The College of Nursing offers curricula leading to the Bachelor of Science in Nursing and Master of Science degrees. Both degree programs are fully accredited by the National League for Nursing.

The four-year Bachelor of Science in Nursing program is designed to develop the knowledge, understanding and skill essential for the practice of professional nursing and to provide the basis for graduate education. The first two years of the program include foundation courses in the natural, social, and behavioral sciences, liberal arts, and two introductory nursing courses. The third and fourth years of study include clinical and nonclinical nursing courses as well as elective courses.

The college is located in Madeline O. McDowell Hall, a modern building with classrooms, nursing practice laboratories and facilities for the use of computers and instructional media. Many health care agencies in the Wilmington-Newark and nearby areas are used for clinical teaching.

STUDENT LIFE

All students are encouraged to participate in the broad variety of extracurricular activities available on campus. Nursing students may request special interest housing or select to be housed with students of other colleges in the campus residence halls.

Organizations in which students may participate include the College chapter of the National Student Nurses' Association.

Students who have earned recognition for superior academic achievement may be invited for membership in Beta Xi Chapter of Sigma Theta Tau, the International Honor Society of Nursing. Qualified students are encouraged to pursue the program requirements for a degree with distinction.

Most nursing courses are offered once each academic year. Students must complete required lower division courses before enrolling in nursing courses. Nursing courses must be taken in sequence.

B.S.N. FOR THE R.N.

Registered nurses may enroll in the Bachelor of Science Program either full-time or part-time. Requirements in non-major courses may be met by enrolling in the course, credit by examination, external study, or FOCUS Program (Flexible Options for Continuing University Studies). Previous learning and experience in nursing may be validated through credit by examination for nursing courses required for the degree. All registered nurse students are required to enroll in and successfully complete two nursing courses.

POLICIES

A minimum grade of C in each nursing course is required. A student who earns a grade lower than C must repeat the course before enrolling in a more advanced nursing course. Students are not permitted to repeat any clinical nursing course more than once. Further, students who earn a grade lower than C in more than one clinical nursing course will not be permitted to continue in the program.

A cumulative grade-point index of 2.0 is required to enroll in all nursing courses.

Students are expected to provide their own transportation to all required clinical laboratories.

LICENSURE

Graduates are eligible for registered nurse licensure in Delaware or other states upon satisfactory completion of the National Council Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses (N-CLEX-RN). If the examination is passed and licensure granted in one state, application may be made to other states for licensure there by endorsement.
