Baltimore Colts To Play Here To Aid Local Ambulance Fund

World Champions Of Professional Football To Appear Next Thursday Night At NHS Gym Against Jack Ferro's Metropolitan League Five For Newark Ambulance Fund

Champions of the world will visit Newark next Thursday to play a basketball game for the benefit of the Newark ambulance fund, as members of the Baltimore Colts—world champions of professional football for the second straight year—meet Newark Jack Ferro's cagers of the Wilmington Metropolitan League in the second half of a twin bill at 8:30 p.m. at the Newark High School gymnasium.

The Baltimore Colts who will appear at the Newark basketball benefit game are the "Long Hairs" led by star halfback from Baylor University at 5-11 and 190-lbs., with a 40-yard dash in 5.8 seconds. Sandusky at 6-2, and 230-lbs., and a former Rutgers star, is expected to be the starting center spot for the Colts, while Joltin' Jim MacMillan, 6-1 and 215-lbs. of Colt fame and a former Notre Dame performer, and 275-lb. Ray Lewis, one of pro football's leading defensive players, will draw the starting guard positions on the Colt quintet.

Reserve are Andy Nelson, Art Lario, Gino Marchetti, Jim Park and Lou Frasse—all Colts—all players—and all big.

The double-header will begin at 8 p.m. with the Newark Public School Faculty meeting the Rising All Stars.

The Colts will play Ferro's five, including Newark basketball stars Gene Schaefer, Phil Wilson, Sam Gray, and George, with Jimmy Hamilton, Mark, Danny Wilson, and Ralph, veteran Wilmington cagers.

Jack Ferro, local heating and sheet metal contractor at 134 East Cleveland Avenue, is sponsor and coach the team that bears his name—they play a fast brand of basketball.

Proceeds from the program will be donated to the Newark Ambulance Fund.

Marines' Colonel Paul E. Becker, Jr. Named Controller

Veteran With 21-Years Marine Corps Service Appointed To UD Post

Lt. Col. Paul E. Becker, Jr., a 1938 graduate of the U. S. Naval Academy and former adjutant of the 2nd Marine Division, Camp Lejeune, N. C., has been appointed controller at the University of Delaware.

Col. Becker succeeds C. W. Ford who recently accepted a position in the business office at Princeton University.

A veteran of more than 21 years service in the Marine Corps, Col. Becker will be responsible for the receipt and disbursement of authorized funds; accounting and preparation of financial reports; budget control and analysis; and the installation of systems and procedures within these areas.

Upon graduating from the Naval Academy, Colonel Becker was commissioned a second lieutenant and at the outbreak of World War II, was serving as company commander at Marine Barracks, Pearl Harbor.

During the war he served as commanding officer, 22d Provisional Marine Co., Midway Island.

Between World War II and the Korean hostilities, the colonel served as executive officer, Naval Disciplinary Barracks, Philadelphia; commanding officer, Naval Disciplinary Barracks, Harts Island, N.Y.; legal officer with the 1st Marine Division, Tientsin, China, and as a battalion commander with the 1st Provisional Marine Brigade on Guam.

Becker was in charge of all personnel plans and policies for the entire Marine Corps during the Korean build-up when he served from 1949 until 1952 with G-1 Division Headquarters, U. S. Marine Corps, Washington.

The colonel is married to the former Miss Claire Atkins of Bridgeport, Conn., and West Palm Beach, Fla. The Beckers, with their sons, Paul, III, 13; Kenneth, nine, and Raymond, seven, will reside at 205 Radcliffe Drive, Newark.

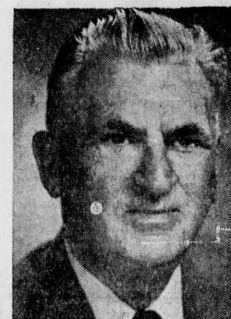

Farm-Home Week Program At University To Open Tuesday With Featured Speakers

Next Tuesday is the first day of Farm and Home Week at the University of Delaware, and programs will include most everything from fashions to corn harvesting, and from lawns to pleasure horses.

"Something for everybody" could be the motto for this year's show.

Besides regular meetings on subjects of interest to farmers, home gardeners and homemakers, there will be several general interest events such as the general sessions held at 11:30 each day; an FFA exhibit, special awards and contests.

The Dairy Herd Improvement Association will present awards; Governor Boggs will present prizes to the 15-ton tomato winners; and a state 4-H cherry pie baking contest will be held.

Tuesday sessions will cover soybeans, poultry, corn and home economics.

R. C. Rothgeb, University of Maryland corn breeder for more than 30 years, will be one of the main speakers. He will explain how short-season hybrids, along with early planting, can produce early maturing corn without loss in yield.

Tuesday's homemaker show will include Gail Henoin, J. C. Penney Co., who will discuss common fibers in use and explain how they can be identified and cared for.

There will be a special session for home gardeners Tuesday evening. Topics include selection of lawn seed, shade trees, and a detailed program on pruning.

On Wednesday, dairy, fruit and potato topics will be featured. One of the top speakers at the morning dairy session will be R. F. Davis, University of Maryland, who will explain feeding tests with alfalfa and various stages of maturity.

Because of this test the Maryland Extension Service has changed its recommendation on cutting time for alfalfa.

The livestock sessions will feature sheep and hog topics in the morning; a talk on beef breeding trends, by Jim Lingle, Wye plantation manager, Queenstown, Md., and a panel discussion on livestock management on the afternoon program.

Highlights of the vegetable program will be a panel discussion on the corn borer problem in peppers, and Governor Boggs' presentation of awards to the state's 15-ton tomato growers.

A high spot on the morning home economics session will be a talk by University of Delaware psychiatrist consultant, Dr. James A. Flaherty, entitled "Parents Have Rights Too." There will also be a session on upholstery with foam rubber.

A special program for horse owners or prospective horse owners, will be held Thursday evening. Management, feeding and selection will be discussed.

The general session will feature Paul C. Johnson, editor of the "Prairie Farmer," who will speak on "What America Needs Most from her Rural People."

Memorial Award For Robert Ulin Established At UD
A memorial award in political science has been established at the University of Delaware by Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Ulin, Claymont, in honor of their son Robert B. Ulin, who died on July 24, 1958, preceding his senior year at the university.

Robert was a distinguished student in political science during his three years at Delaware.

During his six semesters at the university, Ulin never failed to make the dean's list and once had a perfect 4.0 index. His overall scholastic average was 3.52. He was a member of the debating club.

The newly established prize will be awarded annually to the outstanding senior majoring in political science. Selection will be made by the chairman and faculty of the political science department.

At Cooch's Bridge, where they were met by Mr. and Mrs. Edward Cooch, all participated in the planting of a holly tree. The ceremony was opened by Robert Newlin and Hilary Moore placing the American and CAR flags at the tree site while Chaplain Lynn Teitsworth, read a prayer about trees, and each member marched by the tree, placing earth on the roots.

Bodine To Address Local LWV Meeting On City Planning

Penjerdel Head To Talk On Metropolitan Setting For Newark Plan Problem

"The Metropolitan Setting for Newark's Planning Problems" will be the subject of a talk by the president and executive director of Penjerdel—John W. Bodine—at an open meeting of the League of Women Voters of Newark next Monday at 8:15 p.m. in the West Park Place School.

Characterizing himself as a "concerned amateur" rather than a professional planner, Mr. Bodine accepted the league's invitation "with the hope that a lively interchange of questions and discussion" would give him an opportunity to learn more about Newark's local problems.

"Despite this modest approach," said Mrs. Joseph R. Perkins, president of the local league, "I feel there is much we can learn from Mr. Bodine's experience with local planning as well as from his overall view of the great metropolitan area to which, willy-nilly, we belong. We hope all interested citizens will come so that we can swap ideas on Newark's future development."

Former president of the Citizens' Council on city planning in Philadelphia, and president of the city planning commission in Springfield, the suburban township where he makes his home, Bodine is head of the Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware Metropolitan Project, Inc., concerned with research and education on the needs of the area from Trenton to Wilmington, including Newark.

Penjerdel, as this organization is called, is made up of civic-minded individuals and organizations. President John A. Perkins of the University of Delaware is a member of Penjerdel's board of directors. Its work is financed in part by a grant from the Ford Foundation.

Members of the League of Women Voters are asked to come to the West Park Place School at 7:45 next Monday evening for a short business meeting before Mr. Bodine's public talk.

Fire, Explosion Wrecks House On Newark's East Main Street

Family Of Three Return From Saturday Night Movies To Find Home Guttered By Unexplained Fire; Aetnam Battle Blaze for Two Hours; \$5,000 Damage Estimated

Fire, followed by an explosion in a house at 313 1/2 East Main Street in downtown Newark, Saturday night, gutted the structure and most of its contents with a loss estimated at \$5,000.

A crowd of some 700 persons, many of them returning from the movies, watched Aetna Hose, Hook and Ladder Company volunteer firemen battle the flames for more than two hours.

Graduation Speaker
Occupants of the house, Mr. and Mrs. Augustino Paradisi and their son, had gone to the movies. They returned to find the building, which they rent from the Misses Etta and Nell Wilson, a mass of smoking ruins.

Smoke Damage
According to Newark firemen, smoke caused heavy damage to furniture and other articles in the home.

The fire started in the parlor, and spread rapidly to the second floor, and finally to the attic.

Burning furniture and other household articles were carried from the house by firemen, who sought to contain the flames.

At the height of the fire, gases created by the flames, caused an explosion which blew out the windows. Following the blast, the wind swept through the shattered windows, causing the fire to spread through the attic.

The crowd was attracted to the scene by flames leaping skyward. There was, however, little traffic congestion.

The cause of the fire has not been determined.

The blaze was first reported to the Aetna fire company at 10:45 p.m.

Bowie Offers Glass-Enclosed Clubhouse, Grandstand For Feb. 12 Racing Opener

The glass-enclosed Bowie clubhouse and grandstand will be ready for the opening of the eastern major racing season on Feb. 12.

With completion of the structural steelwork, the 7½x10½-ft. plate glass panels are being readied by glaziers, and ducts for the heating-circulatory air system are in the final installation phase.

Three huge, blower-type heaters will control temperature in the enclosure. When a 70-degree temperature is reached the circulatory air system will pump 60,000 cu. ft. of fresh air per minute into the 506-ft-long stand—the equivalent of a fresh air change every seven minutes.

The bottom and top panels of the enclosure may be opened as conditions dictate. The bottom panels
