

TEMPORARY RULES OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

I. RULES OF ORDER

RULE 1 – CONVENING OF HOUSE

The House of Representatives shall meet every Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday at 2:00 P.M., unless otherwise ordered. The Speaker or his designee shall take the chair at that time and shall call the House to order. At the beginning of each legislative day, the Speaker or his designee shall cause the names of the members to be called in alphabetical order. If a quorum is present, he shall proceed with the opening prayer, the pledge to the flag, and the business of the day.

RULE 2 - ORDER OF BUSINESS

(a) After the convening of the House, the order of business shall include the following: (1) The minutes of the previous day shall be made public and posted by the

Chief Clerk prior to the next legislative day. With the consent of a majority of members, the reading of the minutes for the previous day may be omitted.

(2) Presentation of petitions, memorials, tributes, memoriams, citations or communications.

(3) Reports from standing and special committees.

(4) Introduction and first reading of bills and resolutions.

(5) Consideration of agenda.

(6) Consent calendar, or consent agenda, when available.

(7) Announcement of committee meetings.

(8) Announcement of agenda for next legislative day.

(b) The order of business may be changed when necessary by the Speaker unless a majority of the members present object.

RULE 3 - MESSAGES

Messages from the Senate or from the Governor may be received at any time except when the roll is being called.

II. DUTIES OF THE SPEAKER

RULE 4 - ORDER AND DECORUM

(a) The Speaker shall preside and have general direction over the House Chamber, and shall preserve order and decorum. In debate, the Speaker shall confine the members to the question under discussion. No member shall have the floor except when recognized by the Speaker, or when the Speaker grants open debate between members.

(b) Cameras, recording instruments, and similar equipment or electronic devices are permitted in the House Chamber only with the permission of the Speaker.

RULE 5 - QUESTIONS OF ORDER; APPEAL

The Speaker shall decide all questions of order. An appeal from his decision may be made by any member, if properly seconded. The appeal shall be upheld only upon the affirmative vote of a majority of the elected members. The Speaker shall not vote on any such appeal.

RULE 6 - TEMPORARY PRESIDING OFFICER

(a) The Speaker may appoint a member to serve as the Presiding Officer to perform the duties of Speaker; but such appointment shall not extend beyond an adjournment or recess except when the Speaker takes a leave of absence, in which case the Senior Member of the majority party of the House shall act as the Speaker pro tempore during such leave. The Presiding Officer shall not have authority to reassign any measure to a committee unless specifically required to do so by Rule 20, the Speaker has taken a leave of absence or pursuant to the direction of the Speaker.

(b) When neither the elected Speaker nor the appointed Presiding Officer nor the Speaker pro tempore is present, the House shall be called to order and presided over by the Senior Member of the majority party. The Senior Member shall serve in the interim as the Presiding Officer. The Senior Member is the member who has served in the House the longest current consecutive period of time. In the event more than one member has served the same length of time, the member originally sworn first shall be the Senior Member. If two or more members were sworn in at the same time, then of those two or more members the member whose name would appear first in alphabetical order shall be the Senior Member.

RULE 7 - SIGNING OF BILLS, RESOLUTIONS, AND OTHER DOCUMENTS

The Speaker shall sign all bills and resolutions passed by the House. All warrants, writs and subpoenas issued by the House shall be signed by the Speaker and attested to by the Chief Clerk. In the absence of the Speaker, the presiding officer or Speaker pro tempore shall have authority to sign such documents.

RULE 8 - APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEES

(a) The Speaker shall appoint all committees and subcommittees.

(b) Where illness, stated conflict of interest, or other sufficient cause shall compel the absence or non-participation of any committee member, the Speaker, in his discretion, may fill such vacancy from the same political party as the absent or non-participating member, during said absence or period of non-participation.

RULE 9 - ASSIGNMENT OF BILLS AND RESOLUTIONS TO COMMITTEE

The Speaker shall determine the principal objective of a bill or resolution and, subject to the provisions of Rule 20, assign the same to the appropriate committee. All prefiled measures shall be pre-assigned to committees by the Speaker and each member notified in writing of assignments, unless the measure is introduced from the floor, in which case the Speaker shall at that time announce the committee to which the measure is assigned.

RULE 10 - SETTING THE AGENDA

The Speaker sets the Agenda and may place an item on the Agenda only if the item is on the Ready List and has been requested to be placed on the Agenda by the prime House sponsor or floor manager. The Ready List shall consist of all items that have been reported out of committee or have been laid on the table.

RULE 11 - SUBPOENA ISSUANCE

The Speaker may sign a subpoena if requested by a majority vote of a standing committee, a special committee, a joint committee, a task force, or any similar entity if the committee, task force or entity was created by the House of Representatives or an action of the General Assembly. No subpoena shall be issued unless it is first signed by the Speaker. Upon the majority vote of all members elected to the House a subpoena shall be signed and issued by the Speaker, presiding officer or Speaker pro tempore

III. RIGHTS AND DUTIES OF MEMBERS. RULE 12- ATTENDANCE OF MEMBERS

No member shall knowingly absent himself or herself from any session of the House without notifying the Speaker that he or she is unable to attend. A member who is absent without notifying the Speaker may be considered in contempt, and may be subject to the censure of the House.

Each member shall answer each roll call from his or her assigned seat in the chamber. **RULE 13- QUORUM**

Twenty-one members of the House shall constitute a quorum. The House shall not convene without a quorum. In the absence of a quorum, the Sergeant-at-Arms shall notify those members who are absent from the Chamber, but not from Legislative Hall, that their presence is required. Upon receiving the notification, the absentee members shall report to the House Chamber. After a proper interval for such notifications, the Speaker shall order a roll call of the House to ascertain if a quorum is present.

RULE 14 - ADDRESSING THE HOUSE

When a member wishes to speak, such member shall rise but shall not proceed to speak until recognized by the Speaker. Upon acknowledgment by the Speaker, the member may be seated until called upon. If two or more members seek recognition at the same time, the Speaker shall determine who shall speak first.

Remarks shall be confined to the subject before the House, or to the purpose for which recognition was obtained.

RULE 15 - DECORUM OF MEMBERS ON FLOOR OF HOUSE

Each member shall conduct himself or herself in a dignified manner at all times.

No member or other person may walk across the House Chamber, or converse privately, in such a manner as to interrupt the House proceedings.

A member shall not be interrupted when speaking except for the following reasons:

a call to order by the Speaker.

a point of order by a member.

a motion by a member to move the previous question, to adjourn, or to recess.

A member shall not make derogatory personal comments about or to other members.

No member shall use a cellular phone in the House Chamber while the House is in session.

RULE 16 - RULES OF LEGISLATIVE CONDUCT

A member of the House shall be subject to discipline by the House for the violation of any of the following Rules of Legislative Conduct, which shall be deemed to constitute "disorderly behavior" within the meaning of Article II, Section 9 of the Delaware Constitution. The Rules of Legislative Conduct are as follows:

Restrictions relating to "personal or private interests" within the meaning of Article II, Section 20 of the Delaware Constitution and Chapter 10, Title 29 of the Delaware Code are as follows:

A member who has a personal or private interest in any measure or bill pending before the House shall disclose the fact and shall not participate in the debate nor vote thereon; provided however, that (i) upon the request of any other member of the House, a member who has such a personal or private interest may nevertheless respond to questions concerning any such measure or bill, or (ii) a member who has a personal or private interest may add factual matter to the debate which he believes will correct wrong or false information. A personal or private interest in a measure or bill is an interest which tends to impair a member's independence of judgment in the performance of his or her legislative duties with respect to that measure or bill.

A member has an interest which tends to impair his or her independence of judgment in the performance of his or her legislative duties with regard to any bill or measure when, (i) the enactment or defeat of the measure or bill would result in a financial benefit or detriment to accrue to the member or a close relative to a greater extent than such benefit or detriment would accrue to others who are members of the same class or group of persons, (ii) the member or a close relative has a financial interest in a private enterprise which enterprise or interest would be affected by a measure or bill to a greater extent than like enterprises or other interests in the same enterprise, or (iii) a person required to register as a legislative agent pursuant to Chapter 16, Title 29 of the Delaware Code is a close relative of the legislator and that person acts to promote, advocate, influence or oppose the measure or bill.

If the member is present, the disclosure required under paragraph (A) shall be made in open session, (i) prior to the vote on the measure or the bill by any committee of which the member is a member, and (ii) prior to the vote on the measure or bill in the House. Disclosure may be made by written statement submitted to the Chairperson of a committee or the Speaker of the House, and read in open session in the committee or the House as the case may be. If the member is absent when a measure or bill is voted on which would have required disclosure required under paragraph (A), then the member shall make the required disclosure as soon as possible upon returning to the committee or House.

For the purposes of this Rule:

A "close relative" means a person's parents, spouse, children (natural or adopted) and siblings of the whole and half-blood.

A "private enterprise" means any activity, whether conducted for profit or not for profit, and includes the ownership of real or personal property; provided that "private enterprise" does not include any activity of the State of Delaware, any political subdivision or any agency, authority or instrumentality thereof.

A person has a "financial interest" in a private enterprise if he or she, (i) has a legal or equitable ownership interest in the enterprise with a fair market value in excess of \$5,000, (ii) is associated with the enterprise and received from the enterprise during the last calendar year or might reasonably be expected to receive from the enterprise during the current or the next calendar year income in excess of \$5,000 for services as an employee, officer, director, trustee, or independent contractor, or (iii) is a creditor of an insolvent private enterprise in an amount in excess of \$5,000.

A "person" means an individual, partnership, corporation, trust, joint venture and any other association of individuals or entities.

A member shall not receive unlawful gratuities in violation of Section 1206, Title 11 of the Delaware Code.

A member shall not receive a bribe in violation of Section 1203, Title 11 of the Delaware Code.

A member shall not profiteer in violation of Section 1212, Title 11 of the Delaware Code.

A member shall not engage in conduct constituting official misconduct in violation of Section 1211, Title 11 of the Delaware Code.

A member shall not fail to comply with the campaign finance disclosure requirements set forth in Chapter 80, Title 15 of the Delaware Code.

A member shall not fail to comply with the financial disclosure requirements of Chapter 8, Title 29 of the Delaware Code.

A member shall not appear for, represent, or assist another in respect to a matter before the General Assembly or one of its committees for compensation other than that provided by law.

A member shall not release, without authorization of the Ethics Committee, any confidential matter pertaining to proceedings of the Ethics Committee.

A member shall not knowingly file a false statement with the Ethics Committee or the House in connection with any proceeding involving a Rule of Legislative Conduct.

A member shall not engage in conduct which the House determines (i) brings the House into disrepute or (ii) reflects adversely on the member's fitness to hold legislative office.

A member shall be subject to sanction for any disorderly behavior occurring subsequent to being elected to the House.

A complaint alleging a violation of a Rule of Legislative Conduct shall be filed in writing by a member with the Ethics Committee for investigation and recommendation to the House as to disposition. A complaint must be accompanied by a written statement signed by any person, sworn under oath, setting forth the facts supporting the complaints. No such complaint shall be considered by the House prior to its consideration and recommendation by the Ethics Committee. If the Ethics Committee recommends some disciplinary action with respect to a complaint, it shall present a resolution to the House requesting that the House conduct a proceeding to consider the matter. If the Ethics Committee votes to dismiss a complaint, and there are no votes against dismissal in the Committee, the House shall take no action with respect thereto. If the Ethics Committee votes to dismiss a complaint, but there are dissenting votes in the Committee, the House may consider the matter upon the motion of any member of the House, approved by a majority vote of the House. In any proceeding before the House involving an alleged violation of a Rule of Legislative Conduct, the accused member shall be given an opportunity to be heard after notice, to be advised and assisted by legal counsel, to produce witnesses, and offer evidence and to cross-examine any witnesses. A transcript of any such proceeding shall be made and retained; and rules of procedure for ethics violations as may be adopted by the House shall apply.

If the House finds by a majority vote that a member has violated a Rule of Legislative Conduct, it may impose such disciplinary action as it deems appropriate; provided that no member may be suspended or expelled without the vote of two-thirds of the members of the House concurring therein.

IV. BILLS, RESOLUTIONS AND OTHER MEASURES RULE 17 - RESOLUTIONS AND OTHER MEASURES; DEFINITIONS The following types of resolutions may be considered by this body:

Simple Resolutions: A Simple Resolution is an expression of a majority of members on a

specific subject, and deals with the internal affairs of the House only. The effect of its passage does not go beyond the bounds and the authority of the House.

Concurrent Resolutions: A Concurrent Resolution is used to accomplish the same purpose in relation to the entire General Assembly that the Simple Resolution achieves for either the House or Senate singly. It must be passed by both the House and Senate to become effective. A Concurrent Resolution adopted by the General Assembly does not become a statute, nor does it have the force and effect of law, nor can it be used for any purpose which requires the exercise of legislative power.

Joint Resolutions: A Joint Resolution is the most formal type of resolution, and is addressed to matters which are not internal affairs of either the House individually, nor the internal affairs of the General Assembly as a whole. It is of no legal effect unless passed by both Houses and approved by the Governor. Although a Joint Resolution is not a law, it is employed to provide for temporary measures; and has the force of law while in effect for a wide variety of limited purposes. A Joint Resolution is effective only for the General Assembly in which it was passed and approved. The requirement of the Governor's signature for Joint Resolutions stems from its original use in instances where it was expedient or necessary to express the joint will and action of the General Assembly and Governor combined.

Each member of the House may issue tributes and memoriams at any time during his or her term of office. Tributes and memoriams shall be sequentially numbered by the Chief Clerk and made a part of the House Journal. Each tribute or memoriam shall be signed by the prime sponsor, the Speaker and the Chief Clerk. The Speaker, or his designee, shall cause to be read into the permanent record of the House such tributes and memoriams as have been filed with the Chief Clerk. Tributes and memoriams shall not require a vote; however, at the time such items are officially read into the record, any member may comment on the tribute or memoriams. Tributes and memoriams issued when the House stands in recess or adjournment shall be administratively managed by the Chief Clerk, who shall cause such items to be made a part of the official proceedings of the House.

A measure, as used in these Rules, means a bill, resolution, amendment, motion, or other questions before the House.

A measure, as used in these Rules, means a bill, resolution, amendment, motion, or other questions before the House.

RULE 18 - PREPARATION AND CUSTODY

Each bill and resolution shall be introduced with as many backed copies as are deemed necessary by the Speaker. The original of the bill or resolution shall at all times remain in the custody of the Chief Clerk of the House or the Chairperson of the committee to which it has been assigned. A "duplicate" backed copy may go (on request) to the following: the Speaker, the Sponsor, and the Division of Research. Upon introduction of a bill or resolution a copy shall be delivered to every member. Copies shall also be delivered to the Division of Research.

No bill or joint resolution shall be introduced into the House unless it be "prefaced" by a brief statement of its purpose which shall be known as the title; and the bill or resolution shall also contain the text of such bill or resolution in full. Each bill or resolution shall have an appropriate enacting or resolving clause. If a bill by its terms requires an extraordinary majority for enactment, such vote requirement shall be announced by the Speaker prior to roll call, and such vote requirement shall be plainly indicated on the bill. At the end of each bill or joint resolution. In the lower left hand corner of page one shall be the initials of the unit preparing the bill or resolution, the initials of the drafter, and the initials of the typist; and, if prepared by automatic equipment, the identification number.

If a bill or resolution provides for the appointment or selection of members to a committee, task force or similar entity, there shall be a brief synopsis of the need for the creation of the task force or similar entity. A copy of such bill or resolution shall be delivered to each person who is to make an appointment or selection; and delivered to any person designated in the bill or resolution to be a member of the committee, task force or similar entity. Such bill or resolution shall contain the criteria for the selection of the chairperson and members of the task force or similar entity.

RULE 19 - INTRODUCTION OF BILLS AND RESOLUTIONS; FILING WITH CLERK

Each bill or resolution shall be numbered in order as introduced, beginning with HB 1 for House Bills, HR 1 for House Resolutions, HCR 1 for House Concurrent Resolutions and HJR 1 for House Joint Resolutions; and the original backer shall contain the signatures of all the sponsors of the original bill.

Every bill or resolution shall be introduced by:

Filing it with the Clerk of the House not less than one hour prior to the opening of the session by one of the two following procedures:

the sponsor's written direction to the Chief Clerk;

verbal approval from the sponsor to the Chief Clerk (original bill must be signed by the sponsor before start of session);

Introduction from the floor while the House is in session if permitted by the Speaker.

At the beginning of the day's session following the filing of a bill or resolution with the Clerk, the Clerk shall read the bill or resolution into the record. A bill or resolution that is filed with the Clerk of the House while the House stands in recess, in adjournment, or is not otherwise meeting, shall be given a number and entered upon a docket kept for that purpose.

Introduction of a bill or resolution shall be considered the first reading, of that bill or resolution, unless otherwise ordered by the House. The bill or resolution shall be read by title only, or by reference to the prefile list, and then be assigned by the Speaker to its appropriate committee.

Resolutions of condolence, congratulations or other non-controversial subject matters may be considered as part of the Consent Calendar without being assigned to a committee, unless any member objects. A suspension of the Rules is required in order to consider any other type of resolution without referring it to a committee.

The prime sponsor or sponsors of a bill or resolution shall be the member or members who have responsibility for the drafting and introduction of a bill or resolution. The prime sponsor(s) of a bill or resolution is that House member listed first to the right of the word "sponsor" on the upper right side of the first page of a bill or resolution, and the names of each member after the first which are joined by the word "and" or the symbol "&". The floor manager of a House bill or House resolution shall be that member whose name is listed first to the right of the word "sponsor" in the upper right side on the first page of a bill or resolution. A joint sponsor is any member of the House or Senate whose name is printed on the measure after the name of all prime sponsors. A co-sponsor is a member of the House or Senate whose name is not otherwise shown on the measure, but who signs the backer of the measure.

The chairperson of the House standing committee to which a Senate bill or resolution has been assigned shall also be the floor manager of that measure, unless he or she declines to serve, or defers to a House sponsor. If the committee chairperson declines to serve as floor manager, the Speaker shall designate a House member to be the floor manager of that measure.

In order to withdraw his or her sponsorship of a bill or resolution, a sponsor shall submit to the Chief Clerk a written notice for this purpose. The written notice shall then be attached to the original of the bill or resolution.

RULE 20 - ASSIGNMENT TO APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE

Each bill or joint resolution, whether emanating from the House or the Senate, containing an appropriation or which may involve any net financial loss or obligation on the part of the State, including transportation trust funds, if any, of \$50,000 or more in any one of the next three fiscal years (which has been previously referred by the Speaker under the Rules to any committee of the House other than the Committee on Appropriations) shall, after the same has been reported back to the House, be referred to the Committee on Appropriations. **RULE 21 - FISCAL NOTES**

RULE 21 - FISCAL NOTES

No bill or resolution either authorizing expenditures, or increasing or affecting the transportation trust fund, or reducing revenues as described in Chapter 19, Title 29 of the Delaware Code shall be placed before the House for consideration unless accompanied by a fiscal note.

All legislation proposing new fees or increases in existing fees charged by any state agency shall include therewith an explanation of:

the expected total amount of funds to be generated by the proposed fee or fee increase; the purpose of the proposed new fee or fee increase;

a general identification of the persons, business entities or organizations affected by the legislation;

the impact of the proposed new fees or fee increases on these affected persons, business entities or organizations;

the intended use by the agency of the revenues generated by the new fees or fee

increases.

The Office of the Controller General shall conduct such review or audit of the information offered by the state agency pursuant to (b)(1) as is deemed necessary to evaluate the information required therein, and shall issue a written report of its findings. The written report of the Office of the Controller General's findings shall be attached to the legislation, by the sponsor of the legislation, prior to the legislation's initial committee consideration in the house of origin.

The House may waive the requirements of this section as to any specific legislation pending before the House by a vote of the majority of all members elected to the House. **RULE 22 - FINAL READINGS AND CONSIDERATION BY HOUSE**

When brought before the House for consideration, each bill and joint resolution shall be given its final reading by title, unless the Speaker directs a reading in full.

Each bill or joint resolution in order to pass the House shall be read on two different days of the session unless a majority of the members elected to the House determine otherwise, or unless the bill or joint resolution is on a Consent Agenda or Calendar, and voted on by a single vote. No bill or joint resolution shall be brought before the House for passage on the same calendar day it is reported out of committee, nor in the absence of the prime sponsor without his or her written consent.

RULE 23 - AMENDMENTS

An amendment to a measure shall be introduced by prefiling the amendment if the amendment changes the nature and intent of the bill or resolution; or may be introduced when the measure is being discussed on the floor, if the amendment makes only technical corrections and does not change the nature and intent of the bill or resolution.

When an amendment to a bill would significantly change the nature and intent of the bill, such amendment shall contain a brief synopsis outlining the basic changes incurred.

When an amendment to a bill would change its fiscal impact by increasing expenditures or reducing revenues by \$50,000 or more, a new fiscal note shall accompany the amendment.

If a bill becomes significantly changed by amendment, the Speaker may reassign the amended bill to committee. The title of a bill or resolution shall not be amended.

All prefiled amendments shall be acted upon in numerical order before final action on the main bill or resolution, when the prime sponsor of the amendment is present.

An amendment previously attached to a bill in either house may be stricken from the bill by: An amendment which directs that a specific House or Senate amendment be stricken; or

An amendment which reverses the directions given by the amendment being stricken.

An amendment to an amendment shall only be considered prior to the adoption of the

amendment it is amending. However, an amendment once passed may be removed by a subsequent amendment.

RULE 24 - SUBSTITUTE BILLS

A substitute bill may be introduced by a prime sponsor of the bill for which it is a substitute and shall be assigned to committee and follow the same procedure as other bills.

Once introduced, the substitute bill shall render null and void the bill for which it is a substitute.

The title of a substitute bill must be identical to the title of the bill for which it is substituted.

RULE 25- PETITION OF BILL OR RESOLUTION OUT OF COMMITTEE

Every bill or resolution which has been in committee for a period of more than 12 legislative days, except those assigned to the Appropriations Committee pursuant to Rule 20,

shall, upon written request of the majority of the members elected to the House, be reported to the House for a decision as to its further disposal.

RULE 26 - VOTING

Except as provided for in Rule 46 or Rule 47, each bill or joint resolution which comes before the House for final action shall be acted upon by a separate roll call vote.

The names of the members of the House shall be called alphabetically, except for the Speaker who shall vote last; and each member shall, without debate or comments, answer "yes", or "no", or "not voting", from his or her respective seat.

No member shall be permitted to change his or her vote after the roll call has been announced by the Chief Clerk.

A roll call may not be laid on the table.

RULE 27 - STRIKING A BILL OR RESOLUTION

Only a prime sponsor of a bill or resolution or a member authorized by a prime sponsor in writing can strike said bill or resolution.

A bill or resolution may not be stricken once it has been voted upon. Upon the expulsion, death or resignation of any member from the House, any bill not yet acted upon by the House which has that member as the only sponsor shall be stricken.

V. COMMITTEES

RULE 28 - STANDING COMMITTEES

The standing committees and subcommittees of the House shall include members of both political parties and shall be appointed by the Speaker. The Speaker shall designate a chairperson, and may designate a vice-chairperson who shall act as the chairperson of the committee in the chairperson's absence, for each committee and subcommittee he appoints. The Chief Clerk shall keep a list of current standing committees and members appointed thereto.

The following standing committees and subcommittees shall be appointed by the Speaker at the beginning of each General Assembly.

There shall also be a House Administration Committee which membership shall be the Speaker, Majority Leader, Majority Whip, Minority Leader and Minority Whip. The Majority Leader shall be the chairperson of the House Administration Committee.

RULE 29 - APPOINTMENT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEES

The Speaker, on his own initiative or upon order of the House, may appoint Special Committees.

RULE 30 - ETHICS COMMITTEE

The Ethics Committee shall be a standing committee consisting of five members, three appointed by the Speaker and two appointed by the Minority Leader, at the beginning of each General Assembly.

The powers and duties of the Ethics Committee shall be as follows:

to recommend to the House, from time to time, such rules of conduct for members of the House as it shall deem appropriate;

to issue written advisory opinions upon the request of any member as to the applicability of any Rule of Legislative Conduct to any particular fact situation;

to investigate any alleged violation by a member of any Rule of Legislative Conduct and, after notice and hearing, to recommend to the House by resolution such disciplinary action as the committee may deem appropriate;

to report to the appropriate federal or State authorities any substantial evidence of a violation by any member of any law involving a Rule of Legislative Conduct which may come to its attention in connection with any proceeding whether advisory or investigative;

to maintain a file of its proceedings and advisory opinions with a view toward achieving consistency of opinions and recommendations. Upon the request of a legislator involved in an advisory opinion, to publish that advisory opinion;

to follow such rules of procedure for ethics violations as may be adopted by the House, and to establish such other procedural rules as shall not be inconsistent with the rules prescribed by the House;

to act only upon a majority vote of its members; and

such other duties and responsibilities as may be assigned by the House from time to time.

All proceedings before the Ethics Committee in connection with an advisory opinion shall be confidential subject to the following: (i) the member involved may waive the privilege of confidentiality, (ii) the proceedings shall no longer be confidential and may be made public in any subsequent disciplinary proceeding if the member acts in disregard of an advisory opinion, and (iii) the Ethics Committee shall maintain records of its proceedings and advisory opinions which shall be available for reference by the Committee, subsequent Committees and their staff.

The Committee may undertake an investigation of an alleged violation by a member of any Rule of Legislative Conduct only upon a written complaint submitted by a member of the House. The complaint must be accompanied by a written statement signed by any person, sworn under oath, setting forth the facts supporting the complaint. In any such investigation or proceeding, the accused member shall be given an opportunity to be heard after notice, to be advised and assisted by legal counsel, to produce witnesses and offer evidence, and to cross-examine witnesses. A transcript of any such proceeding shall be made and retained. In any such proceeding the rules of procedure for ethics violations as may be adopted by the House shall apply.

A member of the Committee shall be ineligible to participate, as a member of the Committee, in any Committee proceeding relating to his or her legislative conduct. In any such case, the person appointing that member (either the Speaker or the Minority Leader) shall designate a member of the House to act as a member of the Committee in any Committee proceeding relating to the legislative conduct of such ineligible member. A member of the Committee who has been found by the House to have violated a Rule of Legislative Conduct shall be ineligible to serve again as a member of the Committee.

A member of the Committee may disqualify himself or herself from participating in any investigation of the conduct of a member of the House upon submission in writing and under oath of an affidavit of disqualification stating that he or she cannot render an impartial and unbiased decision in the case in which he or she seeks to disqualify himself or herself. If the Committee approves and accepts such affidavit of disqualification, the chairperson shall so notify the person appointing that member (either the Speaker or the Minority Leader) and request that person to designate a member of the House to act as a member of the Committee in any Committee proceeding relating to such investigation.

Any member who acts in good faith reliance upon any written advisory opinion of the Ethics Committee rendered to that member shall not be subject to any discipline by the House with respect to the matters covered by the advisory opinion; provided there was a full disclosure to the Ethics Committee of all facts necessary for the opinion.

The Committee may function without regard to recess periods or adjournment.

RULE 31 - JOINT COMMITTEES

The House of Representatives and the Senate by mutual agreement may establish a joint committee or committees. The House members of any Joint Committee shall be appointed by the Speaker, unless otherwise provided by statute.

RULE 32 - QUORUM ON COMMITTEES

Four members or a majority, whichever is less, of the members of any committee, subcommittee or special committee shall constitute a quorum.

RULE 33 - COMMITTEE MEETINGS

During the legislative sessions, each standing committee of the House shall be assigned a regular meeting time by the Speaker. This assignment shall not preclude the option of a committee chairperson to cancel a regular or special meeting or call additional meetings when necessary, provided that such special or additional meetings are not scheduled during regular meeting times of standing committees. No committee meetings shall be held while the House is in session without the consent of the Speaker.

All committee meetings shall be chaired by the chairperson, or in his or her absence by the vice-chairperson, if any, if the committee does not have an appointed vice-chairperson, then, the chairperson shall designate a member of the committee to chair the committee in his or her absence.

So far as may be applicable, the rules of the House shall be observed in the conduct of committee meetings.

All committee meetings will be open to the public except that the committee chairperson may call an executive session at which no final action may be taken. An executive session may be called for those purposes which are listed at 29 Del. C. § 10004 and for the purpose of requesting the issuance of a subpoena pursuant to Rule 35(e). This subsection may be waived by a majority vote of the committee.

RULE 34 - DELIBERATIVE PROCESS AND PROCEDURES OF STANDING COMMITTEES

Each bill, resolution or other legislative matter assigned to a standing committee shall pass through a prescribed deliberative process before being brought to the floor of the House, unless it is sooner petitioned out of committee. Such deliberative process shall include regularly scheduled, pre-announced meetings whereby the committee or subcommittee, after notice to the sponsor, makes time available for each formal sponsor to explain the legislation and answer possible questions, considers an analysis of the proposed legislation and receives testimony from the general public.

On the last legislative day of each week, each standing committee shall release a Committee Agenda which shall include, among other things, all matters to be considered by the committee at its next meeting; and any other announcements from the committee including the times, places and dates of future meetings.

Minutes shall be recorded for each formal standing committee meeting, and the results of any committee votes shall be included. If a measure is tabled, reasons for such action shall also be included. Committee members who dissent from any committee decision shall be permitted, in the minutes, to state such dissent and the reasons therefor.

RULE 35 - PASSAGE OF MEASURES OUT OF COMMITTEE

Bills and resolutions shall be reported out of committee by a majority of the committee or subcommittee by signing the backer. A bill or resolution may be tabled in any committee or subcommittee by a majority vote of the full committee or subcommittee.

All bills and resolutions shall be acted upon by the appropriate committee within twelve legislative days after being assigned to that committee. All bills and resolutions not acted upon by the appropriate committee within twelve legislative days after being assigned to that committee can be petitioned out of committee pursuant to Rule 25.

The Chairperson shall return the bill or resolution to the Chief Clerk within two legislative days after a bill or resolution has been voted out of committee.

If a bill is unacceptable to the committee, a substitute bill may be introduced or the committee chairperson, on behalf of the committee, may offer one or more amendments which shall take precedence in floor action over any other amendment(s). If the committee amendment(s) fails, the bill may be reassigned to the committee by the Speaker.

Upon a majority vote of the full committee, a subpoena may be requested by the committee and presented to the Speaker for consideration pursuant to Rule 11.

RULE 36 - COMMITTEE REPORTS

Each bill and resolution reported out of committee may at the discretion of a majority of the full committee or the committee chairperson have a printed or typewritten report which includes a summary of the committee's discussion of the legislation. A copy of this report shall be placed in each member's agenda book when the legislation appears on the agenda. **RULE 37 - COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS TO APPROPRIATIONS** COMMITTEE

The committee chairperson on behalf of the committee shall make budgetary recommendations to the Appropriations Committee.

RULE 38 - COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

The committee of the whole shall mean and include a committee of the entire membership of the House, with the Speaker as chairperson, called into session by the Speaker. So far as may be applicable, the rules of the House shall be observed in the committee of the whole.

VI. MOTIONS

RULE 39 - DEBATE AND VOTE ON MOTIONS

After debate or discussion, the motion shall be repeated by the Speaker before putting the question to the House.

Every motion shall be decided in a fair and impartial manner by the Speaker. The vote of a majority of the members present shall prevail in the case of a motion to recess, incidental motions, subsidiary motions, or other motions presenting questions of a general procedural nature. The vote of a majority of the members elected to the House shall prevail in the case of privileged motions (except a motion to recess), main motions, or other motions presenting questions of a substantive nature. Such voting shall prevail unless contrary to these Rules, or unless it is in conflict with the statutes, or provisions of the Constitution, of the State of Delaware.

The Speaker may cause or any member may call for a roll call or division in which case the members voting in the affirmative shall be required to rise for the purpose of being counted by the Clerk of the House.

At the request of any member, the vote on any measure shall be by roll call vote. RULE 40 - PRECEDENCE OF MOTIONS

If a question is before the House, no motion may be received except one of the following, and they have precedence in the order listed:

to adjourn sine die. This motion is not debatable.

to adjourn. This motion is not debatable and cannot be amended nor reconsidered. to recess. This motion is not debatable. This motion is passed by a majority of those

members present.

question of privilege.

all incidental motions.

to table.

motion to call the previous question. A motion to call the previous question shall not be entertained except at the request of five members arising for that purpose and so indicating, and shall be determined by roll call vote without debate. When the previous question has been called and sustained, it shall not cut off action on amendments to the main measure; and the vote shall be taken without debate first on the amendments in order and then on the main measure

to limit debate.

postpone to a day certain.

to commit to committee.

to amend. An amendment may be offered to an amendment, but no motion may be accepted which would amend an amendment to an amendment.

to reconsider.

to take from the table

No motion may be received after a vote upon the question then before the House has been called for by the Speaker.

RULE 41 - MOTION FOR RECONSIDERATION

No motion for reconsideration shall be in order unless made on the same legislative day or on one of the three next succeeding legislative days. If the original vote was taken by a recorded vote of yes and no, this motion can be made only by a member who voted with the prevailing side; i.e., a reconsideration can be moved only by one who voted "yes" if the motion involved was adopted or "no" if the motion was lost. If the original vote was not taken by a recorded vote of yes or no, it is in order for any member to move for the reconsideration thereof.

When a bill, resolution, report, amendment, order or message, upon which a vote has been taken, shall have gone out of possession of the House and been communicated to the Senate, or to the Governor, the motion to reconsider shall be accompanied by a motion in writing, attested to by the Speaker, to request the Senate or the Governor to return the same; which last motion shall be acted upon immediately and without debate, and if determined in the negative shall be a final disposition of the motion to reconsider.

RULE 42 - MOTION TO TAKE FROM THE TABLE

After a measure has been laid on the table, only the following persons may move to lift such measure from the table:

In the case of a House measure, only one of the prime sponsors of the measure or a member authorized in writing by all the prime sponsors.

In the case of a measure without a House prime sponsor, only the floor manager of a measure or a member authorized in writing by the floor manager.

A motion to take a measure from the table may only be made on the same legislative day the measure is tabled (or if this motion is listed on the agenda). The motion is not debatable. **RULE 43 - SUSPENSION OF RULES**

The suspension of any Rule requires the concurrence of at least a majority of the members elected to the House. This motion is debatable but does not permit discussion of the main question. It cannot be reconsidered, laid on the table, nor postponed indefinitely, and while it is pending no motion may be made except to adjourn. A separate suspension of the Rules is necessary for each measure.

VII. CALENDAR AND AGENDA

RULE 44 - HOUSE CALENDAR

The Clerk of the House shall keep a House Calendar on which shall be placed the number and title of all bills and resolutions, the name of the prime sponsor, and the current status of each bill or resolution. Said bills and resolutions shall be kept on the Calendar and final action recorded.

RULE 45 - AGENDA

The Speaker shall place items on the agenda pursuant to Rule 10 of these rules.

In lifting bills from the table, the motion to lift is the agenda item.

Any House bill amended by the Senate shall either be placed on the Agenda or assigned to committee, at the discretion of the Speaker.

Measures brought to the top of the Agenda for the day shall be permitted only to be:

deferred to day certain two times only; or

deferred to the end of agenda one time only; or

laid on the table. A measure which has been on the table for six legislative days shall be returned to the Ready List; or

brought to a vote.

RULE 46 - CONSENT AGENDA

Any member of the House may propose any bill or joint resolution for inclusion on a Consent Agenda for final reading. The proposal shall be made in writing to the office of the Chief Clerk on any day. If any bill or joint resolution on a particular Consent Agenda has a super majority vote requirement then such Consent Agenda will require the highest such vote requirement.

A bill or joint resolution shall be removed from a Consent Agenda if any member objects to it being included thereon. In addition, a bill or joint resolution may not be included on a Consent Agenda if at the time of reading a Consent Agenda an unattached amendment to it has been proposed.

All bills and joint resolutions on a Consent Agenda shall be read and voted upon as a single group.

RULE 47 - CONSENT CALENDAR

Any member of the House may propose any resolution for inclusion on a Consent Calendar for final reading. The proposal shall be made in writing in the office of the Chief Clerk on any day.

A resolution shall be removed from a Consent Calendar if any member objects to its being included thereon. In addition, resolutions may not be included on a Consent Calendar if at the time of reading a Consent Calendar an unattached amendment to it is proposed.

All resolutions on a Consent Calendar shall be read and voted upon as a single group. RULE 48 - ANNOUNCEMENT OF AGENDA; DELIVERY OF BILLS AND RESOLUTIONS

The Chief Clerk shall lay upon the desk of the Speaker at the beginning of each day's session all bills, resolutions and motions pending before the House that day, properly arranged and classified.

Prior to the beginning of each legislative day, the Chief Clerk shall provide to each member a printed copy by number, sponsor and/or title, of the bills, resolutions or other measures that are being placed on the Agenda for that legislative day.

All enacted bills, concurrent resolutions, or joint resolutions originating in the House, or Senate bills or resolutions to which the House has added amendments or its concurrence, shall be delivered to the Senate by the Chief Clerk of the House or by the Bill Clerk within the three next succeeding legislative days.

VIII. MISCELLANEOUS

RULE 49 - OFFICES, PARKING SPACES AND SEATS

Desks on the floor of the House, offices, and parking spaces shall be allocated to the members by the Speaker.

RULE 50 - AUTHORIZED MANUAL OF PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

In all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with these Rules, the latest edition of Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure, shall govern the House.

RULE 51 - CHIEF CLERK AND ASSISTANT CHIEF CLERK

The House shall elect a Chief Clerk and an Assistant Chief Clerk who, in the absence of the Chief Clerk, shall perform the Chief Clerk's duties.

The Assistant Chief Clerk shall be compensated at a per diem rate to be determined by the Speaker while serving as Chief Clerk.

RULE 52 - SUPERVISION OF LEGISLATIVE STAFF

The legislative staff shall report to such supervisory staff as may be determined by the Speaker. The financial officer of the House shall maintain on file job descriptions for all positions within the legislative staff.

RULE 53 - REGISTRATION OF NEWS MEDIA

Members of the news media shall be registered by the Division of Research.

Accredited representatives of the daily and weekly press, press associations, and of radio and television stations shall be accorded equal press privileges by the Speaker. Any person wishing to report proceedings of the House may apply to the Speaker for assignment of suitable available space.

On approval of the Speaker, radio and television stations shall be permitted to air and record sessions of the House.

Any use or reproduction of House tapes will require permission of the Speaker and the request shall be communicated to the Chief Clerk in writing. A fee may be charged for this service.

RULE 54 - REGISTRATION OF LOBBYISTS

Lobbyists shall be registered by the State Public Integrity Commission pursuant to Chapter 58, Title 29 of the Delaware Code. No lobbyist shall be granted privilege of the floor unless so registered.

RULE 55 - PRIVILEGE OF FLOOR

The privilege of the floor may be granted by the Speaker upon request of any member, unless an objection is sustained by a majority of members present and voting.

RULE 56 - EXPEDITED PROCEDURES

The Speaker may designate the procedure by which certain items are to be expedited. Such rules as would interfere with the introduction of and/or action on such items shall automatically be deemed suspended unless one or more members object to an item being determined by expedited procedures.

RULE 57 - PERSONS ON THE FLOOR OF THE HOUSE

No person may be admitted to the floor of the House while the House is in session unless specifically invited by a member and with the consent of the Speaker except the following: former Governors, former members of the House, former members of the Senate (but none of the foregoing has this privileged admission without consent if he is paid to act as a registered legislative agent as defined in Chapter 16, Title 29 of the Delaware Code), duly designated representatives of the Governor of Delaware, members of the House and the Senate and their staffs, staff members from the Division of Research, representatives of each Cabinet Department, reporters for each of the daily newspapers published in the State, a reasonable number of other accredited correspondents as determined by the Speaker and a reasonable number of representatives of radio and television broadcasting stations (together with necessary equipment) as determined by the Speaker.

No one other than a member shall sit in a member's seat while the House is in session.

No one shall be allowed to smoke in the House Chamber.

No one shall use a cellular phone in the House Chamber, including the balcony area, while the House is in session.

RULE 58 - NON-MEMBER INVITED SPEAKERS OR GUESTS

A non-member speaker or guest shall be allowed to address the House of Representatives provided they are noted on the agenda together with the name of the Representative sponsoring said speaker or guest and the time allotted for their remarks.

A speaker noted per subsection (a) of this rule shall be granted a time limit of one minute, three minutes or five minutes by the Speaker of the House.

On the day of the scheduled address, the sponsoring member shall be recognized and shall move that the invited speaker or guest be granted privilege to address the House and shall state the allotted time granted by the Speaker of the House.

The Speaker of the House may grant an unlimited amount of time for the Governor to address the House as deemed necessary by the Speaker or the members of the House.

This rule is only applicable to appearances by non-members giving remarks unrelated to agenda items and shall not be construed so as to limit the speaking time of witnesses to legislation.

RULE 59 - REPEAL OR AMENDMENT OF RULES

No motion, order or resolution to repeal or amend a Rule of the House may be considered or acted upon unless it has been submitted in writing to the House at least one day prior thereto, together with the written text of any proposed amendment. The repeal or amendment of any Rule of the House requires the concurrence of at least a majority of the members elected to the House. **RULE 60 - RULES TO BE PRINTED**

These Rules shall be printed by the Division of Research, upon adoption, in a pocketsized edition which shall also contain the following materials:

a list of the Officers of the House;

the membership of the Standing Committees of the House;

the Constitutional vote requirements for passage of legislation; and

requirements set forth elsewhere directly relating to House action such as the fiscal note requirement.

RULE 61 - STATE MAIL AND POSTAGE

No House member or staff member shall use state mail services and/or state-paid for postage for his or her own personal use.

RULES OF PROCEDURE, ETHICS VIOLATIONS.

RULE 1 - SCOPE AND AUTHORITY.

These rules govern the procedures to be followed by the Ethics Committee and by the House in proceedings involving allegations of violations of the Rules of Legislative Conduct. So far as applicable, these rules and the Rules of the House of Representatives shall be the rules of the Ethics Committee which may prescribe additional rules not inconsistent therewith.

PROCEEDINGS BEFORE THE ETHICS COMMITTEE.

RULE 2 - MEETINGS AND QUORUM.

The Committee shall meet at the call of the Chairman. Notice of a Committee meeting shall be given pursuant to the Rules of the House of Representatives.

A quorum of the Committee consists of a majority of the members of the Committee. RULE 3 - COMMITTEE RECORDS.

The Chairman of the Committee shall, with the approval of the Committee, establish such procedures as in the Chairman's judgment may be necessary to prevent the unauthorized disclosure of any testimony or other information received by the Committee or its staff.

Unless otherwise authorized by the Committee, no information received by the Committee respecting any alleged violation by a member of the House of Representatives of any Rule of Legislative Conduct shall be disclosed to the public before the transmittal, under Rule 8 of these rules, to such member of a statement of alleged violation in connection with such violation. After the service of such a statement on the member:

the statement and any other paper filed pursuant to Rule 8 respecting such violation shall be made available for public inspection at reasonable hours; and

any other paper filed with the Committee respecting such violation shall be made available as authorized by the Committee, except that no paper shall be made available if its disclosure would violate any law or regulation.

RULE 4 - SPECIAL PROCEDURES.

The Committee may adopt, by Resolution, any special procedures deemed necessary to a particular matter before the Committee. Copies of such special procedures shall be furnished to all parties and witnesses in the matter.

RULE 5 - CHANGES IN COMMITTEE RULES.

The rules of the Committee other than these rules may be modified, amended or repealed by a vote of a majority of the Committee.

COMMITTEE INVESTIGATIVE AUTHORITY.

RULE 6 - COMPLAINTS.

A complaint may be submitted to the Committee pursuant to Subsection (c) of this rule and shall be in writing and under oath, setting forth in simple, concise and direct statements the following:

the name and address of the party filing the complaint (hereinafter referred to as the 'complainant');

the name of the member of the House of Representatives alleged to be in violation of a Rule of Legislative Conduct (hereinafter referred to as the 'respondent');

a statement of each violation, identifying the Rule of Legislative Conduct alleged to have been violated, divided into counts with each violation representing a separate count; and

the facts alleged to give rise to the violation. The facts supporting the complaint may be sworn to by any person. When facts are alleged upon the information and belief of the complainant, the complaint shall so state and set forth the basis for such information and belief.

All documents in the possession of the complainant that are relevant to and in support of the allegations shall be appended to the complaint.

A complaint may be filed only by a member of the House of Representatives (including a member of the Committee) and shall be transmitted directly to the Committee.

RULE 7 - PROCESSING COMPLAINTS.

The Staff of the Committee shall examine each complaint submitted to the Committee for compliance with the Rules of the House of Representatives and any other applicable Committee rules.

If the staff determines that a complaint does not comply with House and Committee rules, the complaint shall be returned to the complainant with a general statement that the complaint is not in compliance with such rules and a copy of such rules. A complainant may resubmit a complaint.

If the staff determines that a complaint is in compliance with House and Committee rules, the complaint shall be filed with the Committee and a copy shall be transmitted to each member of the Committee.

The Chairman shall place the complaint on the Committee agenda for consideration, and shall schedule a Committee meeting as soon as practical thereafter.

The Committee shall consider the complaint and determine if the complaint should be dismissed because it fails to allege facts which constitute a violation of a Rule of Legislative Conduct or if the complaint merits further inquiry.

The decision under subparagraph (A) of this paragraph shall be transmitted in writing to the complainant and respondent.

If the Committee determines that the complaint fails to allege facts which constitute a violation of a Rule of Legislative Conduct, the Committee shall deliver to the House a report of the action taken and a brief statement of the reasons therefor.

If there are no dissenting votes to the determination in paragraph (b)(1) of this rule the complaint shall be considered dismissed, and neither the Committee nor the House shall take any further action with respect thereto.

If there are any dissenting votes to the determination in paragraph (b)(1) of this rule, the complaint shall be considered dismissed and neither the Committee nor the House shall take any

further action with respect thereto provided that the Committee's determination shall be considered reversed and the investigation shall be pursued by the Committee upon the written petition of any member of the House filed with the Speaker and approved by the majority vote of the elected members of the House.

RULE 8 - PRELIMINARY INQUIRY AND STATEMENT OF ALLEGED VIOLATION.

If the Committee determines under Rule 7 that the allegation of a violation in a complaint filed with the Committee merits further inquiry, or if the Committee's determination in that regard is reversed by the House, the Committee shall conduct a preliminary inquiry to determine whether such violation occurred.

In the preliminary inquiry:

matter:

the respondent shall have an opportunity to present to the Committee, orally or in writing, a statement respecting the allegations with respect to which the inquiry is being held;

the staff may interview witnesses and examine documents and other evidentiary

the Committee may order the testimony of witnesses to be taken under oath, in which event the oath may be administered by a member of the Committee or by any person authorized by a member of the Committee or any person authorized by law to administer oaths;

the Committee may require, by subpoena or otherwise, the attendance and testimony of witnesses and the production of such books, records, correspondence, memoranda, papers, documents and other things as it deems necessary to the conduct of the inquiry; and

any probative evidence may be used.

Upon the completion of the preliminary inquiry, the staff of the Committee shall prepare and transmit to the Committee a report containing a comprehensive summary of the information received in the inquiry; and may include in the report a recommendation for action by the Committee respecting the alleged violations which was the subject of the inquiry.

If the Committee determines on the basis of the report of the Committee staff on the preliminary inquiry respecting an alleged violation that there is reason to believe that the violation occurred, the Committee shall direct the staff to transmit to the respondent a statement of alleged violation. A statement shall be divided into counts and each count shall relate to a separate violation and shall contain a plain and concise statement of the alleged facts of such violation, and include a reference to the provision of the Rule of Legislative Conduct alleged to have been violated.

If the Committee determines on the basis of the report of the Committee staff on the preliminary inquiry that there is no reason to believe that the violation occurred, the Committee shall deliver to the House a report of the action taken together with a statement of the reasons therefore.

If there are no dissenting votes to the determination in paragraph ($c\dot{\chi}(1)$ of this rule, the complaint shall be considered dismissed and neither the Committee nor the House shall take any further action with respect thereto.

If there are any dissenting votes to the determination in paragraph (c)(1) of this rule, the complaint shall be considered dismissed and neither the Committee nor the House shall take any further action with respect to the matter provided that the House shall consider the matter upon the written petition of any member of the House filed with the Speaker and approved by the majority vote of the members of the House.

If any such proceeding is initiated in the House, the matter shall be prosecuted by the members of the Committee who dissented from the vote to dismiss the complaint. In such case,

the dissenting members shall direct the Committee staff to transmit to the House and to the respondent, a statement of alleged violation as described in Subsection (b) which shall be the basis of the House's consideration of the matter.

RULE 9 - ANSWERS AND MOTIONS AND COMMITTEE ACTION.

If a statement of alleged violation is transmitted under Rule 8(b), the respondent shall have 20 calendar days in which to respond. The response shall be by way of answer or motion, shall be in writing and signed by the respondent or his counsel, and shall be limited to the following:

An admission or denial of, under oath, each count set forth in the statement plus any supportive evidence and any other relevant information which the respondent may desire to submit.

An objection to any count in the statement on the grounds that it fails to state a fact which constitutes a violation of a Rule of Legislative Conduct.

An objection to the jurisdiction of the Committee to consider the allegations contained in the statement.

A motion for a bill of particulars.

An objection to the participation of any member of the Committee in the consideration of the allegations contained in the statement on the grounds that such member cannot render an impartial or unbiased decision. The Committee member against whom the objection is made shall be the sole judge of his qualifications. A motion under this paragraph is not in lieu of an answer. Any motion submitted pursuant to this rule shall be accompanied by a memorandum of points and authorities. Except for good cause shown, no pleading or motion not described in paragraphs (1) through (5) of this subsection will be considered by the Committee and the Committee will not consider any answer or motion in such paragraphs which is submitted under this rule after the expiration of such 20 calendar days.

Within 10 calendar days after the receipt of any motion under Subsection (a) of this rule, the Committee shall consider such motion. Notice of the decision of the Committee respecting such motion shall be furnished the respondent. When the Committee has acted on all motions submitted under paragraphs (2), (3) and (4) of Subsection (a) of this rule, the respondent shall, in accordance with paragraph (a)(1) of this rule, submit, within 10 calendar days of the date of the last Committee action, an answer to each count in the statement not dismissed by the Committee.

Failure to submit, within the applicable time period, an answer to a count of a statement which has not been dismissed by the Committee, shall constitute an admission to the violation alleged in the count.

The Chairman, in his discretion, may extend or shorten any time limitations imposed by this rule if he determines that the extension would facilitate a fair and complete inquiry or the shorter time is required because of special circumstances.

As soon as practical after the expiration of all applicable time limitations for action under Subsections (a) and (b) of this rule, the Committee shall act, by the vote of a majority of the members of the Committee, to:

hold a disciplinary hearing on the violation charged in the statement;

defer action on the statement, but only if there is a grand jury or judicial proceeding pending; or

dismiss the statement.

The respondent shall be notified in writing of action taken under paragraph (1) of this Subsection.

If the Committee votes to dismiss the statement, the Committee shall deliver to the House a report of the action taken together with a statement of the reasons therefor.

If there are no dissenting votes to the decision in paragraph (f)(1) of this rule, the statement shall be considered dismissed and neither the Committee nor the House shall take any further action with respect thereto.

If there are any dissenting votes to the decision in paragraph (f)(1) of this rule, the statement shall be considered dismissed and neither the Committee nor the House shall take any further action with respect to the matter provided that the House shall consider the matter upon the written petition of any member of the House filed with the Speaker and approved by a majority vote of the members of the House. If any such proceeding is initiated in the House, the matter shall be prosecuted by the members of the Committee who dissented from the vote to dismiss the statement. The statement shall be the basis of the House's consideration of the matter and the dissenting members shall cause a copy of the statement to be delivered to the House and served upon the respondent.

RULE 10 - DISCIPLINARY HEARINGS BEFORE THE COMMITTEE.

A disciplinary hearing respecting a violation charged in a Statement of Alleged Violation shall be held by the Committee to receive evidence upon which to base findings of fact and recommendations, if any, to the House respecting such violation. A disciplinary hearing shall consist of two phases. The first phase shall be for the purpose of determining whether or not the count in the statement have been proved. The second phase shall be for the purpose of determining what action to recommend to the House with respect to any count found to have been proved.

At a disciplinary hearing the Committee may require, by subpoena or otherwise, the attendance and testimony of such witnesses and the production of such books, records, correspondence, memoranda, papers, documents and any other things as it deems necessary. Depositions, interrogatories and sworn statements taken under Committee direction may be accepted into the Committee record.

Prior to setting a date for a disciplinary hearing and issuing subpoenas for witnesses, the Committee shall resolve the scope and purpose of the hearing. A copy of this statement of scope and purpose shall be furnished to all witnesses. During the course of the hearing the Committee may expand or contract the scope in light of evidence received.

The order of phase one of a disciplinary hearing shall be as follows:

The Chairman shall open the hearing by stating the Committee's authority to conduct the hearing, the purpose of the hearing and its scope

Testimony from witnesses and other evidence pertinent to the subject of the hearing shall be received in the following order whenever possible, (i) witnesses and other evidence offered by the Committee staff, (ii) witnesses and other evidence offered by the respondent, and (iii) rebuttal witnesses.

Witnesses at a hearing shall be examined first by the Committee counsel or authorized staff member. The Committee members may then question the witnesses. The respondent or his counsel may then cross-examine the witnesses. Redirect and recross may be permitted in the Chairman's discretion. With respect to witnesses offered by the respondent, a witness shall be examined first by the respondent or his counsel, and then may be cross examined by Committee counsel or authorized staff member. Committee members may then question the witness. Redirect and recross may be permitted in the Chairman's discretion.

Testimony of all witnesses shall be taken under oath. The oath shall be administered by the Chairman or Committee member designated by him to administer oaths.

At a disciplinary hearing the burden of proof rests on the staff with respect to each count to establish the facts alleged therein clearly and convincingly by the evidence that it introduces.

The second phase of a disciplinary hearing shall consist of oral and/or written submission by counsel for the Committee and counsel for the respondent as to the sanction the Committee shall recommend to the House with respect to any count of the Statement of Alleged Violation which has been proved. Testimony by witnesses will not be heard at phase two except by a vote of a majority of the Committee.

RULE 11 - COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS.

As soon as practicable after the completion of the first phase of a disciplinary hearing respecting a Statement of Alleged Violation, the Committee shall consider each count contained in the statement and with respect to each count as originally drawn or as amended shall vote either to find that the count has been proved or to dismiss the count. A count shall not be proved unless at least a majority of the Committee vote for a motion that the count has been proved.

If the Committee votes that a count has been proved, the Committee may, upon completion of the second phase of the disciplinary hearing, by a majority vote of the Committee, consider and vote on a motion that a recommendation be made to the House for appropriate action respecting the violation charged in such count.

With respect to any violation with which a member of the House was charged in a count which the Committee has voted as proved, the Committee may include in its recommendations to the House one or more of the following sanctions:

Suspension or expulsion from the House.

Censure. Reprimand. Fine.

Any other sanction determined by the Committee to be appropriate. The Committee report accompanying a recommendation to the House adopted by the Committee under paragraph (a)(2) respecting a violation charged in a count shall contain a statement of the evidence which supported the finding as to that count and a statement of the Committee's reasons for the recommendation as well as a statement of the Committee's reasons for finding that any count was not proved. The Committee shall cause a copy of the Committee's report and the Statement of Alleged Violation to be served upon the respondent. The statement shall be the basis of the House's consideration of the matter.

If the Committee votes to dismiss all counts of a statement and there are no dissenting votes, the statement shall be considered dismissed and neither the Committee nor the House shall take any further action with respect thereto.

If there are any dissenting votes to the determination in paragraph (d)(1) of this subsection, the statement shall be considered dismissed and neither the Committee nor the House shall take any further action with respect thereto provided that the House shall consider the matter upon the written petition of any member of the House filed with the Speaker and approved by a majority vote of all members of the House. If any such proceeding is initiated in the House, the matter shall be prosecuted by the members of the Committee who dissented from the vote to dismiss. The statement shall be the basis of the House's consideration of the matter and the dissenting members of the Committee shall cause a copy of the statement to be delivered to the House and served upon the respondent.

RULE 12 - DISCLOSURE OF EVIDENCE.

Upon the request of a respondent, the Committee may permit the respondent to inspect, copy or photograph books, papers, documents, photographs or other tangible objects which the Committee intends to use as evidence against the respondent in a disciplinary hearing and which are material to the preparation of the defense of the respondent.

RULE 13 - EXCULPATORY INFORMATION.

If the Committee at any time receives any exculpatory information respecting a Statement of Alleged Violation against a member of the House of any law, rule, regulation or other standard of conduct, it shall forthwith make such information available to such member.

RULE 14 - ADMISSIBILITY OF EVIDENCE.

Any evidence that is relevant and probative shall be admissible in any hearing of the Committee, unless the evidence is privileged or unless the Constitution otherwise requires its exclusion. Objections going only to the weight that should be given to evidence will not justify its exclusion.

The Chairman or other member presiding at a hearing shall rule upon any question of admissibility at the hearing of testimony or evidence presented to the Committee. The Chairman or other member presiding may limit the presentation of repetitious evidence. Rulings shall be final unless reversed or modified by a majority vote of the Committee members present. **RULE 15 - WITNESSES.**

A subpoena to a witness to appear at a hearing shall be served sufficiently in advance of his scheduled appearance to allow him a reasonable period of time, as determined by the Committee, to prepare for the hearing and to employ counsel should he so desire.

Except as otherwise specifically authorized by the Chairman, no member of the Committee or staff shall make public the name of any witness subpoenaed by the Committee before the date of his scheduled appearance.

Witnesses at hearings may be accompanied by their counsel for the purpose of advising them concerning their constitutional rights and to raise objections to the admissibility of testimony and evidence. Counsel for a witness other than the respondent shall not be permitted to engage in oral argument with the Committee. After a witness has testified, his counsel may submit to the Committee, in writing, any questions he wishes propounded to his client and any request for additional witnesses or other evidence. Such request may be granted at the Committee's discretion.

The respondent may apply to the Committee for the issuance of subpoenas for the appearance of witnesses or the production of documents on his behalf. The application shall be granted upon a concise showing by the respondent that the proposed testimony or evidence is relevant and not otherwise available. The application shall be denied if not made at a reasonable time or if the testimony or evidence would be merely cumulative.

Each witness appearing before the Committee shall be furnished a printed copy of the rules of the Committee.

PROCEEDINGS BEFORE THE HOUSE

RULE 16 - RECORDS OF HOUSE PROCEEDINGS.

All papers filed in the House with respect to a proceeding involving an allegation of a violation of a Rule of Legislative Conduct shall be made available for public inspection at reasonable hours except that no paper shall be made available if its disclosure would violate any law or regulation.

RULE 17 - SPECIAL PROCEDURES.

The House may adopt by Resolution any special procedures deemed necessary to a particular matter before the House. Copies of such special procedures shall be furnished to all parties and witnesses in the matter.

RULE 18 - CONSIDERATION OF COMPLAINTS BY THE HOUSE.

If a Statement of Alleged Violation is served upon a respondent pursuant to rules 8(c)(3), 9 (f)(3), 11(c) or 11(d)(2), the respondent shall have 20 calendar days in which to respond. The response shall be by way of answer or motion, shall be in writing and signed by the respondent or his counsel, and shall be limited to the following:

An admission or denial of, under oath, each count set forth in the Statement plus any supportive evidence and any other relevant information which the respondent may desire to submit.

An objection to any count in the Statement on the grounds that it fails to state a fact which constitutes a violation of a Rule of Legislative Conduct.

An objection to the jurisdiction of the House to consider the allegations contained in the Statement.

A motion for a bill of particulars.

An objection to the participation of any member of the House in the consideration of the allegations contained in the Statement on the grounds that the member cannot render an impartial or unbiased decision. The member of the House against whom the objection is made shall be the sole judge of his qualifications. A motion under this paragraph is not in lieu of an answer. Any motion submitted pursuant to this rule shall be accompanied by a memorandum of points and authorities. Except for good cause shown, no pleading of motion not described in paragraphs (1) through (5) will be considered by the House and the House will not consider any answer or motion in such paragraphs which is submitted under this rule after the expiration of such 20 calendar days.

As soon as practical after the receipt of any motion under Subsection (a) of this rule, the House shall consider such motion. Notice of the decision of the House respecting such motion shall be furnished the respondent. When the House has acted on all motions submitted under paragraphs (2), (3) and (4) of Subsection (a) of this rule, the respondent shall in accordance with paragraph (a)(1) of this rule, submit, within 10 calendar days of the date of the last House action, an answer to each count in the statement not dismissed by the House.

Failure to submit, within the applicable time period, an answer to a count of a statement which has not been dismissed by the House shall constitute an admission to the violation alleged in the count.

The Speaker, in his discretion, may extend or shorten any time limitations imposed by this rule if he determines that the extension would facilitate a fair and complete inquiry or the shorter time is required because of special circumstances.

As soon as practical after the expiration of all applicable time limitations for action under Subsections (a) and (b) of this rule, the House shall act, by the vote of the majority of the members, to:

hold a disciplinary hearing on the violation charged in the statement;

defer action on the statement but only if there is a grand jury or judicial proceeding pending; or

dismiss the statement or any counts thereof.

The respondent shall be notified in writing of action taken under paragraph (1) of this Subsection.

RULE 19. DISCIPLINARY HEARINGS.

A disciplinary hearing respecting a violation charged in a Statement of Alleged Violation shall be held by the House to receive evidence respecting such violation. A disciplinary hearing shall consist of two phases. The first phase shall be for the purpose of determining whether or not the counts in the statement have been proved. The second phase shall be for the purpose of determining what disciplinary action to take with respect to any count found to have been proved.

At a disciplinary hearing the House may require, by subpoena or otherwise, the attendance and testimony of such witnesses and the production of such books, records, correspondence, memoranda, papers, documents and any other things as it deems necessary. Depositions, interrogatories and sworn statements taken under House direction may be accepted into the House record

Prior to setting a date for a disciplinary hearing and issuing subpoenas for witnesses, the House shall resolve the scope and purpose of the hearing. A copy of this statement of scope and purpose shall be furnished to all witnesses. During the course of the hearing the House may expand or contract the scope in light of evidence received.

The order of phase one of a disciplinary hearing shall be as follows:

The Speaker shall open the hearing by stating the House's authority to conduct the hearing, the purpose of the hearing and its scope.

Testimony from witnesses and other evidence pertinent to the subject of the hearing shall be received in the following order whenever possible, (i) witnesses and other evidence offered by the committee staff, (ii) witnesses and other evidence offered by the respondent, and (iii) rebuttal witnesses.

Witnesses at a hearing shall be examined first by the committee counsel or authorized staff member. Members of the committee may then question the witnesses. The respondent or his counsel may then cross-examine the witnesses. Redirect and recross may be permitted in the Speaker's discretion. With respect to witnesses offered by the respondent, a witness shall be examined first by the respondent or his counsel and then may be cross-examined by committee counsel or authorized staff member. Committee members may then question the witness. Redirect and recross may be permitted in the Speaker's discretion.

Testimony of all witnesses shall be taken under oath. The oath shall be administered by the committee member designated by the Speaker to administer oaths.

At a disciplinary hearing the burden of proof rests on the committee with respect to each count to establish the facts alleged therein clearly and convincingly by the evidence that it introduces.

Phase two of a disciplinary hearing shall consist of oral and/or written submission by counsel for the committee and counsel for the respondent as to the sanction the House should impose with respect to any count of the Statement which has been proved. Testimony by witnesses will not be heard at phase two except by a vote of a majority of the House.

The House by Resolution may establish rules by which members of the House other than members of the Ethics Committee may participate in a disciplinary proceeding before the House. **RULE 20. FINDINGS; SANCTIONS.**

As soon as practicable after the completion of the first phase of a disciplinary hearing respecting a Statement, the House shall consider each count contained in the Statement and with respect to each count as originally drawn or as amended shall vote on a motion that the count has been proved. A count shall not be proved unless at least a majority of the House vote for a

motion that the count has been proved. A count which is not proved shall be considered as dismissed by the House.

If the House votes that a count has been proved, the House may upon completion of the second phase of the disciplinary hearing, by a majority vote consider and vote on a motion that any of the following sanctions be imposed respecting the violation charged in such count;

Suspension or expulsion from the House.

Censure.

Reprimand.

Fine.

Any other sanction determined by the committee to be appropriate.

A member of the House may not be suspended or expelled from the House unless by a vote concurred in by two-thirds of the members.

RULE 21. DISCLOSURE OF EVIDENCE.

Upon the request of a respondent, the committee may permit the respondent to inspect, copy or photograph books, papers, documents, photographs or other tangible objects which the committee intends to use as evidence against the respondent in a disciplinary hearing before the House and which are material to the preparation of the defense of the respondent.

RULE 22. EXCULPATORY INFORMATION.

If the Committee at any time receives any exculpatory information respecting a Statement of Alleged Violation against a member of the House of any law, rule, regulation, or other standard of conduct, it shall forthwith make such information available to such member. **RULE 23. ADMISSIBILITY OF EVIDENCE.**

Any evidence that is relevant and probative shall be admissible in any hearing before the House, unless the evidence is privileged or unless the Constitution otherwise requires its exclusion. Objections going only to the weight that should be given to evidence will not justify its exclusion.

The Speaker or other member presiding at a hearing shall rule upon any question of admissibility at the hearing of testimony or evidence presented to the House. The Speaker or other member presiding may limit the presentation of repetitious evidence.

RULE 24. WITNESSES.

A subpoena to a witness to appear at a hearing shall be served sufficiently in advance of his scheduled appearance to allow him a reasonable period of time, as determined by the Speaker, to prepare for the hearing and to employ counsel should he so desire.

Except as otherwise specifically authorized by the Speaker, no member of the Committee or staff shall make public the name of any witness subpoenaed by the Committee before the date of his scheduled appearance.

Witnesses at hearings may be accompanied by their counsel for the purpose of advising them concerning their constitutional rights and to raise objections to the admissibility of testimony and evidence. Counsel for a witness other than the respondent shall not be permitted to engage in oral argument before the House. After a witness has testified, his counsel may submit to the Speaker in writing, any questions he wishes propounded to his client and any request for additional witnesses or other evidence. Such request may be granted at the Speaker's discretion.

concise showing by the respondent that the proposed testimony or evidence is relevant and not otherwise available. The application shall be denied if not made at a reasonable time or if the testimony or evidence would be merely cumulative.

Each witness appearing before the House shall be furnished a printed copy of the rules of the House.

Lieutenant Governor Carney, Senate pro Tem Sharp, Mr. Speaker Spence, Members of the 141st General Assembly, other elected officials, members of the Judiciary, members of my Cabinet, distinguished guests, to my family, to my fellow Delawareans, thank you for the opportunity to address you today on the state of our great state.

To the Members of the General Assembly, let me express my sincerest appreciation for the kindness and consideration that you have shown me in my first weeks, also to my staff and to my Cabinet. I am most grateful. And I am more confident than ever that I will have the best relationship with the General Assembly that any Governor has ever had, and for that I am grateful as well. Thank you very much.

In return, I'm going to make you a promise. As a legislator and a Lieutenant Governor, I've sat through many of the speeches and I know what it's like to sit through these speeches. So I promise you this State of the State, like a good pizza, will be delivered in 25 minutes.

So let me begin: We have benefited from the longest economic expansion in recent history.

Delaware, like other states, has seen extraordinary revenue surpluses over the last four years. These surpluses have allowed us to cut taxes, pay down our debt, expand and improve our education, our welfare reform, make capital investments of over \$1 billion preserving our state's farmland and historic sites and open spaces, improving our water, wiring our schools - all while keeping the balance sheet well and solidly in the black.

But our revenue picture has changed, changed significantly in the last year. The rate of growth in state revenues has slowed due to the sizeable tax cuts and the slowing economy. Our auto plants face competitive pressure. A landmark Delaware company is up for sale. And the cost of environmental compliance is making it tough for Delaware's agriculture to prosper.

And on the expenditure side, the picture is changing as well. Medicaid has run large deficits over the last eighteen months. In part, this deficit is a result of the expansion of the health care for Delaware's children. But, more generally, the Medicaid deficit may result from the slowing economy, rising costs of health care, trends that may continue - and escalate - over the next several years.

I was here during our last recession, just as many of you were and we know we have to heed these early warning signs and make hard choices if we're going to keep our economy strong. I begin my administration with more limited resources than the last one did. Two months ago, it was projected that we would end the current fiscal year with a \$35 million deficit. Thanks to the hard work in our state agencies and by Budget Director Pete Ross and his deputy Bert Scoglietti, I am happy to report to you today that we are back on course and will end this year in the black. And for the future, the state has sufficient revenue and borrowing authority to meet the most pressing needs. But gone are the days of the \$200 million or the \$400 million surpluses we've had.

Commitments to fund schools, school construction for the referenda that have already passed will consume most of the available revenue. And if this year's pending referenda pass, we are looking at another \$452 million bill - a necessary but a high cost we must address before we even talk about any other school building. In this year, and in coming years as well, we will have to make tough choices. Choices between competing and equally deserving priorities. I am prepared to do that.

I have already announced two of my priorities for the year. First, working with Senator Blevins and Representative Maier, we have started the Patient's Bill of Rights. This will ensure that Delawareans, especially our seniors, get the health care they need, the health care they deserve, that they have paid for and- in some cases - are not getting. I ask you to work with me to achieve this goal.

I have announced, with the help of Senator McBride, an Environmental Right-To-Know measure, providing for more timely notification to residents in the event of an environmental incident. Again, I ask you to work with me to provide better protection and more information to our citizens.

Today, I want to focus on two additional areas that Delawareans have asked me and you as elected officials to address. And they are education and growth.

Education is certainly the most pressing issue we face in our state, and for good reason. Every facet of our state and our society depends on preparing today's children for the challenges of tomorrow, in work and in life.

Over the past several years, we've built the framework for improvement of our schools - established standards, developed tests to measure those standards, supported our teachers and implemented accountability. I believe we are beginning to see the fruits of those labors and we must remain committed and on the path that we started. But we are far from where we want to be. And so the work is just beginning.

There are many possible solutions for improving our schools. Most of them are worthy and would work - if only we had the resources to do them all. But as I have said before, this is the time for tough choices.

I believe, as do many experts, that reading is the most crucial aspect of education. Without a proper foundation in reading, it's not possible for a student to master math or science or history or literature. And so every child who leaves the early grades without good reading skills is a child who will struggle through their remaining days - and in life.

That's why I will focus on the one reform that I believe will make the most difference in the educational lives of our children. And that's my promise to put reading specialists in every elementary school, a reading specialist who can spend time with students in their early grades and help smooth the path for them for their years to come.

As I was preparing this address this week, I read a letter to the editor and it mirrored my feelings on education. The letter was titled, "Help children learn before they fall back academically," and it was written by Mary Beth Evans, a schoolteacher at our own Drew Pyle Elementary School. Her message is a simple one. And I quote, "Preventing children from falling behind has to be simpler and less expensive than treating the problems later." End quote. Think about it. I am glad that Mary Beth could join us today as my special guest to help me stress the need for reading specialists in our elementary schools. Please join me in welcoming Mary Beth Evans.

It has been estimated that putting a reading specialist in every elementary school will cost \$5 million. But I pledge to make it my number one priority, and I ask that the Members of the General Assembly work with me to ensure our children's educational future.

The other area that cries out for attention from state government is growth.

Delaware is growing faster than any northeastern state. Each new resident costs Delaware taxpayers almost \$10,000 in new infrastructure and services - including roads and water and sewer, schools, libraries, emergency services.

If that growth is poorly planned - leapfrogging over development areas into unincorporated and rural parts of our state - the cost of the growth goes even higher. Already, 72 percent of our Delawareans live outside town and city limits. Zoning is a local matter. But because government in Delaware is so centralized at the state level, every taxpayer bears the cost of land-use decisions that ignore all the efforts to plan growth.

The state, with an eye on the bigger picture, must play a role in encouraging growth in areas that we've agreed and are ready to accept growth.

We need to pursue a strategy that will keep sprawl in check, reduce traffic congestion, strengthen our towns and cities, protect our huge investment in roads and schools and other infrastructure. I propose to call it "Livable Delaware."

But "Livable Delaware" is not anti-growth. It offers carrots, not sticks, to channel development to growth zones that already have been designed and designated by the state, the county and the local communities for growth. Elements of such a strategy already are in place. Open space and farmland preservation. Redevelopment of brownfield sites. Preservation of our major highway corridors to promote safer travel and minimize the need to build new roads. Tax credits for historic preservation. Coordination and cooperation among state agencies, the county and the community on projects like AstraZeneca.

I plan to unveil my full "Livable Delaware" strategy in the coming months.

The Minner-Carney Administration is not only the first administration of the new millennium. It also represents the first Delaware administration to exist entirely during the Internet era. For the first time in Delaware's history, from the first day this Governor took office, the Internet is a regular fixture in the lives of a large number of Delaware citizens.

In fact, this State of the State is being broadcast live on the Internet, so to those who are joining me on the web, I say welcome. And I especially welcome the classes at the Milford Middle School, who I know are watching in their school computer lab.

Today, thousands of Delawareans have incorporated the Internet into their daily lives. We had four million hits on the state internet website last month. Four million hits. The time is right for the State to fully incorporate the Internet into the way it conducts its business daily providing services for our citizens. And the goal should be to harness the technology, making it easier to interact with government - easier on people and easier on resources like paper or fuel.

Last year, the State of Delaware conducted an e-Government assessment, comparing the numbers and types of services, comparing the Internet with other states. We found that Delaware was behind most states in what we do.

And as a result, state agencies have already completed projects, the polling place locator provided by the State Election Commissioner and the onsite job applications to our State Personnel Office.

Today, we are in the middle of several more projects.

First, a complete overhaul of the State's web site. On our new home page, we will organize services and information in a way that makes the user's experience easier, more efficient, more enjoyable. Web users will see a new website up and operational by spring.

Second, a new state-of-the-art web presence for the Division of Motor Vehicles. The "next generation" website will utilize the latest technologies to meet the needs of our DMV customers in a way that no other state is doing it today.

And finally, we will establish a statewide set of technical and policy standards that will be a consistent framework for our state agencies as they move services and information onto the Internet.

And I want to stop a minute and thank State Treasurer, Jack Markell, for his leadership. Thank you, Jack, for the leadership that you've provided. We look forward to moving Delaware government even further onto the web.

But let me speak for just a few minutes about some challenges I have inherited.

Between 1994 and 1997, vehicle miles traveled on Delaware highways increased by more than 12 percent - about three times faster than our population growth. During that same period, the number of Delaware-registered vehicles grew by 10 percent.

All that traffic generates ground-level ozone, which irritates the lungs and the eyes and can temporarily decrease lung capacity by as much as 20 percent. Delaware is falling short of meeting its federal ozone emission target. We have until July 24 to demonstrate to the federal Environmental Protection Agency that we can meet the target by 2005.

Therefore we must study our options and decide the best course. About 85 percent of our shortfall could be met by lowering the speed limit on SR-1 and I- 495 during the summer, if that's the way we choose to go. We can also look at our vehicle inspection process and changes in our land-use policies. But this is an issue we must face between now and summer.

Last October, Delaware's federal highway construction funds were reduced by \$2.1 million because we have not passed a tougher open-container, repeat-offender DUI law in Delaware.

If we don't act, we will continue to lose that amount of federal highway funds every year until October 2003, when the sanctions will grow and we will lose \$4.2 million a year. Likewise, we face the loss of up to \$16 million in federal aid beginning in 2003 unless we lower the legal blood-alcohol limit from .10 to .08. These funds can be restored if we enact these highway safety standards. We may even qualify for additional money as well.

In the coming months, we should consider this on its merits. But understand the consequences and our bottom line as well as the public safety.

One more issue: For some time now, state government has been designing and implementing an integrated payroll and human resource system called PHRST. Phase one of the project, the human resource system, was completed successfully and has been operating for nearly two years. But the payroll system, as many of you know, has been delayed and delayed, and the cost of the project is now over \$30 million.

To evaluate the current status of PHRST and determine the best option for moving forward, I have asked that an independent assessment be made of the project. I hope to have a report back soon, and to be able to make a recommendation on the future course by the time the General Assembly returns in March.

There are many other challenges, many goals that I have for the coming year.

I will focus on Delaware's children - working to improve our foster care system and making child safety first priority for our children's agencies. I charge my Secretary of Transportation with boosting morale at DelDOT and the public's confidence in their employees. I will ensure that we continue to make progress towards a clean and safe environment. I pledge to make state government a better partner, a better business partner especially fostering growth for small businesses - minority businesses and women-owned businesses.

I recognize farming as a valuable part of our state's economy our culture, and I will work hard to keep it viable.

These are my priorities for the year. I will add to them over the coming weeks as I unveil my legislative agenda and prepare my own budget recommendations for the General Assembly's consideration.

I have been Governor now for 22 days. It has been a fast start, but I am pleased by and proud of what we have been able to accomplish already. As we forge into the next year and the next chapter of Delaware's history, I look forward to working with you to resolve all of our state's challenges.

At the end of the presidential election in 1984, one columnist wrote this: "We love the blather and the boast, the charges and the countercharges of campaigning. Governing is a tougher deal." Well.

Governing will indeed be a tougher deal in Delaware over the next several years. But I have prepared for a long time for your service as your Governor. I did not come here just to make easy decisions. And I came to help face the hard ones. And I look forward to working with each one of you to continue our financial stability and our wonderful quality of life.

Thank you.

Lieutenant Governor Carney thanked the Governor and asked the escort committee to reassemble to escort the Governor back to her executive office.

DSEA has a profound, unshakable commitment to our students and their well being. Our members share the goal that schools be safe and that all students be treated with respect. We have a long-standing policy of non-discrimination against gay and lesbian students and school staff. We are proud of our advocacy on behalf of all our students and members, regardless of their sexual orientation.

Our members are concerned about bullying and harassment of students who are different. Students who have been bullied suffer from a loss of self-esteem, and often their schoolwork is affected. In the most extreme cases, this harassment can lead to acts of violence against oneself or others. Delaware has been spared from the major acts of violence in other parts of the country, but we want to provide safe schools for every student to avoid those tragedies. HB 99 guarantees freedom from discrimination to the citizens of our futures, a right that is extremely important to me as a high school teacher and as the President of 10,000 education employees who serve thousands of Delaware's children. When I stand in front of a classroom of adolescents, I encourage them to pursue their dreams without fear of failure. As a teacher of writing, I have read the anguished stories of young people who don't know whether the world will accept them because they are different. I will not caution some students that their futures can be compromised because of their sexual orientation.

HB 99 corrects an issue of basic fairness and tolerance. However, HB 99 does not protect an employee of any sexual orientation who might make sexual advances toward students or otherwise inappropriately influence students about sexual choices. Those situations are clearly covered by Delaware law, and such employees would be subject to termination under the criminal code. The Association certainly does not sanction criminal activity of any kind directed against the children whom we are hired to protect and serve. **HB 99** does not endanger our students or their families; in fact, it protects their individual safety and respects their individual choices.

Indeed, not treating others respectfully or as we would want to be treated is seen by the various faith traditions as moral failure.

As leaders representing a wide variety of spiritual expression in the State of Delaware, we strongly support the full civil rights of lesbian, gay and bisexual persons and see such support as being very consistent with our shared belief. Signed.

PROBLEM-SOLVING IN JUDICIAL MANAGEMENT

Mr. Speaker Spence, Lt. Governor Carney, members of the House of Representatives, members of the Senate, members of the Judiciary, public officials and citizens of Delaware. I have the honor and the statutory responsibility to report to you on the State of the Delaware Judiciary, which is excellent. We are building on our successes and working on our challenges.

I want to begin by expressing my thanks for the outstanding cooperation and support of the General Assembly and the Governor over the nine years that I have had the honor to serve as Chief Justice. This collegial interdependence among the three branches in Delaware is essential to the continuing progress of our State, and I do not for one minute take it for granted.

Overview of the System and the Courts

You all have copies of our Annual Report containing the details of our operations. I will not repeat the material you have seen there. But I do want to update you on a few ongoing matters that relate to problem-solving in the court system as a whole and in the individual courts.

<u>Systemwide</u>

As to the court system as a whole, our problem-solving efforts are focused primarily on the following:

- 1. speedy trials;
- building on our progress in technology;
- 3. achieving effective integrated case management systems;
- 4. relieving the problems of the unfairness and cost to the taxpayers of the excessive and prolonged incarceration of pre-trial detainees;
- 5. upgrading salaries of state employees;
- 6. finishing and equipping court facilities in all three counties; and
- 7. developing innovative techniques of judicial management.

I will address these items more comprehensively in a few moments. But it is important at this point to note that progress is being made in these areas because the courts are working uniformly together through our Council of Court Administrators and Dennis Jones, our new State Court Administrator, to produce systemwide solutions.

The three branches of government have worked very effectively together in many areas, but I would like **particularly** to note the progress on building and improving court facilities, particularly the New Castle County Courthouse. As we build and improve new courthouse facilities in all three counties, we must be ever mindful that these facilities are for the benefit of the public, not for the convenience or comfort of judges, staff and lawyers.

In this connection, it is important that we allocate significant resources, including an adequate proportion of the space in these facilities, to provide working centers to assist the ever-increasing number of self-represented litigants. For example, in the Family Court alone there are now over 70% of the litigants who are self-represented. Serving these litigants who cannot afford a lawyer or who do not want one requires us constantly to rethink how we do business. So, for example, we need to find a way to reallocate a modest amount of space in the New Castle County Courthouse to service this increasing demand.

Related to our mission of public service is the need to provide top-notch security in our buildings. By Administrative Directive No. 119, dated December 1, 1999, I appointed an outstanding committee, co-chaired by Judge Bill Carpenter and the Secretary of Public Safety, to examine how we can best provide state-of-the-art security in our courthouses. Just yesterday the Committee provided to me its report, which is being released to the public. One of the key recommendations of the report is that the Judicial Branch should be authorized to move to a more professional service analogous to the United States Marshal service. This should be done in cooperation with the Department of Public Safety, including the creation of a separate division of Capitol Police dedicated to court security.

Public trust and confidence in the court system is essential and requires vigilance by courts in many areas. But we must always make it a priority that our courthouses be both safe and user-friendly. To that end we will concentrate on helping the public to navigate our courthouses to avoid confusion and the proverbial "run around". Our goal is to make a court experience as positive, efficient, professional and friendly as possible under the circumstances for victims, litigants, media, witnesses, jurors, spectators, and our national and local corporate citizens.

Supreme Court

In the Supreme Court, we have been able to manage our growing and increasingly complex caseload, maintaining our nationally-respected record for decisions that are promptly rendered and jurisprudentially sound. In addition, we have improved our website and our court visitation programs, which a number of you have taken advantage of. Also, we have opened further the window on our processes with our virtual docket system that provides public access electronically to briefs and other filings. Future goals include a state-of-the-art electronic filing system and oral arguments on the Internet.

We celebrate this year the Fiftieth Anniversary of the great history and national stature of Delaware's separate Supreme Court. Each of you will soon be receiving a book being published to commemorate that event. It is the product of many people working under Justice Randy Holland's guidance and his fine hand.

Court of Chancery

The Court of Chancery continues to carry out in superb fashion its internationally respected work in the corporate area. The judges of that Court are extraordinarily busy and effective. They continue to enjoy the highest level of national esteem. The prestige of that Court is further enhanced by its high-tech approach to litigation and advanced mediation techniques.

We are hopeful that the General Assembly will approve the constitutional change necessary to modernize the **Register** in Chancery system in a fair and efficient manner, and also approve the Senior Judge constitutional change.

Superior Court

The Superior Court continues to do an outstanding job while being saddled with increased numbers and complexities in criminal cases and an inordinate number of resource-draining capital cases. In addition, civil case

filings in Superior Court have grown from 5,644 in 1990 to 9,523 in 2000, and this civil calendar includes complex cases involving liability for the payment of billions of dollars in claims.

National attention is being focused not only on the Superior Court's problem-solving through its Drug Court and its innovations (including a proposed Re-entry Court), but also on its important national role as the commercial litigation center for claims involving money damages. Delaware's attractiveness as a high-tech business and litigation center was recently featured in the *Metropolitan Corporate Counsel* publication that many of you may have seen. Corporate decision-makers are very interested in, and carefully consider, the quality of the courts (and now their technology) when choosing where to incorporate and to litigate.

I cannot over-emphasize the importance of technology in the courts, not only to speed the disposition of cases and enhance the Court's national respect as a business court, but also to improve the safety of the police and public on the streets. Real-time data shared throughout the criminal justice system enables police, judges, and corrections staff to make better decisions on investigations, bail, sentencing, release and attempts to purchase firearms by convicted felons.

Family Court

Much progress is being made in the Family Court by the implementation of its Performance Standards, the Court Improvement Project and other initiatives. I am very pleased with the improvements in problem-solving by the Family Court, particularly over the past two years. Moreover, the judges and staff of that Court continue to attempt to address the many concerns and challenges that remain.

It has been my custom to present the State of the Judiciary Message around National Law Day. That is today. This is the 44th year that Americans have paused to reflect on our legal heritage and our good fortune in living under the rule of law. Since Law Day was originally proclaimed by President Eisenhower in 1958 to counter the then-bellicose military observations of May Day by the Soviet Union, various annual themes have been emphasized. The national theme of Law Day this year is "Celebrate Your Freedom: Protecting the Best Interests of Our Children". The Family Court of Delaware is a national leader in the area of protecting children, and its focus on the best interests of children continues to enhance its performance.

Court of Common Pleas

The Court of Common Pleas, with the help of the additional resources provided by the General Assembly, is handling its enormous workload, and it continues to collect significant fines and costs for the benefit of the State. But this Court continues to need help to support its outstanding judges and staff.

For example, we are addressing the problem of demands for jury trials in minor traffic offenses that tend to clog the system. First, through the increasing use of the probation before judgment technique, the acute problems are being temporarily diminished by avoiding demands for jury trials in many cases. Second, I have appointed a special court committee that is working with Senator Blevins to produce a more permanent legislative solution potentially involving the decriminalizing of minor traffic violations, thus taking them out of the realm of jury trials.

Justice of the Peace Court

The Justice of the Peace Court system is an extremely well-managed organization that dispenses justice fairly and efficiently to more of our citizens than any other court. It also is an efficient collector of fines and costs for the benefit of the State.

I would like briefly to bring you up to date on a few new developments in the Justice of the Peace Courts: (1) on April 23rd in Middletown we opened a new Court 9 to replace the facility that was destroyed by arson last year; (2) the hours of Court 20 in the Public Safety Building in Wilmington have been expanded to 24 hours, 7 days per week; (3) at Court 18 we have established a "cyber court" dedicated to processing videophone proceedings on an expedited basis; and (4) we have proposed a pilot project, providing deputy attorneys general, public defenders and staff, to handle cases at Court 20 in Wilmington. If approved, this pilot project should lead to new efficiencies and reduce time frames for resolution of cases at the lowest possible court level, thereby eliminating a significant number of cases that would otherwise transfer to the Court of Common Pleas.

The Economic Climate

The Delaware Judicial Branch is a relatively small user of state appropriations, compared with some of the larger executive departments. The Judicial Branch is allocated about 2.7% of the state budget to run its operations for the benefit of the citizens. The operating budget and capital improvement requests of the Judiciary for FY 2002 will soon be considered at mark-up by the Joint Finance Committee and the Joint Bond Bill Committee. Some of these are of critical importance. For example, the new New Castle County Courthouse must run efficiently for the Delaware public and our corporate citizens from day-one, which is September 2, 2002. The same is true in the technology area, particularly the case management systems. So these issues must be addressed now.

We are keenly aware of a very problematic general decline in Delaware's revenue. The Judicial Branch is cooperating with the other two branches to manage this challenge, and we have been working closely with the Governor and the Budget Office on a problem-solving plan.

I note parenthetically that the economic picture is not entirely gloomy. The Corporation Franchise Tax, which is collected by the Secretary of State's Office under Chapter 5 of Title 8 of the Delaware Code, accounts for over 22% of the entire budget and it continues to expand. The growth rate from FY 2000 to FY 2001 is estimated to be over 10%, and the growth rate from FY 2001 to FY 2002 is estimated to be over 5%. In real dollars this should result in revenue of about \$550 million from the Corporation Franchise Tax alone in FY 2002.

The General Corporation Law adopted over the years by the General Assembly and the continuing extraordinary efficiency of the Secretary of State's Office contribute significantly to this economic benefit. Moreover, the conventional wisdom around the nation is that the expertise, stable body of judicial decisions, prompt service and modern techniques of the Court of Chancery, Supreme Court and Superior Court are largely credited with maintaining Delaware's preeminence as the corporate domicile of choice for over 300,000 corporations, including a substantial majority of the Fortune 500 companies.

We cannot be smug about, or take for granted this enormous economic benefit. Other states are taking aggressive steps to compete with Delaware by improving their business courts with the goal of attracting incorporations, businesses and business litigation to their states. We need to maintain our competitive national position as well to continue to enhance the trust and confidence of our residents. This objective has not been short-changed by lack of effort on the part of the Judiciary or lack of support from the Executive and Legislative Branches, and the new New Castle County Courthouse is a prime example of this interbranch problem-solving.

As I noted, the Judicial Branch has agreed to cooperate with the Budget Office in reducing some of our FY 2002 budget requests. We have responded with a detailed plan of budget cuts, increased revenue from fees and costs and an innovative program of volunteerism. That volunteer program will be designed to save taxpayer dollars by organizing a well-managed small army of volunteers to perform at little cost to the State some functions that might otherwise have to be performed by future increases in paid staff.

Urgent Priorities in Problem-Solving

There are some urgent priorities that must be addressed. As we look into the future, I would like to discuss a number of challenges of long duration that represent problem-solving opportunities for the three branches of government over the next 18-24 months. These challenges are in the areas of information, communication, and incarceration.

Delaware has information systems that compare favorably with those of other states. But that is not good enough. Delaware is small enough and our people are expert enough so that we should have the best systems attainable. We are not there yet, and we need urgently to get there.

The Judicial Branch needs better information systems to manage its operations in a more businesslike manner. When a defendant who has been convicted in a criminal case comes before a Superior Court Judge for sentencing, the judge must be made aware of pending charges in other courts, recent case dispositions on other charges, or sentences which the defendant is currently serving. When the defendant arrives at the Department of Correction, the receiving clerk must know how the sentence just imposed relates to other sentences or other cases. When the presiding judge or the case manager in Superior Court wants to know which defendants are still in custody awaiting trial and which of those has been in custody the longest, the system needs consistently reliable information.

There are additional problems in the area of communication. When a clerk in the Justice of the Peace Court enters information about a new offense, that information must be made available to the Court of Common Pleas or the Superior Court when that defendant moves further into the criminal justice system. Currently, the information on that defendant has to be re-entered in both the Court of Common Pleas and the Superior Court systems. Moreover, the new information must be available to the Justice of the Peace Court if the defendant is later arrested on a new charge.

What occurs in the Court of Common Pleas or the Superior Court must be available to the Department of Correction when the defendant is sentenced. The Department of Correction depends on a piece of paper filled out by a court staff person and transported with the defendant to prison to tell correction officials of the court action. The information in this document must be electronically transmitted and must be exactly the same as the information entered into the case management system of the Superior Court or the Court of Common Pleas.

Finally, there are problems of incarceration and incarceration costs. We have all heard statistics of the extraordinary sums that Delaware spends per year to house pre-trial defendants. We all lament the length of time it takes for a case to move through the criminal justice system from arrest to disposition. Delaware's prison population is made up of an unacceptably high percentage of pre-trial detainees. That problem is traceable to exploding caseloads, an extraordinarily high number of capital cases and the increasing complexity of litigation. That is unfair to the accused and expensive for the taxpayers.

The Judicial Branch must be, and will be, the lead problem-solver in this area. We know we will receive the support of the Attorney General, Public Defender, and the Department of Correction, all of whom have echoed this same concern and agreed to work with the courts to solve these problems. The Judicial Branch is addressing the problem aggressively in a way that may well make Delaware the most coordinated justice system in the United States.

On December 1, 1999, I issued Administrative Directive Number 118 appointing the Speedy Trial Guidelines Committee, chaired by Justice Joseph T. Walsh. That committee released its comprehensive report on November 1, 2000 with a host of findings and recommendations that are now being implemented. Many of you have studied that report and its underlying data. On April 10, 2001, I issued Administrative Directive Numbers 127 and 128.

Directive No. 127 creates the Uniform Case Processing Committee, chaired by Carole Kirshner, Court Administrator of the Court of Common Pleas. This committee has been charged with recommending and implementing a single case management system for use by all of the courts in Delaware. The committee will build on the six months of work already completed by a subcommittee of the Judicial Branch Technology Policy Committee chaired by Chief Magistrate Griffin.

Directive No. 128 created the Delivery of Criminal Justice Policy Committee, also chaired by Justice Walsh. That committee is charged, among other things, with:

Implementing the Final Report of the Committee on Speedy Trial Guidelines

Reducing the pre-trial prison population

Reducing the length of pre-trial detentions

The results of the work of both of these committees should produce better information and better

communication that will lead to meaningful and achievable goals to speed up and improve the fairness of justice. Cases will come to trial more quickly and there will be more certainty in sentencing. For example, these committees will help us to have specific numerical goals on the maximum number of days pre-trial detainees may be held pending trial. Similar goals of the percentage of pre-trial detainees to the total prison population should be set and maintained at the lowest level feasible. The keys to success are:

DELJIS and the Judicial Information Center (JIC) must provide reliable, up-to-date information on all detainees in our prison system.

The Release Date project that is being worked on cooperatively by a committee co-chaired by Superior Court Judge Jerry Herlihy and Correction Commissioner Stan Taylor must work effectively.

We must provide an integrated case management system that works for all of the courts in Delaware. Cooperation among the courts, Attorney General, Public Defender, and members of the Bar to achieve speedy trial goals is essential.

Up-to-date information on all detainees in our prison system will allow Justice Walsh's committee to address both individual case problems and general process problems. The completion of the integrated case management system by Ms. Kirshner's committee will provide the same information to all of the courts, corrections, and the public in a system of integrated, real time, single entry information. It will also allow for electronic filing and expanded information for the general public, the courts, the General Assembly and the Executive Branch.

State Employee Compensation

I close my presentation with a request to raise the financial compensation level of all State employees. The State of Delaware is one of the State's largest employers, but State salaries are, at least, 7 to 10% behind those offered to private sector employees and other city and county governmental employees. Turnover is also a problem. Turnover, inability to fill vacancies, and lack of time to train new employees makes it impossible for the courts to serve the citizens of Delaware as they deserve to be served. There is a significant negative impact that low salaries and insufficient pay increases have had on morale of employees and the operations of the courts.

The difficulty in recruiting and retaining qualified employees, particularly in technology positions and in key clerical positions has reached crisis proportions. This is particularly true in the tight Wilmington job market, which is aggravated by the city wage tax and high parking expenses.

State employees are looking to its leaders for solutions. I hope we can work together to find those solutions. The salary structure and personnel systems urgently need revamping, and employee compensation needs to be upgraded. The State must be innovative and businesslike in developing competitive incentive plans, pay-for-performance plans, career ladders, longevity pay and competency-based pay plans. The State must, at a minimum, continue the policy from the current fiscal year that does not permit existing employees to be feathered.

In an effort to address the problem comprehensively, but also urgently, I suggest the formation of a three-branch task force, including public officials, employee representatives and private sector representatives. The task force should address inequities throughout the system, modern business ideas, antiquated classifications, competitive pressures, geographic pay differentials (dealing with issues like the Wilmington Wage Tax and parking costs), pre-tax benefits for parking and transportation, longevity pay, creating a line for overtime pay, a permanent, institutionalized merit bonus system and other solutions.

As a temporary solution, pending this overarching analysis, I am recommending to the Governor, the Budget Office and to State Personnel specific upgrades and reclassifications of key employees in the Judicial Branch. I also propose an employee bonus plan for the Judicial Branch that would not cost the taxpayers any more money, but would give us an incentive to save a targeted amount of appropriated funds annually and to reallocate these savings to employees in the form of merit bonuses. We think this proposed bonus plan is a "win-win" proposition, but it is only one piece of the puzzle. I hope I can count on your support in getting the State of Delaware to a comprehensive solution to the problem of State employee compensation.

Conclusion

The principal goal of the Delaware Judiciary is easily stated: We need to have, for our individual and corporate citizens, the most modern court system achievable, coupled with old fashioned values of work ethic, integrity, fairness, efficiency, competence and promptness. We have lots of work ahead. We had better get on with it in the traditional way the three branches in Delaware solve our problems by working together.

Thank you again for giving me the honor of sharing with you the State of the Delaware Judiciary.
