## PRE-SCHOOL HEALTH TEST SCHEDULED FOR MAY 15

**Immunization And Exam To Be Given At Local School**

Dr. J. R. Downes, deputy state health officer for New Castle County, announces that he began his program of pre-school health examinations, (known as the "Summer Round-Up"), on Monday and that 19 schools will be visited. Assisting Dr. Downes with the examinations will be Dr. R. A. Lyon, pediatrician, from the U. S. Public Health Service, now on temporary duty with the State Board of Health, who will answer parents questions on nutrition and health habits.

Parents are urged to attend these State Board of Health examinations with their children in order that the doctors may explain to them any physical defects found in the youngsters and the need for corrections to be made by the family physician during the summer months, that they may be in the best possible health to begin their school careers in the fall. It is a well known fact that a healthy child learns much more readily than does a sickly one.

In addition to the physical examination of the pre-school children, immunization against diphtheria and vaccination against smallpox will be given.
