Trick-or-treating tips for kids

Master Cpl. Gerald Bryda of the Newark Police Department shares these tips for a safe Halloween:

DRESS RIGHT: To prevent trips and falls, avoid wearing long costumes. Wear light-colored clothing that drivers can easily see. Avoid wearing masks that could obstruct your vision, or take off the mask when crossing the street or walking near traffic.

TRAVEL IN GROUPS: Never go trick-or-treating

STAY THE COURSE: Kids who are going trick-ortreating without adults should first review a map of the neighborhood with an adult and establish a safe route to follow. Keep a safe distance from cars, and walk on the sidewalk, not in the road.

FOLLOW THE LIGHT: Only travel down well-lit, well-traveled streets. Only knock on doors to houses with an outside light on.

DON'T GO IN: Never enter a stranger's house or


A \$15 donation will help support Hasko through the Paws and People Assisting Wounded Warriors organization, which places service dogs with veterans with PTSD or brain injuries.





Locals among Aviation Hall of Fame inductees

Five Delawareans were recently recognized for their roles in advancing aircraft design to the benefit of the First State and their country.

Inductees into the Delaware Aviation Hall of Fame this year were William O. McCabe of Hockessin, Ernest G. Talbert of Bear, Jeness F. Steele of Camden, E.N. Tyndall of Georgetown and Tenney H. Wheatley of Wilmington.

Of the 2012 inductees, all have served in the military, three in the Delaware Air National Guard. Four of them are pilots, one is a navigator, and one is an active-duty helicopter pilot.

Talbert was recognized for his command positions and an impressive number of flying hours: he clocked 6,500 hours, including combat hours, as a pilot for the United States Air Force and the Delaware Air National Guard. He retired as Chief of Staff of DANG with the

rank of Major General.

Each inductee has a "wingman" that notifies them of their nomination and helps the inductee create a display of their achievements for the cer-

Talbert's wingman, Dr. Dan Coons, a 2011 inductee, said Talbert was nominated because of his service to the country, his position on the Delaware Aviation Hall of Fame Board of Trustees and his commitment to leading

young people.

Talbert has been very active with a program at Delaware Airpark that instructs young people and mentors those who are training to be pilots.

"General Talbert did so much at guiding the program to the success that it was and is today," Coons said.

Coons said he could not think of a better candidate than Talbert for the induction. He said when he told



Talbert of his induction, he was thrilled that he would be named by his peers.

"(Talbert) had tears in his eyes," Coons said. "It was a surprise to him. Ernie is a humble person."

McCabe, of Hockessin, flew 100 USAF fighter combat missions in Vietnam, and went on to become an aerospace executive for DuPont and head of the DuPont Aviation unit at New Castle County Airport. He is currently CEO of his



Moreover, during the hours leading up to the fatal incident, Odom and the occupants of Room 418 seemed to be social - aside from the premises at that point, he said.

The man went to bed, only to be stirred later inside his Room somewhere close at that motel, he added.

"I was asleep about 10:30 at night when I heard this loud noise, like something heavy had fallen. It rattled my wall. Then I heard a whole lot of moving and yelling. It was like war cries. It went on for two minutes," the guest in Room eral moments later and took cus-420 described.



Police: Man arrested for pedestrian hit-and-run

Newark Police have arrested a 46-year-old Newark man in connection with a hit-andrun collision that injured three pedestrians in the unit block

East Cleveland Avenue early Saturday morning.

a 21-year-old female from Morristown, N.J., a 19-yearold female from Irvington, N.Y., and a 19-year-old female from Northport, N.Y., were walking westbound on the north side of East Cleveland Avenue around 12:15 a.m. Saturday when Erroll Johnson, 46, of Newark, driving a 2001 Dodge Dakota Pickup truck traveling westbound, struck the 21-year-old female pedestrian, who was walking in the roadway just off of the curb.

Flying debris from the ini- ment, police said. tial collision also struck two 19-year-old pedestrians who were both walking westbound on the sidewalk. One was struck in the back of the head and the other in the lower leg, police said.

After the collision, Johnson failed to stop and continued westbound on East Cleveland Avenue, police said. Witnesses obtained the tag number for the vehicle and officers immediately responded to Johnson's home, where the vehicle was located in the driveway. Johnson was found still inside the vehicle and was taken into custody without incident.

The 21-year-old female pedestrian was transported to Christiana Hospital and is listed in serious but stable condition with head and internal injuries. 

The owners of State Line Liquors, just over the state line in Elkton, recently stepped up their quest for growler legislation that would let them and other retailers in Cecil County refill "growlers" with beer for customers.

The new law would have to be introduced by Cecil County lawmakers during the 2013 session and passed by the entire General Assembly before it can take effect.




