The 1998 University of Delaware football season was a season that saw the Blue Hens post victories over eventual NCAA I-AA champion Massachusetts, over defending NCAA I-AA champion Youngstown State on the road and over then No. 4 ranked Connecticut by an overwhelming 59-17 score on the road.

The Hens, who had the toughest rated schedule in I-AA according to the NCAA, suffered three of their four losses to Top 20 teams, including a disheart-

ening 52-45 setback at No. 18 William & Mary in October in a game where both t e a m s scored at will. Unfortuantely, the Tribe scored last to win the





t was a banner year for the University of Delaware men's cross country and track & field program in 1998-99.

Delaware opened the year by placing second at the America East championship; hosted and won the America East indoor track and field title in February; and placed second at the league outdoor meet in May.

The Blue Hens' indoor title was the team's first since 1993.

The indoor season was an outstanding one for the Blue Hens as Delaware won three of the five scoring meets in

which they competed. including the Delaware Invitational and the America East championships.

Sophomore **Butch Patrick** earned the meet Outstanding Performer award as he won both the 60 meter dash (6.87)and long jump (24

Overall the Hens took five first place finishes and six second place finishes. In addition to Patrick, winning individual titles for the Hens were Jeff McIlvaine in the pole vault (13-7 fl), Joe Quigley in the 1,000 meters (school record 2:28.95), and Geesaman in the 5,000 meters (14:50.51).

Among the Hens' second place finishers were Jamin Elliott in the triple jump and John Marino in the 60 meter

hurdles (school record time of 8.67).

Highlighting the Hens at the IC4A regionals was the 4x800 meter relay team of Quigley, Mark Coyle, Steve Sinko, and Troy Bockius which placed sixth to earn All-East honors in a school record time of 7:38.11.

Elliott also earned All-East honors with a fifth place finish in the triple jump, setting a school record of 48-11fi.

Delaware had eight individuals place second led by Tom Marando (shot put), Eric Sands (Discus), and Sam Yarrington (hammer) in the weight events, Gary



Adding to the uncertainty coming into the season was the

amount of vouth head coach Marc Samonisky's roster.

The group was composed of 22 freshmen sophomores with just a handof upperclassmen.

Not good recipe for a team that had lost plenty close games the vear before.

But Samonisky's young guns were solid, enthusiastic, and showed the vast potential that lies ahead.

That along with the play of four-year starting goalkeeper and team Most Valuable Player Joaquin Hurtado resulted in the Blue Hens posting a solid 8-9-1 record which included a sixth

place finish in America East play (4-5) and eight, you guessed it, one-goal losses.


"We had a very successful season, and feel that we have a very bright future," said Martin. "This team is very anxious to take on the challenges we will face in the future."

he 1998-99 University of Delaware men's golf team wanted to repeat the performance of the 1997-98 squad which won the America East championship.

Head coach Jim Kent returned seven letterwinners from the 1997-98 team, hungry to repeat the performance this year.

The Blue Hens did not have to wait long, opening the fall season with the conference championships in Falmouth, Maine.

The Hens came home with a fourth place team finish as junior captain Mike Ladden finished fourth, shooting a pair of 74's in the 36-hole tournament. He earned All-America East honors for the second straight year. Towson won the team title.

Ladden was just warming up as he shot another 74 in the first round of the Georgetown Invitational and then shot 69 in the second round to finish third overall.

The squad struggled in its next two meets, finishing 11th place at the St. John's Invitational and 12th place at the Stabler Invitational at Lehigh.

The Hens finished the fall season on a high note with an eighth place at the Caves Valley (Va.) Invitational as Ladden won medalist honors with a 70-77=147, becoming the first UD golfer to win a tournament since 1993.

The spring season began with the Hens heading to sunny Florida and placing 18th overall at the Northwood Invitational in West Palms Beach, Fla.

From there it was a trip north to the William & Mary Invitational where the Hens placed 27th at Kiskiack GC. Mark Swinger led the Hens with a 63rd place finish.
