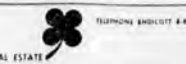

VOTER'S CHOICE

Approval of the two issues at stake in the referendum conducted in the Newark special school district this week—with polls to be established at all eight elementary buildings and at the high school, between 2 and 9 p.m.—is an overall school tax increase of 20 cents for \$100 of total property assessment. A taxpayer whose property is assessed at \$5,000 will pay an additional \$10 increase from \$43 to \$53 annually.

Rejection of the proposed tax increase will present additional problems for providing adequate educational facilities in the Newark district.

School administrators are asking for a 15 cent increase from 40 to 55 cents—in the tax rate for current year to attract and retain quality teachers in a competitive and to raise Newark's supervisory staff standards to state level.

They are seeking a 4.5 cent increase—from 45 cents to 49.5 cents—in the tax rate for bonded indebtedness with construction of a new elementary and a new junior high school to meet projected enrollment requirements. Payment of this requested tax increase is to be applied to payment of the proposed \$160,000 bond issue, and will be used for retirement of existing bonds.

According to state law, the Newark Free Library will be an additional half-cent—an increase from the current rate.

Can we approve both, one, or neither of these proposals by exercising our All-American privilege of vote?

Me vote for a 20 cent raise in my tax rate? Think of it as a nut or something? Many may well ask.

Then on the other hand, what will we do in the next year for enough good teachers and administrators, and to accommodate increasing pupil enrollment.

School authorities are asking for approval of this increase because they believe the extra money must be used to continue to provide reasonable quality standards in the Newark district.

Our strategists and shock troops on the firing line battle to obtain and maintain quality public school education, our school administrators most of all, would prefer the present tax rate. They have asked for an increase in this tax rate, and this editor, waiving use of the "we" in this instance, has confidence and faith in the judgment and integrity of Newark's school administration.

A major increase in the budget is proposed for paying for up to five years out-of-district teaching experience, heretofore not included in the local salary scale. School officials report that the local district has lost nine teachers because of more attractive salaries in other districts.

Newark has had to employ some 70 new teachers each year with personnel turnover and increasing school enrollment.

The proposed budget also calls for enlarging the planning and supervisory staff. Recent studies disclosed that Newark is below both Delaware and national averages in the ratio of administrative staff to pupils.

Fred Mitchell and a Newark companion who spent one entire day trolling under the expert guidance of Captain Walter Reis and his wife Thelma as first mate aboard the "Tern" out of Haulover Inlet, from the green water offshore of Miami Beach, through the deep purple of the Gulf Stream almost to Bimini and back, will concur that hooking a sail by any means is a rare experience.

But hooking a sailfish on an artificial lure at the moment of impact as the sail taps the bait with its bill, is almost unheard of. Normally, sailfish are caught by trolling a whole ballyhoo or mullet, or fish fillet, and when the sail strikes, the reel is free-spooled, permitting the bait to stop and slowly sink for some slow, subsequent swallowing by the quarry.

Judging by the quality and quantity of nominations for this weekend's version, another real thriller is in prospect. Just a few of the well known campaigners that may have to be reckoned with are Admiral's Voyage, Sunrise County, Cyane, Dedimoud, Molelet, Green Hornet, Siduck, Prego, Green Tick, et, Daddy R., Rebellious, Rainy

Lake, Stinson, Bismarck, et, et, et.

An interesting aspect of the racing is that the 25th running of the Kent is the 25th running of the Delaware Park's major stakes for three-year-olds.

At Washington, Park's feature is the Arlington Stakes, a mile-and-a-half.

With so many quality Derby-aged three-year-olds in the picture, the picture has changed, by almost weekly increments.

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Outdoor Barbecue Suggestions Cited For Man Of House

As summertime arrives, a man's thoughts just naturally turn to outdoor activities. Gardening, the lawn mower, golf, and just tag are high on the list. Another summer favorite is the backyard barbecue.

The same man who can't light the rear burner on his wife's kitchen range is often a master of outdoor cookery. And in some cases, his enthusiasm for the smell of charcoal and barbecued chicken exceeds his ability in the outdoor culinary arts.

Katharine Jones, New Castle County home demonstration agent, offers these tips for the beginner.

Well-done is the secret word for good barbecued chicken. Cook it about an hour.

You'll need broilers or fryers split in half. The size can be your pleasure, but a sixteen-ounce half is very good for a single serving.

If you want to use a backyard barbecue grill, simply raise the grill as high as possible above the fire. Then lay about eight briquettes per half of chicken in the pan. When the charcoal is well started, lay the halves of chicken on the grill and turn them about once every two minutes until the leg bone turns easily. A pair of tongs can be used for this.
