'It was another remarkable year, which just goes to show you the support the community has for the 3,500 Special Olympics athletes here in Delaware," said Jon Buzby, spokesperson for Special Olympics Delaware. "What we hope more than anything, is that the Bears who plunged, and those who watched them, walked away with

an even greater appreciation for the abilities of people with intellectual disabilities, and not just on the playing fields. For that, we can't thank the bears enough!"

Police arrest Newark man for multiple shed and car break-ins

Newark Police Department has arrested 24 year-old Michael Early of Newark for a seven-month

crime spree, dating back to July 2011, involving multiple shed and car break-ins and the unlawful use of several credit cards stolen from within one of the vehicles. The investi-

gation culminated in the arrest of Early on February 4 and the execution of search warrants by Newark PD and the University of Delaware Police at Early's residence and a second home in Newark where Early was storing stolen prop-

During the search warrants investigators recovered stolen items linking Early to multiple break-ins along with additional recovered items which are believed to be stolen but which have not yet been linked to a crime. Those items, whose ownership is undetermined, include power tools, a child's bicycle, and multiple GPS units. The investigation is ongoing and additional charges are anticipated as Early has been linked to at least one vehicle break

Last month a Maryland man was arrested on theft charges after promising schools in at least five Maryland counties that a member of the Baltimore Ravens would speak at assemblies. Shortly before the scheduled appearances the man called the schools to cancel the visit, but kept money that had already been paid. Nearly 20 schools are reported to have fallen victim to this scam, at a cost of more than \$14,000, according to the Annapolis Capital newspaper.

This week's Out of the Attic item is an undated Jess Rightmeyer photograph on an Everett Photo Card of the building at 300 East Main Street. This view shows the building when it was the Newark Senior Center. The Center was founded in 1957 to serve the Newark area. With membership growth and expanded offerings the Center moved to the pictured location in 1966. Continued growth made this building inadequate to serve the membership. This led to the construction of the customdesigned building at 200 White Chapel Drive that is the Newark Senior Center today.

The original building at 300 East Main Street was built circa 1890 as the Water Works plant for the new village water system. Water was pumped from the White Clay Creek and was distributed through wooden pipes under the streets. The development of the water system and the formation of the volunteer fire company came as a result of the disastrous fire that destroyed the Dean Woolen Mill on Christmas day 1886. Inmigration and annexation of neighboring land caused the village to grow to be a town and then to become a city by the 1960 census. A totally new water system replaced the old Water Works. After the Newark Senior Center moved to White Chapel, the Main Street site became the new

location of the New Ark United Church of Christ. Visit the Newark History Museum located at



the historic 1877 passenger train station on South College Avenue beside the bridge on the town side
