## Local Residents Seek Office With Next Tuesday's Election

Warwick Candidate for County Coroner; Representatives Hale, Edmondson Opposed By Rash, Hart; Alsip, Murphy Vie For 24th District House Seat; Folsom For Council

Polls will be open next Tuesday from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. for voting in the state, county and district election, with one Newark resident—William J. Warwick—a candidate in the county-wide balloting. Warwick, who operates a funeral home in Newark, is the Republican candidate for county coroner, opposing Democrat William J. Doherty.

Republican State Senator Margaret R. Manning is seeking reelection to the 8th district seat, and is opposed by Democrat Stephanie Santow.

In contest for the State House of Representatives, GOP Rep. Everett Hale of 109 Meriden Road, Newark is opposed for the 14th district seat by Democrat John C. Rash, Jr., of 12 Phyllis Drive, Newark Estates; Democratic Rep. Ralph D. Edmondson of 209 Park Place is seeking reelection in the 18th district, with William F. Hart of 16 Marilyn Road, Chestnut Hill Estates, as his Republican competitor; and two Brookside—Democrat William E. Alsip of 89 Kenmar Drive, and Republican Joseph R. Murphy of 171 Brookside Boulevard, are contestants for the 24th district seat in the House.

**County Council Candidate**  
Newark Council candidate Councilman Henry R. Folsom, Jr., 28 Amstel Avenue, is the Republican candidate for the 4th district New Castle County Council seat, and Folsom is opposed by Catherine F. McMahon, Democrat, 10 Imperial Drive, Lancaster Court.

In the county-wide vote, U.S. Sen. J. Caleb Boggs (R) is opposed for reelection by James M. Funnell, Jr. (D); Congressman Harris B. McDowell, Jr. (D) is seeking reelection, with William V. Roth, Jr. as his Republican opponent; and Attorney-Gen. David P. Buckson (R) is opposed for reelection by Democrat Sidney E. Back.

J. Edwin Lewis (D) and Daniel J. Ross (R) are candidates for state treasurer; Dr. Charles F. Moore (D) and George W. Cripps (R) are candidates for state auditor; Howard S. Abbott (D) and Robert A. Short (R) for insurance commissioner; Samuel R. Russell (D) and William J. Conner (R) for county executive; and Thomas G. Hughes (D) and C. Douglas Buck, Jr. (R) are candidates for county council president.

Peter A. Grandell (D) and Leo J. Dugan, Jr. (R) are candidates for the office of recorder of deeds; John P. Brady (D) and Lawrence M. Sullivan (R) for register of wills; and Gerald E. Reilly (D) and Edward J. Michaels (R) for county sheriff.

## Polish Cage Coach Visits Wisniewski In Tour Of U. S. A.

Walenty Klyszetko (Klee-shay-ko), a Polish basketball coach, is visiting the University of Delaware and surrounding elementary and secondary schools as part of a three-month tour of the United States.

Dr. Klyszetko, a former Olympic coach and now director of physical education of the Polish Physical Education Academy, is the guest of Irvin C. Wisniewski of the university's athletic department for two weeks, Oct. 24-Nov. 5.

Wisniewski met Klyszetko when the former Delaware basketball coach visited Poland last summer on behalf of the U.S. State Department.

Klyszetko's trip to the United States is planned by the people-to-people sports committee and sponsored by the state department. He requested that Delaware be the first stop on his trip.

During his stay in Newark, Dr. Klyszetko will observe athletic and training techniques and methods at Delaware, and physical education, recreation and athletic programs at local elementary and secondary schools.

One of Poland's most prominent athletic figures, Dr. Klyszetko coached the Polish Olympic team in Berlin in 1936, and has been an important member of the Polish Olympic committee.

## Aetna Volunteers To Call On Sunday For Fund Donation

Newark Firemen Seeking  
\$31,350 In Public Gifts  
As Supplement To Budget

Uniformed volunteer firemen of the Aetna Hose, Hook & Ladder Co. will call at homes in the Newark area this Sunday to accept contributions to the annual fund campaign to maintain fire protection service in the Newark district.

A goal of \$31,350 has been set for public subscription to Aetna's annual budget of \$68,250.

Campaign literature was distributed by bulk mail to homes in the Newark district this year as an innovation in Aetna's annual fund campaign.

In the past, Newark firemen made two calls at homes in the district, on successive Sundays.

Brochures explaining the fund drive and Aetna budget, with envelopes for donations, were left by firemen on the first visit and the following Sunday, Newark's volunteer fire-fighters returned to accept contributions.

Campaign Chairman Olan R. Thomas explained that bulk mailing to all homes in the district—partial bulk mailing was introduced last year in the outlying areas—was necessitated by the increased number of residences; the difficulty of finding people at home; the threat of inclement weather; and the demand for Aetna manpower in emergencies.

The Aetna Hose, Hook & Ladder Co. maintains two fire stations in Newark, and a fleet of 11 fire-fighting vehicles.

Those not contacted by Newark firemen this Sunday, are requested to post their contributions to the annual fund drive in the envelope received with bulk-mailed brochures.

## Less Than 20 Face Salary Staff Cut At Chrysler Plant

Less than 20 Chrysler employees at the Newark assembly plant will be affected by administrative cutbacks planned by Chrysler Corp. across the nation.

From Detroit headquarters, Chrysler announced that it would try to cut administrative costs by 10 percent to recover some of the income lost when price increases on its 1967 cars were not as large as expected.

The reduction of Newark plant office personnel will be in administrative, technical and clerical positions, a company spokesman said.

The effective date for layoff of those employees is Nov. 11.

Salaries of employees at the Newark plant number about 600.

Guest artist for the evening is Painter Rowland P. Elzea of Landenberg, Pa., curator of collections of the Delaware Art Center in Wilmington, Del. He will display and discuss a variety of his work, and answer pertinent questions.

His paintings are found in private collections in this country and abroad and several have been purchased by alumni groups for inclusion in the university's permanent collections.

He has been guest artist to the Yaddo Corp., Saratoga Springs, N.Y., and the Huntington-Hartford Foundation, Pacific Palisades, Calif.

His show at the Kershaw Gallery features works from two earlier exhibitions—"Scenes of Witchcraft" at New York's Sudmerman Gallery in 1963, and "Iconus," part of a four-group invitational exhibition at the Delaware Art Center in 1964.

## Lab Worker Shot At Newark Plant During Night Shift

A laboratory analyst was shot and seriously wounded, apparently from a car passing his place of employment in Newark on Tuesday night last week.

Barry Richard Purdy, 22, of Wellington Arms Apartments, Oletown, was taken to Delaware Division in serious condition with wounds of the left arm, left side and in the lung area.

State police detectives said the shooting occurred at 9 p.m. while Purdy was working his regular 4 to midnight shift at the American Viscose Division plant, FMC Corp., 1301 Oletown Road.

Detectives believe the shot was fired from a 30-caliber rifle in a car passing or stopped on Delaware Rt. 273, which parallels the American Viscose building.

Officials of the police Purdy was alone in a laboratory at the front of the building when the shot tore through a window, penetrating his left arm and side.

Purdy, who is married, had been employed with the firm one year.

Officials of the company said that at the time of the shooting Purdy was engaged in making tests in the quality control laboratory. The firm manufactures Avicel, a crystalline cellulose used in the pharmaceutical and food industries.

The placement test takes about an hour and a half.

## Buckson Tops Vote In Mock Election By U. D. Students

Boggs, Roth, Manning,  
Hart, Folsom, Michaels,  
Warwick Win Student Poll

Atty. Gen. David P. Buckson again proved popular among University of Delaware students as he topped a Republican sweep in Monday's mock election, defeating his Democratic opponent, Sidney Balick, 604-211.

The 831 students who used the voting machine were down from the 1,275 who took part in the mock election in 1964 when President Johnson took 55.4 per cent of the vote while all other races saw the Republicans triumph 2-1.

J. S. Sen. J. Caleb Boggs, R-Del., rolled up the second-highest total, 580-246 to win over James M. Funnell, Jr.

William V. Roth Jr., Republican, defeated U.S. Rep. Harris B. McDowell, Jr. for Congress by 545-280.

The election was sponsored by the young Republican and Democrat groups, with the Student Government Association and the Review, campus newspaper. They paid the cost of transporting the voting machine from the New Castle County Department of Elections.

In New Castle County, C. Douglas Buck, Jr., Republican, won the presidency of County Council over Thomas G. Hughes by 545-213, while William J. Conner defeated Samuel R. Russell for county executive 539-234.

In the 8th Senatorial District which includes the university, State Sen. Margaret R. Manning defeated Mrs. Stephanie Santow 566-213, and in the 16th Representative District, State Sen. Ralph D. Edmondson was defeated by William F. Hart, 218-541.

In the 4th County Council District, Henry R. Folsom, Jr. won over Mrs. Catherine F. McMahon by 514-242.

Edward J. Michaels won the sheriff race over Gerald E. Reilly, 540-224, and William J. Warwick won as coroner over William J. Doherty, 505-258.

## Salary, Wage Plans Amended With Five Ordinances Passed

Newark City Council Approves Pay Raises Retroactive To Last Aug. 1, To Mid-Point Of Established Scale; \$2,400 Authorized To Permit Access To Western Ditch

Five ordinances were approved unanimously at last Monday night's meeting of Newark City Council with but five persons in the audience, and Councilman Olan R. Thomas and Fred Wakefield absent. And David Gallo, one of the five spectators, asked "I don't know whether this is a closed meeting or not, but your front doors are closed."

Mayor Norma Handloff, considering the small audience, responded with "Is that the trouble?" And the front doors, left locked by mistake, were opened for the public meeting, although no increased attendance resulted.

Ordinances establishing new salary and wage plans for municipal employees were approved, with Comptroller Albert K. Martin summarizing provisions.

Municipal employees are to receive a minimum \$14 per month general increase in pay, retroactive to last Aug. 1, or an increase in pay sufficient to bring their rate to the mid-point of their classified pay range.

Those receiving higher rates than scheduled, will not receive pay reductions, Martin said.

"I think we have to pass this ordinance tonight," Councilman Henry R. Folsom, Jr., stated of the amended salary plan. "It's the best we have. We can come back and beat it to death later."

Councilman C. Vernon Steele said "I think a review should be made of administrative personnel," and City Manager Edward R. Stiff replied "I am making such a review."

The new plan for wage roll employees is in agreement with the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, AFL-CIO, and its Local Union 1670.

An ordinance prohibiting drag racing, and unnecessary skidding of wheels with attendant noise, was approved with fines from \$10 to \$100 to be levied against offenders.

"The ordinance is carried, and we can no longer spin our wheels," Mayor Handloff observed.

Councilman Arthur P. Mayer approved the new ordinance prohibiting parking on the south side of Lathrop Road from Short Lane to Wills Road, but objected to such prohibitions on a "brand new road that six months later shouldn't lose its parking."

A fifth ordinance was passed with unanimity, establishing job classifications and wage rates for certain hourly employees. Martin explained that the ordinance "simply embodies our union contract."

To permit continued construction of the western area drainage ditch culvert, Council authorized city expenditure of \$2,400 for a gravel base access roadway from West Park Place to Dallas Avenue, with next June 15 as the scheduled completion date.

"Basically, the delay was caused by the city," Stiff stated, through failure to acquire necessary easements from property owners to permit access by the contractor. He reported that Public Works Director Benjamin J. Commey had recommended the additional \$2,400 expenditure.

Observing that "the contractor will stop work until he gets a dry ditch to work in," Councilman Folsom proposed that the \$2,400 expenditure be authorized—and it was.

Stiff assured Councilman David H. Doehrlert that city provision of easements for access to the ditch were included in the request for bids.

"We should have gotten them when the people were ready to give them," Doehrlert declared of the unobtainable easements.

"Until something is done about ditches in the 5th district, I am not interested in this (western) ditch any more," Councilman Mayer declared, scoring residents of the area for their lack of cooperation with the project.

## Boggs-Tunnell To Appear Tonight Over WHY-TV

James M. Tunnell, Jr., Democratic candidate for the U.S. Senate, will appear with Sen. J. Caleb Boggs on WHY-TV, Channel 12, live, tonight at 8 o'clock.

It will be the last joint appearance for the two candidates before the Nov. 8, election.

Each will speak for five minutes, and then answer questions from a panel of newsmen.

## Fourth DP&L Power Unit To Be Dedicated Thursday

Delmarva Power and Light Co. will dedicate a fourth power unit at its Edge Moor Power Station next Thursday at 10:30 a.m., President Austin T. Gardner announced today.

Dedicating the 167,000 kw unit will be Gov. Charles L. Terry, Jr. Other invited guests include U.S. Senators John J. Williams and J. Caleb Boggs and U.S. Rep. Harris B. McDowell, Jr.

After the dedication, luncheon will be served at the Wilmington Country Club.

Edge Moor Power Station is located on the Delaware River adjacent to Hay Road.

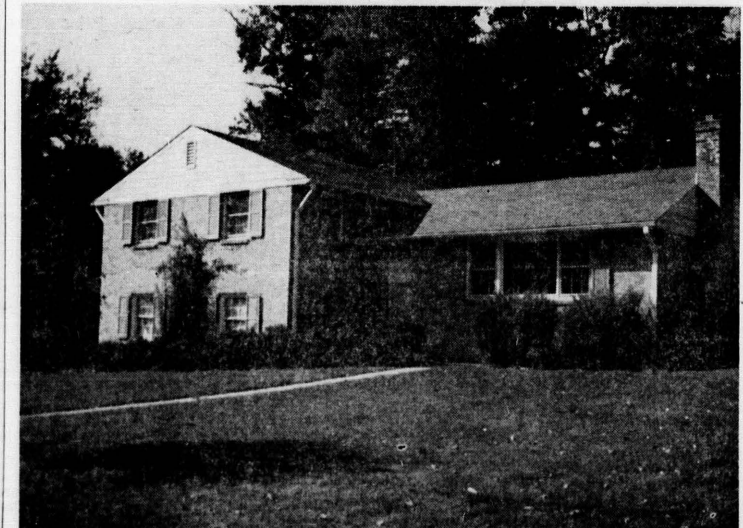

Clark, president of The Arthritis Foundation, spells out the problem in the latest booklet on rheumatoid arthritis from the Foundation: "We do not know the cause and we do not have a cure. Nevertheless, the painful and disabling effect of rheumatoid arthritis can be alleviated by modern medical skills. With early diagnosis and treatment of symptoms most of the severe crippling can be prevented. With new techniques for rehabilitation, even severely disabled persons can be brought back to a more active and productive life."

Of some 100 diseases that affect the joints, five stand out: ankylosing spondylitis, osteoarthritis, gout, rheumatic fever and rheumatoid arthritis... the most painful and troublesome of all.

There is no single pattern of treatment for rheumatoid arthritis, since all cases are different. It will involve a number of things, not just one or two. Exercises may be prescribed, and almost certainly pure aspirin will be. Even a patient's mental attitude can have a bearing on treatment.

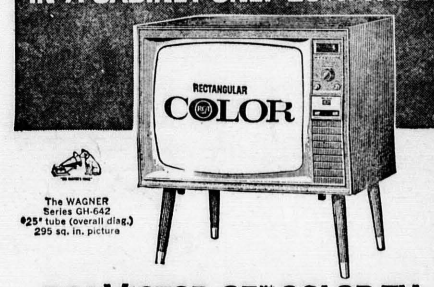

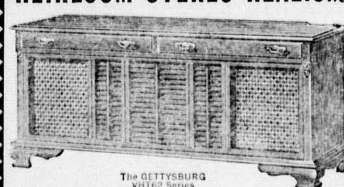

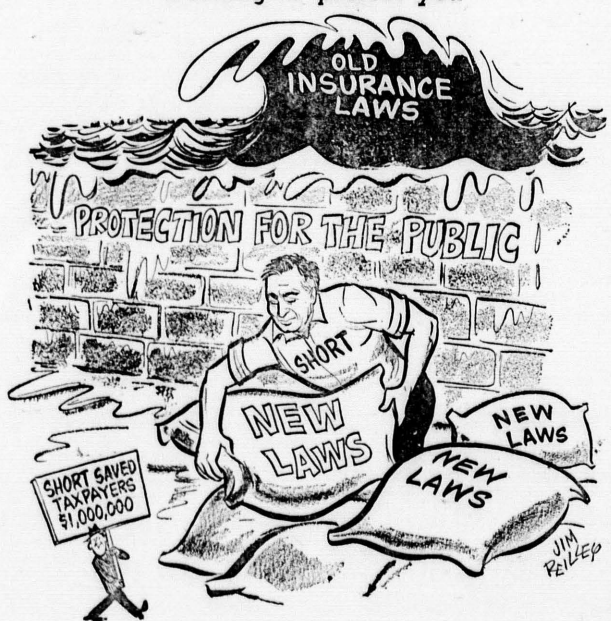

So, let us pause a few seconds to review what President Wilson said in his first Armistice Day proclamation: "To us in America the reflections of Armistice Day will be

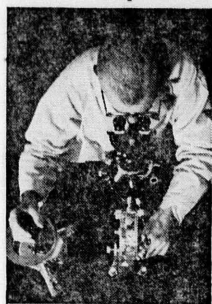

## Micro-Manipulation



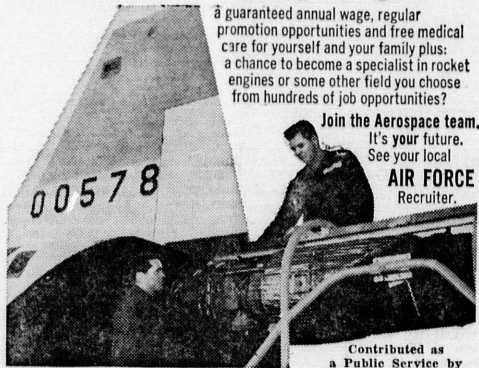

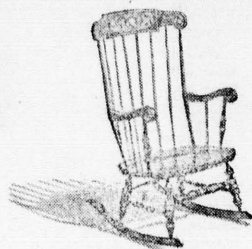

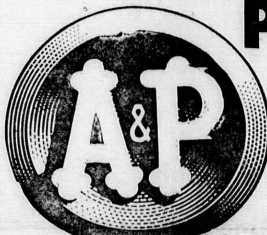
