

Seabrook Island S.C.

June 29th 1868

Dear Brother I now take my pen in hand to inform you that we are all well at present and hope this may find you all the same. I received your letter dated May the twentyfourth yesterday morning about this time it is now five o'clock. Well I was glad to hear that you had corn planted and was ready to harvest which by all accounts the rebels will cut. I wait for you fellows for I hear there is a hundred thousand cavalry and six batteries of flying artillery in

pennsylvania and that they in-
tend to come by philadelphia
and then down to wilming-
ton by the right flank
so you must look out for
the ass of your pants for
I expect there will be more
shit than blood

I get that the furlow
business has let through
the first ones that went haven't
all got back yet. Well the
weather is very warm here
now and good many sick
in the regiment. There ~~was~~ is
twenty five sick of
so I am pretty near that
many in each company
in the regiment we go on
picket next wednesday for
one week

I saw a letter that George
got from pap the same time
that I got yours and it said
buy for the monkey
ask pap if he could get a
pair of boots. I made two
fit me if I would send
him the measure. William Jones
said that Charles Wilbanks
was talking about seeing pap
about ending something I
thought maybe they could be
all sent together. I must now
close for it is pretty near
drill time now ~~so no~~ only
I still remain your brother
