SURVEY OF THE RESIDENTS OF SOUTHBRIDGE SUMMARY OF RESULTS

The information contained in this report has been derived from a survey of residents of Wilmington's Southbridge neighborhood. This survey was conducted door-to-door in the neighborhood by the University of Delaware's Center for Community Development and Family Policy. Arrangements were made with Neighborhood House for students registered in the Community Analysis and Development Seminar to survey, neighborhood residents regarding their demographic characteristics, the most serious problems in Southbridge, political and organizational behavior, familiarity and use of Neighborhood House, banking use and needs, neighborhood commercial and service needs, opinions about the development of the waterfront, perceptions of the environment in and around Southbridge, and household problems.

Methodology

Students canvassed the neighborhood by going door-to-door during the day and asking residents if they would participate in the survey. Thus, the survey was not a random sample of the neighborhood but rather represents residents of the neighborhood who tend to be home during the day. Ninety-five of the approximately 600 households in Southbridge participated in the survey.

Demographic Characteristics of the Respondents

Figure 1 shows the age breakdown of the survey respondents. A substantial proportion of the respondents were over the age of 60 (nearly 27 percent) and three-fifths (60 percent) were female. The characteristics of the survey respondents reflect the fact that the survey was conducted during the day when females and older residents are more likely to be encountered. Fully 57 households (63 percent) reported having children at home, while 33 (37 percent) reported having no children in the household.

Figure 2 details the educational attainment of the respondents to this survey. Only 20 percent had less than a high school education.

Finally, it should be noted that 45 (48 percent) of the survey respondents reported owning their own home, while 49 (52 percent) stated that they rent. Many of the respondents are long term residents of Southbridge. Figure 3 shows that almost 60 percent have lived in Southbridge for 11 years or more.

Age of Respondents






Figure 2

The following figure shows the breakdown of responding residents by length of residence at their current address.


Figure 3

Electoral and Organizational Activity

Southbridge residents appear to be active in the electoral process: 64 (68 percent) of the survey respondents said that they are registered voters while only 30 (32 percent) are not. Of the 64 registered voters, 59 (92 percent) voted in the last election.

One quarter of the surveyed residents (25 percent) reported belonging to a civic organization (four mentioned the Southbridge Civic Association and 10 mentioned Neighborhood House). Of those who reported belonging to a civic association, 21 (91 percent) stated that the organization meets their needs.

Familiarity and Use of Neighborhood House

Of the 73 residents who reported being familiar with Neighborhood House and its services, 35 (48 percent) had availed themselves of these services. The most commonly used services provided by Neighborhood House, according to these residents, are day care, tutoring, the teen center, 4H, and summer camps. The programs which these residents stated they would most like to see being offered by Neighborhood House are additional youth activities, housing assistance programs. and computer skills training for both youth and adults.

Residents who responded to this survey were asked what services they would like to see a community organization in Southbridge provide. The following were mentioned as needed services:

- Work skills training
- Day care
- After-school programs for youth
- Recreation programs for youth
- GED
 - Drug counseling

Banking Use and Needs

Questions were asked about the banking uses and needs of Southbridge residents. Over 70 percent reported having a bank account of some sort. PNC, Wilmington Trust, and Delaware Trust were the banks reported to be most commonly used by survey respondents. Most reported banking either "in Wilmington" or "on Market Street". Of those respondents with bank accounts, 46 (69 percent) said that they would be willing to change banks if a bank were established in Southbridge.

Continuing with questions on banking, 47 or 70 percent of the respondents with bank accounts reported that they go to their bank four times per month or fewer, or need banking services four times per month or fewer. The service which these respondents overwhelmingly reported needing more often than any other was check cashing services.

Neighborhood Commercial and Service Needs

Survey respondents were asked which kinds of additional businesses are needed in Southbridge to serve existing needs. The following figure details the results.




When asked to be specific in the category of "other", several residents specified a low-budget community store and a laundromat as needs. Over a third (36 percent) of the respondents

said that Southbridge had too many liquor stores and nearly a fifth (19 percent) felt that there were too many bars.

Respondents were also asked to indicate which public services would be beneficial in helping Southbridge to prosper. As shown in Figure 6, the most frequent reply (53 percent) was more police presence.





Waterfront Development

When asked about the proposal to dredge an area of Southbridge for waterfront development, 61 (64 percent) of respondents reported being aware of this proposal. A follow-up question was asked as to whether this development would benefit or harm Southbridge. Of those who responded to this question, 38 (76 percent) felt that the development would benefit Southbridge, while only 9 (18 percent) felt that such development would be detrimental. The most common response was that the proposed development would lead to more jobs and a cleaner environment in Southbridge.

Perceptions of the Environment

The survey respondents were asked about their perception of the environment in Southbridge. The results are as follows.






It is instructive to note that none of the respondents chose the option "excellent" to describe the environment in Southbridge. Also, new residents (those in Southbridge less than one year) stated unanimously that the environment in Southbridge is unsatisfactory, while others with a longer residential tenure were almost evenly split on the subject.

Residents were also asked if they personally face environmental problems. Of those responding, 46 (59 percent) said yes and 32 (41 percent) said no. Air and water pollution and offensive smells were most often cited as personally-faced environmental problems in Southbridge. Notably, families with children at home were more likely to report personally facing environmental problems. A total of 41 respondents reported that their family's physical or mental health had been harmed by the waste facilities in Southbridge. Asthma and other breathing problems were most commonly reported as being faced by Southbridge residents. Only 14 (15 percent) of the survey respondents had ever voiced an environmental complaint. All of those who had voiced a complaint were registered voters who belong to a community or civic organization. Seven (54 percent) of these stated that their problem was quickly addressed, and five (39 percent) said they received little or no help.

As shown in Figure 8, over half of those responding to a question about the location of environmentally hazardous facilities (37 or 57 percent) felt that Southbridge gets more of these facilities than anywhere else in Wilmington and only 9 residents (14 percent) said that they feel t Southbridge gets fewer environmentally hazardous facilities than other locations in Wilmington.

Common Problems Faced by Households

Respondents were given a list of difficulties that many households experience and asked to indicate whether any of these were problems for themselves or someone in their household. As shown in Table 1, housing repair (44%), lack of recreational activities (39%), and weatherization of the home (36%) were the most frequently reported problems faced by respondents to this survey.

Some comparative data is included in the table from a study conducted for the Delaware Division of State Service Centers in 1994¹. Care must be taken in comparing the Southbridge results with the city and state data because the methodology used in the earlier study was quite different. In that study, a telephone and field survey of 1340 low- and moderate-income households was conducted statewide. Therefore, the population sampled was likely to be made up, on average, of lower income households than was included in the Southbridge survey. Thus, Southbridge respondents were less likely to report income related problems such as unemployment, difficultly in paying utility bills or for medicine, or inadequate health insurance or dental care. It should be noted, however, that the Southbridge respondents were more likely to report that housing repair, a lack of recreational activities, and a need for weatherization were

household problems. A somewhat higher proportion of Southbridge respondents also reported that drug abuse or alcoholism was a household problem but this result may be related to the fact that the Southbridge survey was conducted fact-to-face rather than by telephone, allowing the interviewer to establish a greater level of trust.
