## Shuttered Rodney dorms a valuable practice site for police

With its cinderblock walls, narrow jagged hallways and small rooms, the University of Delaware's Rodney Complex resembles a prison, many students often said.

Now, on many days, the shuttered

dorms look like an active crime scene as SWAT teams and other police units from around the state use it for training.

"Whenever a building gets shut down, we look at it as an opportunity to do some training," UD Police Chief Patrick Ogden said. "It's best to do training in a real-life environment."

Rodney in particular is valuable because it offers a variety of hallway layouts, staircases and different-sized rooms for the officers to practice in. Ogden said it's important for officers to be accustomed to operating in a

## Aetna mourns firefighter

Aetna Hose, Hook and Ladder Co. is mourning one of its own, a veteran firefighter who was one of two who died while battling a blaze in Wilmington on Saturday.

Colleagues and friends described Jerry Fickes, 51, as a quiet but hardworking firefighter who was always the first one into the fire and wasn't afraid to get dirty.

"The fire service in this community just lost a real good guy," said Dave Weyl, a longtime Aetna firefighter.

Fickes, 51, and Lt. Christopher Leach, 41, died Saturday morning while battling a house fire in the Canby Park neighborhood

# Main Street Cosi closes as chain files bankruptcy

The Cosi sandwich shop on Main Street closed this week as the company filed for bankruptcy.

"We truly appreciate your patronage and we apologize for any inconvenience," a sign posted on the door read Tuesday. Chairs were stacked atop tables inside the eatery, and the furniture was gone from the outdoor patio.

The Boston-based chain, which specializes in sandwiches and pizzas on freshly-baked flatbread, opened the location at 111 E Main St. in 2008. It was one of two restaurants lo-

cated on the ground floor of the Washington House condominium building.

On Wednesday, the company filed a Chapter 11 petition in United States Bankruptcy Court for the District of Massachusetts, attempting to reorganize and sell the business.

In a press release, company officials stated that 29 of its 74 company-owned restaurants were closed, but the 31 franchised locations are unaffected.

"This was a difficult step, but it was necessary to address our liquidity issues," Patrick Bennett, Sr., interim CEO, said in a statement. "Cosi's core business and franchise base remain intact, and we filed with the

liquidity resources necessary to carry out the restructuring plan. We believe this process will allow the company to right-size its balance sheet, reduce its debt, and focus on improving the business and stabilizing the brand."

The bankruptcy comes as the chain copes with sagging sales numbers. Last month, it fired its CEO and hired a consulting firm that specializes in turning around struggling businesses.

Even before the bankruptcy, the Newark location gradually had been scaling back its hours of operations, especially during breaks in the University of Delaware schedule.

For more than a year, the

Washington House building was surrounded by scaffolding that was part of a project to fix structural issues and repair the crumbling façade. Cosi employees said at the time that the scaffolding was affecting business because customers weren't sure if the eatery remained open during construction. The scaffolding was removed this summer.

Each commercial tenant had to contribute approximately \$300,000 toward the cost of the renovation project. Condo owners are each on the hook for \$100,000, though the condo association is engaged in a lawsuit against the builder in an attempt to recoup the costs.

## Council approves plan to convert Annabelle Street house into apartments

On Monday night, city council gave a homeowner the go-ahead to divide his house on Annabelle Street into four apartments that he plans to rent out to tenants.

The board agreed to amend the Comprehensive Development Plan, issue a special-use permit and approve the subdivision at 6

Annabelle Street by a vote of 4 to 1. Council members Jen Wallace and Mark Morehead were absent.

Owner James Watts explained to council that 6 Annabelle Street is his childhood home, but he no longer has a use for it as a single-family residence. He said the house has been vacant since his father died a few years ago and he now wants to turn it into four

apartments.

"When my father was alive, he wanted to do this and for some reason he always seemed to delay," Watts said. "The house means a lot to my family."

The house is zoned RM, which allows for the conversion with a special-use permit granted by council. Watts also needs a comprehensive plan amendment to go from single-family resi-

dential (medium density) to multi-family (medium to high density) in order to account for the additional tenants.

Last month, the planning commission voted unanimously to recommend city council approve the project and also deed restrict the entire house to no more than 14 unrelated tenants.

The Board of Adjustment also approved variances for

the minimum lot area and gross floor area per apartment. Newark code requires there to be at least 16,000 square feet for four apartments, but Watts' house only has 13,068 square feet. Gross floor area also has to be at least 1,000 square feet per apartment, however, two of the proposed units have 855 square feet and 778 square feet.

Councilman Stu Markham

was the only council member who voted against the plan Monday night.

"I believe with all the issues we have with rentals and the actions going on on Cleveland Avenue that this will have a negative impact on nearby and adjacent properties," he said.

The proposal passed 4 to 1, meaning Watts can now start renovation work on the home.

# Despite public outcry, council approves senior condos

Neighbors living near the site of a plan to build 37 senior condominiums off Valley Road are upset about the increased traffic and claim they weren't involved in the development process, but they weren't able to convince city council to reject the project Monday night.

The board unanimously voted to annex into Newark the 16.4 acres of land where builder Dan Kandra plans to construct the new neighborhood — called Briarcreek North — and agreed to let him move forward with construction, albeit with a set of conditions.

Councilmembers Jen Wallace and Mark Morehead were absent from the meeting.

On Monday night, Alan Hill of Hillcrest Associates, a Pennsylvania-based architecture and engineering firm, presented the project to council on behalf of the Kandra Group. He said Kandra plans to build at 0 Valley Road and 308, 309, 310 and 311 Mason Drive, across the street from his existing Briarcreek development, and wants that land annexed into the city of Newark and rezoned to RS (single-family detached residential).

The 37 homes will be built in groups of three and four

in the same style of Briarcreek. Buyers must be 55 or older, and no more than two unrelated tenants are allowed per unit, just like in Briarcreek.

In August, the planning commission unanimously voted in favor of the annexation and rezoning, but narrowly approved the project as a whole, 3 to 2.

Hill said Monday that Briarcreek North will have a density of 2.26 units per acre, which fits within the city's comprehensive plan for the area and noted that the closest neighbor will be 92 feet away from the new development.

However, several residents living in the Christine Manor neighborhood, which lies just north of the property in unincorporated New Castle County, felt that was a little too close for comfort.

Marilyn Woodman said her home is 97 feet from the edge of Briarcreek North and although Kandra promised to plant bushes and maintain a treeline between the two neighborhoods, it will take years for those to fill in.

Woodman also said the existing Briarcreek community "sticks out like a sore thumb" and called the plan for Briarcreek North "sloppy."

"I have no objections to development, but I'd like

to see that development reflect the character of the surrounding community," she said.

Karen Hurley-Heyman, also a Christine Manor resident, fears that increased traffic from the new neighborhood will eventually cause the Delaware Department of Transportation to widen Valley Road, meaning residents there will lose several feet of their land and their homes will be closer to the roadway.

She described Valley Road as a nice, country road where people walk and jog with baby strollers, but if Briarcreek North is developed, she said, it will become too dangerous to do so.

"Don't tell me that my quality of life is not going to be affected by this development," Hurley-Heyman said.

She told council she didn't know about Kandra's plans until recently and claimed the sign posted on the property was too hard to read. She urged the board to think about the neighbors being affected.

"It's really devastating to some of us, to many of us," she said.

County Councilwoman Lisa Diller, whose district encompasses the site, was upset Kandra didn't reach out to Christine Manor residents prior to presenting

his project to the city.

"I would have been happy as a county councilperson to set up a meeting with the developer and with these people if anybody had asked," she said. "The only reason I found out the annexation was occurring was because I got an email from a constituent."

She said neighbors were "shut out" of the discussion and suggested council send the project back to the planning department in order to get answers to the residents' questions and address their concerns.

Planning Director Maureen Feeney Roser explained that letters were sent in July to residents in Maryland and Delaware who live within 300 feet of the property.

"There was a real good attempt to reach out," she said.

But that wasn't enough for Christine Manor resident Micheal Heyman, who echoed Diller's frustrations with the process and urged council to revert back to planning commission to give neighbors more time to research the project and consider hiring their own lawyer.

"This wasn't a fair fight tonight for all of us residents who are opposed to this development," he said.

He claimed the sign on the property, which details

the proposed development plan and provides information about public hearings, is in poor condition and because of that, residents were "denied their right" to have their voices heard at the planning commission meeting in August.

"In order for a driver to read that sign, they would have to slam on their brakes, leave their car parked in the middle of the right lane, get out, walk through weeds and then read it," Heyman said. "When you drive past the sign, it's a blur and it's dangerous and impractical."

Although opposition to the project was strong on Monday, several Briarcreek residents also took to the mic to argue in favor of the project and praise the quality of Kandra's construction as well as his dedication as a builder.

Beverly McFarland presented council with two petitions in favor of the project — one signed by 37 Briarcreek residents and the other signed by 143 city of Newark residents. She said many people want to live in a place like Briarcreek and she is often asked if there is any vacancy in her neighborhood.

"They drive right into our development and say, 'Where are there more houses like this?' Because they're screaming for 55+

homes and these are quality 55+ homes," she said. "That's a problem that we have in Newark."

Councilman Todd Ruckle agreed.

"As the only licensed realtor up here, I can state that there is an unbelievable need for over 55 communities," Ruckle said. "There is absolutely none in development in New Castle County above the canal, and I've got clients who are screaming for this."

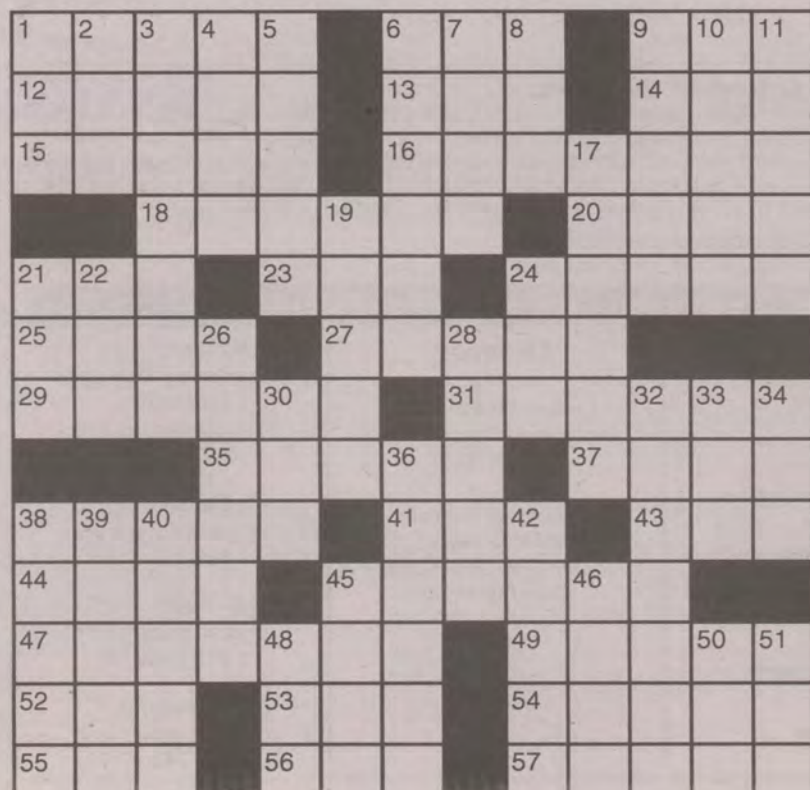
He said he understands that nearby neighbors are upset they are "losing their view," and stressed the importance of maintaining the tree line as well as the existing look and feel of the neighboring homes so their property values do not go down.

"Somehow we have to figure that out to keep everybody happy," Ruckle said.

Councilman Stu Markham suggested several amendments to the plan, including requiring Kandra pay \$16,650 in lieu of open space to the city for future improvement of nearby parks, commission an endangered species study of the area, maintain responsibility of infrastructure upgrades and replace part of the sidewalk within Briarcreek North with more trees for screening. All of the amendments passed unanimously.

# 'Connecting through food is what it's all about'

## Taste of Newark showcases city's restaurants

University of Delaware senior Jenna Pekofsky already has all of her required community service hours, but that didn't stop her from volunteering at Sunday's Taste of Newark festival. In her fourth year staffing the event, she said it's one of her favorites to work.

"We're hospitality majors," Pekofsky said. "Connecting through food is what it's all about."

She was one of 80 students from

UD's Hotel, Restaurant and Institutional Management who volunteered at the annual event on the Old College Lawn. Other students helped recruit restaurants and plan the event.

Started by former mayor Vance A. Funk III in 2004 as a way to showcase downtown Newark's emerging restaurant scene, Taste of Newark now also serves as a fundraiser for HRIM and the Downtown Newark Partnership and provides real-life experience for students.

"I like that the city and university gets together and has a party," said Sheryl Kline, director of UD's HRIM program. "That speaks volumes about the type of community and educational institution we are."

Funk proclaimed this year's fes-

tival the second-best in the event's history, the best being 2013 when it doubled as a retirement party for Funk on his second-to-last day as mayor.

"It's the weather more than anything. You can't beat this," said Funk, who previously announced he was stepping down from the event planning committee after this year. "I'm very happy with the way it turned out."

Approximately 40 restaurants and several wineries participated in the event, which offers attendees unlimited food and drink samples. Nearly 900 tickets were sold.

"It's nice to see such a good collaboration between the city, university and all the restaurants," Mayor Polly Sierer said. "The restaurants have really kicked it up a notch. The food is absolutely

wonderful."

Recently appointed UD president Dennis Assanis and his wife, Eleni, attended Taste of Newark and were officially welcomed to Newark by Sierer.

Kosta Papanicolas, whose family owns Mediterranean Grille in Newark Shopping Center, was serving up stuffed grape leaves and other Greek specialties at his restaurant's booth.

"People who normally wouldn't try Mediterranean food get samples," he said. "It brings people together."

This is the fourth year the eatery has participated in Taste of Newark, and Papanicolas said the event helps bring awareness to the business.

"Being out in public and more people seeing the restaurant is

good," he said.

Robin Griffith, owner of Duck Donuts on Main Street, reported similar success. He brought 1,000 donut holes and 12 dozen donuts to start and planned to have another 12 dozen delivered as the afternoon went on.

"It gets our brand out there," Griffith said, adding that about half the people who stopped by his booth were trying a Duck Donut for the first time. "It's total win-win."

Harry Chen, a UD junior, was volunteering at the event but planned to carve out some time to sample the various dishes offered.

"I'm a big foodie," Chen said. "Here today with all the different restaurants, I'm picking my next target."

# Oxford House event celebrates addiction recovery

Cady Tobin stood in an expansive, tree-lined backyard on West Chestnut Hill Road and looked out at the scene playing out in front of her.

Dozens of people milled around, eating picnic food and chatting in small groups. A band performed on a stage set up in the yard. There were no alcohol or drugs in sight.

A few months ago, Tobin would have thought that party sounded boring. But now six months clean, the bubbly 26-year-old couldn't imagine being anywhere else.

"The fun is right here," Tobin said. "Fun isn't in the drug game. Fun is in virtue, community and recovery."

Tobin was one of the organizers of Saturday's "Recovery Extravaganza," sponsored by Oxford Houses of Delaware. The event, in its third year, coincided with National Recovery Month and was meant to show newcomers they can have fun without drugs and alcohol and to bring together those in recovery with other members of the community.

Sometimes addicts feel like outsiders or have guilt over past indiscretions, but Tobin said Newark is a welcoming community.

"It's easy to forget we're accepted in the community," she said. "Addicts and non-addicts can come together."

Tobin said she first smoked marijuana when she was 14 and then used "gateway drug after gateway drug," ultimately becoming addicted to heroin. It wasn't until she lost everything and was found passed

out in a bathroom that she sought help.

"It was truly a gift," she said. "Had I not reached that point, I'd still be doing what I was doing."

After spending time in a treatment facility and a halfway house, she went to live in an Oxford House, where she has been for the past four months.

Oxford Houses are independent living facilities for recovering addicts. Residents of the home share the cost of rent and other expenses and hold democratic meetings to run the house.

"It's a peer group holding each other accountable," said Johnny Roache, an outreach coordinator for Oxford House. "It's not like you have a leader telling you what to do."

Tobin said living there has taught her responsibility and helped her

to stay clean. She plans to attend community college next year and wants to be a social worker.

"Oxford House is one of the many things that enabled me to save my own life," she said.

Roache, who has lived in Oxford Houses for eight years, has a similar success story. He said the rules of the house forced him to become more responsible, recalling how he

was once fined for not washing his dishes early on in his stay there.

"It really saved my life," he said.

Roache, 50, grew up in a family where drinking alcohol was a part of everyday life. Alcohol led to drugs like crack cocaine and heroin, and he was in active addiction for more than 30 years.

"It was over. I wanted to die," he said. "My family saved me with

one of those interventions like you see on TV."

As part of his job now, he helps start new Oxford Houses. Eight years ago when he started, there were 15 in Delaware. Today, there are 65, including 18 in the greater Newark area.

"They're a great thing for people who want to recover," Roache said. "It's a good place to start."

# Pedestrians, motorists getting used to new Main Street stoplight

It has been just over a month since crews installed a traffic signal at the intersection of Main Street and the University of Delaware Green, and according to police, most cars and pedestrians are getting the hang of the new rules.

Since the light went up on Aug. 22., officers have not written any tickets for jaywalking and there have been no collisions reported there, Newark Police spokesman Lt. Bill Hargrove said.

"We've had an officer out there at least once a day during the week to deter illegal crossings and give out warnings, but no tickets yet," Hargrove said. "Everything that we've done so far has just been educational."

He said pedestrians seem to be getting it, but motorists are having a difficult time.

"It's hard because they're so used to stopping and letting the people cross but no, when the light's green you've got to keep going," he said.

Several cars last Friday afternoon were unsure of how

to maneuver through the new crosswalk, with some slowing down to let pedestrians cross during a green light and others completely

ignoring the traffic signal altogether and running the red light. One motorist tried to beat the light and ended up stopped on the crosswalk

waiting for the South College Avenue signal to turn green, forcing a group of approximately 20 pedestrians to walk around the car.

For years, cars have had to stop whenever a pedestrian wants to cross, causing delays when pedestrian traffic is heavy. With the new signal, vehicles and pedestrians each get a turn to proceed.

The signal is timed with the light at Main Street and South College Avenue, so when that light turns red for Main Street traffic, so too does the new traffic light at the crosswalk so pedestrians can cross. When Main Street traffic is allowed to flow, pedestrians are required to stop.

UD sophomores Thomas Johnson and Victoria Darling think traffic has improved since the light was installed and said the change has been good for Main Street.

"Before, you could get stuck on Main Street for almost an hour," Darling said.

"And, as a pedestrian, it got to the point where you felt bad for holding up traffic," Johnson added.

Darling said she understands how stopping at the crosswalk could be frustrating for students who are used to crossing whenever they want, but it doesn't bother her. She has even

seen several students jaywalk or walk further down Main Street and cross in front of The Galleria just to avoid the wait.

"You wait 30 more seconds," she said. "It's really not that big of a deal."

To junior Nicole Jacoby, the new traffic light is "annoying." She admitted, however, that it makes crossing Main Street safer and more regulated.

"It's more equal for the cars and pedestrians, but it kind of sucks as a pedestrian because now I have to wait," she said.

Senior Daire Pyle agreed that it can be frustrating to wait and sometimes students – including himself – take the risk of jaywalking over being late to class. Overall, though, the new crosswalk makes things safer and he has noticed less traffic and less aggressive driving on Main Street since the light went up, he said.

Although he has crossed there at his leisure for the last three years, he said it didn't take long to get used to the new rules when he returned to campus.

"I saw the light and it was kind of just like, oh, it's here now," Pyle said.

# Two charged with robbing UD student

Two New Castle men have been charged with robbing a 28-year-old University of Delaware student last month.

The incident happened at approximately 1:10 a.m. Aug. 17 on the sidewalk near Studio Green apartments, located in the unit block of Thorn Lane off Elkton Road.

The victim told police he was walking with his bicycle when two assailants attacked him. They stole his backpack, containing paper notebooks and a laptop computer, and then ran away.

During the robbery, the victim suffered injuries to his ribs

and lungs. He was treated by EMS and taken to Christiana Hospital.

Lt. Bill Hargrove, a spokesman for the Newark Police Department, said detectives used surveillance footage from near the site of the robbery to identify people and vehicles that were in the area.

After tracking down several leads, they arrested two suspects last week, Lewis Henderson, 23, and Derrick Hudson, 20. Both were arrested near their homes in New Castle.

Both men were charged with first-degree robbery and second-degree conspiracy and committed to the Howard R. Young Correctional Institution in lieu of \$25,000 secured bond.

## Two Newark-area men face drug charges

Two local men are behind bars in connection with the sale of heroin in several communities in New Castle, police said.

The defendants were identified as Tyler Flores, 23, of the unit block of Kollman Drive in Brookside, and Nathan Wilson, 27, of the 100 block of Madison Drive in Newark's College Park neighborhood.

According to New Castle County Police spokeswoman Cpl. Tracey Duffy, Flores and Wilson were developed as

suspects during a month-long investigation. She did not disclose what led detectives to the two men.

They were arrested in the parking lot of University Plaza on Sept. 20. Duffy said officers found a total of 99 bags of heroin in their possession.

Flores and Wilson were both charged with drug possession, drug possession with intent to deliver and conspiracy. They were committed to the Howard R. Young Correctional Institution in lieu of \$46,000 and \$25,000 secured bail, respectively.

## Laptop stolen from Newark Free Library

A library patron is missing his laptop after he left it unattended on Sunday, police said.

According to Newark Police spokesman Cpl. James Spadola, the theft occurred at approximately 4:30 p.m. at Newark Free Library on Library Avenue.

The victim told police he was working at a desk in the li-

brary and left his Dell Latitude laptop — worth an estimated \$1,200 — unattended while he went to his car. He came back a few minutes later, and the computer was gone.

Spadola said a witness saw a black man with a full beard wearing all black clothing walk by the laptop during the time of the theft, but he didn't see the man take it. Police are still investigating the incident.

## Bicyclist hit by car in Brookside

A 26-year-old bicyclist was hit by a car in Brookside last week.

The crash happened just before 4:30 p.m. Sept. 21 at the intersection of Marrows and Old Newark roads, according to New Castle County paramedics spokes-

man Cpl. David McKinney Jr.

The bicyclist was knocked off his bike and suffered scrapes and a shoulder injury. An Aetna Hose, Hook and Ladder Co. ambulance took him to Christiana Hospital, where he was listed in stable condition.

New Castle County Police are investigating the crash.

wide array of situations, adding that even something as simple as whether a door opens inward or outward can affect how the room is handled.

"Those buildings give you a variety of different looks," he said.

Built in 1966, the Hillside Road dorm complex closed to students in May 2015. Along with the nearby Dickinson Complex, it sits vacant, surrounded by fences and locked gates. The city of Newark is in talks to purchase the Rodney site for possible use as a stormwater pond.

Ogden said that last summer, UD offered every police agency in the state the opportunity to use the building for Advanced Law Enforcement Rapid Response Training, which teaches patrol officers how to respond to active shooters. Because the goal is to stop a shooter as quickly as possible, the task often falls to patrol officers rather than waiting for a SWAT team to arrive.

Since then, several agencies have also used the building to train K-9 officers, SWAT teams and other

units.

Though the training happens inside and is not visible from the street, Ogden noted that the training exercises are announced on UD's website and on signs hung up at the property as to not alarm neighbors.

Last week, the Newark Police Department SWAT team spent the day there practicing maneuvers for clearing rooms during an active shooter or hostage situation.

Rodney's hallways have clusters of four doors, each leading to a dorm room, a situation that can be challenging for officers moving through a building during a real-life situation. Counting the hallway in front of them and the hallway behind them, that layout presents six places from which a threat could emerge.

The officers practiced a carefully choreographed way of systematically clearing each room while other officers keep an eye out for possible threats. They walked through the scenario several times, with instructors pointing out ways to improve and experimenting with different positions.

Sgt. Scott Simpson, who commands the team, said the four opposing doorways are a "tactical nightmare," so he relished the oppor-

tunity to use the dorms for training, which his team has already done a half-dozen times.

"You get every obstacle you could run into," he said. "We try to get different looks and go to different places."

Newark's SWAT team recently merged with Middletown Police's SWAT team in order to achieve a higher class of certification. Newark contributes 12 members and a commander, while Middletown brings six members and another leader.

The joint squad specializes in hostage and barricade situations, but is most commonly used to serve high-risk warrants when police leaders believe there is a possibility the wanted suspect could get violent. It is typically called out about a dozen times each year, Simpson said.

The SWAT officers, who all have day-to-day duties with patrol and other units, train together at least twice a month, often using vacant buildings around the city. They also train in schools and large commercial buildings so they are familiar with those sites if they are called there for an emergency.

"It's best if it's not the first time you've been in there," Simpson said.

of Wilmington. Two others, Ardythe Hope and Brad Speakman, were injured.

Fickes was serving in his capacity as a career firefighter with the Wilmington Fire Department. Because Wilmington has the only fully paid staff in the state, it's common for members of volunteer departments to also be employed there.

Fickes had been employed by the Wilmington Fire Department for 13 years and Leach was a 14-year veteran of the department.

Fickes joined Aetna in 1991 and at one time served as an assistant chief.

At Aetna's Station 9 on Academy Street, the American flag hung at half staff Saturday afternoon, while a sign honored Fickes. Dozens of firefighters and other first responders gathered to console each other and tell stories about their fallen comrade.

Coincidentally, Aetna leaders already had a "Feeding the Finest" barbecue planned to thank its active firefighters and recruit University of Delaware students to join the department. Deputy Chief John Guzzo said they thought about canceling the event after learning of Fickes' death, but decided not to.

"We can't. The only way to honor the fallen is to continue our mission," Guzzo said. "It's obviously a very sad day, but what a great outpouring and show of support."

The event drew quite a few UD students, many of whom have experience with their home fire departments.

"The next Jerry could be coming in today," Guzzo said. "We're trying to bring in the next Jerry, the next good guy."

None of the firefighters gathered Saturday could recall the last time Aetna lost a firefighter in the line of duty, but they remembered

several close calls. One of those close calls came in the mid-to-late 1990s during a house fire on North Chapel Street when firefighter Chris Zisl breathed in smoke and collapsed on the floor of the burning building.

It was Fickes who helped pull him out and performed CPR until medics arrived, a fact Zisl had forgotten until reminiscing with colleagues Saturday.

"That makes this a lot more surreal," he said. "It makes a tragic loss a lot more personal."

Zisl recovered and is now an EMS lieutenant for Aetna.

"Being saved that night has enabled me to continue many more years of service," he said. "Looking

back, I'm here for a reason. What Jerry did helped that continue."

Fellow Aetna firefighter Dave "Doc" Bailey noted that Fickes gave up a well-paying job as an insurance actuary to take a full-time position with WFD.

"He so loved fighting fire," Bailey said. "It wasn't enough for him to do it as a volunteer."

"He was the first guy to go in, and you wouldn't see him until the fire was out," he added. "He was just an incredible guy."

Colleagues recalled seeing Fickes covered in tar that had melted off the roof during a fire at Towne Court Apartments on Elkton Road.

"He was the dirtiest damn

firefighter in the department," spokesman John H. Farrell IV said, explaining that's a sign of a hardworking firefighter.

Farrell noted that Fickes only stood 5 feet 6 inches tall, but his small stature belied his physical strength.

"He was a very quiet fellow," he added. "He spoke up when needed to but he was not one of those demonstrative guys."

Fickes left behind his wife of 26 years, Laura, and two sons, 18-year-old Benjamin and 16-year-old Joshua. Leach, who was also a member of Talleyville Fire Company, left behind three children, Brendan, 16; Abby, 14, and Megan, 12.

"Now, we've got to take care of his family, and we will do that," Weyl said.

Dave Bailey, a former assistant chief who shares a name with but is not related to Dave

"Doc" Bailey, described Fickes in mourning, its mission continues, he said.

"He was definitely a professional and a good guy," he said. "He was one a lot of guys looked up to."

Though the department is

An insider's look at Yellowjacket football

It was homecoming last Friday night on the west side of Middletown, and Appoquinimink High kicked off a weekend of festivities with a decisive 40-7 victory over Newark.

"We struggled early and had a hard time getting it together," Newark head coach Barry Zehnder said. "(Appo) Coach (Brian) Timpson and his staff did a great job having his team ready and taking it to us early."

Appoquinimink jumped out to a 14-0 lead in the first quarter, and then, just as the Newark fans who made the trip south started losing

faith in the Yellowjackets' chances, Newark quarterback Andrew DelPercio hooked up with Isaiah Velez on a 52-yard touchdown reception to pull the Yellowjackets within 14-7.

"The attitude of the team was energetic after that score," DelPercio said. "The touchdown gave us momentum, and it was important for us to do that and gain some momentum back. I give my line all the credit for that touchdown, giving me time to make that pass, and to my receiver for making the cuts he did to score."

However, the momentum shifted back to Appoquinimink when DelPercio went down with a leg injury that would knock him out of the game.

"When we lost DelPercio that reduces not only your playbook but you lose an on-the-field leader," Zehnder said.

The Jaguars then scored three consecutive touch-

downs in the second quarter to take a decisive 34-7 halftime lead.

"As the game went on, they did a great job setting things up and making plays when they needed them," Zehnder said. "We never really got comfortable and got ourselves in some tough situations. Our defense made plays but then struggled to get off the field on critical

plays. Appo's kids played hard and made us pay for mistakes."

The teams battled evenly for most of the second half with the only points coming in the fourth quarter when Appo's Kamal Yellowdy scooped up a Newark fumble on the 5-yard line and scampered into the end zone for the game's final score.

"We showed some great character in the second half but we need to start showing that earlier," Zehnder explained.

### This week's focus

Zehnder said the focus at practice this week is just that, "This week."

"We can't dwell on a flat performance, we have to move forward, or last week will cost us this week," he said.

### This week's game

Newark travels to cross-town rival Glasgow High tonight for a 7 p.m. game against a 3-0 Dragons team coming off a big 26-14 win over Hodgson. Glasgow, which made the move to Division II last season when the school's enrollment dropped below 900, is led by junior quarterback Isaiah Wilson, a three-year starter whose primary targets are senior wide receivers Michael Credle and Ja'saan

Cunningham.


"Glasgow has a lot of speed and they are playing with a lot of confidence right now," Zehnder said.

Glasgow's first two wins were decisive, a 66-12 victory over Seaford, followed by a 50-0 shutout over McKean.


DelPercio's status for the game is uncertain.


