Delaware State Fair To Open Saturday With Top Entertainers, Record Exhibits

The Delaware State Fair opens at noon this Saturday, and continues through Aug. 3 with a record number of farm products, poultry and livestock exhibits and a top entertainment program presenting some of the nation's most popular stars at Harrington.

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NEWARK, DELAWARE

The schedule of grandstand variety shows will include Frank Fontaine, comedy star of the Jackie Gleason television program; Brenda Lee, singing personality; Les Paul, a favorite of past fair crowds; and The Four Seasons singing group.

There will be such traditional fair features as auto and stock races, harness racing, vaudeville and circus acts, side shows, the midway with its rides and side-shows and nightly fireworks displays.

As usual, Tuesday, July 30 will be Children's Day and all school children will be admitted free. A special program of afternoon and evening entertainment has been planned for them, featuring the Saturday Line All-Girl Rodeo Thrill Show with chariot races and bareback riding.

Next Thursday will be Governor's Day, when Gov. Elbert N. Carvel and other state officials will be present at the evening grandstand show with Les Paul, the show headliner.

Thursday also has been designated as Senior Citizens' Day at the fair. All persons 60 and over will be admitted free at the gates. Wednesday afternoon will find some of the nation's outstanding juvenile players and trotters with leading drivers, competing in a program of harness racing.

Friday night visitors will hear Brenda Lee, one of the most popular singers in the recording industry, make highlights the evening grandstand show.

On Saturday afternoon, entertainment will include one of the favorite features of any fair, big auto races. Some of the country's best drivers will blaze their way around the half-mile dirt track.

Frank Fontaine will headline the Saturday evening grandstand show.

The new wing is named for Harry W. Lynch of Wilmington and Rehoboth Beach, a retired Du Pont executive, who is chairman of the finance committee, treasurer of the Beebe Hospital board of directors, and was chairman of the special gifts committee during the hospital's building fund campaign.

The four-level wing is the first major addition to the hospital itself since 1933, when the Mary Wilson Thompson wing was completed.

Construction of the Lynch wing was coordinated with remodeling of existing facilities at a cost of approximately \$15 million.

Employed Persons Offered Social Security Benefits

Many persons are not aware they don't have to retire completely to receive social security benefits, according to Myron Milbourn, manager of the Wilmington social security office.

Milbourn explained that a person can earn \$1200 during the year and still receive all of his benefits. Also, a person who has earned \$2 earned between \$1700 and \$2400 can receive all of his benefits.

For earnings over \$1700, a person's benefits is withheld for each \$1 earned.

Milbourn pointed out that a person's month's benefit is payable the month in which the beneficiary dies.

In the early years of motorized America, slower and fewer autos needed fewer and narrower roads, and driving a car for the fun of it was common. Today, more and more people own more and faster cars, and pleasure driving is almost as passe as bathtub gin. In heavily populated metropolitan areas like the one stretching from above Trenton to below Wilmington, including 377 local governments and 11 counties in three states, highway construction has been unable to keep pace with population growth. If current population trends continue, some responsible authorities expect an additional 3 million people in these 11 counties by 1985. If these people keep buying cars at the present rate, our region will then have 750,000 additional cars.

Putting the old fashioned fun back in driving may be impossible, but speeding up the movement of people and goods can be accomplished.

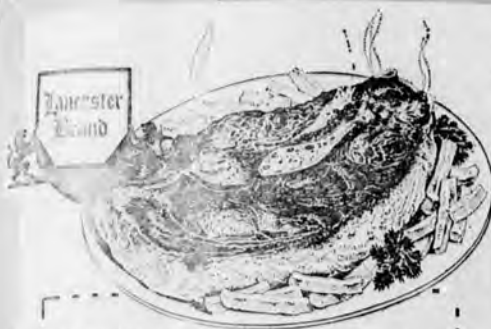

Bug Banishment Measures Advised For Summer Fun

Swarms of bugs can make summer fun quickly a summer nightmare, says Dave Tamm, assistant county health officer. There are a number of things homeowners can do to discourage their presence.

Breeding areas for mosquitoes can be eliminated by draining standing water. A few inches of water in the garden pool or pond will do the trick. Adequate drainage should be provided in the yard where water tends to stand.

To discourage flies, collect and completely cover or burn refuse and other debris in the garbage can.

And by all means, encourage the use of desirable bird life in the garden. These little feathered friends not only fill the air with their sprightly screeches, but they destroy birds of insect pests.

Homeowners may also find a regular spray program with a non-toxic insecticide will help protect not only their plants but also themselves from insect pests.

Effective too are the various repellent materials that are available. These may be dabbed on the skin or diffused into the air from scented candles or garden torches.

Alfred C. "Abe" Siltz caught an 8 1/2-lb. flounder in the bay west of Ocean City, Md., last weekend, but a flounder of that magnitude is almost frightening to any happily surprised sports-fisherman — and a monster, indeed, to smaller fry.

Few if any flounder fans far up the Chesapeake where we fished around Kent Island last weekend with a last cruise aboard the Young Un III. And the striped bass or rockfish reputed to abound in the area — and from personal observation on isolated occasions, we know that they sometimes do — were but slightly more evident than the absent flatfish.

With Francis Neide and Gibby Young late last Friday evening, we trotted and drifted live oysters at the mouth of the Chester River through sunset and on until near midnight when we anchored to sleep in the shelter of a cove upriver from Love Point.

A friendly, fortunate fisherman at Castle Marina had provided us with a half-dozen nice rock for an early dockside supper—two-pound rock that he had caught chumming with softshell clams in an area of the Chesapeake loosely defined as "below the Bay Bridge" and we never did discover this treasure trove. But with fried rock under our belts, we had a lot of stomach for some poor fishing luck long after things normally would have been abandoned for the night.

It had been a long time since this Newark trio had experienced any gain, but we renewed this experience Friday night when a storm broke over our Chester River anchorage at bedtime.

Mr. Neide was oblivious to it all from his point of vantage in the cabin bunk, but his two companions in the open cockpit aft, set some sort of a record for snapping up a couple of leopards while half asleep and wholly wet.

Morning dawned clear over water sparkling beneath a brisk breeze, and after breakfast aboard, we joined the commercial pros from Rock Hall with a clam chumline some mile offshore at the northern end of Kent Island in the bay.

Three beautiful rock were taken by one charmed individual from one of the half-dozen boats in the chumline — rock weighing around five pounds apiece — and when things tapered off around noon and this big boat pulled out for home, a pair of sportsmen in an outboard boat moved into the vacated spot to catch some 15 big rockfish beneath the frowning brows of their fishless neighbors.

Cap'n Young finally latched onto a rock of some pound and a half weight, and that was a bit better than most of the boatmen were doing. After a violent rainstorm, that poured tons into the already well-saturated Chesapeake, we joined a flotilla of trolling cruisers off the Western Shore near the Magothy mouth, and Francis finally found what we had been looking for — a burrowing silver slab of striped bass that wallowed a live reel as we trolled over a shoal, and four pounds of fury fought all the long way up to the boat.

Plenty of big white perch and bigger toothfish provided some unwanted action in our rock chumline, but we kept few perch — and no tooth — in some specialized stripster seeking.

After another fish fry, and this time a clear night on the river, we picked up Salisbury Sam Quillen, a potential purchaser for the Young Un III, early the next morning at Castle Marina — and Sam had barely cleared the Castle Marina channel ahead of the 26-ft. chumline's cooing wake when he said "I'll take her."

But it wasn't quite that easy. We kept him aboard for a hard, hot

TIPS FROM THE TACKLE BOX

Bait On The Button

TRYING TO BUY live bait is often a frustrating business—it seldom seems to be available when and where you want it. A 6-ft. minnow seine solves this problem neatly, yet hardly one fisherman in ten includes this inexpensive item in his inventory of fishing equipment. Maybe it's because most fishermen don't realize how quickly and easily bait can be secured from almost any fishing waters.

In lakes, for instance, surprising numbers of minnows hide away in practically every weedy cove. The water may seem barren of bait, but a few hauls of the seine will usually turn up all the minnows needed for a day's fishing. For even faster returns try this:

Scatter dry oatmeal over a small area, wait a few minutes for it to attract minnows and then drag through the school.

In streams, look for minnows in protected pockets and close-to-shore shallows. But for a variety of catching stream bait anchor your seine in a riffle and then turn over all flat rocks and loose boulders immediately upstream. Dislodged crawfish, hellgrammites and an assortment of useful nymphs will be swept into the net by the current. The bait you seine is not only fresh and lively, but it has the advantage of always being native to the water you plan to fish.
