Increase Of 21% In State Appropriation For 1961-62 Operations Sought By U. D.

The University of Delaware is asking for a 21 per cent increase in state appropriations for operations in 1961-62, President John A. Perkins said today.

Perkins said that the university's budget for 1961-62 is \$10,000,000, an increase of \$2,100,000 over the 1960-61 budget of \$7,900,000.

The increase is needed, Perkins said, to pay for the additional staff and more adequately pay those already on the payroll, including teaching and maintenance personnel.

Perkins said that the bulk of the increase is to meet added day-to-day operations and to bring the university's budget to a better standard, Dr. Perkins said.

Perkins also points out that the university's long-range plan calls for a number of capital improvements which must be completed by 1965 and for which funds are required. Among the facilities are a new library, a new chemical engineering building, and another dormitory building similar to Harrington Hall, under construction on the east campus. Other buildings must be renovated and refurbished, and electric and heating control systems will have to be extended.

Layoff To Follow Holiday Shutdown At Chrysler Plant

Newark Assembly Plant
To Lay Off 1,500 After
Dec. 23-Jan. 8 Shutdown

A holiday shutdown of Chrysler Corporation's assembly plant at Newark from Dec. 23-Jan. 8 will end with a layoff of about 1,500 workers.

James G. Shepherd, plant manager, said the holiday is necessary to "balance production with field inventories."

Nationally, the holiday affects all but 4,400 of the company's 23,500 workers.

Shepherd said that the two-shift operation will become one-shift on Jan. 9, reducing the plant's 4,400 employees to about 2,900.

A spokesman for the plant union, Local 1883, United Auto Workers, said the night shift—4:30 p.m. to 12:30 a.m.—would be entirely eliminated after the reopening.

Mr. Shepherd said some of the 3,400 hourly paid workers would remain for maintenance duties, along with about 1,000 salaried and office personnel.

National Fibre Acquires Georgia Plant Of Fisher Manufacturing For \$350,000

National Vulcanized Fibre Company has acquired the Fisher Manufacturing Company of Hartwell, Ga., for \$350,000 in an exchange of stock.

Fisher is a major supplier of metal, vulcanized fibre, fiberglass, and fibre-reinforced materials-handling receptacles for the southern textile industry.

Details of the merger are expected to be concluded before the end of the year. Terms of the purchase agreement, approved by the board of directors of each company, call for an exchange of 17,000 shares of National Fibre stock for the total of 1,000 shares of Fisher stock issued and outstanding.

Fisher manufacturing was founded in 1946 as a partnership. It is jointly owned by J. Glenn Fisher, president and chairman, James N. Fisher, vice-president for plant operations, and Robert M. Matthews, Jr., vice-president for costs and design.

I, as a taxpayer, am deeply grateful to them for handling this emergency as they have done.

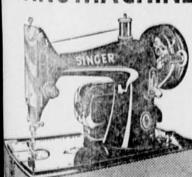

PUBLIC NOTICE TO RESIDENTS OF NEWARK

All Citizens are requested to reduce the danger of slippery pavements by complying with the following section of a City Ordinance:

Section 5. Removal of Obstructions, Snow and Ice from Sidewalks. The tenant or occupant of every building or lot within the City of Newark, or when the same is not tenanted or occupied, the owner, claimant, agent or person having it in charge, shall keep the sidewalk abutting such property free from all obstructions, and in the falling of any snow or the formation of any ice thereon, shall have such snow and/or ice removed within six (6) hours from the time of its ceasing to fall or to be formed, except that when such snow ceases to fall or such ice to be formed between the setting and rising of the sun, such snow and/or ice shall be removed by the following noon. Any tenant, occupant, owner, claimant, agent or person in charge violating any of the provisions of this section shall, upon conviction thereof, be sentenced to pay a fine of five dollars (\$5.00) and costs for each and every offense. Provided: no snow or ice removed from any sidewalk shall be placed in the gutter. Provided further: whenever, according to this section, any sidewalk would have to be cleaned on Sunday, the same may be cleaned instead within six (6) hours after sunrise on the following day.

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

Common sense precautions on safety can help make Christmas a time of joy and good rather than a time of needless injury, the Delaware Safety Council declared yesterday.
H. Tyler McConnell, council president, suggested some precautions to be taken in the use of Christmas trees and lights.
Store the tree in a cold place ready to set it up; then erect away from radiators and other sources of heat. Never place it so it will block an exit.
Make a fresh cut diagonally in trunk at least one inch above signal cut and keep the base water-filled container all during holidays. Don't try to fireproof the wiring of all tree for defects and loose sockets and overloading circuits with added illumination.

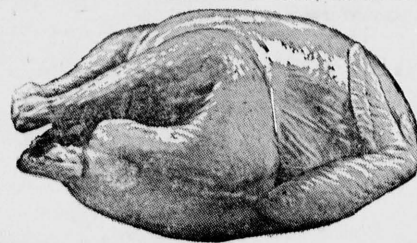

Delaware Food Market Report

Holiday prices on festive foods are definitely in effect. That difficult decision on what to eat between now and Christmas dinner is eased by sales on fresh pork roasts, cured hams, sausage, bacon, chickens and some beef, such as roasts (rib, round and chuck), and a few steaks.

The recent blizzard complicates the forecast of what fresh fish will be abundant in the next few days

and weeks. Fish affected are those from cold waters of the North such as cod, butterfish, flounder and porgies. Other seasonal fish which come from warm southern waters are in good supply. These are bluefish, red snappers, and Spanish mackerel. You also can find plenty of frozen halibut, salmon and swordfish.

Check the fish counter for some fairly good buys of shrimp, crabmeat and soft or hard clams.

Prices are edging up on fresh vegetables, and this may send many a budget-minded shopper to the canned good shelves. Fresh broccoli picked up the five to seven cents lost last week and is now averaging 38 cents a bunch.

Other vegetables which are in price are cauliflower, cabbage, peppers, green beans and carrots.

Apples, cranberries, and fruit continue as abundant.

Check special sales for bananas, grapes, coconuts, oranges and pines.
