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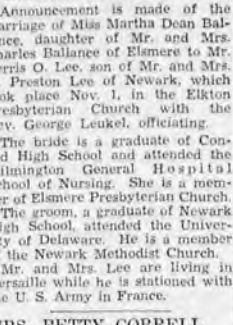
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Delaware Loses Pair Of Heart-Breakers By One Point Each To St. Joe and LaSalle

A pair of one-point losses punched a pair of big holes in Delaware's undefeated Middle Atlantic Conference record after five victories, and dashed Coach Irv Wisniewski's hope for a championship.

The Hens were tipped 72-71 by powerful St. Joe's last Saturday night, and were edged in a 69-65 thriller by LaSalle here last Monday night at Carpenter Fieldhouse.

The Hawks, trailing by 37-22 at halftime, thrilled a turn-away crowd of 3,700 by rallying to pull out their fifth straight MAC victory.

Behind nine points with three minutes remaining, St. Joseph's scored 10 straight points.

Delaware regained the lead brief-

ly with 1:12 left, but Tom Wynne's field goal at 1:03 put the Hawks ahead for good—or bad, depending on point of view.

Billy Hoy added two free throws with 10 seconds remaining and Delaware's Ron Smith tapped in a field goal at the buzzer.

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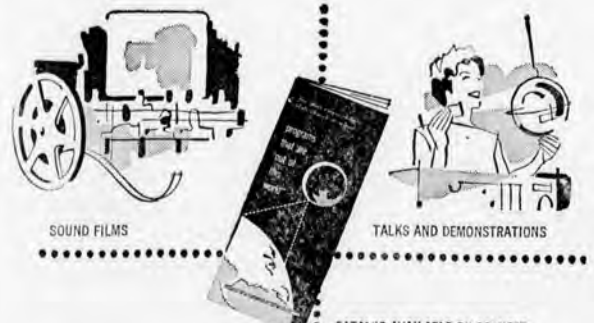
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
