Red Cross War Fund Quota Is \$10,000

Final plans for the Newark Red Cross war fund drive beginning March 1 will be completed at a dinner meeting for the general committee and the zone captains this evening at 6:30 in the dining hall of the Newark Methodist Church.

The Branch quota of \$10,000 will be raised by house-to-house canvases to cover completely the district which includes the area from the Pennsylvania line to Glasgow and from the Maryland line to Cochran's Corner.

Funeral services were conducted from the Yeatman Funeral Home with interment in Riverview Cemetery.

Mr. McMullen was vice president of the Allied Kid Co. and a director of the Industrial Trust Co. He was the only Democratic Governor Delaware has had during the past 48 years.

MILITARY STUDENTS RECALLED

U. of D. to Lose A.S.T.P. Students Next Month

Plans are in the making whereby the University of Delaware will become one of the outstanding institutions of its kind in the field of graduate study in Chemical Engineering. Dr. Walter Hullahen told nearly 200 assembled alumni at the mid-winter banquet in the Hotel duPont, Saturday night.

In addition to announcing recent gifts to the university amounting to some \$34,000, Dr. Hullahen commented that while the University would feel the loss of the 360 students engaged in the specialized military training program, it would continue to operate under a curtailed schedule.

Recent military plans will recall some 110,000 specialized training troops from college campuses to combat field in early April. About 400 military students are presently enrolled at the U. of D. The War Department has said that the move was necessary because draft boards have failed to meet the Army's manpower requirements.

Withdrawal of the military enrollees will leave the university with about a hundred or less male civilian students. It is thought.

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IS THE FEED SHORTAGE OVER?

The answer, in all probability, is "No."

Corn is the key to the whole feed situation. Midwestern hogs can still pay more for corn than the ceiling price set by Government order. And there are still enough hogs in the Corn Belt to eat up the rest of the 1943 corn crop. Nearly half of the crop is already gone.

Southern States grain buyers, along with other grain handlers, predict that the flow of corn to the market will freeze up again within 60 to 90 days. Even if the market becomes favorable, corn growers do not generally move their corn during the busy planting season. That season is just around the corner and reserves of corn are practically gone.

Last May, when corn went off the market, mixers turned to barley, oats and wheat. There is no such "out" this year. We simply do not have the barley or the oats or the wheat.

Members of Southern States Cooperative must protect themselves in the event of another disruption in feed service.

What Farmers can do

Starting immediately, farmers can build up and keep a 30 to 60 day supply of feed right on the farm. This will prove to be a valuable cushion when and if feed service is interrupted by shortages of corn or other ingredients. Southern States Cooperative Service Agencies are now geared to help you build up the farm feed inventory. They may not be able to help you do it later.

As poultry mashers are fed, they should be drawn from the oldest pile to insure the proper vitamin content for the poultry.

Attention should be given seriously to growing more grain and grass forage on the farm. Pullets, as well as cows, can benefit from a leafy succulent range which saves feed costs. Every measure must be taken: First, to build up a feed backlog and Second, to produce more home grown feed to stretch purchased feed further.

New 4-H Agent
For N. C. County**

Mrs. Clara D. Skoglund has been appointed 4-H club agent in New Castle county for the Delaware Agricultural Extension Service, effective February 16, replacing Mrs. Laura R. Owens, who resigned January 1.

Mrs. Skoglund was reared on a farm and belonged to a 4-H club for ten years later serving as local leader for three years. She is a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, serving as 4-H club agent for eighteen months in Massachusetts and as home demonstration agent in New Hampshire for eighteen months; and has spent the past two years in practical experience in her own home.

Mrs. Skoglund is the wife of Ensign W. C. Skoglund, absent on leave from his position as extension poultryman for the Delaware Agricultural Extension Service.

Victory gardeners and home canners are assured Mason jars with porcelain-lined zinc lids, rubber rings made from reclaimed and synthetic rubber, tin cans and hand sealers, pressure canners, water-bath canners, home dehydrators, and other drying devices, and community freezer lockers for 1944. WFB reports to the Delaware Agricultural Extension Service and Agricultural Adjustment Agency indicate that 1944 national output will be 50,000 hand-operated tin can sealers, 400,000 aluminum steam pressure canners, 500,000 enamel water-bath canners, 25,000 home type dehydrators, and 550 new community freezing locker plants to serve 200,000 families.

Last week a group of entomologists interested in developing non-poisonous insecticides visited the department of entomology at the University of Delaware to study insecticide testing. The group was made up of Dr. E. D. Witman, Dr. H. A. Waters, and Dr. B. C. Dickinson, of the Sherwin-Williams Company, who perform research at Ohio State University; Dr. D. M. DeLong, professor of entomology at Ohio State, who directs their work; and E. F. Rothmisch, chief chemist of the Sherwin-Williams Company at Bound Brook, New Jersey.

Prof. A. E. Tomhave and Edmund Hoffman of the department of animal and poultry industry at the Delaware Agricultural Experiment Station, recently made a study of four Barred Rock strains to check their comparative rates of growth, rates of feathering, and amount of fleshing. Copies of a report on the study, showing definite superiority of some strains, are available through the Department.

County farm rationing committees of the Agricultural Adjustment Agency have discontinued the issuance of certificates for conversion of tractors from steel to rubber tires as a move to assure adequate replacements of worn out tractor tires and an adequate supply of tires for new tractors.

Prof. A. E. Tomhave of the department of animal and poultry industry at the Delaware Agricultural Experiment Station, spoke this week before the Maryland Tri-County Poultry Association. In view of his recent tour of the broiler section of George, Prof. Tomhave was invited by this peninsula group to discuss the methods, housing, and feeding, of broilers in Georgia as compared to those on the Peninsula, and competitive problems involved.

Christian Endeavor Society Presents Program

A dramatic sketch was presented by the Christian Endeavor Society of the Newark Presbyterian Church last Sunday evening. The production was coached and directed by Miriam Lewis who was also the reader.
