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Significant Increases in Delaware's Child Population

The 2000 U.S. Census reported one of the largest increases in child population in history, second only to the baby boom generation. According to the Census, there was a 41 percent increase in the overall population under the age of 18 in Delaware. In times such as now, when there is an increased demand on organizations that serve children, but decreased funding both locally and nationally, information on changes in child population becomes essential to policymakers and providers, service as they strategically plan to meet the needs of their constituents.

In 1990, there were 49,781 individuals under the age of 18; in 2000 this number has increased to 70,413 children. New Castle County had a 50 percent change in population. In 1990 there were 34,212 children and in 2000 that population increased to 51,320. Sussex County also had an

increase - in - their population. The number of children in Sussex County went from 4.849 to 6.310 children. Kent County was the only county that had a decrease in its child population. The

Census reported only 12,780 children in Kent County in 2000, which is 940 fewer children that were reported in the 1990 Census. Similar to the nation, Delaware's child population is being led by enormous increases in Latino populations.

The change in the population under age 18 varied extensively among towns in Delaware. There were several towns that saw significant increases in the percent of their child population. For example, Middletown, Pike Creek CDP¹, Harrington, Delmar, and



Georgetown all experienced over a 50 percent increase in their population under the age of 18, with Pike Creek CDP showing the largest increase of approximately 116 percent.

Although the child population in the majority of the towns increased, there were some towns that reported a decrease in this population: Brookside, New Castle, and Wilmington Manor.

¹ Census Designated Place (CDP) - A geographic entity that serves as the statistical counterpart of an incorporated place for the purpose of presenting census data for an area with a concentration of population, housing, and commercial structures that is identifiable by name, but is not within an incorporated place.

The U.S. Census Bureau conducts a census of the national population every ten years. The most recent census was completed in April 2000.
