaurant will open soon. Key features will include nontraditional goods, Middle Easternstyle dining, and possibly belly dancers, said co-owner Riyad Albaroski.

The city of Newark has begun providing sidewalk street cleaning service for sidewalks on Main Street between the University of Delaware Mall and Chapel Street. "Sidewalk street cleaning will help ensure that Newark's downtown sidewalks are as clean as the city's business district is vibrant," said Downtown Newark Partnership coordinator Maureen Roser. The sidewalk-cleaning project currently operates on an experimental basis from 7:30 a.m. to noon on weekdays.

January 12, 2001

Ruth Ann Minner has invited Delawareans to take part in the historic celebration as she is inaugurated as the State of Delaware's first female Governor this week in Dover. Minner and Lieutenant Governor-Elect John Carney will travel the state this week during three days of inaugural celebrations to mark the beginning of their administration.

Christina School District has granted a local development company the access rights to a piece of district property near Leasure Elementary School in Bear. Verino Pettinaro of Pettinaro development asked to yield ownership to the 12-acre parcel so his company can build a connector road from a nearby apartment complex to Salem Church Road and Route 40. When the new road is finished, it

School District must decide whether \$67.7 million in state and local funds should go towards renovating decades-old elementary schools. If the Bond Issue Referendum passes, renovations to half of the 18 elementary schools will be completed within the next three to four years. Jones, Brookside, West Park, Smith, Gallaher, McVey, Downes, Maclary and Wilson elementary schools will be upgraded if the referendum is approved.

The burgers stopped sizzling in the Charcoal Pit last month on Main Street when the restaurant closed up shop less than one year after its grand opening. Representatives of the Delawarebased restaurant chain said a shortage of public parking, the lack of liquor license, and no assistance from city of Newark officials are the reasons why the burger joint folded here on Christmas Day.

The final pieces are falling into place at the former National Vulcanized Fibre site on Paper Mill Road. Timothy's of Newark, an eating and drinking establishment; a dry cleaner; and Samuel's Salon and Day Spa all have already signed a lease at the new location. January 26, 2001

The three Christina School District "Wings for Learning" daycare program locations at Smith, West Park Place and Maclary elementary schools enroll a total of 200 preschoolaged children. The programs will merge into one next year, and Glasgow High is the most costeffective place to put it. The school received mixed reviews from students, parents of students, and parents who do not want their preschool-aged children to attend day care there next Newark City Council decided

Feb. 23, 2001

April in Newark this year means four city council members are up for re-election at the same time as the referendum to fund construction of a water storage facility. "Hopefully on April 10 we will finish this out when people vote to build the reservoir," stated John Farrell IV, up for reelection in April.

The Christina District school superintendent told an audience of more than 100 people last week that the rumors about teacher and program cuts at Glasgow High School are, so far, unfounded. "No staffing decision has been made about Glasgow High School," said Dr. Nicholas Fischer at the start of the regular school board meeting on Feb. 13. "Any statements that have been made are clearly before the fact."

March 2, 2001

Robert Ashby is hoping to make the historic Deer Park Hotel a center to his restaurant business. Ashby is taking the next step on March 6 when the city's Planning Commission reviews his plans for the renova-

tions to the building itself.

Approximately 150 students who live in developments along West Chestnut Hill Road will receive Christina District transportation to the schools of their choice next year, either Newark or Glasgow High School, or Shue-Medill or Gauger-Cobbs Middle School.

Newark's city council gave their official seal of approval to holding a bond referendum for funds to build a 300-million-gallon reservoir. The vote came after council members and local residents said they support construction of a \$16 million reservoir and a \$3.1 million iron removal facility.

March 9, 2001

March 23, 2001

Identified as project number one at the first meeting of the former Western Newark Traffic Relief Committee in 1996, safety improvements at the Casho Mill Road underpass finally are going to be done this year - really. 'The contractor started last week," said Ralph Reeb, a planner for the Delaware Department of Transportation.

Newark is widely perceived as a drinking destination, according to members of the Building Responsibility Community Coalition. The details of the dollars needed to build a reservoir and an iron treatment plant in Newark will be spelled out at the city council meeting on Monday, Feb. 12. According to the information provided by the city, voters at the April referendum in Newark will be asked to approve city borrowing in the amount of \$16.9 million for the two projects.

Christina District board members will vote Feb. 13 on whether they believe a feeder pattern plan to "reunite the West Chestnut Hill Road community" will, in effect, disunite Glasgow High School students. A majority vote in favor of the Choice guideline provision would give approximately 70 district students a choice between two district middle- and high schools.

Delaware State Police are investigating a traffic crash that killed a Delaware State Trooper while she was investigating a separate crash on Tuesday, Feb. Newark's city council election will only feature one race this year on April 10. Longtime community activist Bruce Diehl filed last week to challenge incumbent Hal Godwin for the Mayor's seat on the council.

A Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting was recently earned by the city of Newark. Government Finance Officers Association established the award in 1945 to encourage governing bodies to prepare comprehensive and accurate financial reports.

April 6, 2001

State officials announced the results from the Christina School District's capital referendum on Tuesday night. The district's major capital improvement plan was defeated by a vote of 3,072 to 2,864. This is the first time a referendum has ever been defeated in the Christina School District.

Tuesday is the day Newark property owners finally vote on whether to approve up to \$18.6 million in bonds for the construction of a reservoir in Newark as well as a South Well Field iron removal treatment plant.

Three brothers who already own two Italian Bistro restaurants in Delaware signed a lease on March 30 to relocate their Christiana Mall restaurant to the former Charcoal Pit site. The property will undergo "quite a bit" of renovations to both the interior and exterior before it opens to the public...again.

April 13, 2001

Water and Hal Godwin were the big winners in Newark's election on Tuesday night, but mayoral candidate Bruce Diehl did not feel like a loser. "I'm not disappointed," said Diehl, who lost the mayor's race to Godwin by a 1,539-1,094 vote. Property owners in Newark also approved a bond referendum to build a 300million-gallon reservoir as well

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

as an iron removal treatment plant.

Taxpayers defeated the \$67.7 million Major Capital Improvement Plan. District officials needed the money to fund renovations in nine suburban elementary schools and a new district pool. But parents of district students said officials need to patch some of the holes in communication before anyone can pace the pathway to a successful capital improvement plan.

The new regional Catholic elementary school to be constructed in Glasgow by the Diocese of Wilmington will be called Christ the Teacher Catholic School. Groundbreaking for Christ the Teacher will take place on June 14 and the school will open for grades K-5 in September 2001.

Access to the UD farm in Newark is restricted, effective immediately, purely as a precautionary measure, in light of the potential for the introduction of foot and mouth disease in the United States. Consistent with USDA recommendations, the University has adopted the restricted access policy.

Residents of the Red Clay Consolidated School District voted "no" to a capital improvement plan to renovate district schools. Fifty-three percent of Red Clay voters rejected \$185 million proposal to upgrade 27 district schools and build new elementary schools in Hockessin and Stanton.

The currently vacant property next to Lums Restaurant on Kirkwood Highway will be the site of a 60,000-square-foot shopping center this summer. The Red Mill Square site will feature Lyons Hardware store, a Chinese restaurant, a Mexican restaurant, a sporting goods store and a Landromat

between Beck's .Pond and Reybold Road on Salem Church Road. "Legally the plan has to be regulated according to the county laws from 1974," said Jim Smith of the County land use department.

The fence along the CSX rail line at the Newark Cemetery at New and Chapel streets is supposed to be done sometime in May. The wall increment is being built with a combination of CSX Railroad, University of Delaware, city of Newark, and state of Delaware assistance.

Officers from New Castle County and Delaware State police departments have charged three teens with five residential burglaries and one business break-in where a gun was stolen.

May 4, 2001

Members of the Christina School District have until Nov. 15 to devise a plan that will comply with House Bill 300, which mandates that public school students attend schools closest to their homes. The School Board admitted they were a little lost.

Commonwealth Development has gotten subdivision approval for the former Happy Harry's drug store site across Choate Street from Klondike Kate's. The new development, to be called Abby Court, will have four apartments on a new second floor and 6,900 square feet of office space on the ground floor.

Improvements to the Windy Hills Bridge over the White Clay Creek on Kirkwood Highway can include a carrier to protect pedestrians if someone provides the additional funds. A bridge designer fro the Delaware Department of transportation said the protective barrier would increase the costs of the project by approximately \$206,000.

May 18, 2001

The neon beer signs are gone, and so are the clocks, and the bar stools. Someone stole them. At 1 a.m. Tuesday, the Deer Park Tavern only boasted whiter squares where pictures of Main Street once hung. "They took everything that wasn't screwed into the wall," said bartender Mark Silvestro.

City council members voted to approve alcohol amendments. Under the new provisions, restaurants selling alcoholic beverages within 300 feet of "protected" uses like churches can now have one-person electronically amplified performances or any number of non-amplified performers. They can also have Happy Hours or offer drink specials that must be served with orders of food.

A performing arts center open to the whole community becomes a possibility if the University of Delaware Trustees OK plans for a feasibility study of the project.

Newark Police Chief Gerald Conway said the police had little warning about major problems brewing at the Deer Park on Monday night. CSX ultimately had to delay and hold a total of seven trains due to wanderers on the tracks. West Main Street was closed for over an hour and a half. At approximately 1:20 a.m., officers finally dispersed the crowd without serious problems.

Christina School District held two meetings this week to share information with the public about accountability standards to affect players at all levels in the district.

May 25, 2001

On June 11, the Delaware Department of Transportation begins long-anticipated improvements to the location where Route 72/Library Avenue and Capitol Trail meet Main Street/Route 273 and Ogletown Road.

Members of the Christina district Neighborhood Schools Committee agreed last week that district students would attend three different schools in 13 years. The State Board of Education must approve this

Delaware legislators recently traveled to Germany to meet with Daimler Chrysler officials to discuss possibilities for the Newark Assembly Plant, one of Delaware's largest employers. State officials made the trip to assure top Chrysler officials that the Newark assembly plant is an intricate part of Delaware's economy.

The celebration of the New Year has come and gone. It's time to get back to work on the daily minutiae, not to mention the important issues that demand our attention.

Topping our list of resolutions is demanding action regarding alcohol and drivers by the local government as well as the state General Assembly, which has still not acted to lower the Blood Alcohol Content level for drunk driving in Delaware to .08 percent.

As of Dec. 27, almost a week before New Year's Eve, seven people had been killed and 49 others injured in alcohol-related crashes in Delaware

since Thanksgiving week.

In addition, state and local law enforcement officers reported arresting 185 motorists for driving under the influence of alcohol in that time period. Delaware State Police reported that 32 of those arrests came over the weekend before

While the statistics regarding deaths and injury appeared to be an improvement over 2000, when 12 people were killed and 110 injured between Thanksgiving and New Year's, the number of drunk drivers on the roads continue to be a major concern.



Poor, a World War II GI, and in college: the good old days

In the spring of 1947, I was a World War II veteran and a junior at the University. I was enrolled under the GI Bill, very grateful and happy to have it.

My wife Jane and I lived on the third floor of the apartments at 17 New Street, facing the cemetery and the B and O railroad embankment. There was rent to pay, and food to buy; we were pinched at times.

One day I decided to walk down to the

Curtis Paper Mill and inquire about a parttime job there. I wasn't very optimistic but went anyway. Howard Ferguson, the mill manager, looked me over and drew me into conversation. After a bit, he leaned back and asked if I minded getting my hands dirty. I shook my head, and he then took me on a tour of the building and finally asked when I would be able to start if indeed he did decide to hire me.

I indicated that he should know that on

all right," said Howard, "You come down at times when you don't have class, and we'll put you to work."

And that's the way it worked out. I did all kinds of things, sweeping floors, moving skids around, sorting rags for the beater room, even emptying freight cars.

At that time, a railroad spur ran northwest from the vicinity of what is now the Newark Shopping Center, crossed near the present-day intersection of Cleveland Avenue and Curtis Mill Road and climbed a small knoll which is now part of an attractive little city park.

The spur ran up to and stopped beside a large shed which crowned the little hill. It was owned by Curtis Paper. Large bags of powdery substance were to be transferred from a freight car which had been backed into position on the tracks next to the shed.

The Ross brothers, Curtis and Ralph, and I were at times detailed to hike up the hill from the mill to unload these heavy

some days I had heavy class loads. "That's bags and stack them in piles in the compabowling team, bought us bowling shoes ny shed.

> It was a back-breaking task; we were soon sweating and were covered from head to foot with this white powdery material. I can't remember what it was (lime?), but we were soon covered with it. When I headed home later and turned the corner from North Chapel Street, I could have passed at Halloween as the Ghost of New Street. I'm sure I must have tracked that stuff right into the apartment building and

> During my time at Curtis, I was introduced to many fine people by Howard Ferguson: Raymond McMullen; his daughter, Rae; Ella Mae Maclary; "Mitch" Mitchell; the Ross brothers; Ralph Gregg, and numerous others. I became friends with all of them.

> The administration at the mill was fabulous in its generosity. In the spring they formed a softball team and outfitted us in logo shirts and caps and a stock of bats, balls, and gloves. In the fall they got up a

and paid for all the games. We rolled at the alleys near Bob Cook's grocery store on Main Street, where the Goodwill store

I was encouraged to work any time my university class schedule permitted. It was a godsend to us financially, and I felt proud to be working for a company that made the world-famous Colophon paper in addition to other specialties.

It was a period of my life that I recall with great fondness. It had its ups and downs, but I enjoyed it, learned from it, and think about it often. Today I volunteer at Tri-State Bird Rescue at the foot of Possum Hollow Road, and each time I pass the shuttered mill I smile in remem-

I understand perfectly what is meant when people speak of "the good old days." I know. I was there.

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



Your food dollar bargain

Now that the winter holidays are over and the bills are stacking up in the mailbox, you may be questioning what you got last month for the dollars spent. Well, I have some good news for you and your household budget: you are get-ting a bargain in at least one area of

spending — your food costs.

Based on percentage of income spent, the United States has the most affordable food in the world. According to figures put out by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, only 10.9 percent of the average family's income is spent on food. The highest percentage

of food-income ratio is India, with 51.3 percent earnings going to food. In the median range Italy, Germany and Japan with a little over 17 percent of income budgeted for food. Also amazing is that for the By Carl Davis



percentage, Americans also can boast the safest food supply and the greatest variety of food choices.


So, pound for pound, what do Americans spend food dollars on? Annual per-person consumption of major foods grown in the United States include: flour and cereal products, 196.8 pounds; fats and oils, 65.3 pounds; milk as a beverage, 204.5 pounds; cheese, 244 pounds; rice (and, yes, we grow rice in the United States), 18.9 pounds; fresh fruits, 131 pounds; fresh vegetables, 186 pounds; poultry, 65 pounds; and red

meats, 115 pounds.

Before World War II, 6.8 million American farms produced food and fiber for the nation and the world; today, the national average is 2.2 million farms in agricultural production. Despite the shrinking agricultural community, this nation's farmers can still provide for the ever-increasing populations here and around the globe. And America's farmrs continue to be the envy of the world Been there,

Chap Tyler of Hockessin is the quintessential 20th-century man - he lived through the entire 100-year span. Tyler, who is 103, has written a new book, "The view from Age 100," published by the University of Delaware.

While much has been written and there are many studies about aging, Tyler points out in his book that "the benefit of direct witness is largely lacking.'

Tyler says that being his age has advantages -"You live in a different world where you are not

Beginning as a research assistant at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, he then held an editorial position at McGraw Hill, moving on to different positions with the Du Pont Company, followed by a corporate consulting position with Coca Cola until he was more than 80 years old.

'Actually," he said, "I think we should banish the concept of retirement. People don't 'retire.' They live life in a different way, with different interests, different employers and use their capabilities to benefit society and to enrich their

Tyler reported that since the age of 95, it's been "gently downhill in stamina, hearing and sight."

That, however, has not stopped his interest in life and what's going on in the world although he now uses a wheelchair. He is well informed about current events and said he hopes he'll be around to see what happens next.

Tyler is the author of other books based on his business experience including "Chemical Engineering Economics," which appeared in 20 cents on every dollar that you spend on food, when just 20 years ago, they received 31 cents for every dollar spent. Off-farm costs, including marketing expenses associated with processing, wholesaling, distributing and retailing of food products accounts for 80 cents of every food dollar.

For example, take the dairy cow. According to the American Farm Bureau Federation, a typical dairy cow weighs 1,400 pounds and produces 60 pounds of milk per day. The value of this cow's daily contribution is \$8.40; however, feed costs \$4.50; supplies, \$1.60; buildings and overhead, \$2.10, leaving the farmer's profit as 20 cents on one cow! Who of us would work for that small a return on our investments?

Why do America farmers do what they do, given that kind of income? The farmers I have known are independent, entrepreneurial, persistent, proud, hardworking and, most of all, optimistic that next year will be better.

It's a good thing, because you and I have gotten used to the bounty on our tables provided by these men and women who rise before the sun every morning to make sure we have enough to eat

Delaware Nature Society adding to Ashland Nature Center

Expanded education services, a new geo-thermal heating and cooling system, and a new visitors entrance and reception area-these are a few of the changes that are taking place at Ashland Nature Center near Hockessin and Greenville.

Leonard Sophrin Architect Inc. designed the building and grounds expansion and Bancroft Construction Company will manage the construction with guidance provided by Crawford MacKeand, Nature Society Board Chair of the Building and Grounds Committee.



ordinance to revise the student code of conduct. The revisions to the code were read at the June school board meeting.

Burglaries at businesses in Newark are up over 100 percent compared to the same period in 2000, according to Newark Police. Residential burglaries, always higher than at commercial sites, remained about the same with 52 in 2000 and 48 in 2001.

The Downtown Newark Partnership has evolved in just three years from a parochial group of Main Street business owners to a collaboration of more than 50 members. The DNP is designed to market Newark's downtown as a center of commerce, and the partnership has helped bring the feet back onto Main Street.

July 13, 2001

A request for a curbcut which would have meant development of a lot currently owned by the state of Delaware off Anna Way in Newark failed to get approval in city council on Monday.

The Delaware Technology Park, a partnership between the state's government, academia and leading industries, will be built out within two years. J. Michael Bowman, chairman and president of the DTP, said the construction on the technology park's last building is expected within a year.

Newark Charter School's first faculty is on board and ready for September. According to school director Gregory Meece, 28 staff members have been hired for the charter school expected to have 430 students in grades 5,6 and 7 on opening day, Sept. 4. Its temporary facility at 924 Barksdale Rd. is expected to be completed soon.

The Code of Conduct changes will bring harsher punishments to students caught fighting, leaving school without authorization, or terroristic threatening; students who under the old code would have been sent to after-school detention for committing these acts will, under the revised code, be sent to a supervised "alternative" classroom all day to do their work.

July 20, 2001

are beginning to raise thoughts of water shortages – and the faintest whisper of drought. "We want to be on the safe side," said city assistant Carol Houck. "We are starting with the lowest level of water restrictions that we last had in 1999."

August 24, 2001

Newark is in the process of building it's largest and most costly capital improvement ever, but last week the city moved past that \$27.2 million endeavor to propose \$12.6 million in new projects. "The Capital Improvement budget for 2002-2006 doesn't include projects that are already funded," explained city manager Carl Luft, "even if they aren't complete, yet."

Billions and billions might have been served at McDonald's restaurants over the years, but this summer at the Main Street location, sales have not been sizzling. Les Dukart, owner of several area McDonald's, said end-of-the-day profits have been consistently down about 20 percent at his Main Street location since June. The sales dip came in June

when construction began close to his restaurant.

Some 3,450 freshmen, and an estimated 16,300 other undergraduate graduate, Parallel Program and Continuing Ed students, will arrive at the University of Delaware in Newark this week. Freshman orientation and move-in is tomorrow, while returning students arrive Sunday and Monday. Classes begin Tuesday, Aug. 28.

August 31, 2001

All new construction, as well as some existing structures, are now subject to the city of Newark's requirement for sprinklers in the event of fires. City council spent three hours dis-

cussing the amendment to the city's BOCA National Building Code.

This year, the residence halls are overflowing once again, with 7,187 students, including 3,220 freshmen registered to live in them as of Aug. 24. The total number of dorm dwellers has increased by about 350 students since last year. The 880 beds in the one-year-old University Courtyard apartments are completely full.

The Oscar Mayer Weinermobile has come a long way since it debuted in 1935 as a 13-foot metal hot dog on wheels to carry about the company spokesperson. The 27-foot Weinermobile rolled into town

A Newark father of two became the third local resident to die in a traffic accident since Aug. 30. Delaware State Police are still investigating the Tuesday afternoon accident on Interstate 95 in which they said Jason E. Bell, 29, was killed. Early on Aug. 30 a Newark woman, who failed to stop at a stop sign at Appleton Road and Route 273 in Maryland, was killed when her car collided with a tractor-trailer that intersection. Lisa Necastro, 21, a University of Delaware student was pronounced dead at the scene. A 78year-old man from Newark was fatally injured in an accident on Sunday, Sept. 2, at approximately 5:30 p.m. when his vehicle was struck.

A first-grade teacher who lives in Hockessin and her brother from Pennsylvania stepped forward on Aug. 30 to claim their share of the \$294.8 million Powerball jackpot. 

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

inspired Yellowjackets.



The Delaware Depart-ment of Transportation (DelDOT) is holding a Public .Informational Meeting concerning the reconstruction of Library Avenue. The meeting is on Wednesday, January 16 in the Newark High School cafeteria, 401 East Delaware Avenue, Newark, DE. Plans

The project consists of replacing existing pavements on Library Avenue from Kensington Lane to SR273. The project will be completed in one construction season (April-November) with the majority of the work to occur from early from early June to late August. To facilitate completion of this aggressive construction schedule, it will be necessary to detour Library Avenue from early June to late August. Vehicular traffic will be detoured at SR273 and SR4, and will use Marrows Road. Truck traffic will be detoured to SR273. One lane will remain open in each direction from SR273 to Delaware Avenue throughout the duration of the road closure.
