Mr. Surratt, executive secretary of the Newark YMCA, has been the YCA's office available to the Red Feather campaign since its inception.

Manufacturers Warn Against Ice Box Suffocation Hazard
At last week's City Council meeting, Councilman Wm. Coverdale proposed drafting an ordinance to protect Newark children from the danger of suffocation in abandoned ice-boxes and refrigerators.

This subject is discussed in a bulletin recently issued by the National Manufacturers Association.

The Household Refrigerator and Freezer and Home Freezer Sections of NMAA are profoundly concerned over the deaths of a number of small children who have been suffocated in recent years after closing themselves in abandoned ice-boxes and refrigerators.

"Unless adequate steps are taken to dispose of such abandoned ice-boxes or to render them harmless, this hazard might well be an increasing one. There are more than 10 million ice-boxes, refrigerators and freezers in use today which are being discarded or scrapped at a rate of approximately two million a year, and for that reason the cabinets presently in use may become potential sources of hazard over the next 30 years. A similar hazard exists with discarded ironing boards, chests or other discarded containers into which a child might go."

"The most effective means of removing discarded cabinets safely is to scrap them or to completely remove the doors or lids. Unused cabinets which are stored temporarily should be placed with their doors against a wall or have their hinges or latches removed."

Newark parents have been fortunately free from such tragedies but preventive measures are certainly in order.

Mayor Johnson Makes Appeal For 100% Turnout For Health

Councilmen Among First Newark Residents To Get Chest X-Rays In State-Wide Health Program; Units To Be Stationed Here Tomorrow, Saturday, Tuesday

Three x-ray units set up shop in Newark yesterday morning and Mayor Wallace M. Johnson and members of the City Council were among the first in the community to have their chests x-rayed in the state-wide program offered to all Delawareans over 15 years of age.

"It is extremely desirable," Dr. Johnson stated yesterday, "that all citizens over the minimum age limit avail themselves of this free service."

"Through the generous efforts of our State Legislature, the Delaware Anti-Tuberculosis Society, allied medical groups, and public spirited citizens, Delaware has become the first state in the nation to put into operation a state-wide chest x-ray survey," the Mayor said.

"The value to community and individual health cannot even be estimated at this time," the Doctor-Mayor continued. "But by your full support of this program, you will contribute immeasurably to better health for yourself and for your neighbor."

X-ray units will remain in the Newark area tomorrow, Saturday, and on Tuesday. Each unit is staffed at 1 to 9 p.m. Friday, and from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturday and on Tuesday.

Two x-ray units will be located at Brookside Park, Sections C and K, from 12 noon to 8 p.m. Saturday. On Tuesday, a unit will be stationed at the Glasgow Arms Restaurant and at the Christians Fire Hall from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m., in addition to the x-ray unit at Main & Academy Streets in Newark.

Ten mobile units hope to x-ray some 7,000 New Castle County adults before moving on to Wilmington, November 17.

Dean William O. Penrose, president of the survey, expressed confidence that New Castle County will show a keen interest and active support in the survey. He reminded New Castle County citizens that the x-ray is free, takes less than a minute, there is no danger, no need for an appointment, and no undressing is necessary.

The grand total of small x-rays made in Kent County was 22,339 in Sussex County, the known number of small x-rays made through October 10 was 27,339.

Rotary Club Hears Authority Speak On Life In Japan

G. R. Roames Addresses Rotarians At Regular Monday Dinner Meeting

Glen R. Roames, an engineering director of the Savannah River atomic energy project, addressed members of the Newark Rotary Club at their weekly dinner meeting Monday night at the New Century Club.

Mr. Roames, a former professional basketball player and Indiana state tennis champ, and an electrical engineering graduate of the University of Cincinnati, was a government advisor on electrical industries and utilities for the War Department in Korea, and from 1948-50, he was director of the atomic energy and fuel division on Gen. Douglas MacArthur's staff in Japan. Since 1950, Mr. Roames has been with the Atomic Energy Commission at Savannah River project.

Mr. Roames, in his discussion of life in Japan, described Japan as the focal point in the Far East.

"Tokyo," he said, "has a downtown area like a typical American city, with its modern buildings, elevated trains and buses. But along with its modern facilities, there are numbers of rickshaws and ukiyos."

The speaker pointed out that Japan has been a constitutional monarchy since 1889, that the emperor is the theoretical ruler only, and that the people are inclined to follow a strong leader. For this reason, they followed MacArthur.

"There are no layoffs in Japanese industry," Mr. Roames stated. "The Japanese government subsidizes industry and many private enterprises, and industrial payrolls are maintained when necessary by government subsidies."

"The railroads are inefficient by our standards," he said, "but trains are always on time. The train crews receive bonuses for prompt arrivals."

Rotary president Cliff Gulleides presided at the meeting, and Herbert Dorn was program chairman. Visting Rotarians included Frank Blake, Edward Martin, Van Hook, Sea Isle City, N.J., and John Zapp, Kennett Square.

At last week's meeting, Wm. A. Mosher, head of the University of Delaware chemistry department, spoke to the Rotarians on economic conditions in European countries that have maintained free enterprise.

Mr. Mosher recently returned from a year in Vienna, Austria where he lectured on a Fulbright Fellowship.

The little town of Newark was very quiet and peaceful. There were no big crowds and no big noises.

DHIA Testing Plan Provides Dairymen Improved Earnings

(The Public is Invited)

When a cow joins the Dairy Herd Improvement Association, her life becomes an open book. This book is a day-to-day record of milk production and feed cost figures.

By keeping DHIA records, dairymen are able to analyze their herd production and the efficiency of each cow, and can plan a sound management program.

Delaware DHIA records reveal that the average cow in the testing program earns her owner from \$121 to \$141 more per year than does the average cow in the state. The records show that higher producing cows give greater returns. They show that a cow yielding every 12 or 13 months returns more money in a lifetime than does one with 10 or 11 monthly intervals.

Records also show the value of feeds used. They disclose the influence of feeding, feed quality and cost, kind and balance of feed nutrients, body condition of cows, and growth and development of herd replacements.

DHIA dairy farmers learn from records the value of sanitation and careful herd management in preventing disease.

Records also show the influence of using good lines in the herd, and the effect of cow turnover on the cost of milk production.

Hens Prep for New Hampshire After 27-13 Defeat By Rams

Wildcats Bring Undeclared Record To Local Stadium Saturday; West Chester Second Half Offensive Hands Delaware First Loss Of Season; Wagner, Zaiser Score

All-American Glenn Killinger and his West Chester Rams have departed along with the Blue Hens' undefeated record in Delaware Stadium, but a new day dawned Saturday with New Hampshire, and Coach Dave Nelson and Delaware's Fighting Blue Hens are rounding out a week of intensive practice for things to come.

New Hampshire is undefeated in three appearances this season with victories over Upland, Rhode Island, and Maine, while Delaware was unbeaten in two and one-half games with wins over Georgetown, Lehigh, and West Chester until the third quarter last Saturday. To the football pool quarterbacks the Wildcats' past performance throws but little light on the possible outcome of Delaware's pending clash, but backfield coach Gene Stauber, who has scouted the New Hampshire squad, says they're good and that the Hens have a tough one coming up.

Last year, in meeting one mutual opponent, Delaware lost to the Connecticut 23-13, while New Hampshire was but four points off the pace on the short end of a 16-12 count.

On Saturday, the Hens overcame a 6-0, West Chester first period advantage when yearling Jimmy Zaiser ran 53 yards to the Touchdown, 26 yard strike, Don Miller shot a pass to sophomore halfback Andy Wagner behind the line of scrimmage, the wing-footed Baltimorean raced through the middle for 27 yards into the Rams' end zone, and veteran Frank Serpico, at end, placed-kicked Delaware to a 7-6 advantage.

The second quarter was a period of satisfaction for all but West Chester and those in the Hen ranks who were absorbing painful punishment on the field of battle.

West Chester was unable to score, and Delaware quarterback Miller heaved a 35-yard pass to Zaiser for the second touchdown as the Rams concentrated their attentions on Jimmy Flynn.

Zaiser rang up 96 yards in 11 carries as the leading Delaware half-bearing back, and Miller completed seven out of 12 passes for a total aerial gain of 121 yards.

West Chester scored their second touchdown and the tying extra point in the third quarter when Al Stauber, stepped out of his center role to intercept Miller's pass and romp for 26 yards to the Hens' 22.

A Teacher pass was good for 12 more and the Rams' Johnny McAnaney blasted his way through the Delaware line for 17 yards more and a touchdown. Mosteller's placement was good.

In the final quarter, West Chester converted a pair of intercepts into passes into touchdowns, defeating Delaware, 27-13.
