or slush. Neither type of tire, by itself, even approaches the stop-and-go safety performance offered by the use of reinforced type tire chains, Mr. Ashton said. Much as the aver-age driver dislikes to bother with chains, he added, the committee now recommends modern tire chains as the best help available to drivers in deep snow or slick ice. "The committee's tests have shown that reinforced tire chains reduce braking distances on both snow and ice by half or more." Ashton said. "Insofar as forward traction is con-cerned, the tests show reinforced tire chains will increase pulling or hill climbing ability 409 per cent on ice. On packed snow, such chains will outpull a regular tire 313 per cent better."

He added that some drivers had come to distrust tire chains because of unsatisfactory past experience with the round wire link type chains known as "regular" chains, which are reinforced chains. However, regular chains do pro-vide stop-and-go traction on snow, and to a more limited extent, on ice. While regular chains do give 231 per cent better pulling traction on ice when their resistance to side skids, how-ever, is relatively poor on ice when compared with that of reinforced chains.
