Will sparks fly over electric rate overhaul?

The Newark City Council members face a big decision late next month on a proposed ordinance that would overhaul the rate structure of the municipal electric system.

The goal, as stated in a memo accompanying a copy of the proposed ordinance, would end subsidies to residential and small firms by large electrical users.

The council is expected to consider the ordinance at its April 25th meeting. A public hearing would be held at that time when the ordinance is scheduled to undergo its second reading. The rate structure was studied by council

members in August and was also reviewed by "stakeholders" representing the rate classifications.

According to the memo accompanying the proposed ordinance, the revisions would lower projected revenues for 2011 under the old structure by \$2.8 million with that amount going to large customers. The memo states the revenue derived from residential customers would not be raised or lowered overall under the proposed rate structure.

The projected rates aim to encourage energy conservation by charging higher summer rates for heavy residential users of electricity, with flat rates in the winter, the ordinance indicated.

The goal is for Newark's electric rates competitive with those of Delmarva Power, the memo stated. The city also wants to make certain that its rates do not drive away any potential employers that might wish to hook up to the city electric system.

Not a factor is the closing of the Chrysler Corp. plant, which did not use electricity from the city utility. The University of Delaware, which plans to redevelop the Chrysler site, is the largest user of electricity by a wide margin and along with the Dow (Rohm and Haas) site operate under a separate electric rate.

In remarks at the Monday

Council candidates join in debate

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The Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Newark played host to a debate for candidates running for election onto the City Council in Districts 1, 2, and 4. The election will occur on April 12.

District 1 features the only race of the three districts as Councilmen Jerry Clifton (District 2) and David Athey (District 4) are running unopposed. Four candidates have filed papers to vie for Councilman Paul Pomeroy's seat in District 1 and three of them - Kevin Brown, Robyn Harland, and Mark Morehead - participated in Saturday's discussion. Candidate Michael Conway was unable to attend due to a prior engagement.

The first half of the event featured views from both Clifton and Athey talking about the hard road that Newark faces in recovering from the area's economic downturn and the renaissance that has happened in recent years to build up Newark's tourist appeal. Clifton noted his displeasure at the city's reliance on electric revenues as a main income source, especially when so many households are conserving in a down economy. Athey discussed the balancing act performed by Newark and the Council to keep down costs, while retaining many of the services the city provides, and the need to increase revenues, without overtaxing businesses and residents.

The three other candidates used the second part of the event to introduce themselves

and to discuss their views on topics and questions posed by the audience.

Kevin Brown, a primary systems technician for Christiana Care and a Newark resident for 11 years, talked about his hands-on approach and how he has canvassed nearly 500 homes, asking owners to list their likes and dislikes about Newark's government. He made further suggestions of gauging peoples' input, such as taking a personal survey before major issues and talking with residents of District 1 about how they will be affected by them.

"I believe the government works for the people, not the people for it," Brown said in his opening statements. "Council should work for the people, not City Hall."

Brown stated that he has attended no council meetings recently, due to a feeling of frustration with the process. But, he said that he has used that time to get a feel for the concerns of members of his district: keeping taxes affordable, offering quality services, and reining in spending. He promised to continue going door-to-door talking to residents to maintain a continuous dialogue with constituents to let their voices be heard in council, not just his.

Robyn Harland, a retired special education teacher and a paralegal for 30 years in real estate and corporate law, is relative newcomer to the area, coming from New York and being a beneficiary of the First-Time Homeowner Program almost two years

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Pomeroy praises city in farewell remarks

Paul Pomeroy ended his term as a Newark City Councilman by praising his colleagues and city staff at his final meeting Monday night.

In remarks before the council, Pomeroy said the highlights of his six years on the council included economic development efforts, the city's stronger financial position, continued growth on Main Street and Elkton Road and resolution of the lawsuit over the City Reservoir.

During his time on the council, Pomeroy championed economic development efforts for a city that has seen the closing of the Chrysler plant, now undergoing demolition under new owner the University of Delaware.

Pomeroy said he was also

gratified by the fact that the council does not engage in negative politics and infighting. In recent months, the Wilmington City Council and mayor, and the New Castle County Council have both seen their share of controversy.

He went on to praise city staff and Mayor Vance Funk for working to represent the interests of the city and its residents.

Councilman Jerry Clifton called Pomeroy a "statesman" and not a politician and Councilman Stu Markham said Pomeroy's successor will have "huge shoes to fill."

Four candidates will square off in an April 12th special election that will fill Pomeroy's vacant seat. (See story in this edition.)



Pomeroy decided not to seek another term, citing added responsibilities at his employer, the Wilmington advertising firm of Aloysius, Butler & Clark, as well as family responsibilities.

City Finance Director Dennis McFarland said the city's financial position continues to strengthen, with a cash balance of \$20 million. The city has been aided by higher electrical and other revenues.

Bank robber manages to escape

On Thursday, March 24, employees with Citizens Bank, located at 301 Louviers Drive, reported that an unknown suspect had produced a handgun and threatened a teller during a robbery.

The teller stated that a black male wearing a yellow jacket and a black head covering had come up to her station and passed her a note stating that he wanted \$50,000 in various denominations. The further said that the suspect would start shooting if there was any interference by bank personnel. An undetermined amount of money was given to the suspect. The suspect fled from the bank in an unknown direction.

While en route to the scene, one reporting officer saw a male wearing a jacket similar to the one the suspect was wearing, but this person was quickly ruled out as a suspect.

An audit will be performed by the bank to determine the amount of cash taken in the incident.

The investigation has been turned over to the Criminal Investigation Division.

Items for homeless stolen from church

The Newark Police Department is investigating a daytime burglary which occurred at the Newark United Church of Christ on March 5. Stolen during this burglary were various items including food intended for the homeless and a credit card. The credit card was later used at a Gulf gas station on 4th Street in Wilmington.

As part of this investigation the Newark Police Department is requesting the public's assistance in identifying two suspects as well as the owner of a truck. Photos are available at <http://tinyurl.com/4q7z197>.

The first subject is described as a tall, thin, white male in his 30's with brown hair. He is usually in possession of a book bag and a rolling suitcase. He is known to frequent Main Street in Newark and is believed to be homeless.

The second subject is believed to be a light skinned black male. Both were last seen in Wilmington at the Gulf station on 4th Street where they used

the stolen credit card to purchase gasoline for the operator of a two-tone Dodge Ram truck with a makeshift bed rack, possibly made of wood.

Former roommate suspected in break-in

Residents of a house on East Cleveland Avenue, told officers that someone had broken into the residence and removed \$200 in cash and a laptop computer worth several thousand dollars.

An investigation by police showed that the suspect had entered through a side window that had thought to have been secured.

An interview with the occupants revealed that they believe a former roommate, who had been banned from the house after he was discovered taking items to support a drug habit, is responsible for the incident. This person was also involved in another break-in on February 25, where the same window was used as the point of entry.

During their interview, one resident said that he had been

sleeping on the couch in the living room heard a knock on the door the day of the break-in. He got up to see who it was but saw no one at the door. As he was going back to the living room, he saw the suspect walking down the driveway to the back of the house. The suspect knocked on the back door, but ran away after the resident shouted, "Who's there?"

The occupants of the house left the residence from 6 to 8 p.m. that night and found the items missing upon their return.

Authorities have attempted to contact the former roommate, but have been unable to reach him via telephone.

Car damaged on parking lot

Enterprise Car Sales, at 155 East Cleveland Ave., contacted police for a criminal mischief incident in where three parked vehicles had been damaged on their lot.

The event was reported last Monday and involved all three vehicles having their side mirrors broken. The total damage is estimated to be \$1,500.

Several incidents of similar damage have been reported in various lots across Newark over the past few weeks. The police have not reported that any of the incidents are connected.

Shoplifter returns for second attempt

A manager with Happy Harry's at 216 Suburban Drive reported that a shoplifter that had been asked to leave the day

before had returned to the store to steal again.

The first incident occurred on March 20, where the suspect was seen by personnel and on camera taking a bottle of Dove body wash that was concealed in his jacket. The manager asked the man to return the product and leave the store. He placed one bottle on the shelf, but still concealed the original bottle, and left without incident.

The next day, the same man came back to the store and attempted to take the same item, but this time using a female accomplice. The man asked for cigarettes at the front counter, diverting the attention of store employees, while the female hid the goods in a bag. As the pair left together, the anti-theft alarms went off at the front door. Personnel stopped the duo and asked the woman to open her bag. The female would not obey and kept walking toward a car parked in the lot. Both suspects entered the car and were driven away by a third suspect, a black male. The female suspect was reported as taking eight bottles of the body wash with a store value of \$64.

The first suspect is listed as a black male, 25 to 39 years-old, 6' to 6'02" tall, 150 to 175 lbs., who is partially bald with a thin build. The second suspect is a black female, also 25 to 39 years-old, 5'02" to 5'06" tall, 250 to 280 lbs., with straight, below-the-collar hair. The vehicle described is a maroon 1991 four-door Ford Taurus with Delaware registration.

Police are attempting to run the registration tags of the vehicle and contact the owner.

Up to 20 years in prison

A Newark-area man who managed computer network security for a large Delaware law firm, faces up to 20 years in prison for buying stock based on advance information coming into the practice.

Jeffery Temple, listed as residing in Newark, Del., pleaded guilty on Thursday to one count of securities fraud. Co-defendant Benedict Pastro, also listed as residing in Newark, pleaded guilty to one count of securities fraud on March 10. As a result of their pleas, each defendant faces a maximum term of 20 years imprisonment, and a fine of up to \$5 million.

According to the office of the U.S. Attorney for Delaware, during the period from June 2009 through September 2010, the two men traded stocks of more than 15 companies based on inside information that Temple received through his job as network security manager for Richards Layton & Finger, Wilmington.

The information related to upcoming public announcements of mergers and acquisitions involving clients of the law firm. Temple would share information with Pastro, his brother-in-law, and both men would buy stocks and options shortly before the public announcements. Once the announcements were made, the defendants would sell their shares and/or options.

Companies mentioned in proceedings included Facet Biotech Corporation, Odyssey Healthcare, Inc., and Southwest Water Company. As a result of

executing securities transactions based on the inside information, the defendants collectively obtained over \$160,000 in profits. Sentencing in Mr. Temple's case is scheduled for June 2011.

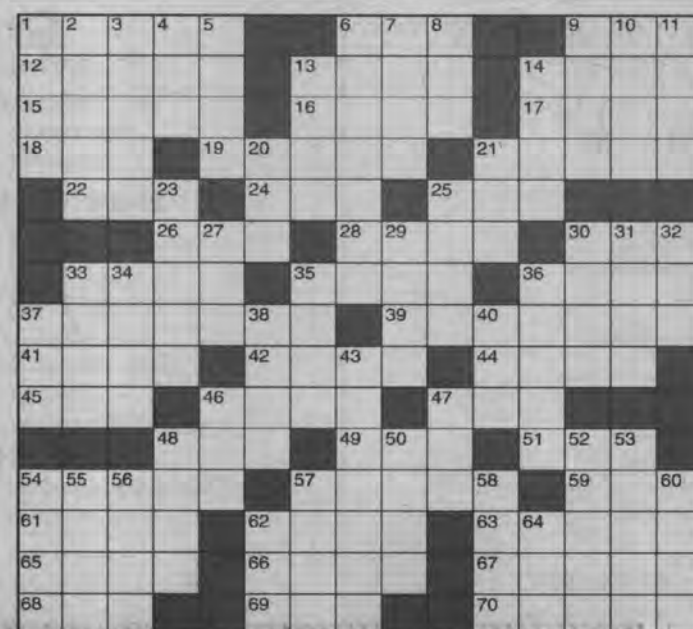
The investigation was a joint federal and state effort. Led by State Securities Commissioner Peter O. Jamison, III, and Keith M. Rosen, the Chief of the U.S. Attorney's Office Criminal Division, the working group used federal and state resources to investigations. Other federal law enforcement participants in the working group include the FBI, IRS, ICE, and the U.S. Postal Inspection Service.

The case is being prosecuted by Assistant United States Attorneys Keith M. Rosen and Shawn A. Weede.

In keeping with the policy of the U.S. Attorney's office, street addresses of the two men were not listed. One story on the case indicated the two resided in "suburban Newark."

Whatever your reasoning may be, it is never too early to change your habits and shed the pounds.

A great tactic to help you drop the extra weight would be to exercise more frequently with your dog. Having a pet gives you an advantage to losing weight because you have a playmate or companion to accompany you on your walk in the park or during your jog around town. OUT OF THE ATTIC



This week's Out of the Attic item is an undated aerial photograph taken in the 1940's of the Continental-Diamond Fibre plant that was built on the then edge of town on South Chapel Street. Continental was a major industry, employer, and town benefactor for over a half century. Founded in 1906 by a group of businessmen led by John Pilling and Samuel Wright, Continental Fibre Company joined Newark's American Fibre Company and several others in the Wilmington area to become the Fibre Capital of the World. In 1916 the Diamond Fibre Company of Wilmington merged with Continental. By the 1950's the company had five plants, one in Canada.

Newark remained the company headquarters. The office and plant fronted on South Chapel Street that passes from lower left to mid-right in the picture. The Pomeroy Railroad runs behind the plant from mid-left to upper right. On one occasion an airplane flew between the twin smoke stacks.

Glasgow baseball coach sees improvements

When Antwain "Mack" Haman returned to his alma mater to take over the Glasgow baseball program three years ago he knew he had a tough task ahead of him.

"We knew as a baseball team we had to crawl before we could walk," said Haman, a former outfielder who played college baseball at Coastal Carolina before being drafted by the Orioles and spending three years in the minor leagues with the Bluefield Orioles and Delmarva Shorebirds. "One day I hope we take off running."

His first season the Dragons were winless, but then last year the team won three games. Certainly a step, or crawl, in the right direction. But Haman says it is this year when people should see the direction the program is going under his leadership.

Although young, the Dragons have nine returning players who saw some varsity action last year. Senior centerfielder Dylan Billy hit .380 last season, which earned the tri-captain a selection to the second team All-Conference team.

The other two tri-captains, Jamie Watson (sr.) and Jeremy Euston (jr.), will help Billy anchor a young but experienced

squad. Watson, who hit .296 last year, will pitch and play right field, and according to his coach will do some catching when needed. Euston, who will pitch and play shortstop, is coming off a season during which he hit .286.

"We are still young with only two seniors in the program," Haman said. "The greatest thing is that we have had most of this group for the past three years."

Sophomore Zack Zervas is a perfect example of the experienced youth of this team. The pitcher/third baseman was placed into the varsity starting lineup as a freshman last season and responded by hitting .286. He's one of several promising young players who were forced into varsity action early in their careers, in hopes that the early experience would pay off as Haman put together the pieces of the puzzle he

envisioned would eventually turn this program around.

"We as a program need to prove that we can bounce back from failure," Haman said. "That's the key for my kids. The staff believes that we are on our way to change our reputation."

Despite losing its first two games, Haman hopes that this season his team will be off and running, sooner rather than later.

Six captains will anchor Glasgow lacrosse

Too often high school coaches have trouble finding true leaders. However, that's not the case this year for the Glasgow High boys lacrosse team.

"The most important thing for our team is for our six captains to lead by example and help the younger players understand the game the way I've been teaching it," said coach Brett Gershman, whose team is coming off a 5-10 season. "And maybe that message, information and the skills will translate to our younger, first-year players quickly."

Those six are Gerald Lodge (attack), Deshawn King (attack), Chris Bergeron (midfield), Andrew Welch (midfield), Damir Creecy (defense) and Luke Onisk (defense), who Gershman says has "all-state ability and talent."

The defense will be anchored by sophomore goalie Evan Williams, who took over the starting job at the end of 2010.

"Evan has really grown since last year and is seeing the ball really well and has improved his quickness and reaction time," Gershman said. "But his biggest improvement is in his ability to clear the ball."

When the ball is cleared, junior Osman Siddiqui will join Lodge and King on the attack, while sophomore Tim Caine and freshmen Tucker Ellis and

Nick Coleman will also work into the rotation.

Gershman said senior Compton King has converted from defense to midfield and "looks like he's been doing it for years." He will start and, along with sophomore Aaron Correa and freshmen Brandon Hopkinson and David Connor, will see significant playing time.

Junior Jerry Khoutsavanh and sophomore Thomas Reed will start on defense, while first-year players Stephan Jones and Chris Rossi, both seniors, have made their way into the varsity lineup and will give the Dragons some depth and versatility on the defensive end of the field.

"We have a lot of young and inexperienced players," Gershman added, "but they are surrounded with a lot of returning veterans who have earned captain's roles."

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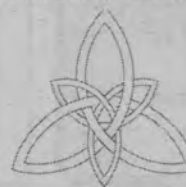

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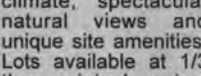
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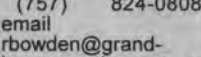

13th DE National Guard Plane Pull

The ultimate man-versus-machine challenge is back, as the Delaware National Guard presents its Plane Pull to benefit Special Olympics Delaware on Sunday, April 10, at the Delaware Air National Guard Base in New Castle.

Candidate wants UD to pay 'fair share'

ago, a program that she said she would like to start again. She is also a volunteer at the Newark Senior Center, making minor repairs to members' houses free of charge. Harland is also an appointee to Newark's revenue sharing committee, which makes recommendations to the council of financial matters.

"My intention is to work for all of you, not just those in District 1," Harland stated. She implied that her role is to take a larger view of the council seat by seeing issues as they affect all residents, not just those in her district.

Harland got to the heart of matters by stating that a large part of Newark's financial shortcomings can be remedied by making the University of Delaware pay its "fair share." Quoting a 2000 impact study, she said that UD creates a deficit of almost \$1 million for Newark. Coupled with the loss of Chrysler and taxes equaling almost \$306,000 from that site,

Harland said that the city is negatively affected by almost \$1.2 million. While saying, "We don't need to be an ugly step-child to the university," Harland did acknowledge that UD and Newark both need to improve their situations to become mutually beneficial partners.

Mark Morehead is an 11-year resident of Newark and the owner of a local business. Morehead stated that his greatest concern is the city's budget.

Likening Newark's budget to a home budget, Morehead talked about the necessity of having "rainy day" funds and choosing wisely where and how to spend funds. He explained that financial control will be the vehicle to Newark's economic recovery.

Morehead repeatedly quoted budget data items and heavily suggested that people need visit the city's website to look at the budget to see how tax dollars and revenue are spent.

In a question asking about the importance of the coun-

cil to the lives of Newark residents, Morehead stated that the council affects every aspect of their lives from the services they receive, the level of taxes, to utilities such as electrical and water.

In a quote from the University of Delaware's newspaper, The Review, Morehead said, "I'm interested in continuing to improve the quality of life in town."

Michael Conway is a 16-year resident of Newark and

a 30-year member of the Delaware National Guard, with the rank of Lt. Colonel.

Though he did not attend the event, Conway gave an interview to The Review student newspaper and said that he is for greater change. "What I'd like to do is change the focus of the city back to the residents of the neighborhoods," Conway stated. "I'd like to see all of the departments in the city reach out into the community, instead

of the other way around."

As for previous government experience, Brown said that he has none, along with Morehead who stated that his only experience has been interaction with Newark's government on a personal level. Harland quoted her 10 years of working with the New York Board of Education, four of them as a union representative with the United Federation of Teachers. Conway has 30 years of managerial experi-

ence with the National Guard, which he says will shape his choices on the council.

Electric rate changes proposed

Electric rates are approved by the council and do not undergo rate cases that are required in Delmarva Power rate cases.

The ordinance is based on a study by the Kansas-based firm of Black and Veatch. A report from the firm says the current rate structure uses large commercial customers to subsidize residential customers.

A comparison of possible new rates from Black & Veatch shows that residential customers with a \$42 winter electric bill would pay around \$46. Customers with a \$244 a month bill would see a 6.7 percent reduction or \$16.

In the summer, the person with the \$42 bill would see the same increase as in the winter rate. However, the cus-

tomers with the \$244 a month summer bill would see a two percent increase or around \$5 a month.

Revenues of the electric utility in 2011 are projected to be nearly \$59 million, with more than \$12 million of revenue going into the city's general fund to help pay for services and hold down property taxes and fees.

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
