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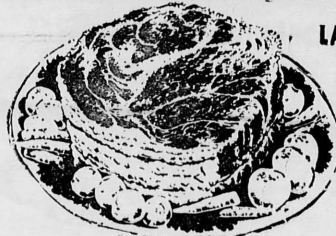

NEWARK ALL-STARS FOR NINE YEARS

The 9th annual Delaware All-Star High School Football Game will be played this Saturday in Delaware Stadium at Newark—and four more Yellowjackets will join the honor roll of 34 Newark High School athletes who played in the past eight All-Star contests.

All-State Guard Dan Suppe; Second Team All-Staters Harvey Folk and Mike Walker at quarterback and tackle; and Halfback Eddie Moore from Coach Bob Hoffman's Blue Hen Conference championship squad of 1963, are members of the Gold All-Star squad. And these boys join an illustrious group of skilled athletes from Newark High, who gave a great deal of time and effort to the "we play that they may learn" theme of this tremendous state-wide benefit for handicapped young people.

In the first All-Star game played in 1956, Newark contributed All-State Halfback Lee Schaffer, End Ray Klapinsky, and Tackle Mark Hurm, with Billy Cole coaching the Blue team to a 27-6 victory. The first game featured the New Castle County vs. Kent-Sussex All-Stars, and for the only time, the Yellowjackets were in Blue uniform.

In 1957, Newark joined the Gold team with a new dividing line of the Christiana River and White Clay Creek adding William Penn and Newark strength to the southern All-Stars.

The Yellowjackets' All-State Quarterback Bobby Conway won the Notre Dame Trophy as the outstanding player of the game in which the Blues edged the Golds 7-6; and Newark also contributed All-Stars John Talucci, end; Dick Simpers, halfback; Wilson Cooper, fullback; and George Colbert, guard.

And Newark's Big Gus Seaburg was trainer for the Golds in the years 1957-58.

Newark's Don Miller was head coach for the Gold team in 1958, with Yellowjackets Barney Field, All-State end; Fletcher Truitt, guard; Iven Bryant, Jr., tackle, and Reggie Walstrum, halfback, playing as Gold All-Stars. Coach Earl Smith's powerful Blue team won 27-0.

In 1959, Newark contributed All-Staters Wayne Crissman and Walt Mackey at center and end; Frank Jczyk, end; Ed Wallace, guard; and Ed Machulski, tackle, as the Blues won a 7-0 thriller.

In 1960, Newark's Bob Hoffman coached the Gold All-Stars to a 6-6 finish, with Yellowjacket Bob Burton at fullback selected as the outstanding player of the game. With Burton in Gold uniform, were Newark's All-State Halfback Maynard Conkey, who scored the lone Gold touchdown in the final quarter; Guard Monty Jackson; Halfback Marshall Saunders; Quarterback Carl Rice; and Guard Rodney Wilson.

The Golds won for the first time in 1961 with Newark's All-State Halfback Lloyd Wells; Fullback Frank Subach; Tackle Don Frank; and Guards Art Carney and Bill Mowll. Wells, the state scoring champion, scored a touchdown, and Subach drove over for the final touchdown in the 20-14 Gold victory.

The Gold team won again in 1962 with Newark's All-State End Arnold Saunders enfolded the winning touchdown pass for the 25-24 nod. And Yellowjackets Mike Sinclair at quarterback, and Jim Smith at end, played a lot of football for the victorious Golds.

And last year, Newark Fullback Lee Hackney was co-captain for the Gold squad, with teammates Walt Jones, end, and Mike Kubico, quarterback, playing in the All-Star Game which the Blue team won 12-0.

Too few will remember the boys who played in the eight previous All-Star games—and "play" is hardly the word with the hot, hard work involved—but the Delaware Foundation for Retarded Children is a lasting memorial to their self-sacrificing effort.

Dan Suppe, Mike Walker Named Captains Of Golds For Saturday's All-Star Game

Two of Newark High School's three co-captains for Coach Bob Hoffman's Blue Hen Conference Championship Yellowjackets of last season—Dan Suppe and Mike Walker—have been elected captains of the Gold squad which will meet the Blue team in the 9th annual Delaware All-Star High School Football Game to be played this Saturday beginning at 2 p.m. in Delaware Stadium for the benefit of the Delaware Foundation for Retarded Children.

William Penn's Alvie Beatson, tackle, is the third captain for the Gold All-Stars.

And two more of Hoffman's Yellowjackets champions are slated to play with Captains Suppe and Walker in Gold All-Star uniforms this Saturday—Halfback Harvey Folk and Fullback Eddie Moore.

Suppe was a first team All-State selection at guard, and Folk and Walker were second team All-Staters at quarterback and tackle. Folk, a halfback in his junior year, volunteered for duty as Newark's first line quarterback last season when scheduled starter Norris Saunders was sidelined before the opening game because of a softball-sustained shoulder injury. And Harvey Folk won All-State laurels in one year as a senior field general, passing and punting, ball-handling, and running quarterback.

Moore, a hard-running, fast and shifty halfback for the Hoffman-coached champions of Newark High, is performing at fullback for the Gold All-Stars.

With Dan Suppe at 6-1 and 175-lbs., the Golds will have four other first team All-Staters with State scoring Champion Jim Layfield, 205-lb. halfback from Millsboro; Middletown Quarterback Bill Clark at 6-1 and 179-lbs.; Charley Graham, 6-4 end at 204-lbs. from Jason High; and Ed Roberts, 185-lb. guard from Seaford.

Along with Yellowjackets Folk at 5-8 and 160-lbs., and Walker at 6-3 and 195-lbs., the Golds will have three other second team All-State gridders—End Ken Branner at 6-2 and 190-lbs. from Middletown; Georgetown's Kenny Rementer, 190-lb. guard; and Center Bruce Steen, 245-pounder from John M. Clayton High.

Tied down in a cooler aboard the boat, the four Delaware pike provided some puzzled ponderment for the party boatmen at the marina the next day.

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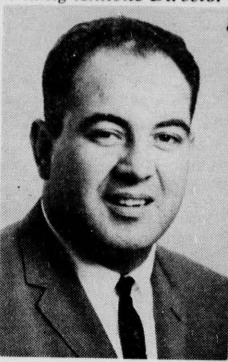
