City's 75th Memorial Day Parade slated for Sunday

Parade will mark its 75th anniversary on Sunday at 2 p.m.

In attendance will be marching units representing all branches of the service, veterans organizations, schools and community organizations.

Prior to the parade, at 1 p.m., at State Memorial Ceremony will be held outside Memorial Hall on The Green at the University of Delaware. The ceremony honors those who have died making the ultimate sacrifice for their nation.

At 2 p.m., Maj. Thomas E. Kelly, USMC Retired, will lead marching bands, military units, and community participants down Main Street. The parade will follow a route North on South College Avenue, East on Main Street, South on South Chapel Street, and end at Haines Street. The reviewing stand will be located at Academy and Main Streets. A City Memorial Ceremony will be held at the Academy Building following the parade, with a performance by the U. S. Coast Guard Training

Center Drill Team. The Master of Ceremonies for the event will be Col. Robert Hyland from the Delaware National Guard.

Street closures and detours for the parade will go into effect in stages starting around 12:30 p.m. Delaware Ave is closed starting at 12:30 p.m. Main Street is closed starting at 1:30 p.m. Traffic is diverted to Park Place and Cleveland Ave which causes long delays.

On Saturday, a Civil War

Parking fee change ok'd for proposed Chipotle Grill

The Newark City Council unanimously approved a compromise parking waiver fee plan for a restaurant that wants to open on Main Street.

Chipotle Grill, which calls itself a "Fresh Mex" restaurant, sought a 50 percent reduction in the parking waiver for a cafeteria-style location at the site of the former Copy Maven on Main Street. Its name refers to a smoky pepper used in Mexican food.

Instead the council adopted a suggestion to levy the remaining 50 percent of the \$74,000 parking waiver over 10 years. Officials of the chain stressed that the compromise is subject to approval by the company. It would allow the Chipotle to reduce its development costs for the site, with the 50 percent paid over 10 years shifted to the operating budget. Those costs, with the parking waiver money added in, had resulted in the company

walking away from the project.

Chipotle agreed to seek the compromise at the urging of Newark Mayor Vance Funk.

The city charges the waivers as a way to pay for parking costs and future expansion in Newark. A long-discussed parking ramp in downtown has been on hold, as the city works to improve its finances and avoid taking on additional debt.

Funk, in arguing for a modification of the waiver, cited the fact that the building has been vacant for five years. He also noted that the city would eventually get the waiver money through the development of the site. It was also reported that the location had been shown by real estate agents 100 to 150 times, but had not generated any firm commitment until now.

Councilman Paul Pomeroy expressed concerns about the proposed fee reduction setting a precedent for future projects, but was happy with the revised payment plan.

In other action, the council:

• Agreed to look for ways to ease the burden on non-profits, schools and other tax-exempt organizations in paying for refuse pick up. Those pickups had been paid for by the city, even though the organizations do not pay property taxes. The city is asking nonprofits to pay for services as it struggles with a downturn in real estate transfertax revenues. Nonprofits outside the city have to pay private haulers for refuse costs.

 Heard a presentation on a proposed natural gas generation expansion at a power plant in Smyrna owned by the Delaware Municipal Electric Corp. Newark accounts for 35 percent of the generation from DEMEC, which serves a number of municipalities in the state.

He did not see any vehicles or anyone leaving the scene before he called the police.

When officers arrived, the car had had its passenger side window shattered and brown and red fluids were leaking from the engine compartment. The car also suffered several scratches and dents and a broken side mirror. Total damage was \$1,500. No fingerprints were recovered at the scene.

Trespasser turns out to be a fugitive

A Newark man was arrested for trespassing at the Studio Green Fitness Center, at 9 Thorn Lane, by employees with Bayside Security Patrol Services.

The 37 year-old suspect

New Castle County Police have arrested Andre Choury, 34, whose last known address was in the Valleystream Garden

Apartments in the Bear area. He has been transported to the Christiana Hospital where he is being evaluated. Upon his release, he will be charged with 18 criminal offenses that include two counts of kidnapping, aggravated menac-ing, reckless endangering and multiple weapon offenses.

On Monday, at 5:43 a.m., County Police responded to the Fox Woods Apartments in Pike Creek for a report of a domestic dispute involving a weapon. When the officers arrived, they found a 31 yearold female victim who reported her estranged husband had just grabbed and pulled her out of her car and pointed a handgun at her. She also advised her boyfriend overheard the sounds of her car horn (she sounded the horn) and came outside the see what was going on.

Choury then turned the weapon on the 24 year-old male and forced him back into the apartment at gunpoint. Once inside, Choury fortified the front door and barricaded the two of them inside. Police learned the gun discharged while he was moving furniture around inside the apartment. No one was injured as a result of the shooting.

Delaware Technical & Community College Computer Information Systems (CIS) student Robin Depto, Newark,

has been selected as an Aerospace Scholar, one of only 76 students representing community colleges across the



country. He will travel to NASA's Johnson Space Center in Houston, May 20-22, to participate in a three-day on-site event to develop robotic explorers.

Robin graduated from Delaware Tech with his associate degree in CIS in 2005, and has continued taking engineering courses to enhance his degree. A participant in the National Community College Aerospace Scholars pilot program, Depto completed four web-based assignments during the school year, and his exemplary work qualified him for this experience. As part of the program, participants will form teams and establish fictitious companies interested in Mars exploration. Working with NASA engineers, each will develop a prototype rover, and form a company infrastructure, including budget, communications and presentations. The on-site experience includes a tour of Johnson, and briefings by NASA employees, including astronauts.



Chapel Street buzzing with original works

Even though there was no performance on the marque, the Chapel Street Players Theatre was humming this past Friday and Saturday as they were the venue once again for the Eastern States Theatre Association ESTAfest/Original Works 2010.

The ESTA is a regional association of community theater groups from New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland and the District of Columbia. Each state division sent two entries to be judged a winner on the regional level.

Marsha Amato-Greenspan, Festival Chairperson, told me that this was the third year in a row that the festival has been held in the Chapel Street Players

I went to the Saturday morning session - one of four in which each community theater group had to put all props, cast and stagewrights in a small square on the stage outlined in tape ('the box' was what Amato-Greenspan called it). Once all materials and personnel are in the box and ready to go, they call 'start' and the timer begins. Cast and stagewrights place props and furniture and then wait for the lights to come up to run the show. Then they break the set, stuff the materi-

The event was fun, but clearly not intended for public consumption. It was more like being in a large backstage audience, watching everything the stage crew would see, including bringing props in from the parking lot. The brave lights and tech crew were trying to follow the instructions of 15 different casts and errors inevitably occurred, but I saw four solid

als back in 'the box' and call

performances of original works on Saturday morning.

Three were quite humorous: Flowers, by an 88-year-old playwright, Sherman C. Ward, Jr. from the Little Theater of Watertown (NY) was a humorous story about a mother/ daughter team who scarfed up silk flowers from cemeteries for resale. Midnight Train to George by Delaware's own Matt Casarino is a tightly written play about two women on a bus together who figure out they know each other rather intimately. The third comedy was Clean, produced by the Silver Spring Stage (MD) story about a shy Italian chef who has been in love with a waitress for five years and finally lets it slip. The fourth, presented by RAPA East End Theatre of Rochester (NY) was an all too realistic story of a factory worker who has just received his severance package.

Chapel Street Players deserves kudos for hosting such

Go green and save green

Take an environmentally sensitive approach to your landscape and "go green!" By implementing the following sustainable landscape techniques, you will provide support and protection to our natural environment and ease up on your budget at the same time.

Choose plants carefully.

Not familiar with native plants? Native plants grow naturally in our region with minimal care; they are well adapted to our climatic and environmental conditions. In most cases, when used in appropriate growing conditions and once firmly established, native plants will thrive without supplemental water or chemical treatments. Native plants allow you to have nature's beauty close at hand, they conserve natural resources, invite local wildlife into your landscape for food and shelter, and they are beautiful. The more natives we plant, the

more popular they will become; and the more widely planted, the greater the environmental impact. In addition to nativity, consider plants that are appropriate for your

site; evaluate growing conditions, height and width, and the needs of the plant. Provide proper spacing between plants and use proper planting procedures. Finally, do your research and choose plants that

are disease resistant and with few problems.

Designing with native plants reduces landscape maintenance costs; management is less intensive because native plants are low water, fertilizer and pesticide users. Proper siting, planting, and maintenance ensures that your plants get a good, running start; compromised plants lend themselves to foraging insects and diseases. By supporting healthy growth, you will have fewer replacements and


spend less time and money trying to control insects and/or diseases.

Recycle organic material on your property. Compost. Mulch.

The organic material you "clean up" from your property including lawn clippings, fall leaves, branches, and herbaceous material can be composted on site. There are millions and gazillions of (micro and macro) organisms like earthworms that break down organic matter into a usable and rich product called compost. It's easy to maintain a compost pile and make rich compost to improve the soil. Use compost on lawns, as a soil amendment, mulch, or in a potting media for containers.

Mulch is distinct from compost. Although you can mulch with compost, generally, mulch is not fully decomposed. Mulch with organic material; use lawn clippings, leaves, or seasoned hardwood mulch in your landscape beds to suppress weeds,

George Evans turned out in Christina board election

Long-time Christina Board of Education member George Evans was trounced Tuesday night by Eric Anderson in a race for another term.

Evans, an attorney, is the current president of the board and had served on the body for three nearly decades.

He lost his race to Anderson by a lopsided 869 to 217 margin. A third candidate, Paul Falkowski received 104 votes.

Anderson is a teacher (at the Charter School of Wilmington), has served as a teacher's aide, coach, and substitute teacher.

The candidate used social media in his election win, with

a page on Facebook that had 900 friends. Evans by contrast, seemed to rely on lawn signs.

Evans suffered from low turnout in the city of Wilmington, where he won precincts. By contrast, Anderson racked up huge margins in the Newark and Bear-Glasgow areas. The sprawling district includes the above areas, with a narrow sliver running near the Christina River into Wilmington.

As board president, Evans took a lot of heat over a code of conduct with a zero tolerance policy that resulted in the suspension of a young student at a Newark elementary school.

The suspension was later overturned, after a New York Times story brought unwanted national attention to the district and a triggered wave of criticism from both sides of the political spectrum.

A revised code of conduct awaits final action from the board.

Later this month, a referendum will be held in an effort to ease a budget gap and avoid teacher and staff layoffs that were approved by the board at a meeting earlier this month.

On his Facebook page, Anderson indicated he supported the referendum.



Lawns require intensive management; they demand a large input of water, labor, and often chemicals. Consider alternatives; small areas of lawn amongst garden beds, a meadow, or a vegetable garden. Select the appropriate turf species for your site, and mow, fertilize, and water correctly. Mow high and frequently, leave the clippings on the lawn, fertilize in the early

Bastianelli steps down at top of his game

It's not often a coach in any sport steps down at the top of his game, but St. Mark's wrestling head coach Jay Bastianelli has done just that.

"As much as I have cherished every moment spent coaching the St. Mark's wrestling program, I have decided to retire from coaching to pursue an administration position and to focus on my responsibilities and goals as a husband and hopefully one day as a father," said Bastianelli, who is a seventh-grade social studies teacher at Skyline Middle.

As a senior at St. Mark's in 1997, Bastianelli won the



135-pound state championship as captain of a team coached by his uncle, Steve Bastianelli. Then, in 2003, after serving as an assistant for several years, Jay continued a family coaching tradition by following in the coaching footsteps of his uncle, who himself won four

individual state championships wrestling on a Sussex Tech team coached by his father, Herm. Collectively the three generations of coaches won 429 meets during a 50-year span.

"We are very appreciative of Jay's dedication and hard work he put into this program," St. Mark's athletic director Tom Rosa said in a phone interview. "He ran the whole program and did such a great job organizing everything. We wish him the best in his education endeavors."

Bastianelli led the Spartans to a 78-22 dual-meet record and crowned 23 individual state champions during his sevenyear tenure

"In my eyes Jay had the

proper mindset all along, which was to attempt to develop each wrestler in the program to the best of his ability," Steve Bastianelli, who currently serves as athletic director at Newark High, said in an e-mail. "By doing that he has not only continued a fine tradition but also raised the bar."

St. Mark's was 14-0 this past season, winning its second consecutive state championship team title. In addition, four Spartans signed letters of intent to wrestle at major college programs.

"Jay has a great feel for the part of the job which involves talking to college coaches and helping those wrestlers who are interested find a school that is a good match for them." Steve Bactianelli added

Bastianelli learned from his uncle that the success of any sports program doesn't stem solely from the head coach, but rather his ability to see the big picture; to build on a strong foundation already in place, while adding his own personal touch to add another layer of success. When asked about leaving his mark on the program, he talked more about what leading the Spartans did for him as a person, than what he did for the team as its coach.

"This program has helped shape me into the person I am today. From being a fan as a little kid, to a wrestler for a legendary coach (Steve Bastianelli), to an assistant coach, and then eventually as the head coach, the pride I feel as a part of this program and its storied history, and bright future, will always be with me.

And I look forward to being a fan in the stands next year."






