SENATE RULES OF ORDER

Rule 1—The daily order of business shall be as follows:

- 1. Prayer.
- 2. Roll Call.
- 3. Reading of Journal.
- 4. The presentation of petitions, memorials, or communications.
- 5. Reports of standing and select committees.
- 6. The introduction of bills and joint resolutions.
- 7. Concurrent and other resolutions.
- 8. Bills for third reading.
- 9. Miscellaneous Business.

Rule 2—Every member shall be in his place at the time to which the Senate stands adjourned.

Rule 3—Section 1. Unless otherwise ordered by a majority of the members of the Senate, the Senate will meet every day (Saturday and Sunday excepted) at eleven o'clock, A.M.

Section 2. The Senate shall not convene in session, nor shall any Session of the Senate continue after ten o'clock P.M., Eastern Standard Time.

- Rule 4—Each legislative day and before the Senate proceeds to the consideration of any business, the Secretary shall call the names of the members in alphabetical order, and shall read the Journal of the preceding legislative day, which shall be approved or corrected by order of the Senate.
- Rule 5—After the Journal is read, the Presiding Officer shall lay before the Senate communications or messages from the Governor, reports and communications from Departments, Commissions or State Boards and other communications addressed to the Senate, and such bills, joint resolutions and other messages from the House of Representatives as may be upon his table, undisposed of.
- Rule 6—The Presiding Officer may at any time lay, and it shall be in order at any time for a Senator to move to lay, before the Senate, any bill or other matter sent to the Senate by the Governor or the House of Representatives and any question pending at that time shall be suspended for this purpose. Any motion so made shall be determined without debate.
- Rule 7—The proceedings of the Senate shall be briefly and accurately stated on the Journal: Messages of the Governor in full; titles of bills and joint resolutions; every motion

with the name of the member making the same (except motions for adjournment); the names of the members voting in the affirmative or negative on all roll calls.

- Rule 8—When petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the Senate are presented by the President, or a member, the contents thereof shall be briefly stated.
- Rule 9—Section 1. Whenever a bill or joint resolution shall be offered, its production shall, if objected to, be post-poned for one day.
- Section 2. Every bill and joint resolution shall receive three readings previous to its passage; the first two of which may be had on the same day, the second reading by title only, unless the Senate direct otherwise; and the Presiding Officer shall give notice at each reading whether it be the first, second, or third.
- Rule 10—Messages from the Governor or from the House of Representatives may be received at any stage of proceedings, except while the Journal is being read, or while a question of order or a motion to adjourn is pending.
- Rule 11—Messages shall be delivered to the House of Representatives by the Secretary, or by a Senator or other officer of the Senate directed by the Presiding Officer; the Secretary shall certify previous to delivery the determination of the Senate upon all bills, joint resolutions, and other resolutions which may be communicated to the House, or in which its concurrence may be requested; and the Secretary shall also certify and deliver to the Governor all resolutions and other communications which may be directed to him by the Senate.
- Rule 12—When a message is brought to the Senate by a member of the House or any officer of the House, the members shall rise upon their feet, if so directed by the President.
- **Rule 13**—No Senator shall absent himself from the service of the Senate without leave.
- Rule 14—Section 1. When the yeas and nays are ordered, the names of Senators shall be called alphabetically; and each Senator shall without debate, declare his assent or dissent to the question, unless excused by the Senate; and no Senator shall be permitted to vote after the decision shall have been announced by the Presiding Officer, but may change or withdraw his vote prior to said announcement.
- Section 2. When a Senator declines to vote on call of his name, he shall be required to assign his reasons therefore, and having assigned his reasons, the Presiding Officer shall submit the question to the Senate: "Shall the Senator for the reasons assigned by him, be excused from voting?" which

shall be decided without debate; and these proceedings shall be had after the roll call and before the result is announced; and any further proceedings in reference thereto shall be after such announcements.

- Rule 15—The President Pro Tempore shall appoint all committees, unless the Senate shall otherwise direct.
- Rule 16—The following standing Committees shall be appointed by the President Pro Tempore to whom business appropriate to them shall be referred: Accounts, Agriculture, Banking and Insurance, Buildings and Highways, Claims, Corporations—Municipal, Corporations—Private, Education, Elections, Executive, Finance, Fish, Oysters and Game, Judiciary, Labor, Miscellaneous, Passed Bills, Printing and Supplies, Public Health, Public Lands, Revised Statutes, Rules and Temperance.
- Rule 17—Section 1. When a Senator desires to speak, he shall rise and address the Presiding Officer, and shall not proceed until he is recognized, and the Presiding Officer shall recognize the Senator who shall first address him.
- Section 2. No Senator shall interrupt another in debate without his consent, and to obtain such consent he shall first address the Presiding Officer; and no Senator shall speak more than twice upon any one question in debate on the same day without leave of the Senate which shall be determined without debate.
- Section 3. No Senator in debate, shall directly or indirectly, by any form of words impute to any Senator or to other Senators any conduct or motive unworthy or unbecoming a Senator.
- Rule 18—If any Senator, in speaking or otherwise transgress the rules of the Senate, the Presiding Officer shall, or any Senator may, call him to order; and when a Senator shall be called to order he shall sit down, and not proceed without leave of the Senate, which if granted, shall be upon motion that he be allowed to proceed in order, which motion shall be determined without debate.
- Rule 19—Section 1. All motions shall be reduced to writing, if desired by the Presiding Officer or by any Senator, and shall be read before the same shall be debated.
- Section 2. Any motion or resolution may be withdrawn or modified by the mover at any time before a decision, amendment, or ordering of the yeas and nays.
- Rule 20—No Bill or Joint Resolution shall be received by the Senate unless it be prefaced by a brief statement of the purpose of the Bill or Resolution, which shall be known as the title, and shall also contain the text of the Bill or Resolu-

tion in full. The original of all Bills and Resolutions shall be typewritten or printed, properly backed and shall contain no erasures or interlineations.

Rule 21—A motion shall be in order at any time to amend or substitute a title to any bill or resolution only in order to correct typographical errors.

Rule 22—No bill or joint resolution shall be committed or amended until it shall have been twice read, after which it may be referred to a Committee; bills and joint resolutions introduced, reported from Committee, or received from the House of Representatives, shall not be considered the day on which they are received.

Rule 23—All bills and joint resolutions that have been twice read, shall be placed on the calendar by the Secretary and each member shall be furnished daily with a calendar.

Rule 24—No bill shall be put upon its final passage on the day of its presentation nor in the absence of the member who introduced the bill, unless by his written consent.

Rule 25—Every bill and resolution to which the concurrence of both Houses of the General Assembly may be necessary, shall be introduced with one original and at least six copies; the original shall at all times remain in the custody of the Chairman of the Committee to which it was referred, or of the Secretary of the Senate; one copy shall at all times be under the general supervision of the Bill Clerk of the Senate; one copy shall be delivered to the Presiding Officer of the Senate; one copy shall be delivered upon introduction to the majority leader of the Senate; one copy upon introduction shall be delivered to the minority leader of the Senate; one copy shall be delivered to the member introducing the bill or resolution; and one copy shall be delivered to the representative of the Press who may be present upon the introduction of the bill or resolution.

Rule 26—All bills for the amendment of any statutes contained in the Revised Code of Delaware, 1935, shall be made with reference to the statutes or parts of statutes contained in the Revised Code of Delaware, 1935, shall be made with reference to the said Revised Code and to conform to the arrangement of said Revised Code. All bills before being introduced shall first be submitted to the Attorney for approval as to compliance with this Rule.

Rule 27—When a question is pending, no motion shall be received but:

To adjourn.

To adjourn to a certain day, or that when the Senate adjourn it shall be to a certain day.

To take a recess.

To proceed to the consideration of executive business.

To lay on the table.

To postpone indefinitely.

To postpone to a certain day.

To commit.

To amend.

Which several motions shall have precedence as they stand arranged; and the motion to adjourn, to take recess, to proceed to the consideration of executive business, to lay on the table, shall be decided without debate.

Rule 28—When a question has been decided by the Senate, any Senator voting with the prevailing side may, on the same day or on either of the next two days of actual session thereafter, move a reconsideration; and if the Senate shall refuse to reconsider, or upon reconsideration shall affirm its first decision, no further motion to reconsider shall be in order unless by unanimous consent. Every motion to reconsider shall be decided by a majority vote, and may be laid on the table without affecting the question in reference to which the same is made, which shall be a final disposition of the motion.

Rule 29—When a bill, resolution, report, amendment, order, or message, upon which a vote has been taken, shall have gone out of the possession of the Senate and been communicated to the House of Representatives, the motion to reconsider shall be accompanied by a motion to request the House to return the same; which last motion shall be acted upon immediately, and without debate, and if determined in the negative shall be a final disposition of the motion to reconsider.

Rule 30—A question of order may be raised at any stage of the proceedings, and, unless submitted to the Senate, shall be decided by the Presiding Officer without debate, subject to an appeal to the Senate. When an appeal is taken, any subsequent question of order which may arise before the decision of such appeal, shall be decided by the Presiding Officer without debate; and any appeal may be laid on the table without prejudice to the pending proposition, and thereupon shall be held as affirming the decision of the Presiding Officer. The Presiding Officer may submit any question of order for the decision of the Senate.

Rule 31—Every motion or resolution to print documents, reports, bills, or any other matter shall, unless the Senate otherwise orders, be referred to the Committee on Printing. When a motion is made to commit with instructions, it shall be in order to add thereto a motion to print.

JOINT RULES-1951

RULE 1—Messages from one House of the General Assembly to the other shall be conveyed by such persons as a sense of propriety in each House may determine. Announcement shall be made by the Sergeant-at-Arms of the House to which the message is being conveyed, and the message shall be respectfully communicated to the presiding officer by the person or persons conveying the same.

Rule 2—Every bill and resolution upon being messaged from one House to the other shall be receipted for by the Chief Clerk of the House receiving same, and all papers on which the said bill or resolution may be based shall be transmitted at the same time.

Rule 3—Every bill and resolution to which the concurrence of both Houses of the General Assembly may be necessary shall upon its final passage in both Houses be delivered by the Chief Clerk of the House in which such bill or resolution originated, into the custody of the Bill Clerk of said House, and it shall be the duty of the Bill Clerk of the Senate and the Bill Clerk of the House of Representatives jointly to see that such bill or resolution has attached to it a proper parchment backing and that each and every page of the said bill or resolution has been properly initialed, sealed or stamped, and, upon being assured that such is the case, shall immediately, if the Houses be in session, and, if not, at the earliest opportunity, present the said bill or resolution to the presiding officer of each House for his signature, the presiding officer of the House in which the bill or resolution originated signing first. Said Bill Clerks shall then certify with the Secretary of

the Senate and the Clerk of the House on the backing of said bill or resolution that such bill or resolution is the same as that which passed both Houses of the General Assembly, and the said bill or resolution shall then be delivered by the Bill Clerk of the House in which such bill or resolution originated to the Chairman of the Committee on Passed Bills of said House.

Rule 4—Disagreement between the two Houses in the substitution for an amendment to a bill or resolution or over any other matter shall be made subject for conference at the request of either House. A committee, composed of members who voted in the majority on the point or points of difference, shall be appointed in each House, and, at a convenient hour agreed on by their chairmen, shall meet in the conference chamber and state to each other, verbally or in writing, the reasons of their respective House for and against the substitution, amendment or other matter of disagreement, and confer freely thereon. Conferences shall not have power or control over any part of the bill or resolution or other matter save such point or points over which the Houses disagree.

Rule 5—Every bill and resolution, which shall have passed one house and been rejected by the other, shall be returned to the House which had approved it and notice given of its rejection and the same entered on the Journal.

RULES

Governing Executive Sessions of the Senate of the State of Delaware

Rule 1—When about to act on confidential or executive business; the Chamber shall be cleared of all persons except the Secretary and the Reading Clerk of the Senate, the Sergeant-at-Arms, and such other officers as the presiding officers shall deem necessary; and all such officers shall be pledged to secrecy.

Rule 2—The Executive proceeding and the confidential legislative proceedings shall be kept in separate Journals.

Rule 3—When nominations shall be made by the Governor of the State, they shall, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, be referred to a committee to be hereinafter provided for; and the final question on every nomination, shall be, "WILL THE SENATE CONSENT TO THIS NOMINATION?" Which question shall not be put on the same day on which it may be reported by a Committee, unless by unanimous consent of the Senate.

Rule 4—All information communicated, or remarks made by a Senator when acting on nominations concerning the

character or qualification of the person nominated, shall be kept secret; if, however, charge shall be made against a person nominated, the committee may, in its discretion, notify such nominee thereof, but the name of the person making such charges shall not be disclosed. The fact that a nomination has been made, or that it has been confirmed or rejected, shall not be regarded as a secret.

Rule 5—When a nomination is confirmed or rejected, any Senator voting in the majority may move for a reconsideration on the same day on which the vote was taken, or on either of the next two days of actual sessions of the Senate; but if a notification of the confirmation or rejection of a nomination shall have been sent to the Governor before the expiration of the time within which a motion to reconsider may be made, the motion to reconsider shall be accompanied by a motion to request the Governor to return such notification to the Senate. Any motion to reconsider the vote on a nomination may be laid on the table without prejudice to the nomination and shall be a final disposition of such motion.

Rule 6—Nominations, confirmed or rejected by the Senate, shall not be returned by the Secretary to the Governor until the expiration of the time limited for making a motion to reconsider the same, or while a motion to reconsider is pending unless otherwise ordered by the Senate.

Rule 7—Nominations, neither confirmed nor rejected, during the session at which they are made, shall not be acted upon at any succeeding session without being again made by the Governor, and if the Senate shall adjourn sine die, all nominations pending and not finally acted upon at the time of such final adjournment shall be returned by the Secretary to the Governor, and shall not again be considered unless they shall again be made by the Governor.

Rule 8—Any Senator or officers of the Senate who shall disclose the secret or confidential business or proceedings of the Senate, shall be liable, if a Senator, to be called before the bar of the Senate for reprimand; and if an officer, to be dismissed from the service of the Senate and to punishment for contempt.

Rule 9—The Governor of the State shall, from time to time be furnished with a copy of the list of appointments confirmed or rejected by the Senate, but no further extract from the Executive Journal shall be furnished by the Secretary except by special order of the Senate.

Rule 10—The President Pro Tem of the Senate shall appoint a Committee, which shall be styled "The Executive Committee," to which all nominations of the Governor shall be referred.

SPECIAL SESSION of the STATE SENATE

Dover, Delaware DECEMBER 8, 1950, 2:30 P. M.

Senate convened in Special Session with President Alexis I. duPont Bayard presiding.

The Members recited the Lord's Prayer.

Senator Cubbage moved that Robert W. Tunnell be made Temporary Secretary of this Special Session. Motion prevailed.

Robert W. Tunnell was sworn in and seated.

Roll Call was taken of the hold-over Senators: Messrs. Barnard, Benger, Burris, Cannon, Crossley, Cubbage, Dolby, Handsberry, Johnson, Klair, Longbotham, Pedrick, Peeney, Powell, Reilly, Steen, Webb.

Mr. Klair, on motion for leave, introduced the following

Resolution, which, on his further motion, was adopted.

SR 1—BE IT RESOLVED, by the Senate, that a Committee of two be appointed by the Presiding Officer to inform the Judges that the Senate is ready to receive the Certificates of Election of the Senators-Elect.

The Chair appointed Messrs. Powell and Reilly as a Committee of two to await the Judges of the three counties for

the Certificates of Election of the new Senators.

Certificates of Election were received from the First, Third and Fifth Senatorial Districts of Sussex County, from the First, Third and Fifth Senatorial Districts of Kent County and from the First, Third, Fifth and Seventh Senatorial Districts of New Castle County.

Upon motion, duly adopted, by Senator Cubbage, Messrs. Burris, Stenn, Johnson, Handsberry, Barnard, Longbotham, Peeney, Benger, Pedrick and Dolby were duly sworn into the Senate by President Alexis I. duPont Bayard.

Mr. Crossley, on motion for leave, introduced SR 2:

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Senate, that the Rules of the Senate, together with the Rules governing Executive Sessions adopted by the regular Session of the 115th General Assembly, as amended, be and they are hereby adopted as the Rules for governing this Special Session of the Senate.

Mr. Handsberry, on motion for leave, introduced SR 3,

entitled: SENATE RESOLUTION No. 3.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Senate, in extraordinary session met this eighth day of December A. D. 1950, pursuant to the Proclamation of the Governor, that Mr. Roy Allen Cannon be and he is hereby elected President Pro Tempore of the Senate for this extraordinary session of the Senate.

Mr. Webb moved that the President Pro Tempore be directed and authorized to name the members of the Rules Committee and the Executive Committee. Motion prevailed.

Mr. Cannon, President Pro Tempore, announced the appointment of the following members of the Senate to com-

prise the Executive Committee:

Messrs. Cubbage, Reilly, Burris, Powell and Cannon, Chairman, and announced the appointment of the following members of the Senate to the Rules Committee: Messrs. Klair, Webb, Johnson, Longbotham and Steen, Chairman.

Mr. Cannon moved for the suspension of Rules. Motion

prevailed.

Mr. Steen introduced the following Resolution, which, on

his further motion, was adopted—SR 4:

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Senate in Special Session assembled, that the President Pro Tempore of the Senate appoint a committee of two (2) members on the part of the Senate to notify the Governor of the State of Delaware, of the convening of the Senate in Special Session, and to inform him that the Senate is ready to receive any communication that he may desire to present, or to receive any message that he may choose to deliver at such time as he may designate.

The President Pro Tempore appointed Messrs. Benger and Crossley as a Committee of two to notify the Governor that the Senate is organized in compliance with **SR 4**.

Upon direction of the President, Alexis I. duPont Bayard, the Temporary Secretary was instructed to read the Gover-

nor's Proclamation, as follows:

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, the term of William Watson Harrington as Chancellor of the State of Delaware expires at the close of court business on December 7, 1950; and

WHEREAS, the term of Associate Judge, Charles L. Terry, Jr., expires at the close of court business on December

D. 1950, at 2:00 o'clock P. M. (Standard Time) to consider and act upon the following business, to wit:

To confirm the appointment which will be made to fill the vacancy in the office of Chancellor and in the office of

Associate Judge in the State of Delaware.

JOINT SESSION

Mr. Cubbage moved that the President of the Senate

preside at the Joint Session. Motion prevailed.

The President of the Joint Session invited the Honorable Harvey H. Lawson, Speaker of the House, to come to the Rostrum.

The President of the Joint Session invited the Honorable R. Allen Cannon, President Pro Tempore of the Senate, and former President Pro Tempore Vera G. Davis and Dr. George W. Rhodes, to come to the Rostrum.

Mr. Cubbage moved that the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives act as Secre-

taries of the Joint Session. Motion prevailed.

Mr. Cubbage moved that the President of the Joint Session

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced His Excellency, The Honorable Elbert N. Carvel, Governor of the State of Delaware.

The committee escorted the Governor to the Senate rostrum where he delivered his biennial message, as follows:

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

Message of the Honorable Elbert N. Carvel, Governor of Delaware to the Members of the One Hundred and Sixteenth General Assembly of the State of Delaware, convening in Regular Session at Dover, on Tuesday, the Second Day of January, Nineteen Hundred and Fifty-One.

Mr. President, Mr. Speaker, Members of the General

Assembly of the State of Delaware:

We are gathered here together at the beginning of the second half of the twentieth century, in the midst of worldwide turmoil and nation-wide emergency, to once again, through deliberation and legislation, as the representatives and public servants of the people of Delaware, to carry out their desires and to enact laws for their welfare insofar as we are able to do so under existing conditions of emergency and

uncertainty.

Although my administration is not supported by a majority in one house of the Assembly, I sincerely believe that this will in no way deter the passage of sound legislation. The outstanding record of achievement which was accomplished by the previous General Assembly, where the political faith of the majority of both houses differed with that of my administration, should demonstrate to all of us the fact that regardless of political party, the elected representatives of the people of Delaware believe in always placing the interests of the people of their State above all other consideration.

It is to the eternal credit of the great majority of the Members of the 115th General Assembly that they, in cooperation with this administration, enacted into law the realistic, uniform, state-supported teachers' salary schedule which has meant so much to the progress of education in this state, first, by retaining within our school system the excellent teachers and leaders it had been our good fortune to previously attract to the system and, second, by encouraging well-qualified and well-trained teachers to come into the system directly from colleges, or from other states. Because of this improved salary

schedule the morale of the teaching staff all over the State is at a high level, their qualifications are much improved and the general level of the training and education we are giving our children in our public schools is gradually moving to a higher plane. This is as it should be, and this is the American way. We have great faith in our future and we all share the desire to constantly improve the training and preparation that will be provided for our children and our future citizens.

In addition, although we did not at the time realize that time would be so short, we approved a nineteen and onequarter million dollar school building program which provided that over thirteen and one-half million dollars worth of State funds would match over five and one-half million dollars worth of local funds to build schools all over the state, to provide adequate educational facilities for our fast growing school population. The population of our State during the decade beginning 1940 increased by 50,000 people, or about 19%. This is an astounding growth for our State and it is quite fortunate that such a program was approved and begun during the late spring and early summer of 1949. The fact that such a broad program was not aggressively advanced by the previous administration has meant that because of the sharp increase in building costs caused by the Korean crisis and the world situation, we have been forced to pay much higher prices for many of the schools we are now building than would have been the case had such a program been initiated two years sooner. Over 80% of this program is now under way and it is the sincere hope and prayer of this administration that the major part of this work will be swiftly completed so that we may promptly meet our emergency needs in the field of educational facilities.

Uniform support by the State of the running expenses of all our schools was another important measure cooperatively adopted which is now providing adequate State support based upon the actual student population of each school.

To provide for these educational advances and for the tremendous increase in the financial support which was supplied to education by the State, it was necessary to raise additional taxes at the State level. I would like to emphasize at this point that the increase in state support of education resulted in either a decrease or a retardation of the various taxes which are levied at the local level by the local governments to support education in the community. For example, the City of Wilmington for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1949, was able to eliminate a specal tax on real estate amounting to 23 cents per hundred which was earmarked for education in that city. When it is realized that Wilmington now has a real estate tax that amounts to 38 cents per hundred, the substantial saving to the Wilmington taxpayer because of State support to education is readily appreciated. This saving by Wilmington

was made because the 115th General Assembly, with my approval, provided an additional \$1,269,237.00 for the biennium beginning July 1, 1949 for educational purposes in Wilmington, over and above the amounts recommended in the budget pre-

pared by my predecessor, outgoing Governor Bacon.

In the light of the present world situation it should be a matter of much satisfaction to all of us that the broad road construction and rebuilding program was authorized. This, together with the many other construction projects which are scattered among our many institutions is work well begun and we can be thankful for having accomplished this much since the cessation of hostilities in August of 1945.

I call to your attention these outstanding advances as evidence of the fact that regardless of political faith, the Legislature and the Administration have intelligently met the needs of the State through thoughtful, cooperative action. It is most fortunate in the light of the present emergency that valuable time was utilized and important progress was made by rebuilding, repairing and enlarging the physical plant of the State to provide for the damage done because it was impossible to do these things during World War II. It was most fortunate, also, that we were willing to make an investment in the future by enacting legislation which provided for the realistic compensation of our teachers, and had the courage to raise sufficient taxes to pay for this program.

I have faith that as this session of the General Assembly develops, we will again, through mutual and intelligent cooperation, develop a sound legislative program that is in the best interest of the great majority of the people of Delaware.

FINANCES

During World War II the pressure of inflation was restrained through the application of artificial price and wage controls by the Federal Government. In 1946 those controls were lifted and the post war march of inflation began. The prices of practically all commodities and services increased. Part and parcel with this increase was the steady climb of

salaries and wages in general.

Because of the nature of the organization of State government, the State employees were among the last to receive realistic increases in compensation, although they are financially affected by rising costs of food, goods and services in the same manner as the average citizen. This is a serious situation. If the State fails to properly compensate its employees in line with the increasing cost of living, it will slowly lose these employees to the competition of private industry and be forced to hire inefficient and unqualified personnel. This will surely result in the lowering of the standards of the services which the State provides, with resultant public dissatisfaction.

On April 18, 1945, my predecessor, Governor Bacon, approved a law authorizing a permanent salary increase for certain State employees which amounted to \$150.00 to \$200.00 for those certain State employees who received basic salaries of \$500.00 to \$4,800.00.

The 114th and 115th General Assembly, with the approval of the Governor, authorized a temporary salary increase of \$200.00 for certain employees receiving less than \$5,000.00 per year. This authorization will expire on June 30, 1951, and it is my recommendation that the law should not be re-enacted. When the Budget Commission held its hearings last fall, it provided that this temporary salary increase be included in the budget for those certain employees, excepting those employees whose salaries are set by law. I recommend to you legislation which will grant to these employees whose salaries are set by law this \$200.00, provided this does not increase their salary above \$5,000.00.

In view of the sharp advance in the cost of living since 1947 when this temporary salary increase was first instituted, I deem this a desirable step and I believe that this method of handling the matter will effect savings in the Auditor's and Treasurer's office.

The Budget Report was assembled after hearings held last fall and was prepared before the serious military reverses in Korea and the resultant proclamation of emergency by the President of the United States. It contemplates expenditures of \$55,180,000.00 for the biennium beginning July 1, 1951. This Budget includes many large items which during the past meeting of the General Assembly were approved as supplementary appropriations, such as the uniform State-supported teachers' salary schedule, the temporary salary increase and interest on County Highway Bonds. It is estimated that usual supplementary appropriations for such items as grants to hospitals, volunteer fire companies, veterans' organizations, quasi public welfare institutions, town libraries and county soil drainage and conservation operations, plus the biannual expenses of the Legislature, will amount to \$1,000,000.00 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1952 and \$1,200,000.00 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1953.

In addition, an appropriation for \$1,500,000.00 for the first year and \$2,300,000.00 for the second year of the biennium should be authorized for the emergency fund. This emergency fund would call for, among many other provisions, \$987,235.00 the first year and \$1,776,255.00 the second year of the biennium to meet the cost of additional public school teachers and increased operational expenses of our public schools which will result from increasing student enrollment and the unusual increase in physical facilities caused by the state-wide school building program.

In the event that the Budget is enacted substantially as

I have presented it, and the above supplementary appropriations are approved, slightly over \$61,000,000.00 would be appropriated to operate the State during the next biennium. Past State experience has proven that appropriated money is never all spent. For example, at the end of the last fiscal year, over \$1,400,000.00 in appropriated state funds was reverted to the State treasury. Taking this important fact into consideration, I estimate that the Budget as submitted to you, plus forseeable supplementary appropriations, would indicate an expenditure of \$59,000,000.00 for the next biennium.

It is estimated that all sources of income, which includes the revenue from the old net income tax now in force, will yield about \$48,000,000.00 during the next biennium. On the basis of these estimates, the State would spend \$11,000,000.00 more than it collected during the next two fiscal years. It appears that the cash balance available for appropriations on July 1, 1951, will be slightly in excess of \$14,000,000.00. This amount, plus the estimated income, less the indicated expenditures of the next biennium, would leave us with a cash balance available for appropriations on July 1, 1953, of \$3,000,000.00, which is considered to be the minimum cash balance which the State should have on hand at the beginning of a fiscal year.

I realize that under these conditions we will be spending \$11,000,000.00 more than we received, but because we are taking this from our cash surplus I consider that this is a

proper move.

I do not believe it is a wise policy for a State to build up a large cash surplus. It should keep on hand sufficient funds at all times to operate properly. A large surplus is an invitation to many to increase expenses unnecessarily. Such action is temporarily without pain to the taxpayer with the resultant lack of complaint by the taxpayer.

The duty of any government is always to keep expenses at a minimum and pass on to the taxpayers in the form of

tax reductions the benefits of an accumulated surplus.

Now as I have previously mentioned, the Budget which I am presenting to you was approved by the Budget Commission during the month of November after extensive study and hearings. At that time, there was hope that the Korean situation would be cleared up by Christmas. Also, at that time, general world-wide conditions were very much more encouraging on the face of things than we find them to be today.

December of 1950 was a dark month in the history of the United States. Our brave armed forces received one of the most bitter defeats ever experienced by us and we became aware of the seriousness of our position. We realized our weakness and more fully comprehended the diabolical plan of Communist Russia to effect the gradual defeat and destruction of our Nation and the principles of freedom and and justice for which it stands and for which it is so valiantly fighting.

The course of this Administration of this State and of this Nation is clear. When your house is on fire, you do not stop to repair a worn latch, clean a soiled window or nail up a loose board. You immediately summon all aid and resources at your command to put out the fire as quickly and as effectively as possible. Delaware, the first State of the United States, must and will do its part in this national emergency. It must bend its every effort, supply its every available resource, and do its share in providing men and women for our armed forces so that America can become strong and able to defend itself against any probability. The next two years are extremely critical ones. Our continued existence as a Nation may depend upon our willingness to make the sacrifice and effort which will help us reach a position where our foes will respect us and our friends will be anxious to support us.

The course, then, which we, the Legislature and the Administration must take is to re-examine all of the recommendations which have been made in this Budget and to eliminate all items of expense except those which will provide for the bare essentials necessary for the effective operation of this State.

We in Delaware must make our contribution to the successful elimination of this nation-wide emergency by releasing all available manpower to the war effort and by drastically cutting expenses and thereby doing our part to reduce the serious threat of inflation.

It is likewise extremely important that the taxes which we levy in this State be reduced to a minimum, because Federal taxes to finance our rearmament are certain to increase sharply and put a heavy burden on the taxpayer. It is therefore our patriotic duty in the name of national defense to do all in our power to make Delaware dollars available for defense.

Every single unnecessary or postponable expenditure or step that we make during, this emergency is competition to the greater need of building a strong, well-prepared Nation. I want to assure you that I stand ready at all times to work with you, to consult with you and to cooperate with you in our joint efforts to attain this desired end.

Under these conditions, I recommend that you do not revive the income tax law which expired December 31, 1950.

As I have just pointed out, the Budget which is being submitted today was prepared before the President of the United States declared a state of national emergency. If this Budget was approved, together with all other forseeable supplementary appropriations, and the estimated income was deducted, we would have a deficit of \$11,000,000.00 for the biennium to deduct from the \$14,000,000.00 surplus which is predicted for July 1, 1951.

After carefully re-examining and eliminating all unnecessary items in this budget, I believe we can assure to the State

a cash surplus available for appropriations on July 1, 1953, considerably in excess of the \$3,000,000.00 which I mentioned

earlier in my message.

Unless and until the emergency is at an end, I propose that all the State agencies make every effort to live within a Spartan Budget. We must direct all of our energies to the business of the retrenching and the conservation of every resource.

In the event the emergency is of short duration, then I conceive it to be my duty to promptly lay before the State blueprints for the continuation of the progressive program which was initiated at the beginning of my administration. Former income tax law which is now again effective will yield a revenue which will amount to about \$5,000,000.00 less annually than the one just expired. Later, when the State needs additional revenue for increasing expenses or for the financing of debt service of bond issues for a long range building program, I strongly recommend the enactment of a new net income tax which provides that exemptions be allowed for religious and charitable contributions, for pensions to State employees, for income to all of those in the armed forces of our Nation, and for legitimate business expenses incurred by those deriving their income from business commissions. In addition, I would recommend a substantial increase in the exemption for wage earners and their dependents in line with the increased cost of living.

I do strongly recommend that this new net income tax should provide that the taxpayer could not deduct his Federal income tax payments from the income upon which the State net income tax is calculated.

I make these recommendations for the future, because from my experience over the past two years I believe that this tax is the fairest one that is available to us because it is only paid by those who have an income. If money is not made or received, there is no tax. The real estate or the sales tax, on the other hand, falls on those who must pay it whether or not they have an income to provide for it.

For example, the person on relief must pay a sales tax if it is levied on the item he buys. The farmer must pay a real estate tax if he owns his farm, even in the face of a complete crop failure or other disaster. The old age pensioner or the unemployed person must pay a real estate tax if he owns his home. On the other hand, the income tax is only collected from those whose income exceeds certain minimum exemptions.

Let us, then, patriotically and fearlessly apply ourselves to the job of making Delaware's contribution to the alleviation of this emergency effective and important. Although we are one of the smallest states in size and population, we should be deeply proud of the contributions we have always made and will continue to make to the welfare and protection of our beloved Country in times of peril and emergency.

EDUCATION

An important part of the foundation of our development into the greatest and most progressive Nation in the world is our excellent system of education. The American people have always looked up with faith to the future and they have backed this faith through the support of an ever-improving, broadly expanding education program. They realize that the hope for the future of this Nation and world lies in the development of intelligent, strong, liberty-loving and God-fearing citizens, and they know that a strong, well-rounded education program will play an important part in this development.

Well-qualified teachers are the cornerstone of a successful educational system. In order to encourage outstanding teachers to teach in our schools, it is important to give them consideration in keeping with the dignity of their position and profession in matters relating to severance of their employ-

ment.

I strongly recommend that a tenure law be enacted which will provide that in matters of the termination of contracts of professional school employees, the teacher, principal or superintendent in question shall be given an opportunity to be heard by the local school board upon not less than 10 days' notice, with a right of appeal to the State Board of Education. A complete stenographic record of each hearing should be made, a copy of which should be furnished to the employee in question.

To provide for more complete participation in school affairs by our citizens, I again strongly urge the enactment of a law to provide for the election of school boards and trustees

throughout all the school districts of the State.

The recommendations of the School Survey Commission to the Governor and the 115th General Assembly provided for a drastic consolidation of school districts throughout the State. I favor sensible consolidation where it provides for increased efficiency and an improved educational program for the students involved. I feel that this a matter for the individual districts to develop through investigation and discussion and I believe that when public opinion crystallizes in the school districts involved, these consolidations should be approved by the citizens of the area in question and made effective.

It should be a matter of great satisfaction to all of the people of Delaware that we will shortly complete a state-wide program which will provide for equal educational opportunities and facilities to all people of the State. The opening of the Sussex County Comprehensive High School for Negroes at Georgetown last September marked the beginning of this program. Similar schools at Dover in Kent County and Middle-

town in New Castle County are now under way and the City of Wilmington should shortly begin construction of new schools for Negroes in that area. All of these facilities are being financed only by State funds, plus a private bequest. The local school districts have not had to raise matching funds for these buildings.

Although we are now in the midst of a huge school building program, there are still certain areas which are desperately

in need of additional school facilities.

All over the northern end of new Castle County, recordbreaking home construction has resulted in greatly increased population in the suburban areas and this has caused a critical need for additional school buildings. At this time, I recommend a limited school building program to relieve these crowded areas. I strongly urge that the schools to be built be as utilitarian as possible and that the construction costs be kept as low as possible, in keeping with sound construction practices. Under these conditions and to eliminate much of the red tape and lost motion which has been apparent during the present building program and with a view to cutting building costs to the minimum, I recommend that provisions be made for the adoption of standard plans and specifications for school buildings with units of varying sizes, subject to the approval of the State Board of Education and the school building program board. The State funds for this program should be raised by bond issues to be matched by local funds in the ratio provided by the historical formula presently in use.

The people of Delaware have every right to be proud of their educational system and the faithful people associated with it who have made it so outstanding. It is highly important that the people of Delaware should continue their interest and participation in this most valuable operation and lend their efforts, influence and vision to the development of an ever improving and increasingly efficient program of education.

CIVIL DEFENSE

The State must face with the Nation the ominous overtures of the present trend of world events. The threat of a complete conflict brings before us the possibility that our populace may be subjected to its ravages. The advances of science, the new and terrifying weapons of our time, should compel us to give priority to the problems that are presented.

Military authorities are unanimous in their opinion that our potential enemies possess the capability to carry the destruction of modern warfare to the heart of our Nation. The geography, industrial resources, and potentialities of our State lead me to believe that we might find ourselves a coveted and profitable target.

You will, therefore, be asked to consider the enactment of legislation designed to minimize the effects of such a contingency. The legislation will embody certain provisions which have been recommended by our Federal government. It will also take into consideration the advantages of mutual help

with our neighboring states.

Sizeable appropriations will be necessary to implement this legislation. An appropriation of approximately \$35,000.00 will provide for the immediate embarkation upon an integrated program until the end of the present fiscal year. Careful estimates indicate that at least \$55,000.00 will be needed annually to operate during the next biennium. In addition, it is expected that the Federal government will make available sums on an equal matching basis to be used for the construction of shelters and protective facilities. When this program is crystallized by the Federal government, I will recommend to you ways and means of coordinating and providing the necessary matching funds to effectively implement Delaware's share of this cooperative program.

ELECTIONS

Today in the world, we face the challenge of liberty versus subjection. In the United States we have a two-party political system, plus the right to establish as many political parties as we like. In Russia there is only one party and the alternate choice is exile or extermination. Certainly, in this First State of the Union, we should all feel a strong responsibility in seeing that methods used to conduct the election of our representatives, executives and public officials are above reproach. Unfortunately, there are a number of election laws on our statute books which in themselves tend to promote corruption in our elections and tend to encourage the use of large sums of money for the purpose of buying that election. This undemocratic system is a scourge and blight on the fair face of our State and it is high time that important changes be made so that the sanctity of the ballot might be restored. Our boys are fighting for the cause of freedom on foreign soils. Is it too much to expect that you as representatives of the people of Delaware should fight to restore decent, free and clean elections to our State? Free elections are the essence of freedom and liberty. I sincerely urge you to do your part during this Assembly to see that the people of Delaware will have on its statute books the kind of election laws which will promote honest, clean and free elections.

I, therefore, strongly recommend the repeal of the present law requiring the printing of official ballots five times the number of registered voters in the State, the repeal of the law authorizing the distribution of official ballots in advance of election day and outside the polling places, and the repeal of the permanent registration law.

I recommend the enactment of a law making it a crime to have possession of an official ballot outside a polling place;

the enactment of a law for the printing of official ballots only slightly in excess of the number of registered voters in the State; the enactment of a law that only an official ballot received from the election officials may be voted, provided that sample ballots of a color different from the official ballot may be freely distributed without restriction; the enactment of a law requiring a general registration every four years; the enactment of a law requiring for purposes of identification that each voter sign the registration book when registering to vote; and the enactment of a law requiring for purposes of identification that each voter sign the registration book at the time he votes.

No person should be denied the right to vote when his conditions of employment are such that he is unable to present himself at the polls for the purpose of voting within the hours the polls are open. I, therefore, recommend the enactment of a law to compel the polls to remain open from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. on each general election day.

LABOR

In view of the advancing cost of living, it is important that legislation affecting the welfare of labor should be kept abreast of the times.

I, therefore, urge the enactment of legislation to provide increased benefits for those who are covered under the State Workmen's Compensation Law and the Unemployment Compensation Law.

I urge the adoption of a State minimum wage law in line with and to supplement the Federal minimum wage law.

I recommend the passage of legislation to provide for collective bargaining in labor relations cases not falling within the jurisdiction of Federal laws.

I strongly advocate the adoption of a law to provide that no worker shall be disqualified for unemployment insurance for refusal to accept employment at a lower rate of pay than he received at his last place of employment or for the refusal to accept employment outside of the State.

LIQUOR COMMISSION

I believe that it is unwise as a general principle to entrust the administration of laws of a controversial nature to a single individual. Under such a system, when the single individual occupies office for a fixed term of years, there is constant danger that in the administration of laws, that individual may become arbitrary or dictatorial. I do not believe a one-man commission for any purpose within the State of Delaware is in accordance with the principles of democratic government. Especially is this so when the commission is charged with the administering of laws pertaining to the delicate subject of the

liquor industry. Our present law establishing a liquor comcission provides for an undemocratic one-man commission. I strongly recommend the enactment of a law to substitute for this one-man commission a four-member, bi-partisan liquor commission to administer the liquor laws of the State of Delaware. It is my belief that the enactment of this legislation will, insofar as it is possible, insure the removal of the activities of the liquor commission from partisan politics.

WELFARE

One of the most confusing things about the operation of the State's welfare activities is the fact that there are at least three boards and commissions providing welfare services, with each one operating in different directions. Unquestionably, this results in inefficiency, wastefulness, duplication and frustration. It is imperative that legislation be enacted during this session to consolidate and coordinate these welfare operations.

It is unfortunate that the individual welfare agencies because of the fear of the loss of some of their individual power and prestige have seen fit to lobby against such a consolidation. It is certainly a tragedy that the people of the State will allow the selfish interests of a few to obstruct a step that is so desirable and which will bring so many advantages to the administration of public welfare in this State. I sincerely urge and recommend that you enact legislation to effect this consolidation.

Presently, the ceiling on old age pensions is \$40.00 per month. Without any doubt, this amount is entirely too small to provide for the living expense of anyone for a month during these times. I, therefore, recommend that legislation be enacted increasing the ceiling of the old age pension at least to \$50.00 per month.

HIGHWAYS .

One of Delaware's most valuable assets is its beautiful, well-constructed highway system. Ever since World War II, the State has been diligently working to repair, rebuild and extend this excellent system. Unfortunately, during the War lack of material and personnel prevented the maintenance of our highways in their usual fine condition. Although during the past four and one-half years, much reconstruction has been accomplished, there is still a great deal to be done if we are to save some of our important roads which sorely need major rebuilding.

In addition, we are faced with the necessity of building new roads and arteries to provide for the smooth flow of traffic to and from the Delaware Memorial Bridge.

In view of the serious importance to our modern economy, it is imperative that even in times like these we maintain

good roads and provide for the elimination of bottlenecks in

severely congested areas.

Provision has been made in the Budget to take care of the interest and amortization of a bond issue which will supply sufficient funds during the next biennium to match those of the Federal government available to us for new highway construction and the rebuilding of old, worn out highways.

Accordingly, I recommend that you approve this bond

issue to finance these important capital improvements.

In addition, I strongly urge you to carefully scrutinize any requests for increases in the axle weights of commercial trucks. It has been universally demonstrated that weights beyond 18,000 pounds per axle are highly injurious to the type of roads generally in existence today. It is certainly false economy to spend millions of dollars for highway construction on one hand and then authorize an increase of axle weights which will cause prompt and serious deterioration of these fine roads on the other hand. I consider that I would be seriously remiss in my duty as Governor of this State if I were to approve any increase in the axle weights of commercial trucks.

AGRICULTURE

I urge your continued support of the important progress we are making in our State to provide agricultural research in the fields of marketing, animal and poultry husbandry, soil investigations, plant pathology, horticulture and agronomy. Agriculture is one of the State's most important industries and, annually, agricultural income in this State ranks second in per capita, per county, of any State in the Union. It may be a coincidence, but Delaware was one of only five states that had an increase in agricultural income during the calendar year of 1949. This increase, amounting to about 4%, should be highly gratifying to those of the last General Assembly who played such an important part in enacting progressive legislation to promote agricultural research.

During the past year, I appointed a bi-partisan, Statewide committee of outstanding farmers, scientists and soil conservationists to make a study of our present laws relating to soil drainage. Based upon this study, I propose to submit to you for your earnest consideration and enactment, legislation which will overhaul and improve our present drainage laws and help develop within our State a sound and realistic

drainage program.

RETIREMENT ACT

It is recommended that in view of the sharp increase in the cost of living since its enactment, legislation be enacted which will provide for a broader and more realistic operation of the State Employee Retirement Act.

I wish to recommend the following changes and increases:

- 1. That the minimum be increased from \$50.00 a month to \$75.00 a month;
- 2. That the maximum be increased from \$150.00 to \$250.00;
- 3. That the fraction of earnings be increased from 1/70 for each year of service to 1/60—to conform to the 30-year retirement provision adopted at the last Session of the General Assembly.
- 4. That survivors' rights as a percentage of the pension rights available to the State employee be approved as follows:

50% for widow—subject to cancellation upon remarriage;

- 25% for each of the first two children during the minority of such children;
- 5. Permit interruptions in continuous service for continuation of eligibility up to five years instead of only for one year as at present.
- 6. That an employee be eligible to retire because of disability after 15 years instead of 25 years of service;
- 7. That an employee may be eligible for retirement after working 10 years instead of 15 years upon reaching the prescribed age limit.
- 8. The gross salary is to be used as a basis for computation of pension rights instead of base salary as at present. This is only fair acknowledgement of the fact that institutional employees receive a large part of their income in media other than cash. Under the present plan they are subjects of serious discrimination.
- 9. Joint service for the State and for all other political sub-divisions which are under pension systems is to be used as a basis for eligibility. This would include New Castle County, the City of Wilmington, the Town of Lewes and any other Jurisdictions where pensions are or will be adopted. This is done in virtually every other state and the fairness of it is self-evident. The pension charges would be prorated to the various governmental units under which service was rendered.
- 10. The increased benefits would be available to all persons currently receiving pensions as well as those who are still to be retired.

It is highly important that a retirement act be enacted to provide that members of the judiciary could retire at a certain age on a pension which is commensurate with their high position in the State. I sincerely recommend to you that such legislation be enacted by you during this session.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT

I recommend for your careful study and consideration the report of the Commission on Reorganization of State Government. This report recommends sweeping changes in the organization of the executive branch of the government of Delaware which would provide for the improved efficiency and effectiveness of this branch.

THE NEW CASTLE TERCENTENARY

I call your attention to the forthcoming 300th anniversary of the establishment of self-government on Delaware soil at

what is now the City of New Castle.

The last session of the General Assembly created a commission with the duty of preparing plans for the fitting commemoration of this event, commensurate with the dignity of the First State of the Union. This commission will report to you the result of its labors.

I recommend for your consideration the report of the commission and its recommendations. The establishment of the principles of self-government and freedom in our State is of interest and importance to all of us and to the entire nation as well. We will be remiss in our respect for our heritage if we permit this occasion to pass unnoticed and without proper expression of our appreciation of that which has been handed down to us as a result of the faith and labors of our forebears.

We must, of course, keep in mind the heavy expense we are facing. But with that in mind I wish you to provide the means for the proper commemoration of this event. The amount of means provided must of course be determined in the light of other necessary State expenditures, but must none-theless permit the paying of homage to the laying of the foundation of our manner of government in a dignified and fitting manner.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

The following proposed amendments were passed by the 115th General Assembly and I urge their final adoption this session:

- 1. That no person holding any paid State, county or municipal job shall be a member of the Legislature during the time he continues to hold that job.
- 2. That the Governor, at least ten days before sending the name of anyone appointed as a State judge to the Senate for confirmation, shall make public announcement of that name.
- 3. That Article IV of the Constitution be amended to provide for the creation of a separate, independent Supreme Court.

CONCLUSION

I wish to congratulate all of the recently elected members of the Legislature and to invite every Member of the General Assembly to visit me in the executive offices at your convenience. A warm welcome and an attentive ear awaits you. Your visit will always receive prior consideration over normal appointments because you represent the interests and the needs of thousands of people. I sincerely wish for all of you a highly successful term in the service of your State.

I have now served as your Governor for almost two years. During that period of time, I have learned that an administration can fail or succeed in direct ratio to the cooperation which is given it by the people who are the members of the admin-

istrative team.

It has been my good fortune to have had the loyal and hard working support of all of the State employees throughout the length and breadth of Delaware. I wish to publicly thank each and every person associated with or employed by the State for their fine contribution to the success of my Administration.

I realize that the road ahead may be full of obstacles which will result from the seriously disturbed condition in which the world now finds itself.

I am happy that with the cooperation of the last General Assembly and the support of the people of Delaware, so much could be accomplished during the brief time allotted us.

I am prepared now to make any sacrifice necessary to help preserve and protect the sacred liberties and freedoms that this State and Nation enjoy and which have been won through sacrifice, bloodshed and hard work. I am sure the people of Delaware feel the same way. We love our State and our Nation. We love the things they stand for and because we want to pass them on to our children and our posterity, we are willing to carry on in the tradition of those patriots who helped to found and preserve this great country.

There is work for all to do and every one can make his individual contribution to the cause which will help to finally

bring about the peace for which we are all praying.

May God grant that the people of Delaware and this Nation may so act and conduct themselves during this time of crisis and uncertainty that he may shed the light of His guidance upon us and direct us into the paths of honor, peace and understanding.

Mr. Cubbage moved that the Secretaries of the Joint Session compare their Journals.

The Secretary of the Senate announced that the Secretaries had compared their Journals and found them to agree.

Mr. Cubbage moved that the two Houses now separate to

reconvene in their respective Chambers.

On motion of Mr. Cubbage, the Senate recessed until call of the Chair. Senate met at expiration of recess at 2:15 p.m., Lt. Gov. Bayard presiding.

The Chair recognized Mr. Burris who requested that he

be marked present.

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced a messenger from the Governor. Hon. Harris B. McDowell, Jr., Secretary of State, being admitted, delivered a message to the Senate from the Governor. The Chair referred the message of the Governor to the Executive Committee.

On motion of Mr. Cubbage, the Senate resolved itself into

Executive Session.

On motion of Mr. Cubbage, the Senate recessed until 3:30 p.m.

Senate met at expiration of recess at 5:15 p.m., Lt. Gov.

Bayard presiding.

The Chair asked the Reverend Thomas Rowlenson and the Reverend W. B. Bundick to come to the Rostrum to have their Oath of Office administered.

"Unless and until the emergency is at an end I propose that all State agencies make every effort to live within a

Spartan budget."

Yesterday the Senate appointed an additional group of attaches making, so far, I believe, a total of 38 for 17 Senators. If these employees average \$1350 each for their work, \$51,300 will be added to the expense of the Senate for this session. I am well aware that a certain number of employees are necessary for the work of the Senate. What that number is, I do not know, but I will venture the statement that we do not need, and cannot properly use 38. We now have, for example, nine sergeants-at-arms and five cloak room attendants. There are 2.2 attaches per Senator. In the House there are 1.1 per Representative.

I regret that I did not vote against the appointment of the last group of attaches and I apologise for my tardy recognition

of this extravagance.

On motion of Mr. Klair, SB 103—"An Act to Amend Chapter 117, Volume 32, Laws of Delaware, Entitled 'An Act to Amend an Act to Incorporate the Town of Elsmere, New Castle County, by Changing the Hours and Methods of Voting in Town Elections, and by Providing for More Than One Polling Place for Town Elections," was taken up for consideration and read a third time by paragraphs in order to pass the Senate.

On the question, "Shall the Bill pass the Senate?" the yeas and nays were ordered, which being taken, were as follows:

So the question was decided in the affirmative, and the Bill having received the required constitutional majority, passed the Senate and was ordered to the House for concurrence.

SB 201—"An Act to Amend Chapter 74 of the Revised Code of Delaware, 1935, as Amended, Entitled 'Fish, Oysters and Game' with Respect to Bull Frogs," by Webb; to Fish, Oysters and Game.

SB 202—"An Act Appropriating Money to the Delaware Commission for the Blind for the Maintenance and Operation of 'Sunnybrook' a Nursery School for Blind Children," by Klair; to Finance.

SB 203—"An Act to Amend Chapter 43, Revised Code of Delaware, 1935, as Amended, Entitled 'Levy Courts,' by Increasing the Amount Charged in the Treatment and Care of
