Anti-Polio Clinic Scheduled Nov. 3 At Aetna Fire Hall

Oral Sabin Polio Vaccine
Offered With Statewide
Immunization Campaign

Oral Sabin polio vaccine will be offered in Newark at the Aetna Fire Hall, Hook & Ladder Co. fire station on Academy Street with the statewide polio immunization campaign on Sunday, Nov. 3.

The local clinic is one of 36 to be established by the Medical Society of Delaware in cooperation with the State Board of Health and the National Foundation for the Administration of Oral Sabin polio vaccine on Nov. 3.

Sunday clinics will be open from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m., and only Type 1 Sabin vaccine will be administered.

Types 2 and 3 will be offered at successive clinics on Dec. 8 and Jan. 19, and all three types are necessary for complete protection against the three strains of polio virus.

Dr. Henry H. Stroud, chairman of the statewide immunization campaign, urges everyone who has not had the full three-series Sabin vaccine, to come to a clinic on Sunday, Nov. 3.

"If you have had Salk vaccine shots, you may be protected yourself, but are still able to harbor polio virus and pass it on to others," Dr. Stroud said.

"If you have had only one or two doses of Sabin vaccine, you are not fully protected, and should take advantage of this opportunity to receive all doses," Stroud concluded.

Persons receiving the Sabin vaccine will be asked for donations of 25 cents to defray cost of the program. However, nobody will be turned away if they cannot afford this contribution.

The vaccine will be given orally, with two drops of the liquid on a piece of sugar, and the process requires but a minute.

Research Projects Totaling \$183,000 Conducted At U.D.

Science Foundation Grants
Support Eight UD Projects
Conducted By Local Staff

Eight research projects in chemistry, physics, engineering, psychology and biological sciences are being conducted at the University of Delaware this year with support of the National Science Foundation.

Most recently announced by Dr. John T. Lanzetta, acting director of NSF, is a two-year grant to Prof. Jack A. Gerster for continuation of research on automatic control of distillation columns.

Also in the school of engineering are projects under the direction of Dr. Albert B. Schultz and Dr. Jerry L. Nowinski.

The Schultz grant for one year, concerns deformation of common structural materials.

Nowinski's project concerns simple structural elements of plates and shells when subjected to pulsations.

C. Richard Quade and Edward H. Kerner are undertaking two-year investigations in physics. Dr. Quade hopes to provide better understanding of intermolecular forces, and Dr. Kerner is seeking ways to describe motions of elementary particles in each other's fields of force in terms of the particles themselves.

Dr. Harold Kwart, professor of chemistry, is studying the chemical mechanism of organic reactions. Dr. G. Fred Somers, chairman of the department of biological sciences, is studying the chemical and physical properties of plant cell walls.

Dr. John T. Lanzetta and Dr. Dean G. Pruitt have a two-year grant for research in professional information processing.

Col. Leslie B. Williams, university coordinator of research, said that the eight projects have received grants totaling \$183,000.

In addition to the nine principal investigators, 32 graduate students are participating in the experimental work.

Mitchell, Ralph, Wisk Produce 200-Bu. Of Corn Per Acre In Experimental Work

For the first time, University of Delaware agronomists have been able to produce more than 200 bushels of corn per acre. This new high in Delaware corn production was reached this year on research plots at the university's Georgetown Substation.

Average production in the state is 65 bushels per acre. Those working on the project include Dr. William Mitchell, extension agronomist, Ed Wisk, crops research associate, and Ed Ralph, associate county agent in Sussex county. Ralph married the former Miss Lanny Richards of Newark.

Mitchell says they established a project that they hoped would raise the sights of Delaware corn producers above the traditional 100 bushel mark.

"Fifteen years ago the average corn yield in the state was about 30 bushels. Hundred-bushel yields were for dreamers and fellows like us. They were grown on a few research plots around the country and from this we started making recommendations to farmers that would enable them to duplicate this success. Today it is fairly common to see 100-bushel corn in Delaware," Mitchell said, adding that 100 bushel demonstration plots had exceeded their usefulness on the university farm.

"If we were going to stay ahead of the pack we had to know how to grow 200 bushels of corn per acre," he continued.

Mitchell says some of the plots were as high as 225 bushels. The average of both hybrids that were planted under the best conditions of the experiment was 184.8 bushels. What did it take to get this? Mitchell lists several points that he is sure of, and a few others that he is not sure of.

177 Adults Enroll In Evening School For Newark Area

Director George V. Kirk
Cites More Than Doubled
Enrollment Over Past Year

Dr. George V. Kirk, adult evening school director, announced this week that enrollment has more than doubled the 84 of last year.

There are 177 adults enrolled in courses at Newark and Christiana high schools, and at Central Junior High School.

The fact that courses are offered at the three buildings is a first for the adult school. The opening of Christiana High School was necessitated because of the overflow in beginning typing, and the opening of Central Junior High was necessitated by the number wishing to take sewing and tailoring.

There are eight Cuban refugees taking special courses in English and Americanization Studies, and part of the cost for these eight is being borne by the State Department of Public Instruction.

Beginning typing has an enrollment of 51; advanced typing, 24; sewing and tailoring, 31; beginning shorthand, 22; advanced shorthand, 19; English grammar, 12; printing, 11; and Americanization Studies, eight.

William Rylander To Receive Award For Science Exhibit

Wilmer E. Shue, Newark school district superintendent, announced today that William Rylander, a student at Christiana High School, will be presented with the Award of Merit by the Delaware Academy of Medicine at the 17th annual meeting to be held at the Academy in Wilmington this Saturday at 2 p.m.

The award is being presented to Rylander for his biographical science project at the Delaware State Science Fair.

His experiment was to test alkalinity and acidity of gastric juice at specific intervals after eating.

The actual experiment began early one morning when William began to swallow the plastic tubing to reach from mouth to stomach.

This operation took 25 minutes. He then ate his test meal — two cups of tea and two pieces of bread.

William left for school, and with permission of his parents, teachers, and principal, was excused from class every half hour to pump gastric juice from his stomach through the tube.

After 4½ hours of these samplings, this part of the experiment was concluded and Rylander tested the solutions with pH paper.

After determining acidity and alkalinity of the stomach at half-hour intervals, William graphed his findings, mounted a series of photographs showing his experiment, and built a display showing all the things he used for the Science Fair.

"Some of the kids didn't exactly enjoy it, and my mother doesn't want me to do it again," Bill Rylander said.

Mike Brown Scores 2 TD's As Hens Win; Unbeaten Delaware Faces Huskies Next

Coach Dave Nelson's unbeaten, untied University of Delaware football team, one of the best Blue Hen teams in history, meets the winless University of Connecticut squad today at 12:30 p.m. in the first game of the season. The Hens will be heavy favorites for the televised battle.

Nelson's teams have smashed the Huskies in the past two games, winning 34-0 in 1958 and 34-0 last year. The Hens will enter the game riding on a two-year, eight-game winning streak, with 1963 wins over Lehigh, 30-0; Gettysburg, 64-12; Lafayette, 60-0; and Ohio University, 29-12.

Delaware is ranked No. 1 among the nation's small college teams.

Delaware rolled over major college Ohio University last Saturday 29-12, before a homecoming crowd in Athens.

Senior Halfback Mike Brown, 201-pound Wilmingtonian, blasted out 164 yards in 21 carries. Coming out with the play time and time again, he raced seven yards for one touchdown; snared a four-yard pass for another; and caught a two-point conversion pass.

The two-time team rushing leader is now only 21 yards behind his 1962 nine-game rushing total of 433 yards.

Chuck Zolack, 193-pound senior quarterback, called a brilliant game. Directing every offensive play Delaware ran, he completed six of 11 passes for 95 yards and hurled his fifth TD pass of the season, the four-yarder to Brown, and completed the fourth of his four 1963 conversion pass attempts.

The Hens marched 73 yards in 13 plays to score on their first drive as Fullback Mike McCrann, blasted across from the two to give Delaware a touchdown with 6:45 remaining in the first period.

The extra-point kick by John Osborn gave the Hens a 7-0 lead.

The Bobcats drove from their 12-yard line as they began their initial series, moving out to the 37 before Safety Mack Jankie pointed on a fumble by Bobcat Quarterback Wes Danyo. The Hens drove to the Ohio nine-yard line in nine plays, and a fourth-and-nine situation, Os-

born was sent in to attempt a field goal from the 18. But Halfback Joe Shojan, holding for Osborn, scooped up the center snap and raced around left end to score standing up. Delaware's fake field goal play, which has never failed, stunned the opposition for the fourth time in less than three years. Osborn converted and with four seconds left in the first period, Delaware led 14-0.

Ohio scored in the third period on a 16-play, 64-yard drive culminated by a three-point plunge.

A Delaware series immediately thereafter stretched into the early fourth quarter and ultimately resulted in an important TD. The drive opened on the Delaware 23, and the Hens battled to the 34, but a fourth-and-eight situation forced a real field goal attempt by Osborn from the 32. The boot was off the left.

Ohio moved out to their own 30, but a Darvo pass was picked off by Halfback the Bobcat 44; Ist-nick returned it to the 34 and later-est to Shojan, who took it into the 17. The theft was Ist-nick's fourth in four games.

Brown played through left guard for seven yards. Delaware was sent back to the O-U 12 on a backfield-in-motion penalty, but Brown, going outside now, got back the five yards by sweeping right end. On the next play, he snapped through the middle of the Ohio defense for seven yards and Delaware's third TD. With 13:11 left in the period, Zolack hit Brown on a neat flip for the two-point conversion, and Delaware led 22-6.

Danyo's passing brought Ohio from its 47 to the Hen 13, and Danyo, who completed 12 of 19 passes for 183 yards, found Albert in the end zone — and the Bobcats were back in the ball game 22-12 with 6:17 left. The conversion pass attempt failed.

In the key series of the game, Delaware not only ran the clock out but managed to score a fourth touchdown.

Delaware drove from its own 23 through five first downs to the Ohio four, and with two seconds left, Zolack found Brown all alone in the end zone on a four-yard TD loss — Brown's eighth touchdown in four games.

Osborn converted, and Delaware won 29-12.

Turnberger Rates Hoffman's Jackets As Title Contender

Bob Turnberger, head football coach for the new Christiana High School Vikings, addressed the Newark Touchdown Club luncheon meeting last Monday at the Colony Inn.

"The nicest group of boys I've ever coached," Turnberger said of his Viking gridders. "Too nice, maybe, for football players," the veteran but young coach added wistfully, recalling the Vikings' 6-3 record, with losses to Brandywine, Conrad, and Mt. Pleasant.

Of three lettermen reporting to Christiana with the high school district division, End Doug Hunt has been out of action for the past three weeks with a knee injury; Guard Bob Hackney has been playing despite a cracked rib; and only Art Durham has remained sound.

"If anything happens to our quarterback, Ken Eggleston," Turnberger frowned, "we'll just have to kick the ball and play a defensive game."

Volunteering for just one play for the Vikings, Touchdown Club member Al Priestley's offer was promptly accepted by Turnberger with "You're a field goal from the 50-yard line."
