## First State-Wide Civil Defense Net To Be Inaugurated

Delaware, First in U.S.  
To Complete CD System  
Of State Communication

The State of Delaware will inaugurate the first state-wide civil defense communication system in the United States on Monday, May 11, at 10 a. m. The system, which will be inaugurated by Governor J. Calvin Hogan and former Governor Elbert S. Connelley, will consist of a network of 100 radio stations, 50 of which will be operated by the State and 50 by private citizens.

The program will get underway at 10 a. m. when John H. Hammer, Jr., chief of the Delaware Department of Civil Defense, will make the dedicatory address. He will ask for a roll call of all the radio stations in the State. Each station will report to the State Civil Defense office.

Mr. Hogan said that the public may participate in these events by gathering at their local fire stations where they will be able to hear a broadcast and scheduled speaker. The Carvel address, George C. Hogan, chief of the Fire Department, will speak from the Fire Department station in Newark.

## Main Street Property Owners Offer City Traffic Solution

Public Parking Area Behind Main St. Buildings Proposed;  
City Manager, Sewer Service Charge Ordinances Given  
First Readings; Pension Plan Ordinance to be Prepared

A plan to relieve Newark's Main Street traffic problem was proposed by a group of property owners; ordinances for the re-zoning of residential property, and for a city pension plan were requested; storm sewer bids were accepted; and ordinances for the employment of a City Manager and for the establishment of a sewer service charge were given their first readings at the regular meeting of the Newark City Council on Tuesday night.

## Re-zoning

## Re-zoning

## Re-zoning

Requests were approved for the closing of Delaware Ave. from Orchard to Elkton Roads, on May 9, from 10-3, for the May Mart; for the May 23rd closing of the block adjacent to the Newark Public School; from 10-3, for the bike rodeo; and of Cleveland Ave. from Academy St. to Canal Trail, for the Club Scout Pushmobile Derby to be held May 30. This last was granted with the provision that the street be cleared by 5:30 p. m.

## Re-zoning

City Solicitor John Sinclair gave the first official reading of the ordinance for employment of a city manager, who will be appointed by 2/3 vote of council and who will head the administrative branch of the city, prepare and be responsible for the administration of the city budget, and keep council advised of financial and other city affairs.

## Re-zoning

The City Manager may be removed from office for just cause by two-thirds vote of Council.

## Re-zoning

An ordinance for the establishment of quarterly sewer service charges, to be determined by meter size, was given its first official reading, and such charges will be effective as of April 1, 1953.

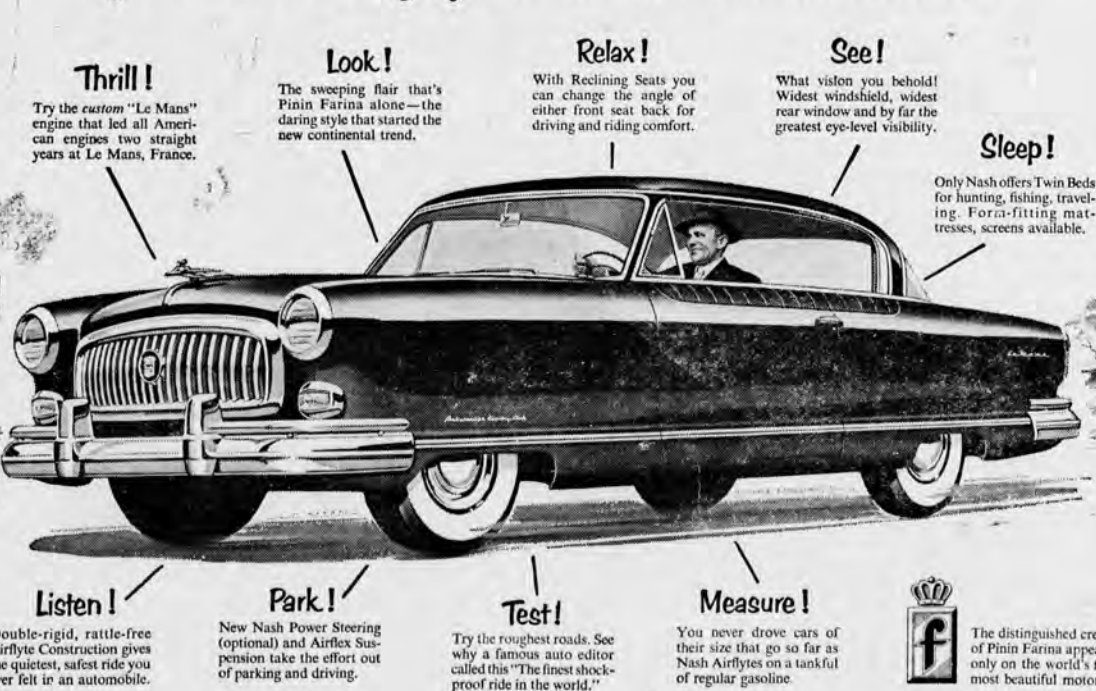
