On June 1, 1970, I received Senate Bill No. 198, As Amended by Senate Amendment 1 entitled:

"An Act to Amend Section 2714, Chapter 27, Title 21, Delaware Code, relating to fees for permanent drivers license, by increasing the fee to twenty-five dollars and imposing a fee of one dollar every four years for identification photographs."

I am returning this bill without my signature for the following reason:

This measure increases the fee for permanent drivers licenses from \$10.00 to \$25.00. The increase in the fee would become effective retroactively starting from January 1 of this year. I do not believe that it is fair to go back and seek an additional \$15.00 from every person who may have obtained a permanent drivers license since January 1, 1970. The fee should be increased to \$25.00 but I would suggest that the increase

become effective on January 1, 1971. I hope that this measure can be reconsidered and passed with the effective date which I have suggested in this session of the General Assembly.

I have discussed this matter with Senator J. Donald Isaacs, the sponsor of this bill, and he is agreeable to a veto of this bill. He will also seek to have another bill introduced and passed this year which will incorporate the January 1, 1971, effective date.

In response to your letter of June 19, 1970, regarding raising the ceilings in Delaware's AFDC Program, Section 402 (a) 23 of the Social Security Act expressly requires that any maximums that the State imposes on the amount of AFDC must be updated to reflect changes in the cost of living. U.S. Supreme Court in Rosdao has confirmed necessity that the State meet this requirement. Senate Bill No. 735 will enable Delaware to comply. Unless the bill is passed and approved by the Governor, the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare will offer Delaware an opportunity for a hearing under Section 404 (a) of the Social Security Act, prior to the determination that further funds will not be made available for Delaware's Aid to Dependent Children Program. I do not wish to convene a hearing and trust that the legislature will approve this Bill.
