### TOTAL

The foregoing lists comprising the first years program include more roads and mileage than can be undertaken or hard surfaced during the first year of the biennium. It is the intent of the Department that the roads to be hard surfaced during the first year of the program will be selected from the foregoing lists; provided, however, that the mileage to be hard surfaced in each county during the first year of the biennium shall not exceed 15.7 miles for New Castle County, 52.33 miles for Kent County, and 95.17 miles for Sussex County. (Chapter 503, Volume 50, Laws of Delaware)

In selecting the dirt roads which shall be hard surfaced, the Department shall give priority to those roads for which the necessary right-of-way has been donated to the State by the adjoining landowners and shall endeavor to distribute the specific projects among the representative districts of the State in an equitable manner, giving important consideration to traffic volume.

# EMERGENCY, CONTINGENT OR OTHER UNSPECIFIED PROJECTS

If conditions should arise or develop during the biennium beginning July 1, 1959 which, in the opinion of the Chief Engineer, make it desirable and in the best interests of the State, whether for engineering, financial or other meritorious reasons, that a capital improvement project which is not specifically listed in any of the foregoing capital improvements programs should be undertaken by the Department, the Chief Engineer shall report the facts, conditions or circumstances concerning such unlisted capital improvement project to the Commission together with his recommendation and estimate of cost of performing such unlisted project and, if the Commissioners shall approve such project, it shall be deemed to be a part of the capital improvements programs of the Department as though specifically listed above; provided, however, that the total estimated cost of all such contingent or emergency capital improvements projects shall not exceed, for the biennium, 20% of the total estimated costs for the foregoing capital improvements programs.

If conditions or circumstances should arise or develop during the biennium which, in the opinion of the Chief Engineer, justify the postponement or abandonment of any of the projects specifically listed in any of the foregoing programs, the Chief Engineer shall report the facts to the Commissioners together with his recommendation for the substitution of another project which is not listed above and if the Commissioners should approve such postponement or abandonment or a substitution of a new project, such new project shall be deemed to be a part of the capital improvements program as though specifically set forth above.

The Commissioners of the State Highway Department hereby accept the Chief Engineer's report that the estimated cost to the State of Delaware (including the cost of acquiring necessary land and rights-of-way but exclusive of such portions of the cost of any projects included in the foregoing programs as might be paid to the State by the Federal Government) of the foregoing capital improvements programs, inclusive of such emergency, contingent or other unspecified projects as might be undertaken as contemplated by or within the scope of this resolution, is Twenty-eight Million Dollars (\$28,000,000) for the biennium beginning July 1, 1959 and \$14,000,000 for each year of such biennium: provided, however, that the maxium amount (exclusive of the Federal Government's share of the cost of such projects) which the Department shall spend or incur liability for all of the foregoing capital improvements programs shall not exceed Twenty-eight Million Dollars (\$28,000,000) for the biennium beginning July 1, 1959 or more than Fourteen Million Dollars (\$14,000,000) for each year of such biennium nor more than the following amounts for each of the aforesaid capital improvements programs, including emergency, contingent, substituted or other unspecified projects:

STATEMENT BY GOV. J. CALEB BOGGS DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES October 28, 1959

Just as Delaware's continuing population growth is seriously straining the state's ability to provide services the people need at a cost they can afford, this tremendous increase in population is placing a heavy burden on Delaware's natural resources.

For example, we have been warned by experts who should know that the state's water supply will be dangerously inadequate in future years. That means you may not be able to water your lawn or wash your car as often as you want; new jobs in the state may drop off if industry is discouraged from coming to Delaware and our farming community will be faced with a serious problem.

Delaware's once-thriving oyster industry has been virtually wiped out by blight. This was an industry that produced an annual harvest worth \$1.5 million and employed about 3000 men and women. Oyster-killing disease has severly damaged this important area of the state's economy.

Beach erosion has become an increasingly serious problem in the state. It has resulted in thousands of dollars loss to property owners along our beach areas and has resulted in further loss of revenue to our resort areas.

One of our most undesired natural resources, mosquitoes, have raised a serious health hazard and have caused us an increasing amount of trouble in recent years. Here again the state's resort areas have suffered economically because of declining business and there's no way to measure in dollars and cents the discomfort and annoyance mosquitoes are causing our citizens.

We have been spending nearly a million dollars a year to preserve and utilize our natural resources, but the citizens of this state are not getting a million dollars worth of results.

One of the major reasons for this situation is the cumbersome and antiquated structure of our state government. We have become enmeshed in so many agencies, boards and commissions—more than 100 in all—that coordination of efforts and solid long-range planning is quite often impossible.

On May 20 of this year, I told the General Assembly that we had reached the point where a complete reorganization of our state government is essential if we are to move ahead in the years to come. The first permanent agency of this new government structure I proposed was a Department of Public Works. On August 3, I proposed the second department, a Department of Public Safety.

As soon as the General Assembly reconvenes, I will submit legislation to create the third agency of the reorganized state government, a Department of Natural Resources. Copies of the bill and this statement will be made available to each member of the Legislature at that time.

There will be about ten new, separate departments in the modern state government the people of this state must have. Each will be headed by a qualified director who will be appointed by the Governor and directly responsible to him. It will be a cabinet-type government with a chain of responsibility leading directly from the Governor, instead of the Commission-type government we have now in which there is really no one the citizens can hold completely responsible for the operation of Delaware's affairs.

In addition to weeding out many of the overlapping agencies and coordinating related state activities in a single department, this reorganization will bring about economy.

The Department of Public Works I have asked the General Assembly to create would eliminate four agencies and 25 administrative positions. The Department of Public Safety would do away with six more agencies and 63 administrative jobs. This Department of Natural Resources would eliminate another eight agencies and 32 additional top-level administrative posts. That means in just these three new departments we have already succeeded in streamlining our state government by eliminating 18 state agencies and cutting out 120 top state jobs.

The new Department of Natural Resources will have other benefits. It will concentrate in one department all of the experts in such allied fields as fish and wildlife preservation, mosquito control, water resources control, and beach erosion.

There are no hidden political benefits in this reform government plan. It will not become effective until July 1, 1961. There will be a new Governor in office by then, and no one knows which party will win next year's election. This is purely a good government reform plan which can benefit only the people.

To carry out its assigned responsibilities, the Department of Natural Resources will have a director appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The director will be paid a salary of \$17,500 a year in order that a man of high calibre and extensive experience in this field can be attracted to the job. The director will serve at the pleasure of the Governor.

The new Department of Natural Resources will have six divisions. The division managers will be appointed by the department director and will receive not more than \$12,500 a year.

The Administration and Control Division will handle the entire department's budget, record-keeping and purchasing functions, which are now taken care of by 10 separate agencies.

The Fish and Wildlife Division will be responsible for all of the functions now performed by the Board of Game and Fish Commissioners, the Delaware Commission of Shell Fisheries, the Collector of Oyster Revenue, and the Mosquito Control division of the present State Highway Department. The task of carrying out a long-range mosquito control program has its effects on our fish and wildlife, so it would provide far better coordination if these responsibilities were in the hands of one division.

The third division in the new Department of Natural Resources will be the Forestry Division. It will assume the duties of the present State Forestry Department in safeguarding Delaware's woodlands.

The Water Resources and Geology division, the fourth division, will assume the responsibilities of the Water Resources Commission which I have asked the General Assembly to create as an interim measure. It will also assume the responsibilities of the existing Delaware Geological Commission.

The Parks Division will take over some of the responsibilities now held by five seperate state agencies, the State Park Commission, the State Highway Department, the Game and Fish Commission, the Waterfront Commission and the Delaware Archaeological Board.

The sixth and final division of the new Department of

Natural Resources will be the Public Lands Division. At present, the State Highway Department controls, harvests and sells crops from much of the public lands of the State. Since this function is far afield from the Highway Department's primary responsibility of constructing and maintaining highways and other public structures, I believe it would be in the best interests of the people to have our public lands in the Department of Natural Resources.

What will this new, modern Department of Natural Resources mean to our citizens? In my opinion, it will provide

these benefits:

1. It will save money by consolidating in one department the numerous allied activities which are now scattered

throughout ten separate state agencies.

2. It will improve the quality of state services in the natural resources field by centralizing planning, coordinating the talents of experts in these fields, and by eliminating the duplication of efforts by several agencies.

3. It will eliminate eight of our existing state agencies and will eliminate 32 specific, top-level posts in the executive branch of the government. (These are the Board of Game and Fish Commissioners with 3 members; the State Park Commission with 5 members; the State Forestry Department with 4 commissioners; the Shell Fisheries Commission with 4 members; the Collector of Oyster Revenue; the Waterfront Commission with 3 members; the Geological Commission with 5 members; and the Delaware Archaeological Board with 7 members).

4. It will provide the citizens with greater control of the state's natural resources services and property by having the director of the department responsible to the

Governor, an elected official.

Even greater benefits will be evident when the entire reorganization plan for a modern, streamlined state govern-

ment is completed.


Serious consideration of this overall government reorganization plan by the General Assembly and the public is of extreme importance. We have floundered too long trying to patch up the weaknesses in our present governmental system, trying to shore up the quality of our state services which are sagging under the burden of an antiquated government.

This is not a political issue. But it is a contest between inadequate government which can no longer meet the needs of our people and a modern, efficient government which will be responsible to the needs of our citizens in providing services efficiently and economically.

If there is to be a new day for Delaware, as there must,

then the people must have a new state government.

### PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, the State of Delaware is facing a severe financial crisis; and

WHEREAS, the estimated deficit of the State forecast by the Joint Revenue Committee at about \$100,000,000 by 1965 demands that definite and specific economies be effected through reorganization of the governmental operations of the State; and

WHEREAS, legislative action on this basic problem of financial and governmental reforms should be accomplished before consideration of the next budget of the State of Delaware; and

WHEREAS, certain phases of governmental reorganization should be put into operation before the start of the next fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, only the General Assembly can pass upon legislation to meet this serious situation; and

WHEREAS, a provision of Section 16, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Delaware, authorizes and empowers the Governor of the State of Delaware by proclamation to convene the General Assembly on extraordinary occasions; and

WHEREAS, I find by reason of the foregoing that there does exist an extraordinary occasion; now

THEREFORE, I, J. Caleb Boggs, Governor of the State of Delaware by virtue of the authority vested in me do hereby proclaim the following: That the 120th General Assembly of the State of Delaware shall convene at Legislative Hall in the City of Dover, Capital of the State of Delaware, on Thursday the tenth day of December, A. D., 1959 at 11:00 a.m. Eastern Standard Time, for the purpose of meeting in joint session to hear a message of the Governor at 12:00 noon; and to then consider and act upon such legislation as recommended by the Governor to bring about basic governmental reforms and specific economies which would provide new protection for the taxpayers.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I, J. Caleb Boggs, Governor of the State of Delaware, have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the said State to be hereunto affixed at Dover this seventh day of December in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and fifty-nine and of the Independence of the United States of America, the one hundred and eighty-fourth.

The Committee delivered his Excellency, the Honorable J. Caleb Boggs, Governor of the State of Delaware. The Governor was escorted to the rostum where he delivered the following message.

Mr. President

Mr. Speaker

Members of the 120th General Assembly of the State of Delaware.

It is once again my privilege to meet with you in joint session and place before you a problem of action which is required by the General Assembly to meet the needs of the people of this state.

Although this is not the opening session of a new General Assembly, it is the start of a new year. Perhaps the experiences we have shared during the past 12 months will help us find the solutions to our pressing problems during the days ahead. It is my hope that you will move rapidly to meet these problems.

This will be my last year as Governor of the State of Delaware, and I am going to do everything I can to see that meet the great challenges and opportunities which we all face the state government is improved, to the point where it can in this new decade. There is only one test which I will apply to every recommendation that I shall make to you during this legislative session: what is best for all of the people of this state.

To really understand the problems that Delaware faces, it is necessary to look at the growth that is taking place in the state today. Delaware is the fifth fastest growing state in the nation. Officials who will conduct the national census this year believe that this state's population has grown to about 480,000 people, an increase of 181,000 since 1947. To meet this growth, we must have better education facilities at the elementary, secondary and college level, greater economic development and job opportunities, better public health programs, greater assistance for our older citizens, stronger natural resources programs, and an overall improvement in other state services which the people want from the government.

The only way in which these demands can be met adequately and on a long-range basis is to provide a government organization that can do the job. This is the first of four broad legislative recommendations which must have your attention and action during this session.

When I appeared before you just a year ago today, I said to you that the business at this session is as urgent as any that has ever confronted a General Assembly in Delaware. I said, at that time, that we are trying to meet the needs of a growing state with an antiquated governmental system and that we are in the midst of a serious financial crisis. I added that these problems must be solved without delay.

I made several preliminary recommendations for meeting this problem, and since that message last January, I have developed a broad program for reforming and reorganizing the entire state government. Legislative action by the General Assembly is required to enact these governmental reforms which will equip the State to move ahead in the new decade, to provide the services which our rapidly-growing population will need in increasing measure, to improve efficiency, and to strengthen the responsibility to the people.. This will enable the State to give our taxpayers more for their tax dollars in the future. Most of all, these reforms will give the taxpayers greater protection and provide the sound financial basis on which our state con flourish.

I am convienced that we must tackle this reform in earnest before an attempt is made to solve the revenue problem. We must have reforms before taxes to give the taxpayer a fair break, and I want to repeat that I am absolutely against placing any new taxes on our citizens until the General As-

sembly acts on the reform program to modernize the government.

I am pleased at the recent reaction to this reform program which has been publicly expressed by the leaders and other members of the General Assembly. This is right in line with the strong expressions of public support for the program which I have found as I have travelled about the State.

On Monday, I received a letter from the President Pro Tem and the Speaker of the House which outlined a plan of legislative action on this reform program, and I would like to reply to the General Assembly as a whole on this letter. I have always been in favor of extensive public hearings on each of these reorganization proposals. I would like to suggest that the hearings begin with the new Department of Finance bill which I will submit to you in the next few days. This is not only the keystone of the reform program, but is absolutely essential to cleaning up the financial situation in the state. This bill will essentially follow the substance of Senate Bill 5.

On the question of timing, it has been requested that the complete program be introduced within the first three weeks fo the month. This request will be met. I would also like to suggest that the General Assembly set a target date before the end of February to complete action on the reform program.

In addition, a presentation on the savings to be realized through this organization will be ready when the hearings get underway and testimony is provided on the bills. However, I want to emphasize that immediate savings are only one of the important benefits the taxpayers will receive from this reorganization. There are many other sound reasons for reforms, and this letter may misconstrue the situation by saying that my reorganization is primarily based on the economy to be gained in governmental operations.

Without getting into any detail of the individual reform bills at this time, I do want to emphasize all the benefits this reorganization will provide for the people.

- 1. It will provide government that is truly responsible to the people.
- 2. It will reduce the size of our government so that it can be administered effectively.
- 3. It will give taxpayers better services for their tax dollars through greater efficiency.
- 4. It will provide substantial economy in operating the government, especially through centralizing purchasing and other service functions for our state activities.
- 5. It will make possible much better control of our financial responsibilities to the taxpayers and help head off

financial crises in the future.

- 6. It will create a true executive branch of the government and enable the Governor to fulfill the Constitutional provision which assigns to him "supreme executive authority".
- 7. It will enable the Governor to carry out fully the laws enacted by the General Assembly.
- 8. It will establish a civil service and compensation program to attract high-caliber personnel to government service and to prevent massive changes in the governmental agencies every time political control is altered.

I hope that these bills will be approached on a bi-partisan basis, and I pledge to you that I will do everything I can to foster bipartisanship in this and other legislative matters facing the State.

The second broad legislative recommendation which needs your action is the budget for Fiscal Year 1961. My budget recommendatiosn for this biennium have been before teh General Assembly since last January. My recommendations for supplemental appropriations are also before the General Assembly. I suggest that the Joint Finance Committee turn its attention to those recommenations immediately and work out its budget bill for the next fiscal year.

It seems to me that work on the budget can and should proceed while the reform program is being considered so that there will be no delay in providing funds for our state services. Also, I think that it is absolutely necessary that the procedure adopted last year be followed again this year to act on the budget bill before any supplemental appropriations, except deficiency and emergency supplementals, are passed.

The third area of legislative action is on the matter of new revenue which is required to meet the needs of the state. It is my sincere hope that the General Assembly will direct the Joint Revenue Committee to resume its deliberations and complete the task which you assigned to it last year. I would like to quote from your resolution which said the Joint Revenue Committee "is hereby empowered and directed to make a careful study and consideration of various new sources of revenue for meeting the financial needs of the state of Delaware, and to submit its report with recommendations to the current General Assembly".

The recent staff report of the Joint Revenue Committee specified the magnitude of the revenue problem facing our taxpayers this next year and in the years ahead. It seems to me that not only is this the most recent study of the problem, but also considering the outside staff experts who prepared it, there can be no question as to its objectivity. However, this is only one half of the job given to the Joint Revenue Committee. The second part of its mission is to draft truly bi-partisan, sound, and objective recommendations for the revenue needs of the State.

I was pleased to note in the letter from your legislative leaders a pledge of legislative cooperation. In view of this, the best place to demonstrate bi-partisanship on the revenue problem is in the bi-partisan Joint Revenue Committee. This is why the Committee was established, and it is therefore my hope taht you will immediately put the committee back in business.

The fourth broad area requiring legislative action concerns several important bills on constitutional reforms, consumer protection, and public safety.

Specifically, I refer to the following measures:

House Bill 22, authorizing a referendum in 1960 on the question of holding a Constitutional Convention. This is an extremely important bill since it will give the voters a chance to decide the question of modernizing our 63-year-old constitution during the election this year. Failure to act on this measure will delay the referendum until 1962. House Bill 22 has been in a House committee since last January.

House Bill 4, providing Home Rule for our towns and municipalities. This self-government bill, which would also reduce the legislative burden of the General Assembly, has also been in a House committee for a year.

House Bill 164, providing for reapportionment of representation in the General Assembly. This measure has been in a House committee since March.

Seante Bill 26, providing a new weights and measures law for the protection of housewives, other consumers, business and agriculture. This measure was approved by the Senate but is still awaiting House action.

House Bills 77 and 100, providing zoning authority for Kent and Sussex Counties to cope with the problems resulting from, and to encourage the development of industrial growth. These measures also offer protection to owners of existing properties.

The package of anti-crime bills proposed by the Attorney General. Many of these measures have been approved by the Senate but are still awaiting House action. Others are still in Senate committee. The Attorney General has made a strong case for these bills to strengthen laws enforcement in Delaware and the widespread public support for these measures is a matter of record.

Each one of these bills, from a Constitutional Convention to the anti-crime measures, has direct benefits for the people of this state. It is obvious to everyone that we have a job to do in Dover this year. The people know what that job is, and they expect it to be done. If we all pull together, working to strengthen our government, we can provide a government which in turn can provide the services demanded by the citizens of this state.

Let a new day for Delaware begin right now in this new year.

# BLANKET POLICY - STATE SCHOOLS STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION

All of State Board of Education insurance is written

under a blanket form, covering blanket on buildings and contents for fire and lightning. The coverage is subject to a 90% co-insurance clause, the same as blanket form for other State Buildings, which means the state agrees to carry insurance representing 90% of the insurable value. Under blanket insurance with the 90% co-insurance clause, there is a decided advantage to the State. This type of coverage means that the Board of Education has 100% insurance to value on each and every school in the schedule. In other words, they are not limited to recovery of 90% of value, but in event of a total loss on anyone building, they can receive 100% of the total insurable value of that particular building.

Periodic inspection and valuation service is maintained. Several times during the past two years this property has

been re-rated to secure a lower cost.

The term of the policy is for three years from November 21, 1958 to November 21, 1961 and the three year premium was \$7.706.62.

In 1959 all of the steam boilers and fired hot water storage heaters within the State Board of Education System were added to this policy and the additional cost until November 21, 1961 was \$7,330.74 and this amount was charged in July 1959. The Premium for steam boiler insurance of course varies as a result of new objects and locations to be added as occasion may demand. The reason for combining as many locations as possible under one policy is that there is a substantial reduction in premium based upon the size of the policy.

An important feature of steam boiler insurance is the fact that inspections of the objects insured are made by the insurance company and the premium includes the charge for such service. HCR 35 having passed the House was ordered to the Senate for concurrence.

Dear Mr. Tribbitt:

In behalf of the public's "right to know", the League of

Women Voters of Delaware commends the members of the General Assembly on their decision to carry through the publiv hearings on governmental reorganization.

It is true that such hearings are expensive. We would therefore approve any steps that might be taken to reduce the expense to a minimum without limiting access to such information and understanding of the proposed bills as may result from full discussion of the pros and cons.

Our dealings with the General Assembly have led us to believe that our legislators, regardless of party or sectional interests share a deep sense of responsibility, and that their primary concern is the best possible government for the people of Delaware. This can be achieved only by consultation, discussion, and careful study of the alternatives. Citizens who are unable to attend the Assembly sessions can do their share by reading the press reports, discussing the issues, and transmitting their views to those who represent them.

It is for these reasons that we respectfully urge the General Assembly to carry out its plan for the public hearings so that decisions can be made on the basis of intelligent consideration of the issues.
