A holiday shutdown of Chrysler Corporation's assembly plant at Newark from Dec. 23-Jan. 8 will end with a layoff of about 1,500 work-

James G. Shepherd, plant man-ager, said the holiday is necessary to "balance production with field inventories."

Shepherd said that the two-shift operation will become one-shift on Jan. 9, reducing the plant's 4,400 employes to about 2,900.

Mr. Shepherd said some of the 3,400 hourly paid workers would remain for maintenance duties, along with about 1,000 salaried and office personnel.
