U. S. POLICY
CRITICISED
BY SPEAKERFails To Build
International
Understanding

American foreign policy, which emphasizes "dollars" without attempting to build understanding between peoples through education, was severely criticized by C. E. Ramsey, world traveler and lecturer, in a talk yesterday at the Newark High School.

Much of the economic aid in equipment and materials, which the U. S. is pumping into European countries, is wasted, he said, because the people there have not been trained to use it nor to appreciate its possibilities for solving their problems.

He further criticized U. S. policy for refusing to face the fact that it is failing in its aim to win the good-will of Europe in the face of Communism's appeal.

Russia, he claimed, has outplayed the U. S. in Germany, where we have failed to carry out an efficient denazification program. People there are losing confidence in us and in our methods, he implied, Russia does not want war, he stated, but it does not fear us in a military sense. The Russians fear much more our potential ability to offer greater material aid to Europe, and their policy is aimed at keeping us from making contact on the human level wherever possible.

The greatest need is to build increased understanding between Europeans and ourselves.

Turkey, he added, is an example of a country where our policy has met with outstanding success, because through education we've secured its confidence and good-will.

Mr. Ramsey recently completed a tour of Western Europe and the Balkan areas, where he made a special effort to gauge the influence of Communism.

As a phase of its community safety program, the Junior Chamber of Commerce here is offering to equip bicycles in Newark with "Scotchlite" reflecting tape.

The offer is free to all private bicycle owners. For commercial bikes, the Jaycees will charge a fee of 20 cents to cover the cost of materials. Dates and locations where the "Scotchlite" tape will be applied will be announced soon.

If bike riders cooperate, the program will go a long way toward eliminating a major night driving hazard—the bicycle that suddenly appears out of nowhere. "Scotchlite" tape glows brightly in the beam of auto headlights. White tape is used on the bicycle front and red on the rear.

The Senior Chamber of Commerce is cooperating with the Jaycees by supplying a portion of the funds for the project.

Newark High School students will compete for prizes in a nation-wide public speaking contest to be sponsored locally by the Junior Chamber of Commerce, November 22 to 30.

Theme of the talks will be "I Speak for Democracy," and students in grades ten, eleven and twelve will be eligible. Those interested should notify Frederick B. Kutz, high school principal, or Don Savitch, Eagle Furniture Company, who heads the Jaycee committee.

Plans now call for a number of prizes to be offered the local contestants by Newark merchants. In addition, the students will compete for state and national awards.

A recording of the local winner's speech will be sent to state judges who will select the Delaware winner during the week of December 6. The best state entry will go to the national judges, who will award a \$500 university scholarship.

Students will get suggestions on preparing their speeches through a number of model talks to be given by prominent citizens of the state over WDEL at 8:30 nightly from November 15 to 19.

Locally the contest will be judged on November 29 at the regular meeting of the Junior Chamber of Commerce. Three Newark citizens will act as judges.

This is the second year for the contest, which in 1947 drew 25,000 high school entrants from 41 states. The four national winners received an all-expense trip to Washington, D. C., where they met the President and were awarded \$500 scholarships.

Leaf Clogged Gutters Threaten Town
Drainage; Officials Debate Action

Falling leaves, those colorful bits of foliage that add so much charm to the autumn scene, are just a mounting nightmare to town authorities.

Much of the town's fall crop has been swept into gutters by industrious and orderly property owners, where it presents a skidding hazard to cars and, what is more serious, a threat to the town's storm drainage system.

In some residential areas, the gutters are piled so high with leaves that a heavy rain would hopelessly clog the sewers.

So grave has the problem become that Mayor Ford H. McBerty called a special session of the Town Council on Monday night. Since a quorum was not present, no formal action was taken, but those Councilmen present discussed two alternatives.

The first calls for hiring additional trucks and men to clean the streets. This would cost in excess of \$500 and would probably set a costly precedent, since next year more citizens would

ON TUESDAYGoal Is Fixed
At Fifty Cents
Per Student In
Over-All Appeal

The United Fund Drive at the Newark Public School will open on November 22nd and continue through December 1. Money collected will be used to cover all the major fund appeals made at the school during the year. It will be distributed as follows:

Junior Red Cross, 7 per cent; Community Chest 33 per cent; March of Dimes 25 per cent; Cancer Control 25 per cent; Emergency Fund 10 per cent.

The goal this term will be fifty cents per pupil. The annual campaign, introduced at the schools two years ago, went over the top on both occasions, and, with full cooperation, should again prove successful.

PRINTS OF
ZONING LAW
BEING SENT
THRU MAELSResidents To Get
Copies Of New
Draft Prior To
Last Public Meet

Printed copies of the new zoning draft are being mailed by town authorities this week to residents within the municipal limits.

About 1,400 of the booklets are being sent, and additional copies are available at the Town Council offices for those who otherwise fail to receive them.

The move is aimed at familiarizing the public with the latest revisions in the draft as well as changes in the proposed zoning map in preparation for the final open hearing on the measure slated for Tuesday, November 30, in the high school auditorium at 3 p. m.

A number of important changes to the draft have been made since it was first presented to the public in a hearing here over two years ago. Criticisms leveled at the bill then have guided a commission under F. A. Wheelless, which has worked out the latest draft.

The November 30 meeting will give residents their last chance to voice their opinions on the bill before it is made law. Unless serious opposition develops at the session, Council will be in a position to pass the long delayed ordinance.

Mayor Ford H. McBerty will preside at the hearing, outlining the new draft, pointing out the changes and conducting a question and answer period.

Although no details on just what changes have been made to the draft have been announced, it is believed that the major objections brought out two years ago have been eliminated, and authorities do not anticipate any more serious stumbling blocks to its passage.

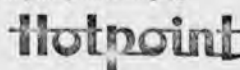

HENS FACE BIG HURDLE IN YEAR'S FINALE SATURDAY WITH WASHINGTON AND LEE

Afternoon Tilt At Wilmington Park Expected To Provide Full Quota Of Thrills As Generals Display Vaunted Air Offensive

Their close shave Saturday against upset primed Rollins College has girded the Blue Hen gridders for what may prove their stiffest hurdle of the season this Saturday afternoon in Wilmington Park. They meet the air-minded Washington and Lee Generals in the season's finale.

Two precision boots after touchdown by end Stan Bilski, plus a blocked kick by Carroll Hauptle proved the margin of victory for the Hens in eeking out a 14-13 win over a surprisingly scrappy Rollins team at Orlando. The Tars, playing one of their best games of the season, threw a decided scare into the Hens, off form for the first time since the P. M. C. debacle.

Delaware scored twice in the second period, with the Tars getting their second touchdown in the fourth.

In the campaign wind-up against Washington and Lee, the Hens are expected a major attack via the air lanes.

The Generals, reported to spend three-quarters of their time in the air, completed around 15 tosses against powerful Pennsylvania. Their aerial ace, Mike Boyda, stands sixth in the nation as a passer, while his top receiver, six-foot-four Jim Lukens, also is sixth in his department. Brian Bell also rates nationally high in receiving, besides being a superb defensive man and elusive ball carrier. The 200-pound halfback is the fastest man on the Generals' team.

The Delaware frosh completed a season that left Coach Marty Pierson well pleased last Friday with an overwhelming 34-0 defeat of the Gettysburg yearlings.

The Chicks were scored on but once throughout the season, and that by a Navy Plebe team that had overwhelmed every other opponent by from four to nine touchdowns. They'll add plenty of power to the 1949 version of the Blue Hens.

Coach Joe Brunansky started basketball practice Monday, but it was mostly to condition the non-football men while the gridders cage men are still in shoulderpads.

The Hen cagers will open fire against Franklin and Marshall Dec. 16 with the highlight of their season to be a trip to Detroit to play Lawrence Tech Dec. 31.

Other opponents will be Gettysburg, Temple, Swarthmore, Ursinus, Washington College, P. M. C., Johns-Hopkins, Drexel and Haverford in a 16-game schedule that the Hens stand a good chance to win more than half.

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Newark Gridders To Play Here On Sunday

A. C. Team To Seek Revenge Against Annapolis Eleven

After holding a star-studded Fort Meade eleven to an 8-8 tie two weeks ago, the Newark A. C. gridders went to Baltimore last Sunday and lost 13-0 to an Annapolis eleven.

Newark outplayed their hosts, unbeaten in two years, most of the first half, but shortly before the whistle, Annapolis executed a well-timed double reverse, which caught Newark's right end napping. The opposition's halfback slipped away for sixty yards without a hand being laid on him.

From then on, Newark played sluggish ball. This, coupled with unfavorable officiating, is credited with losing the game. One decision, which refused to allow a fumble recovery by Newark on the Annapolis 30-yard marker, completely demoralized the team.

Newark will be looking for revenge this Sunday when Annapolis plays here. They are expected to come three teams deep, with two bus loads of rabid fans.

Coach Ernie George has been carrying out intensive practice sessions all this week, pointing for a victory.

In addition, Newark is lining up a game with the Dover Bulldogs to be played on the latter's first open date.

Toward the game's end, A. I. took to the air moving downfield on five completed passes against Newark's second and third stringers. The latter smothered the threat, though, inside

the 20 yard line.

Look at the average felt hat as it floats by on the next male head. The only way these misshapen affairs could be made to look more grotesque than they are of themselves is by placing them on a male head.

The reason so many apparently sensible men manage to go about in them without cringing is because they see so many other apparently sensible men going about looking equally silly and undisturbed.

Tracing the evolution of the modern felt hat probably would be an impossible task, one at least for which we have not stomach, but we imagine it originated in a time of world-wide crisis, when civilization was probably threatened with extinction. So dark were the times that strong men were driven to desperate measures, such as chewing, punching in, or jumping up and down on their hats. Soon the sight of so many men wearing dented and battered headgear became so common that eventually it grew to be regarded as normal, and the custom is continued to this day.

We mention all this only because cold weather is setting in, and, if we are to pass as a respectable citizen, we shall again be expected to wear a hat. This we hereby refuse to do—unless it be something sensible like an eskimo parka or a coonskin cap. In taking this step we realize we are likely to incur the jeers of the multitude. All we can say is that it is a sad commentary on the tenor of the times to reflect that by not wearing a ludicrous hunk of felt one becomes an object of derision. We might add that a sane person is always an odd duck in an asylum.

Our basic quarrel with the felt hat is not with its appearance. We wouldn't mind clapping a flower pot on our head if it would serve some purpose. Our main objection to the fedora is the fact that it is precision designed for blowing off one's head. Years of research by leading aeronautical engineers must have gone into perfecting a hat that at the slightest hint of a breeze will outsoar the gull. Another remarkable feature is the machine-balanced brim, on which the better made hat can taxi for blocks before a stiff wind in utter defiance of all natural laws.

Frankly, we couldn't face another winter under a hat. In blustery weather, we can't step out of doors in one without becoming a prey to unrelenting tension. We feel the hat on our head as a restless, live thing, constantly poised for flight. We are conscious of the slightest shift in air currents and must bend every fibre to anticipate them, dodging to prevent their getting under the brim.

In an effort to escape treacherous and unpredictable gusts, we eventually find ourselves slinking along like a hunted thing, hugging the edges of buildings, dodging into doorways, crouching behind taller men and furtively approaching every corner where lurk the vicious cross currents.

This sort of behavior can get you into trouble in a modern city. Frequently, blue uniformed chaps tap you on the shoulder and ask searching questions.

Once last year on a particularly windy day, we decided to use strategy. We stole up to a corner, took off our hat and peered around to test the wind. This proved a smart move, except for the fact that we found ourself eye to eye with an officer of the law, who for some reason decided our conduct was suspicious. When we foolishly tried to tell the truth, he became even more leery of us, and it wasn't long before we found ourself in a bare, white-walled room, taking through a grating to a soothing, kindly person in a white tunic, who was questioning us about persecution complexes.

We think the simplest thing for us to do this winter is to go bareheaded. We'll take the jeers and be a free man.

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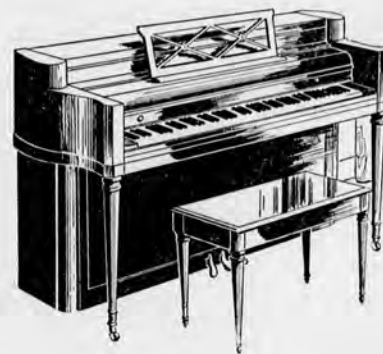
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Faculty Dinner For School Board Members
