Wounded in the left leg and right arm when German artillery stabbed at an American armored ring in Belgium, Sergeant Harold J. Christian, 26, of Fayetteville, West Virginia, is now recovering at the 162nd General Hospital in England. He has been awarded the Purple Heart.

Sgt. Christian was treated on the spot by a medic and taken to the clearing station. The shrapnel was removed in operation at an evacuation hospital and he was brought later by a British hospital ship to England.

Sgt. Christian's wife, Margaret, and seven-month-old daughter Joan, live in Fayetteville. His mother and stepfather, Mr. and Mrs. Nance Gray live at 31 Thompson Circle, George Read Village.

Sgt. Christian has two brothers in the service. Mack, 24, is in the Medical Department, and Curtis, 21, is in the Army.

## FORMER COUNCILMAN DIES IN 90TH YEAR

**George Ferguson  
Succumbs On  
Tuesday After  
Death Of Son**

George F. Ferguson, one of Newark's oldest residents died at his home on East Main Street Tuesday morning while in his 90th year.

Born at Fair Hill May 11, 1855, Mr. Ferguson came to Newark when quite young and worked for Joseph Willis, a building contractor. He later went in business for himself. He built the addition to the old Elfre Mill and later the Continental-Diamond Fibre Mill.

He remodelled the Old Opera House building at the corner of East Main and Academy Streets. His wife Elizabeth Ferguson, died in 1930.

Mr. Ferguson, who had extensive real estate holdings, was for a number of years a member of the Newark Town Council and served for a long time as a member of the Newark Board of Education.

He was a member of American Flag Council No. 25, Junior Order United American Mechanics and Osceola Lodge No. 5, Knights of Pythias and was a member of the Newark Methodist Church.

Mr. Ferguson was the father of eight children. One daughter, Mrs. Clarence Grant died a few years ago and one son Norman Ferguson, died about two hours before his father on Tuesday morning. Living survivors are Mrs. Wilmer Hill of Wilmington, Howard Ferguson, Youngstown, Ohio; Harvey Ferguson, Atlanta, Ga.; Mrs. Alice Dayett, Baltimore, Md., and Mrs. Mildred Davis and Mrs. Robert T. Jones of Newark.

The funeral services for Mr. Ferguson will be held from his late residence 334 East Main Street Sunday afternoon, February 25 at 2 o'clock with interment in Newark Methodist Cemetery. Friends may call at his late home on Saturday evening from 7 to 9.

Funeral services for Norman Ferguson will be held Friday afternoon at McKeesport, Pa., at 2 o'clock with interment in McKeesport Cemetery. He is survived by his wife.

## PATRIOTIC SOCIETY DONATES LOCATOR

**Gift Is Made  
Possible By  
Generosity Of  
Mrs. H. C. Boden**

At a meeting of Delaware Chapter Daughters of Founders and Patriots of America, held this month in the Hotel duPont, Mrs. Harry Clark Boden, presented to Delaware Chapter, as a memorial to her mother, Alice duPont Ortis, a charter member of the chapter, funds to purchase a Berman Locator, for use in an Army Hospital overseas.

The Berman Locator is a radiolike device which locates immediately and without guesswork, bullets, shrapnel and metal fragments lodged in the human body, thus eliminating the dangers of shock and agony of surgical probing.

The first Berman Locator was used at Pearl Harbor after the attack and saved over two hundred lives the first day. The newest improved model which will be purchased by Delaware Chapter gives an audible signal when the shrapnel is located and the needle stops vibrating, thus relieving the operating surgeon from looking up from his work to watch the machine.

The first four locators were made possible by gifts from the National Society, the fifth was a gift of the New York State Chapter, the sixth from the Indiana Chapter, the seventh from the Pennsylvania Chapter and Delaware will have the honor of contributing the eighth locator.

Berman Locators are being used at the Naval Hospital, Brooklyn, N. Y.; Marine Hospital, Wyman Park, Baltimore, Md.; Marine Hospital, Boston, Mass.; Marine Hospital, San Francisco, Calif.; Naval Hospital, Philadelphia, Pa.; Army Air Force overseas and in the South Pacific.
