

Newark Council looks at rate adjustments

The Newark City Council agreed to move forward with a plan for dealing with electric rate adjustments related to demand.

Now known as the revenue stabilization adjustment, (RSA), the provision allows the city to pass along higher peak power rates that can occur in the summer, but can also be affected by economic activity that reduces or increases electrical consumption.

In a report to the council, city Finance Director Dennis McFarland said Newark needs to set the adjustment to reflect wholesale electric rates under the new structure. The rate was set to zero with the change in the electric rate structure.

McFarland told the council the city has to determine when and how to assess the adjustment in an effort to minimize under and over-collection of utility rates.

McFarland also said wholesale electric rates from the Delaware Municipal Electric Corp. (DEMAC) are expected to decline in the next couple of years, although prices can spike if the DEMAC has to buy power on the spot market, usually when temperatures soar.

The stabilization provision has made electric customers nervous, given past volatility of electrical rates.

City staff has recommended the most recent over-collection in 2010, which totaled \$314,000, should be used to reduce the rate adjustment, rather than remain in a surplus account. The \$314,000 refund would amount to about \$7 per customer.

McFarland said he would prefer resetting the RSA once a year. The city would have still the power to make emergency changes. The changes are expected to result in

Vehicle stripped of tires, rims at auto shop

Representatives of Nucar, at 250 East Cleveland Avenue, reported that a 2004 Buick Le Sabre, belonging to an 84 year-old New Castle man, had had three of its tires and rims removed by an unknown suspect. The car was parked near the repair area of the dealer-ship.

The initial report was made by a security guard at the site who stated that he had seen the vehicle as he was making his rounds.

An inspection by police showed that the car was resting on cinder blocks and that all of the tires and rims, with the exception of the front passenger side wheel, had been removed. Fresh marks in the dirt by the wheel showed that it had been attempted to be removed. Attempts at fingerprinting the wheel and surrounding area were met with negative results. The car showed no signs of having been entered.

A video surveillance sys-

tem is being checked to see if there is footage of the theft.

Used car stolen from Toyota World lot

Police are investigating the theft of a 2000 Jeep Wrangler that was taken from Newark Toyota World's parking lot, located at 1344 Marrows Road, last week.

Employees with the dealership told officers that the vehicle was seen on the lot at closing on the previous night, but shards of broken glass were found in the same spot the next morning. The dealership also verified that no employees had moved the car.

Several video cameras were in operation during the time frame, including one that faces the exit gate. Authorities are reviewing the footage to draw up a suspect description. The vehicle is described as a dark blue 2000 Jeep Wrangler with 35 inch tires on black rims, a black roll cage, and having a hard top with a crack above the driver's side door. The vehicle is valued at \$9,000.

Four youths suspected of damaging parked vehicles

Newark Police have charged four New Castle

County males with multiple counts of criminal mischief in connection with reports of broken vehicle windows in the vicinity of Panorama Drive, last Saturday.

A resident of Panorama Drive first reported that their car window had been broken. Officers arrived and began to check the area for suspects. A couple nearby stated that a dark car containing several males had stopped and asked if they needed any assistance. The couple said they didn't and the car left the area. As the interview was going on, a dark colored sedan was speeding through the neighborhood with its lights off. The car continued past the officer and went through the stop sign at the intersection Panorama Drive and Church Road without slowing.

Another officer in the area found the offending vehicle, a black BMW sedan with dealer plates, parked in the driveway of a residence on Woodsman Drive, a short distance away from Panorama Drive. Tire marks on the lawn showed that the car had been travelling at a high rate of speed before turning into the driveway.

Police converged on the car and found four males inside, who were feigning sleep. Each suspect was removed from the car individually, handcuffed, and frisked for weapons. A search of the car revealed a BB gun made to look like a replica hand gun in the front passenger side map pocket. The driver stated that the car belongs to a dealership owned by his mother. A trace of alcohol was detected on the driver's breath, whereby he was charged with DUI, after taking a portable breath test. The driver is under 21 years of age.

and discovered that three other
vehicles had also been damaged by rocks and bricks being

The suspects were transported to police headquarters for questioning, but their statements did not divulge any information of the incidents. Only one of the suspects admitted to actually throwing a projectile at a vehicle, though witness statements show that more than one committed the

Police believe that all four of the youths acted in concert to damage the four vehicles in question and elude capture. Being minors, three of the suspects were released to their parents. All were charged with Conspiracy Third Degree, Resisting Arrest, Criminal Trespass Third Degree, and Criminal Mischief Under \$1,000 Damage Property.

Carjacking south of Newark

New Castle County Police are investigating a carjacking late Saturday night at the Iron Hill apartment complex off Old Baltimore Pike and south of Newark.

At 10:56 p.m., County Police were called to the complex and were told by the 25-year-old male victim that he had been robbed by three masked men at gunpoint. His vehicle was stolen.

Officers said the victim had been sitting in his vehicle, while in the complex when he was approached by three men, one of whom was armed with a handgun. The suspects rifled through the victim's pockets and removed some property including money. The victim was then forced from his car and the men fled the area with the victim's vehicle.

A short time later, a citizen contacted the New Castle County Police to report a suspicious vehicle in the unit block of Split Rail Lane, near Newark. The information provided matched the description of the stolen vehicle. Officers were able to locate and recover the victim's vehicle.

The suspects are described as three black males, between 18 and 25 years of age, 6 feet tall, 170 pounds, wearing dark clothing and with average builds

been expanding in recent years and recently announced the addition of canine teams. The department is now headed by a former top official of the Delaware State Police. Also, under President Patrick Harker, officers carry firearms, a change from the past.

During previous budget discussions, city council members had talked about the expansion of the UD department and how that could affect staffing at the city department. However, as the budget situation has improved, no further public discussions have taken

Mayor Vance Funk has long suggested joint patrols between the two departments. Statements on the situation carried a cautious tone.

UD spokesperson Meredith Chapman released the follow-

"The University of Delaware is continually strengthening its relationship with the City of Newark through various initiatives, such as UD's Community Policing Program. UD strives to educate its student body beyond the classroom by fostering positive interaction among students, staff, community members and law enforcement officials," she stated.

"UD is working to facilitate discussions with the City about the joint jurisdiction of the University's police unit and the Newark Police Department. While conversations are still ongoing, it has not moved to the proposal phase yet. More discussions are expected to take place before the University would present a formal proposal to the public," Chapman concluded.

Newark Police spokesman Gerald Bryda issued the following: "At this time the Newark Police Department has not received a formal proposal from UDPD, so we would be unable to comment on the proposal. The Newark Police Department welcomes the assistance of the University in educating their students on how to behave when living off-campus. The Newark Police Department plans on retaining our jurisdiction over the City of Newark."

accounting changes and the council agreed to hold a meeting this summer with the city's accountant to come up with recommendation.

Newark's power supplier, DEMAC operates a peak-power natural gas-fired plant in Smyrna. Newark owned a 47 percent interest in DEMAC and the plant as of 2010.

Newly elected Councilman Mark Morehead asked why the city could not get a fixed rate for electricity. McFarland said DEMAC cannot buy electricity in that quantity and instead has a number of contracts with suppliers that run for various time periods. In very hot weather, the municipal utility supplier has to buy on the spot market at higher prices, but also faces constraints from electric lines that have not kept up with demand.

Delmarva Power also has contracts that expire at various times that attempt to avoid the nearly 70 percent rate spike that occurred several years ago when a cap on rates expired. The cap was part of the agreement that was part of the merger of Delmarva and Pepco Holdings.

Councilman David Athey suggested a workshop to discuss utility rates and property taxes, with the goal of holding the meeting in late July. Council members informally agreed to move toward that

When the council approved the overhaul of the city's electric rate structure, it came under criticism from members of the public for not doing enough to educate the public on the changes, which included a lower rate for the University of Delaware and a fixed monthly charge.

The council also approved a report from the Planning Department recommending against the use of the old Curtis Paper site as a parking lot for employees working downtown

The proposal, made by Ryan German, owner of Caffe Gelato on Main Street, raised a number of red flags, including the possibility of flash floods in the area and security issues The site is also slated for recreational uses and the city did not want to affect those plans.

One suggestion coming out of the discussion of parking was to approach owners of the College Square Shopping Center to see whether downtown employees could park at that location. The shopping center has a sizable vacancy rate and also has a large parking area that is not near any of the city's financial picture its stores.

Enliven your garden with annuals

"Frost-free" has never felt so good! The "frost-free date" is the date after which we typically do not have to worry about cold temperatures and frost endangering the tender plantings in our gardens. In Newark this date (on or around Mother's Day) has passed and gardeners have started planting their gardens. They have

liberated their over-wintered tender plants and started to enliven their garden design with newly planted perennials and a wide variety of annuals. Classic annuals include petunias, impatiens, and marigolds, but there is a large assortment of annuals available at your local garden center.

An annual plant is a plant that usually germinates, flowers, and then dies in one year. By using annual plants in your garden design, amongst other

things, a gardener can extend their growing season and provide color and variety to their garden.

In the garden, annuals allow the gardener to extend their growing season. The early blooms of pansies, snapdragons and other cool weather annuals are a pleasing comple-ment to spring flowering bulbs and early blooming perennials. The lasting effect of annual mums, grasses, and pansies steer us well into the winter

Annuals add color. The color of annuals might be soothing or it may contribute a much-needed punch of color to your garden. The hot red color of ornamental pepper, deep purple color of salvia, and the bright yellow and blazing orange colors of celosia, black-eyed Susan, and marigold make a visually stimulating impact. The cool, soothing tones of sweet alyssum, cosmos, and begonia have an equally pleasing effect, but one

that is calming.

Annuals diversify your garden. Sprawling annuals such as fairy fan flower spread through the garden and fill in empty spaces. Other annuals such as cigar plant, Mexican sunflower, and zinnia attract butterflies and birds to the garden. Annuals often grow in difficult cultural conditions. Finally, annuals help to create incredible containers for placement on your patio, front porch, or placed throughout the garden.

Artesian seeks rate hike as earnings drop

Artesian Resources Corp., now seeking a rate increase in Delaware, reported sharply lower earnings in the first quarter. The water, wastewater and engineering services company announced that revenues for the first quarter of 2011 were \$14.8 million.

Artesian has operations in Cecil County, Md., but gets most of its revenues from a water utility in northern New Castle county. Artesian is based near Newark.

Net income for the first quarter of 2011 was \$1 million, a 38.6 percent decrease from the first quarter of 2010.

Water sales, which accounted for 87.5 percent of revenues in the first quarter of 2011, increased by 0.2 percent, or \$21,000, when compared to the first quarter of 2010.

Non-utility dropped by \$375,000 from the first quarter of 2010 to \$1.1 million due to the completion of a design and permitting project for the Town of Middletown.


"Our water revenue was flat and our non-utility revenue dropped sharply while our expenses continued to climb because of higher gas prices as well as increased chemical and maintenance costs," said CEO Dian C. Taylor.

Artesian, which as its name indicates, gets much of its water from wells rather than surface supplies, has among the highest water rates in Delaware. Despite recent rate increases, Newark's city water rates are well below those of Artesian.

Artesian has stressed conservation efforts, but also takes a financial hit when water consumption drops. Utility operating expenses grew by 9.6 percent as compared to the first quarter of 2010, driven by an increase in water treatment equipment maintenance and payroll and employee benefit costs. Property and other taxes also increased by 5.6 percent as compared to the first quarter of 2010. Overall, operating expenses for the first quarter of 2011 increased by 7.3 percent to \$10 million for the quarter ended March 31, 2011, as compared to \$9.3 million for the same period in 2010.

Artesian has filed a request with the Delaware Public Service Commission to raise rates by nearly \$11 million.





Letter to the Editor ...

I've just read the electric rate restructure and the news on Newark Post. I understand the concerns and the purposes for this restructure, but I don't see it as a way to "encourage energy conservation among all class customers," "be fair and reasonable to all classes of customers" as it said in the notice.

According to the study in the attachment of the original notice, the user in the lowest rate class will have an 8.6 percent increase in the bill while the higher the rate class, the more electricity used, the less they would be affected and they may even have their bill decline. I don't think it's meant to be fair to all classes of customers.

I've been quite active in

saving energy, so my usage of electricity seldom runs above 250kwh (The first rate class limit). The conclusion is simple: The more electricity I use, the less I will be influenced! And I could be possibly influenced as much as 33 percent on my bill. I really can't see the incentive to save energy or any encouragement for energy conservation as promoted in the notice.

It's really disappointing and upseting to see the new structure, not because it will affect my bill, but because it selectively takes money from the back pockets of residents who try every means to save it and feeds it to the deep pockets of the bigger users.

I really look forward to further coverage of it from Newark Post as it's the primary media in Newark.And I hope it could echo the concerns of the residents.

The limits of a grand vision for UD

Under President Patrick Harker, the University of Delaware has come up with a sweeping vision of its future that includes redevelopment of the Chrysler site, an engineering building second to none and perhaps even a health sciences or medical school.

Harker also wants UD to become a global institution, knowing that education can be valuable export industry.

On Tuesday we saw the limits of that vision when Harker admitted to the Board of Trustees that a law school would present too much of a fund-raising challenge and a drain on resources.

As a result, the project that by some estimates would run \$100 million, will be shelved. While it might be revived, don't hold your breath.

Early speculation that the digital world, minus those hefty books, would allow UD to build a law school at a relatively modest price turned into

the reality of attracting topnotch professors and students that would rise to the quality of Delaware's world class legal system and its world-renowned Chancery Court.

Doing much less would simply give UD another school that would compete for limited resources in an increasingly competitive environment for higher education.

Prior to the law school decision, there had been signs that Harker's ambitions for UD had their limits.

The university is now constructing a building at the Carpenter complex that will provide top notch fitness facilities for non-athletes.

In the battle to attract topnotch students, such amenities become necessities and a new football stadium, while not suffering the fate of the law school, may be on the back burner. After all, sellouts are not automatic, even under current coach K.C. Keeler. An engineer by training and perhaps temperament, Harker is well aware of limitations. In this case, rather than kicking the proverbial can down the road and hoping for a better economy or some huge dona-

tion, he saw the need to sharpen the university's focus.

At first blush, it looks like a very wise decision.

In early fall 2005, Marinis Brothers, certified bridge painters, sandblasted and primed the bridge working at night. At the end of October, the subcontractor, Wish Painting and Sculpture, began painting the design on the newly prepared bridge surface in the daytime. The bridge panels were completed by mid-December. Law school put on hold at UD; Apple Store coming

A decision not to go forward with a new law school, a report showing the need for more work on diversity issues, and news that technology giant Apple will be part of the new bookstore highlighted Tuesday's meeting of the University of Delaware Board of Trustees.

UD President Patrick Harker's year-end review centered on a re-accreditation report recently released by the Middle States Commission on Higher Education which determined that the university met requirements within 14

standards, including quality of education, research quality, responsibility in budgeting, and economic development.

The process for re-accreditation was started two years ago when the school initiated a self-study. UD will be reaccredited in late June.

Though the report gave high grades to UD in all facets, the commission did state that the institution needs to improve diversity among faculty, students, and staff.

A quote from the findings said, "With few exceptions, the University trails its peers in every measure of diversity in every constituency of the institution."

In his address to the Board,

Harker stated, "We have to change that. Because I can say with certainty that we will never achieve what I know we can until we guarantee that UD is a welcoming campus to all, and that every member of this community can fully and actively contribute to our mission.'

"We need to improve the graduation rates of underrepresented minority students, especially African American students, and help our growing number of international students acclimate to life at UD," he added

Harker continued by saying that he received several recommendations from the Diversity and Equity Commission and

that he looks forward to implementing them.

The president's address also touched on the proposed law school. Harker stated that in November of last year trustees authorized drafts of a feasibility study and a business plan. The largest determining factors were the contribution that such a school would have in the community and the cost. Harker said, "And so, while

I acknowledge the benefits to be gained by a UD law school - benefits that the last several months of analysis have illuminated, I have proposed to the Board that we terminate further active consideration of this initiative."

Harker concluded by say-

ing, "There is the possibility that we could reconsider a law school at some future date, but only if its establishment can be achieved without displacing existing University priorities.'

Other highlights of the Board's meeting included:

· Announcement that he bookstore on Main Street will open on August 30. Apple will open a retail area within the bookstore.

· Several additional building projects were reported to be under way: upgrades to the East Campus Utility Plant, renovations and additions to the Bob Carpenter Center, construction of the Interdisciplinary Science and Engineering Laboratory on

Academy Street, and demolition of the former Chrysler site, to be called the Science and Technology Campus.

· Approval was given to other projects, which include the East Campus Housing project, renovations to the Carpenter Sports Building, and an animal care facility. These projects are expected to be completed in 2012 and 2013.

. The incoming fall freshmen class, named the Class of 2015, is reported be the largest and most academically accomplished in the history of the school. The class will consist of 3,880 students from 34 states, the District of Columbia, and 18 foreign countries.

For the second consecutive season the University of Delaware men's lacrosse team gathered around the television and waited for the announcement of not if, but when, they would play in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. However, the gathering at Buffalo Wild Wings on Elkton Road Sunday night was one the Hens would have never imagined was going to happen as recently as a week ago.

But as the saying goes, what a difference a week makes. It was in Amherst, Mass., on April 29 that the Blue Hens lost an opportunity for homefield advantage in the Colonial Athletic Association tournament following an 11-5 setback to No. 19 University of Massachusetts. "I am so proud of this team," said Delaware head coach Bob Shillinglaw, who led the Hens to their 23rd conference title overall. "We are so excited to get this [CAA championship game] win. We were behind the eight-ball a little last week after losing our second straight game and not getting the home-field advantage, but our guys worked hard and gutted it out. We beat two great teams on the road."

Delaware (11-6) will go back on the road to face No. 5 Duke (12-5) in Durham on Saturday at 5 p.m. in the first round of the NCAA Tournament.

"We are excited," said Shillinglaw, who will be aiming for his 300th-career win. "Duke is the defending national

champion so obviously they have some great personnel. This will be a good matchup for us because both teams have similar styles. We both will push the ball and like to score in transition. It could be an up and down game. Both of us have played well in spurts this season so anything can happen."

Delaware or Duke will advance to face the Notre Dame-Penn winner in the quarterfinals May 22 at Gillette Stadium in Foxborough, Mass.




