## Missing girl found safe in South Jersey

*She ran away to live with relative*

Bridgeton, N.J. police have found, unharmed, the Newark girl, missing since Halloween. New Castle County police had been searching for Newark High School Student Bari Goldsboro, 16, since she was reported missing by her mother Nov. 1. Goldsboro had last been seen Oct. 31 at the Main Street McDonald's in Newark, where she worked as a cashier. New Castle County police detective Rand Townley said Goldsboro was found after, at his request, The National Center for Missing and Exploited Children faxed flyers

with Goldsboro's photo to police departments in southern New Jersey. "The posters were faxed to police at about 2:30 p.m. Nov. 18," said Townley, "and within an hour we had five sightings of her in Wildwood, N.J." The girl was living with her adult sister, Eva, who is estranged from the family, police said. Goldsboro was picked up by Bridgeton, N.J. police Nov. 19, counseled by child protective services and brought back to Newark that night. Townley would not disclose the reasons Goldsboro ran away, only

## Academy Hill rezoning approved by Council

A rezoning for the final 70-acre phase of the Academy Hill developments, located off West Chestnut Hill, passed New Castle County Council last week. Residents were not opposed to the rezoning itself, which slightly increases the number of units allowable, rather they worried storm water run-off into Arbour Park would be potentially destructive. Ed Wirth, co-founder and member of the Academy Hill Task Force — comprised of four civic associations, Arbour Park, Anvil Park, West Chestnut Hill and Academy

Hill — said he is pleased with council's decision. Council members promised residents the department of public works would watch the developer, Magness Construction, to ensure another stop work order would not be needed. The area at issue is near Iron Hill. At the very least it could be referred to as a slope. The three developments in the task force are located directly downhill from the four Academy Hill projects. During one of the developer's first construction phases this spring, water run-off reached hazardous levels in Anvil Park. The New

## New proposal submitted for Paper Mill Rd. land

Newark City Council shot down a proposal Sept. 25 for 200 new homes near William M. Redd Park on Paper Mill Road saying they wanted something better. Dick duPont, who makes decisions concerning the 74.12 acres owned in trust by Wilmington Trust, has a new plan. On Nov. 3 he submitted reapplication forms for subdivision plans with Newark's planning department. In round three of this rezoning process,

duPont proposes 136 single-family homes with about 4.5 acres of land set aside for commercial use. His first plan was for 275 homes, but he changed it to 200 before the legislative process began. The site at issue originally housed the Cook and Cullen farms. According to duPont, his father S. Hallock duPont purchased the farms in the late 1930s. After his father died he willed the property to his grandchildren, which remains in trust at Wilmington Trust today. The city annexed a total of 253 acres of

duPont property in 1989 and duPont donated a 63-acre park now named after Newark's former mayor, William M. Redd. Part of the 253 acres is already used for two developments, The Hunt at Louviers (formerly the Cullen farm) and Pine Meadows. The remaining land, 74.12 acres, was originally slated for a 600,000 square-foot office building and is currently zoned to accommodate it. But duPont said he wants to build homes on the property because there is already a surplus of office space in the area. Lopata said the commercial area, about

20,000 square-feet, will include a restaurant that was once the farm house on the Cook farm. "We are recommending that the stores look like houses," Lopata said. During a July 11 meeting, council tabled their vote and sent duPont's 200-home proposal back to the planning commission. Planning commissioners had recommended against the proposal at a May 3 meeting. They cited a lack of innovation in the plan, increased traffic, number of units and accessibility to bike paths as their reasons. See **PROPOSAL, 6A** ▶

## Skateboarders hit major roadblock in Newark

Cindy Ewen, owner of Bilcyn Hair Co. at 26 Haines St. says skateboarders who "hang out" next to her store create an unsafe environment for customers coming and going. She wants to ban skateboarding on Haines Street between Main Street and Delaware Avenue. Ron Amores, owner of Switch — the skateboard shop next to Bilcyn, says his neighbor is making things "sour" because she has never approached him personally about the issue. He said: "She called the police and it became clear she wasn't going to work with us...These kids are growing up in a town where most businesses cater to college students. The problem is you'd be taking away something from youth." She said: "It (skateboarding)

infringes on the public's rights and I'm afraid someone is going to get hurt." John Wisniewski, president of the Newark Business Association (NBA), of which both shop owners are members, says he's looking into solutions. "Just because they're (skateboarders) there and somebody disapproves, doesn't mean get rid of them," Wisniewski said. "However, I don't want to repress business — it's a tough issue." Although Wisniewski, owner of Delaware Sporting Goods on East Main Street, agrees there is a safety issue to be addressed he can sympathize with Ambrose. "I sell rollerblades and in-line skates, but roller skates and skateboards are not allowed on Main Street," Wisniewski said. "That hampers my business somewhat and I have to make sure my cus-

## Police beat

### Man loads gun at gas station

Newark police report a man entered the office Nov. 17 at BP Service Station on Elkton Road and loaded a 9 m.m. handgun. Police said the man used a trash can and left. Police are looking for the man for committing a misdemeanor by alarming the public. Police describe the man as black, 5 feet 5 inches tall and weighing about 220 pounds. ### Student threatens hall monitor at NHS

Police report a 17-year-old Newark High School student threatened to cut and shoot a 23-year-old hall monitor at the school Nov. 17. The student was suspended from school for three days and police are looking into charging the boy with terroristic threatening.

### Homeless man steals shower curtain

Police report a homeless man was arrested Nov. 19 for shoplifting a shower curtain from Kmart in College Square Shopping Center. Police said security personnel saw the man put the merchandise under his clothes and confronted him, but the man fled the store and ran on top of two cars in the parking lot. A security guard caught the man but was sprayed with pepper mace in the face. Police report, at this time, they arrived on the scene and arrested the man. Kenneth Michael Smith, 29, no current address, was charged with robbery, theft and resisting arrest. Police said during the struggle other items were dropped by Smith but were taken by people watching the incident. The security guard did not require medical treatment. Smith was arraigned at Court 11 and committed to Gander Hill Prison on \$26,000 secured bond.



## NEWS BRIEFS

### Inmates charged in local check-cashing spree

Kenneth A. Taylor, 25, of Glasgow Pines Trailer Court, and Robert W. Ingle, 27, of Newark, have been charged in connection with a two-week check-cashing spree that cost Lestardo's Crab House on U.S. 40 near Glasgow nearly \$10,000. The two men obtained blank payroll checks during a break-in at an office where checks for three different businesses were held in a safe. Their spree ended when they were arrested and charged in another incident. Both men are currently being held in Gander Hill Prison for failure to post bond on earlier charges. According to New Castle county police, warrants have been issued for three more men in connection with the check-cashing thefts.

### Man threatens estranged wife

William J. Douglas, 25, of the Village of Canterbury, was jailed recently after he allegedly called his estranged wife and told her

he was coming to her Dover area home to kill her, anyone who interfered and himself. State troopers intercepted Douglas at the entrance to his wife's mobile home park and arrested him. He was charged with making terroristic threats and committed to Delaware Correctional Center for lack of bail. Douglas was in violation of a Family Court order to stay away from his wife at the time of the arrest.

### Newarker convicted of murder

Russell Henry Womer Jr., 45, of Rutherford in Newark, has been convicted of first degree murder and possessing a deadly weapon during a felony. The state did not seek the death penalty but Womer faces a life sentence and up to 20 additional years when he comes up for sentencing in January. Womer was convicted of shooting one of his roommates, Henry Kusz, 43, on July 7 after consuming 25 cans of beer throughout the day. His other roommate, Robert Branum, testified that Womer also pointed his .357 magnum at him but did not shoot Branum after he begged for his life. Womer testified that he remembered nothing of

the shooting incident.

### Christiana High student suspended in knife incident

Christiana School District officials and state police are investigating a recent incident involving a Christiana High School student who was allegedly carrying a knife in the school parking lot. A security guard stopped the 17-year-old about 8:15 a.m. to make sure he was a student, and the knife fell to the ground, according to police. They described it as a butterfly knife with a 4 1/2-inch blade. The student was suspended pending investigation but no charges were filed.

### Sterck student in knife incident

A 14-year-old student was removed from Margaret S. Sterck for the Deaf, Newark, by the state police last week. The girl allegedly planned to attack another student. She was found in the dorm hallway with a knife after motion alarms alerted school staff.

## Man injured in drug deal

A 36-year-old Newark man was cut in his ear during a drug deal Nov. 17 in Cleveland Heights development, Newark police report.

Police report when the Newark man was buying crack cocaine there was a dispute over a disparity of \$20 and the man selling the crack pulled out a knife and cut the Newark man on his ear. The Newark man was then able to flee.

Police report the incident was

reported to police by hospital personnel at Wilmington Hospital, where the Newark man received stitches to his ear.

Police said the man is being uncooperative with police and would not give a description of the man who cut him except to say the man is black.

## Mom on cocaine binge blacks out with three-year old, three-month old in home

Newark police are investigating whether to charge a 24-year-old Newark mother for taking illegal drugs and blacking out for two days while her two children, ages 3 years and 3-months were in her care.

Police report they were dispatched to a house in the 300 block of Paper Mill Road Nov. 17 in response to a medical emergency when the woman almost overdosed on cocaine and marijuana.

Police said the woman was

awake but incoherent when they arrived and was transported by ambulance to Christiana Hospital, where she was treated and released.

Her two children found in the house with her, police report, were dirty and seemed hungry. Police fed the 3-year-old girl McDonald's food and both children were turned over to Child Protective Services. They are currently in the care of a family friend.





# Val's Needy Family Fund celebrates 25 years of giving

Hundreds of volunteers are readying this holiday season to create more than 800 food baskets, as the Newark tradition of Val's Needy Family Fund celebrates 25 years of feeding the hungry.

It was 1969 when Val Nardo and his wife Mary began this outreach, making 10 food baskets for the needy.

"We started in the beginning

making a small number of Christmas baskets at the holiday season," said Nardo. "Then we found out really how many people are in need in this area."

He said the charity was an act of thanksgiving because his wife had survived very serious surgery.

That small beginning has become a huge charity non-profit organization stockpiling food for the hungry, year-round in a warehouse in Fairfield Shopping Center.

Val's Needy Family Fund cur-

rently works with 11 local agencies at Christmas time to create more than 800 food baskets which are given to people locally and in Maryland and Pennsylvania. "My theory is that hunger has no territory lines," he said.

Nardo estimates these baskets feed about 2,400 people and one basket can feed two people for about 10 days. He said a basket is filled with 22 food items including a turkey, canned vegetables and fruit, soup, rice, tuna, potatoes,

apples and bread.

A lot of the turkeys, Nardo said, come from local church congregations who donate them.

Volunteers will be making the baskets Dec. 18-21, which will be ready for pick up and delivery on Dec. 22.

"I feel this a God-given thing," Nardo, 75, said. "I call it my ministry and I don't plan on retiring. It's important and I gave my word to the good Lord I would do it."

"I started out with no connec-

tions," he said, "but as the basket numbers grew the community became involved."

Nardo said there are so many people now involved in the charity it amazes him because of the generous giving. "This is a community thing," Nardo said. "It's not just my thing anymore."

He said half of the Christmas baskets are made by the Newark Area Welfare committee, which makes nearly 400.

Other organizations making food

baskets are the Hudson Center, Newark Senior Center, Newark American Legion and Veteran's of Foreign Wars, St. Elizabeth Ann Seaton Church, Holy Family Church, St. Vincent DePaul Church, Hope Dining Room St. Michaels Lutheran Church and the Newark-White Clay Kiwanis Club.

People can donate non-perishable food items at bins in stores at Fairfield Shopping Center in Newark, including Super Fresh and Fairfield Variety.

Castle County public works department issued a stop work order so developers could stop the run-off.

"The area lends itself to a lot of run-off potential especially with significant rain," said Wirth. "A tremendous amount of debris washed into Anvil Park - the streets and front and backyards of homes were deluged with stones and mud."

The problem was severe enough for residents to contact their county council representative, Karen Venezky, and the Delaware and New Castle County departments of public works.

Two months after the stop work order was issued, Magness Construction got the go ahead to continue.

Task force members are satisfied that council and the public works department will watch storm water run-off during the final Academy Hill phase, above Arbour Park.

"The fact that county council members implied concern that it be monitored, particularly Karen Venezky, pleases us," Wirth said.

In addition to council's promises to watch potential run-off problems, the developer agreed to a 60-foot wooded-buffer between West Chestnut Hill Road and Academy Hill and a buffer between Arbour Park and Academy Hill.

"I don't think there is anyone who can give Brian Shuler (county planning director, responsible for approving site plans) more compliments," Wirth said. "The county public works department was also extremely efficient and did an extraordinary job adhering to storm water regulations and making sure developers have done what they are supposed to do."

Karen Venezky's assistant, Paul Daugherty, said the councilwoman is determined to make sure the public works department "keeps on top" of the developer's progress.

## White Clay Creek survey shows strong conservation support

Results from a White Clay Creek survey indicate support for a conservation plan for the watershed.

Seventy-one Newarkers had their say on how the creek should be protected, when they and 280 others living near the creek in New Castle County and Chester County, Pa., returned answers to a survey sent out early this year by the White Clay Creek Task Force.

The task force was established in May of 1993 to deal with water quality and quantity, recreation, land use, cultural and natural resources.

About 2,882 questionnaires were sent to residents randomly based on property tax records. Of those, only 12 percent — 351 people — responded.

The survey found 89 percent would support land use regulations and programs to conserve and protect the watershed. More than half said they would be in favor of an overall conservation plan for the creek.

According to a press release from the National Park Service Regional Philadelphia office, which oversees the study, "Results from the survey indicate there is a strong support for protecting the watershed's natural, historic and recreation resources. Residents listed water quality, aquatic life and wetlands as being the three most important resources of the area."

While 88 percent want to discourage aggressive development of the area, 55 percent feel there must be room for planned residential, commercial and industrial growth.

Respondents believe the water quality (62 percent) is the most worthy quality which needs protecting. Also wildlife habitat (49 percent), undeveloped land (56 percent) and scenic character (40 percent) need protection.

Results of the survey will be used to create a management plan for the watershed. This plan will recommend actions to maintain and improve the creek.

tomers isn't out there skating on Main Street."

Carl Luft, city manager, said the city won't do anything about it until the NBA gets back to them.

If an ordinance to ban skateboarding were proposed, Luft said it would be included in the traffic code and would ban skateboarding on all streets between East Main Street and Delaware Avenue.

The current regulation, adopted in 1987, is limited to Main Street between Library Avenue and Elkton Road. It says no skateboarding or rollerskating on sidewalks or streets at any time.

Meanwhile, the two store owners are no closer to an alternative. Amores maintains the issue is deeper than skaters hanging out.

"The problem is you'd be taking something away from youth," Amores said. "These kids are growing up in a town where most businesses cater to college students and now that they have something to identify with she wants to take it away."

He added, "What kind of retaliation will kids take if this (ban of skateboarding) happens?"

Ewen, however, said it's a matter of safety and good business.

"Teenagers (sometimes 20 at a time — usually after school) skateboard up and off sidewalks and cars are honking and stopping all the time," Ewen said. "It causes problems with the customers."


Another wrinkle between store owners is the appearance of the skateboarding shop.



# New Castle County parents, teachers gather to talk about what to do

A number of teachers, parents and citizens in New Castle County gathered Nov. 16 to ask that there be a change in the way local monies are received for public schools.

These repeated comments were heard at a meeting of the governor's Education Improvement Commission held to get citizen input on education issues.

The commission was formed this August by Gov. Tom Carper to better Delaware Schools.

The public was asked for comment on questions such as how to improve the quality of Delaware's public schools, who should be held accountable for student performance and how schools should spend tax dollars more efficiently.

While a handful of Christina School District teachers and parents attended the meeting at William Penn High School in the Colonial School District, Christina was hardly represented with only one person speaking at the meeting.

Marshall Elementary School PTA Secretary and parent Ruth Kelly told the crowd of about 50 people that she was nervous to address the audience but that education was important enough for her to do so.

"We need to put our children

first, at home and everywhere," Kelly said. She said she as a parent is as accountable to seeing that her daughter gets a quality education as teachers and principals are.

Kelly said she is enthusiastic about the possibility of magnet schools in the Christina School District and said as soon as a year-round school is running she will sign her daughter into the program.

Of the 14 others who spoke, the barrage of comments were about favoring a change in the referendum system.

Currently for a district to get more local money, residents of the district are asked to vote in favor of raising their property taxes to increase money for schools.

Susan Cobin, a Brandywine School District teacher, said the system of taxation to get funding for schools does not work. "Only finances and the bottom line are

important, not education," she said.

Bert Green of Brandywine said the referendum process is one of the worst things someone ever came up with. "You have to fight people who don't care about education," said Green. "It's an agonizing struggle to get the school books and materials needed."

"If you change the referendum

program a lot of people will applaud you for it," Green told the commission.

Red Clay teacher Barbara Finnan said the public schools need to be funded in a more equitable way such as a graduated income tax, not property taxes.

Other public comment included supporting a longer school year,

more technology tools such as computers and calculators are needed in classrooms, parents should only have to pay one PTA fee - not per building, that crisis intervention dealing with child and substance abuse be put at the elementary level and for the Delaware legislature to make sure there are true student-teacher ratios in classes by not

including librarians, guidance counselors, nurses and others not teaching in classrooms as a part of the count.

The commission will propose recommendations for education improvement in January or February 1995 and will then bring the proposals to the public through a series of open meetings.

## City wants ideas on new plan

Some land-use planners want a variation on a theme that could be likened to fashion gurus who brought back 1970s clothes.

It could be argued that corduroy bell bottoms deserve another walk around the block but Newarkers must decide whether they want to listen to the zip-zip-zip friction of neo-traditional planning.

Neo-traditional planners argue that "our suburbs are a traffic plagued mess that can only be set right by developments that emulate the traditional American small town (where residents can hear their corduroy-clad neighbors taking a brisk walk.)"

City Planning Director, Roy Lopata is looking for input from the community on ways neo traditional ideas can be worked into Newark's comprehensive plan.

Neo-traditionalists say returning to pre-1950s style planning, when people didn't have to drive to the market or school, will decrease automobile trips and promote a community atmosphere.

On street parking, to buffer pedestrians from moving automobiles, neighborhoods with both affordable and expensive homes and bike/pedestrian paths are some of the neo old timer planning strategies.

Sprinkle businesses in this mix and a neo-traditionalist will stick a fork in it and say its done.

Many areas of Newark, however, have already followed the same recipe.

During a recent workshop planners agreed that in the heart of Newark, between the Chessie and Conrail railroad lines, a traditional community already flourishes—according to Lopata.

"You could say that's the model and it occurred without regulations...it was pre-zoning code, which began in the 1950s," Lopata said.

Although most of Newark is already developed, Lopata said he believes there are still aspects of neo-traditional planning that could be used.

For instance, mixed-use developments.

A planning buzzword, mixed-uses could be as simple as townhouses harmoniously nestled in single family home neighborhoods and businesses with residences above located in walking distance.

"Retrofitting is impossible, but I think there are aspects worth considering that could apply to small property," Lopata said.

Lopata said the failed five townhouse proposal for the Deer Park Farm House property at 48 W. Main Street was a neo-traditional concept "boiled down to a small portion."

Opponents to neo-traditional concepts argue it is simply "the design idea of the month."

Lopata encourages interested civic organizations to call him at 366-7030 for more information.

# University looks to reach out to community

A portion of the community that swelled the wave of opposition to the demolition of the rear portion of the University of Delaware's Daugherty Hall and the construction of a new parking garage have washed directly onto the university's lap.

These Newarkers are lobbying to control the university through its charter. They want the charter amended to give the City of Newark power to control university construction through zoning regulations.

University officials, however, are looking to solve community relation problems a different way.

According to Rick Armitage, director of state and local government relations, he or John Brook, vice president of government and public relations, will personally attend council meetings and share information in the university's 1995-1996 capital budget with council.

"We thought we had done a pretty good job communicating, but we were criticized that we didn't," Brook said. "People have found that zoning is the only thing they don't have as a means to control us."

"If people of good will want to get along then we can try to do that," Brook added. "Unfortunately, some have tried to make it a power thing and it really isn't."

Brook speculated that zoning isn't the real problem. As a member

of the Town and Gown Committee, he said two areas have surfaced as to root of all that ails: conflict of lifestyles between students and residents; and the impact of rapid growth on university neighbors.

"The university response is that we have grown and the student center is an example of something we've needed for a long time," Brook said.

Armitage added that university officials don't predict their undergraduate population will grow, rather say it will stabilize.

According to a university statistical fact sheet the greatest influx of students occurred between the 1992-93 and 1993-94 school years. Brook said the university is now catching up to the increases that occurred in such growth years.

Brook said high enrollment figures that occurred when children of Baby Boomers started college have peaked and the university is not anticipating another rush.

Additional land purchases will be limited to small lots—if there are any purchases at all, according to Armitage.

There are some properties we are interested in," Brook said. "These are already surrounded by university property, but that doesn't mean we are interested in all property next to the university."

As for conflicting lifestyles, Brook said the university agreed to aggressively market student housing. He said the university has gone so far as to propose applications that provide better screening for

potential student renters; altering some

Pencader dormitories to house Greek organizations; and asking the Board of Trustees to provide home-mortgage incentives to university faculty and staff locating in the area (which would help the university comply with Clean Air Act mandates.)

"It's not that all students living in single family home neighborhoods are animals, some are great, but every so often you have some that are absolute jerks," Brook said. "We try to focus on helping neighbors live together they way they should."

Now that the student center is under construction, Brook and Armitage say the university's future plans deal mostly with renovations.

In the university's upcoming capital budget \$22 million is set aside for renovations and a 45,000 square-foot addition to the existing Colburn Laboratory. Fifteen million dollars is earmarked for renovations to Purnell Hall and a 34,000 gross square-foot classroom building next to it.

The budget reads, "Since first occupying Purnell Hall in 1972, the number of degrees awarded in Business & Economics has increased dramatically to 518 in 1994. The number of student credit hours taught and the number of full-time faculty has nearly doubled, from 48 to 86. The College currently enrolls approximately 1,774 undergraduate students and 502 graduate students."



# WILMAPCO moves into Newark

Newark Mayor, Ron Gardner, said last week that WILMAPCO headquarters will move from Suburban Plaza to Library Avenue.

The building does not exist yet, but Gardner said Fusco Enterprises, owners of College Square and Pencader Plaza, will be building it.

Gardner, who is chairman of WILMAPCO, said the facility will be specifically designed for

# Economic retreat produces ideas

Members of the a group working to build an economic blueprint for New Castle County endorsed a plan that limits the ability of residents to hold up projects, once rezoning has been approved.

The recommendation was one of a number made late last week by participants in the three-day New Castle County Economic Development Retreat. The retreat was organized by New Castle County Executive Dennis Greenhouse and New Castle County Economic Development Corp. Director Mark Kleinschmidt in an effort to preserve and enhance the area's economy. The public is being asked to comment on the action plan submitted by participants in the retreat. (See related story).

Retreat members also advocated an effort to redevelop decaying shopping centers and industrial sites by exploring the feasibility of an economic development authority.

The authority would have the ability to issue bonds to buy property and then resell it back to developers who would revitalize the site.

Figuring into the discussion

were the former Castle Mall and current Brookside Shopping Center sites, near Newark. The properties, until fairly recently, were in a run-down condition. Castle Mall, now known as Pencader Plaza, is the site of a recently opened Caldor store.

While County Council has no power to order changes in a development once zoning, sewer and other conditions have been met, neighborhood groups have continued to ask that the council take another look.

The process has been blamed for some of the delays that have sent companies elsewhere when seeking "fast track" approval for new buildings or other projects, and in fostering an "anti-development climate" in the county.

County Planning Director Bryan Shuler said the efforts to send back projects are becoming more widespread. In the past, county planners, rather than the council, had supervised the "post approval" process.

Another retreat participant, New Castle County Council member, Karen Venezky, said the recommendation would be controversial. Summit members agreed to throw their support behind council members backing the effort.

Retreat member, Newark Mayor Ronald Gardner, said the post-approval delays are not a problem in the city.

Other recommendations of the summit included:

- An emphasis on bringing in and retaining higher-wage jobs in manufacturing and other areas.
- A marketing effort to highlight the positive effects of high-quality economic development.
- Fostering teamwork among various private and public sector groups involved in economic development in the county.
- Making the education community award of presentation and future needs of employers in the county.

# City applies for money for existing parkland

THE CITY OF NEWARK is applying for money toward the cost of parkland it has already purchased.

The city will apply for half the money it spent on Iron Glen Park — \$275,000 — from a State Trust Fund Grant.

"It's sort of like a back dated application," said Carl Luft, city

manager.

Luft said the state can apply for this money even though the property transfer has been settled.

"We'll apply for \$275,000, but we'll probably only get \$50-55,000," Luft said.

The city purchased Iron Glen Park, 6.45 acres located on the border of Elkton Md. and Newark, earlier this year. The land was originally slated for 44 townhouses, but those plans were axed when the city bought it.

Luft said he will propose a similar application on the Folk property, 34 acres in the southern part of the city, purchased this summer.

The property cost \$1 million and Luft said the city will apply for half and take what it gets.

He assured city council members last Monday that applying for more money than they think they will get is standard and won't harm their chances.

## Despite friend's illness, there's still plenty to be thankful for

**W**HEN I BEGAN writing this column, I had planned for all to be cheerful and to take time to list all the blessings I have in life.

But as life is full of good surprises, there are those shocking events that touch our lives as well.

I received a call from a close friend a few days before Thanksgiving informing me he has cancer.

It's just so ironic, as I was preparing to say how extremely lucky I am to have had no death, illness or tragedy strike family or friends this year, that I received this bad news.

I'm in shock. My friend, 27, lives in Missouri. He works as a glazier replacing glass in windows and loves riding his Harley-Davidson motorcycle.

We met about seven years ago

My friend tells me his doctors say he has a good prognosis and for

that I'm extremely thankful. But I know he has a rough road ahead and I wish I could be there in person to visit him in the hospital.

He will undergo a second surgery to remove cancer today (Nov. 23) and will go through chemotherapy after that.

But as upset as I am, I am still thankful for so very much.

I'm thankful they found the abnormal cells early in my friend's body. I'm thankful he has health insurance, he has supportive parents and brothers nearby to give him support and most of all I'm thankful that Fozzy (his real name is Kirk, but because of his teddy bear resemblance is nicknamed after the muppet) called and told me so that I can support him through this battle with phone calls and letters.

Kirk will be in the hospital as we all sit down at our turkey dinners this Thanksgiving and although I know he'll have his family with him, I'll be thinking of him.

He celebrated Thanksgiving with his family last weekend and says with a joke that he is looking forward to losing weight since he'll be





# City Council to vote on stronger rental ordinance

Newark City Councilmen are thinking about cracking down on overcrowding in rental units.

Council will vote on a beefed-up rental ordinance next week that will require landlords to "prominently stipulate" the number of persons legally allowed to live in a house or apartment, before renting.

If the ordinance is approved the city will ultimately be able to take away a violating landlord's right to rent for one year.

According to Junie Mayle, city building director, landlords found in violation of the proposed ordinance will be required to evict their tenants. If a landlord does not com-

ply, the city can take away his/her rental permit - which translates into a year of lost revenue from that property.

As the ordinance currently reads, tenants who violate are fined \$250 each (even those tenants legally living in a house or apartment.)

Mayle said proving in court that a landlord knowingly rented to extra tenants is very difficult.

Finding proof that too many people live in a house or apartment is also tricky.

City Solicitor, Tom Hughes, questioned, "How do you really know how many people live in a house without infringing on their privacy?"

Council will hear from the public on this ordinance during its next



### Interest rates hamper hopes

LOCAL RETAILERS are hoping shoppers consume more than turkey and stuffing this weekend.

Black Friday is near and merchants are hopeful the day after Thanksgiving will be a sign of money to come for the holidays.

A weekly Johnson Redbook national survey released a week before Black Friday said U.S. retailer sales for the first two weeks of November declined 2.7 percent from October on a seasonally adjusted basis.

On a year-over-year seasonally adjusted basis, sales were up 5.2 percent, according to the study, a service of Lynch, Jones and Ryan stockbrokers in New York.

The November decline reversed, however, when cooler weather rolled into town.

John Wisniewski, president of the Newark Business Association (NBA), said he noticed an increase in 1993 and hopes for even more this season.

"It is a busier day and I have a feeling people will shop on that day even though they might not need anything," Wisniewski said.

He said he and other merchants along Newark's Main Street are preparing for increased shoppers. Wisniewski, who owns Delaware Sporting Goods, has launched promotions and set out clearance items.

"We try to that extra bit from the business we do get," Wisniewski said. "People may not need shorts now, but at 40 percent off they'll buy them."

Although profits have shifted over the years from downtown merchants to mall tenants, Wisniewski thinks the tides may be changing.

"My personal feeling is that people will come to Main Street," Wisniewski said. "The malls are getting so overdone and crowded — people don't want to park a mile away."

Nevertheless, Christiana Mall operators are hoping for the busiest season in years. Santa and his elves are already at the mall and merchants are planning to stay open longer.

According to Moffat Welsh, regional marketer at the mall, shopper traffic was "phenomenal" even a few weeks before

Black Friday.

"I think people come early to spread out the cost of shopping," Welsh said.

Welsh said Christiana Mall is different than others because of its Tree of Difference — which is currently clad in winter amour.

"It's (tree of difference) the only one of its kind in the country and the merchants think it's a hook that will bring people to the mall," Welsh said. "They think of it as — 'if I've got them here, then what can I make them do to spend dollars?'"

Merchants in the mall are also unique, according to Welsh, in that each accepts mall gift certificates.

Ron Walker, vice president of the small business area of the New Castle County Chamber of Commerce, said it's hard to do things for merchants this time of year.

"This is the time of year when we are least involved because retailers are really busy," Walker said. "We can't get them out to do anything."

He estimated that some businesses make as much as 30 percent of their revenue during November and December.

"What they do these six or seven weeks gives them good or bad jibes for the next year," Walker said.

How will consumers pay this winter? Increased credit card rates aren't expected to scare shoppers from "charging it" because most are already relatively high, about 17 percent. An additional one or two percentage points isn't expected to affect consumer spending too much.

According to Dr. John Stapleford, director of the University of Delaware's Bureau of Economic Research, the Federal Reserve's extra three-quarters of a percent on discount interest rates (the sixth increase this year) will "definitely put a crunch on inflation," and impact across the market.

"The question is how much, and how sensitive are the businesses?" Stapleford asked. "Some businesses might not mind an increase for retail loans if they can raise their prices, but only if the customer doesn't mind."

Ed Miller, chair of New Castle County Chamber of Commerce's Retail Committee, said he is hoping the holidays "will be great," but has no idea what really will happen.

### Some say they're dumb, but one farmer sees their potential

TURKEYS aren't just a once a year affair in Delaware. Powers Farm in New Castle County works year round raising domestic turkeys.

Powers Farm in Townsend, Delaware, will have approximately 900 fresh turkeys available for sale this year up from the 50 they grew and sold only five years ago.

Bill Powers, a 1977 graduate of Newark High School, says: "A lot of people are skeptical the first time. Then they come back the next year and order one for themselves and six for their neighbors."

Repeat customers call and order as early as July in order to ensure they get the size turkey they want for Thanksgiving dinner. He says he gets orders from New Jersey, Maryland and Pennsylvania as well as Delaware.

Because he is a first-generation farmer, Powers has worked the second shift at the Chrysler plant in Newark for the past 13 years to help with payments.

His parents bought the farm for him in 1977 and later transferred ownership to him. Powers and his wife, Joan, raise steers, chickens, pumpkins, produce, grain and eggs in addition to turkeys.

Together with their two children, Katie, 4 and Will, 1, the Powers also welcome school tours and hayrides to the farm. Powers says a lot of schoolchildren don't know anything about farming so the tours tend to be amusing.

One year he asked a group of preschoolers what came from chickens besides eggs? Powers said, "They tried guessing milk, but couldn't come up with anything else, so I asked, what about chicken McNuggets?" He said their faces lit

up but a few were upset.

Fresh dressed turkeys are available from 12 to 30 pounds although Powers says the larger turkeys are more popular with his customers. Turkeys are selling for \$1.30 a pound this year, the same as last year according to Powers.

Ground turkey and turkey parts are also available. Orders can still be filled for Christmas, New Year's and spring holidays.

Powers may have plenty of domestic turkeys, but the wild turkey has only recently become bountiful.

Wild turkeys were almost hunted to extinction at the turn of the

century, according to David Small, spokesman for the Delaware Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control (DNREC).

Hunters will have to wait until Easter to bag their own turkeys. Wild turkeys from Pennsylvania were reintroduced into Delaware in 1984, but DNREC has permitted only a spring hunting season in the last three years.

The agency has had to relocate the birds several times so they would have sufficient space to multiply and range.

Turkey hunting licenses are available through a lottery which

takes place in December. This year 666 licenses will be available to hunt the estimated 1500 wild turkeys in southern New Castle, Kent and Sussex counties.

Small says that may sound like an unfair percentage ratio but "turkeys are tough to bag because they are a very wily species". He says hunters only have a 15 to 20 percent success rate.




season and the state title three years ago at Baynard Stadium after the Vikings had beaten William Penn in the regular season.

The Yellowjackets started the season with a 12-10 win over defending state champion Salesianum and then traveled downstate where they beat Polytech and Milford. Newark won its first five conference games before setbacks to William Penn and Christiana.

"We've come off a couple of tough weeks," Simpson said. "Our confidence was shattered, but I think that's a motivating factor. In a sense I believe it's in our favor. It was a difficult week because we didn't know if we were playing or not."

A problem Newark must overcome is turnovers. The 'Jackets lost well over 10 fumbles and interceptions in the last two losses.

## Hens beat Rhode Island to finish season 7-3-1

Being home for Thanksgiving doesn't necessarily mean the University of Delaware football team didn't have a successful season.

The Blue Hens, who completed their 7-3-1 season with a 26-7 win over Rhode Island last Saturday, will not be competing in the NCAA I-AA playoffs for the first time in

four years. That, however, didn't stop Coach Tubby Raymond from pronouncing himself satisfied with the season.

"I feel that the season was successful in many, many ways," Raymond said Monday. "I said at the beginning of the year that this team had a very large range of potential — both positive and negative. We could have easily, if we had some breaks, gone 10-1. But we could have just as easily lost a few more games."

"I've always said that the first and last

games of the season were the most important. The first tells you where you are and the last tells you how far you've come. In that respect, after going 5-0-1 in our last six games, I think the season was very successful."

One of the big reasons for that turnaround was the play of the defense.

In the first five games (with a 2-3 record), the Hens gave up 34 points, 178 yards rushing and 380 total yards per game. In the last six, they gave up just 19.5

(including Hofstra's 41), 116 and 348 respectively.

The quarterback situation also seemed to clear up a bit with Raymond announcing that the starting job for next year's team is Leo Hamlett's to lose with Keith Langan being the backup.

"It's very clear," Raymond said of the quarterbacks. "Langan has a lot of positive things. He's solid. He won't beat you and

## Newark falls 1-0 to McKean in semifinals; finish good season with 14-2-3 record

WILMINGTON — Newark High's hopes of reaching the state soccer tournament championship were suddenly dampened Thursday night after 78 minutes of semifinal stalemate at chilly and drizzly Baynard Stadium.

The Highlanders held an edge in shots 13 to 7 and Bradley made eight saves. Newark had a

**Christiana finishes regular season with big win over Delcastle**

**CHRISTIANA** - It's not that Delcastle gave anything to Christiana High, but the Cougars couldn't stop the Vikings from taking what they wanted either.

The Vikes ignited for three first-period touchdowns and flattened Delcastle 56-8 Saturday at Coder Field to win the Blue Hen Conference Flight A championship and their ninth straight game.

"We obviously outmanned them," said Christiana Coach Bill Muehleisen, who has steered the Vikes to the state playoffs three of the last four years. "We have some extra-special athletes and we had too many for Delcastle. Oh sure, winning the conference is always our No. 1 goal. Always will be. What happens in the next two weeks is icing on the cake. The kids will be excited."

The victory secured home-field advantage for Friday's Division I

state playoff semifinal showdown against William Penn and broke a school regular-season scoring record set in 1991. Christiana's 381 regular season points eclipsed the previous mark of 372.

Seth Davis rushed for a pair of touchdowns and caught another as Christiana ran up a 37-8 cushion by halftime and led 37-0 with 7:47 left in the second quarter. Rashad Bailey rushed for 145 yards, including 123 in the first half and scored Christiana's fifth TD from the Delcastle 1.

Davis scored from the Cougar 4 on a second effort with 7:12 gone in the first and then sprinted around the left side with 5:06 left. He also caught an 11-yard scoring pass from Jon Boney for the Vikes' fourth touchdown.

"They're all good runners," said Boney, who completed six of 12 passes for 126 yards and two TDs, all in the first half. "We wanted to try to keep our running game in because. Everybody thinks we're

just a passing team since we've been passing a lot. Basically we wanted to get the sweeps back."

Christiana rushed for over 200 yards and cracked the 300-plus total offensive yardage barrier for the eighth time this season. Curt Henry scored the Vikings' third TD on a 39-yard scoring pass play late in the first period and finished the game with three receptions for 85 yards.

"Obviously they weren't going to be excited after last week's (victory over Newark) but yet they still came out and did the things they had to do," Muehleisen said. "And I think that's the sign of this team. I don't think we get really high emotionally but I don't think we get really down emotionally either. And that's not all bad."

Christiana held the winless Cougars (0-10) to under-50 yards on the ground. The only breakdown was a partially blocked punt late in the second half that led to Delcastle's lone score, a 29-yard scoring pass from Karvin Reeves to

Dorian Coleman.

Mike Carrington blocked a Delcastle punt and recovered in the end zone for a safety early in the second period that gave the Vikings a 30-0 lead. Bailey's one-yard run set up by his 55 rushing yards in two plays made the score 37-0 and the Cougars scored with 3:28 left for a 37-7 halftime margin.

Marvin Adams bobbled the second-half kickoff but recovered and streaked 93 yards untouched for a touchdown. Andrew Allen, who recorded one sack for minus-12 yards, kicked his fifth point-after and the Vikes led 44-8. # Hen men open season against DelState

The University of Delaware men's basketball team will start its quest to get back to the NCAA Tournament Saturday afternoon at Delaware State.

The Hens, after back-to-back North Atlantic Conference championships and successive trips to the NCAA Regionals, slipped to a 14-13 record and a fifth place finish in the NAC last season.

When practice started Oct. 15, the Hens returned everybody from last year's squad, plus gained transfers Peca Arsic (6-foot, 9-inch center from Yugoslavia) and Steve Pierce (6-8, center/forward from Smyrna).

It didn't take long, however, for Delaware to receive its first setback as starting point guard Rob Garner was lost for two to three months with a fractured elbow.

Despite Garner's injury, optimism still reigns in the Blue Hen camp.

Senior guard Brian Pearl, who led the team in scoring last year (16.7 points per game) will move from shooting guard back to the point. Robbie Johnson, who averaged 12.6 points per game last season, also returns and will see time at both the shooting guard and small forward positions.

Greg Smith, Matt Strine, Micah

Edwards and Darrin Anderson — all inside players who averaged over 26 minutes per game last season — also return, as does Patrick Evans, who played just one game last year before suffering a season-ending injury. Add big men Arsic and Pierce to the mix and the Hens appear to have an extremely deep

Delaware Coach Steve Steinwedel, who starts his 10th year at the helm of the Blue Hen hoop program. "We could be just as happy with our season if we finish seventh or eighth as second or third. It's really going to be that competitive."

Steinwedel, in his nine years, has compiled a 151-106 record, good enough to be Delaware's all-time winningest basketball coach.

"From top to bottom it's the toughest the conference has been since we've been in the league," Steinwedel said. "It was a very young conference last year and just about everybody is back. There's a lot of luck involved in winning a championship. Anything can happen during those three days [of the NAC Tournament] in March."

Drexel Coach Bill Herrion echoes Steinwedel's thoughts.

"I've been around the conference for about nine years," he said. "From top to bottom, this is the strongest and most balanced the league has been."







## Laughter could be best medicine

### UNSUNG HERO

What is the number one movie pick among cancer patients at Christiana Hospital? One that gives patients hope.

The most popular choice is "Medicine Man", where a cure for cancer is found in the jungle.

This fact is known because of the comedy cart program at the hospital. This program is one where patients on the Oncology floor can watch movies and eat popcorn free of charge in their room all hours of the night.

But the most impressive fact is that doctors who treat patients on the cancer floor have documented that they have seen a decrease in the amount of pain medication they prescribe since the movie program has been implemented.

Newarker Jay Wells is instrumental in running the program. When he began volunteering two years ago at Christiana Hospital on the cancer ward because a close-relative is battling the disease, there were no videos for patients to watch.

"They asked me to run this comedy cart because the people on this floor are the sickest and usually have the longest stay (in the hospital)," Wells said. "We started with nothing but a cart on wheels and

then got donations of puzzles, board games and books."

But Wells soon found out that patients going through painful treatments could not concentrate on the cart's contents.

That's when nurse Mary Redman told Wells the idea of providing movies for cancer patients to watch to take their minds off of pain and to make them laugh.

The comedy cart program now gets donations from local video stores and has a selection of 486 videos ranging from comedies to dramas, thrillers and musicals.

But Wells said the sad movies are weeded out from donations. After all laughter - not crying - is said to be the best medicine.

Other popular movies at the hospital are Sister Act, Pretty Woman and Dirty Dancing.

Also, when the program was started the floor had no VCR's or televisions for patients to watch the movies. But after raising money through bake and jewelry sales, a hospital raffle and area corporations making donations, there are currently nine televisions to rotate among the 40 patients.

Of the video equipment, one television was donated by the American Cancer Society and two patients' families have given equip-

ment in memory of a loved one who died from the disease.

Wells volunteers two days a week checking on patients, getting them drinks and of course asking if they want to see a movie. Patients can choose from a movie list Wells has typed up.

He also checks the video cassette recorder machines and rewinds and files the movies in order.

"The movies take chemotherapy patients' minds off of what they are

going through," said Wells, "and also helps their families."

He said a lot of times the patient will fall asleep during the movie and family members will continue watching.

Other volunteers work the comedy cart on Well's off days, so patients can watch movies seven days a week.

## Dolly Parton holds nothing back

NEW YORK—Look beyond the trademark big hair and, well, the other obvious big traits of Dolly Parton, and you marvel at the heart of a big-time star who emerged from the humblest of backwoods roots.

She holds back nothing. She likes herself, likes life. With a candor rarely found in show business or anywhere else, she bares her soul's joys and sorrows and scars with an earthiness that can bring laughter, tears and blushes.

She is raw and rough and perky and personal, but as genuine and distinctive as the high-pitched Smoky Mountains twang that launched her career as a country singer.

In short, she's someone you just like being around.

"This outrageous look fits my outrageous personality," said Parton, wearing a black leather short skirt and low cut, V-neck leather blouse adorned with white, loopy-lacy decorations on the sleeves.

"I like myself, I feel good about who I am," she added, a bundle of boundless energy during a recent interview. "If you're talking to me, you're going to hear what I've got to say."

Well, there's a lot to listen to these days.

Her autobiography, "Dolly: My Life and Other Unfinished Business," hit the book shelves

Sept. 27. It was published simultaneously with the children's book "Coat of Many Colors."

In addition to her book, she's got a new album, featuring her novelty song, "PMS Blues," plus a new line of cosmetics, a line of wigs (big hair, of course), a line of women's undergarments and a new CBS sitcom called "Heavens to Betsy."

"Dolly" is the story of a country girl born poor but rich in spirit, the fourth of 12 children of a Locust Ridge, Tenn., sharecropper who raised a family in a one-room shack.

"I just wanted to write from my heart," Parton said of a book that was three years in the making. "I've always been proud of my people. I've never been ashamed of my family—as poor as we are, as bad as we might have looked. To do that would be denying your own soul, your own heart."

Without ever taking a music lesson, or knowing how to write a note, she learned to pick a guitar and began singing in church. At 18, she headed for Nashville on the day she graduated from high school. And she was appearing on television before her family ever noticed.

What followed over the next 30 years was: 62 albums, four Grammy awards, an entertainment park called Dollywood in Pigeon Forge, Tenn., a career in movies that earned her a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame and country roots that put her in the

Small Town of America Hall of Fame.

After making it big, she went back and bought the old homestead, refurbishing it as a theme park that includes a chapel, schoolhouse and a two-seater outhouse adorned with red and white corn cobs (country folks know what they're for).

"I just had a dream to follow. It wasn't about getting away as much as it was about getting out," she said. "I wanted to be loved, I wanted to be recognized. I wanted to be appreciated and to give something back."

"No amount of money could buy from me the memories I have, and no amount of money could pay me to go back and live through it again."

Her family now lives on a farm of their own, having turned down chances to live in more palatial quarters.

"If I got a dime, my family's got a nickel. They can have it all if they need it. I'm there for them, whatever they need," said Parton.

She writes about her husband, Carl Dean, whom she met on her first day in Nashville. A mystery figure of sorts, Dean doesn't surface at all in Parton's public life.

For years, the tabloids trumpeted rumors of extramarital affairs, which Parton doesn't exactly lay to rest.

"He don't ask and I don't say. And I don't ask and he don't say," Parton writes.

She also mentions Judy Ogle, a friend she's known since the third grade. Parton does allow that she and Ogle often share the same bed, but doesn't quite completely define that relationship either.

"One thing we've had to overcome is the constant rumor that Judy and I are lesbian lovers," Parton writes.

The 5-foot-2 Parton also discloses her 18-month-long bout with depression during the 1980s, when

## The Nashville Network is a hit

NASHVILLE, Tenn.—There's nothing wrong with The Nashville Network that a little country music can't fix—over and over again.

You might think tired formats even network television has discarded, pearl-toothed, hair-sprayed personalities and "Hee Haw" reruns might sound like a recipe for disaster. But think again.

Peel away the veneer, and the earthy music that drives an industry makes TNN's best moments well worth watching.

Take the recent night neglected oldtimer Bobby Bare appeared on TNN's flagship show, "Music City Tonight." Between glad-handing and idle chatter that would have embarrassed Merv Griffin, Bare took center stage to emcee his classic "Detroit City."

Bare put across the simple tale of homesickness and displacement so well that the blinking lights behind him on the Las Vegas-like stage simply ceased to matter.

That happens a lot on TNN.

"Our viewers really want to see all aspects of country music and country music artists," said Kevin Hale, the TNN vice president responsible for programming. "They want to see them perform, they want to know about their lives, they want to know about their families, they want to know how their tours are going and what their new albums are like."

So, perky as the packaging may be, the dark heart of country music fuels every show on TNN except the sports (NASCAR racing, rodeos and the like) that dominate on the weekends.

Where else but TNN are you likely to see Kris Kristofferson and Lorrie Morgan on "American Music Shop" making you believe they mean it on a duet of "Help Me Make It Through the Night"? Or even a genuine non-musical moment as when lapsed superstar Kenny Rogers admits his envy of Garth Brooks to Phyllis George on one of her Barbara Walters-type specials?

Sometimes you have to wade through some cow chips to get to the good stuff. "Country News" is TNN's "Entertainment Tonight," and it's only the lack of gratuitous sex that opens every episode of the show that makes it even watchable. Still, how many breathless reports about artists celebrating No. 1 hits do we need in a lifetime?

Ralph Emery and Phyllis George do the celebrity interview bit—with varying degrees of success.

Emery, who drastically hosted TNN's "Music City Tonight" predecessor until being pushed out in an effort to get a younger audience, still seems to have to struggle to maintain concentration on even the biggest stars.

George goes afiel from country music for guests, even landing President Clinton for a frothy 20-minute segment.

The Charlie Daniels' "Star Search" clone makes one long for the days of "The Gong Show."

On the brighter side are "American Music Shop" a straight performance show that gives the venerable "Austin City Limits" a run for the money with interesting performer combos (such as the aforementioned Kristofferson-Morgan pairing).

New and promising for next year are in-depth biographies of country music greats from the producers of the "Biography" series on the Arts & Entertainment network.

The Statler Brothers reign as the network's most popular show with their variety series, and TNN has two "American Bandstand"-style shows riding the line-dancing craze. "Country America" will revive the old "PM Magazine" format.

"This is real safe-harbour viewing here," Hale said, "and there's a direction and a purpose behind all that."

"We don't want parents to have to worry about their kids sitting down when they watch TNN. It is very wholesome viewing, and our advertisers appreciate that."

Perhaps even more appreciative are some of the artists who are experiencing career revivals through TNN exposure. Garth Brooks, Vince Gill and Reba McEntire appear often and love it when their videos run, but stars of that caliber don't have the time to fill up TNN's 18 hours of daily programming. There are plenty of struggling Nashville performers eager to take up the slack.

Hale says TNN can be punched up in about 58 million homes, compared with about 95 million for each of the three main networks.

Rex Allen Jr. described his career as "dead in the water" when the Statler Brothers made him a regular on their Saturday evening variety show.

"I haven't had a record on the charts since about 1985 or '86," Allen said. "The crowds at my concerts have quadrupled, and it doesn't have anything to do with a current record—totally, it is due to TV exposure."

Hale has worked to protect TNN from any downswing in the popularity of country music by building on brand extensions—shows and personalities with "an all-American character."

"Certainly, our extension into outdoor programming, our extension into rodeo ... and also our motor sports, which is continuing to grow—as country music goes through different ups and downs and different phases of its popularity, I think our programming is extending out enough that we don't anticipate that we'll see ratings drop."

# Computers

## Buying software isn't kid's play

**B**UYING computer software for your child can be a hard job—particularly if the kid is more computer-literate than you are.

Here are some tips, Wendy J. Meyeroff wrote in an article in the current issue of Good Housekeeping, for the dizzy, dazed parent who has a would-be hacker for an offspring.

Know the computer hardware involved. You have to know whether you are buying for a PC or a Macintosh; what size disk the system takes; and if the computer has a color screen, sound capability, and accessories such as a CD-ROM

player.

Write technical information down. Even better, bring along a computer wise friend.

Read the software box carefully. It should tell you the software's technical requirements, such as how much memory it takes and for which age group this program is designed.

Talk to the child's teacher. A teacher can tell you about a youngster's abilities and interests, so you can buy a program to "tutor" him or just stimulate his interest. Also find out which programs are being used at school, particularly in this child's grade. Having the same program at home will give him extra "class" time and you can be fairly

sure a program used in school has passed stringent standards.

Don't take age labels too seriously. You may not think a program labeled "Ages 5 to 10" is appropriate for a 4-year-old. But if she is reading at second-grade level, she will get bored quickly with a program for 3- to 6-year-olds.

Talk to a users' group. User group members meet to trade information, including reports on software. If they don't have information on kids' software, they can steer you to retail and mail-order outlets that have a good track record in serving customers. To find a users' group in your area, call the manufacturer of the computer model you are buying for.


Look for programs that require the child's active participation. A computer, like a TV, should not be an electronic baby sitter. A good program constantly requires the child's input—choosing paths to take, constructing scenarios—so that he is not just a passive observer. Also look for programs that can be set at different age or skill levels, or that have lots of different scenarios to choose from; they grow with children and keep them from becoming easily frustrated or bored.

Look for programs that encourage creativity. There are many drawing and "painting" programs that allow a child to express his or her artistic side by turning the computer into a canvas. "Desktop publishing" programs enable a youngster to produce professional-looking publications—from book reports to the child's own newspaper. There are also music-oriented programs.

Keep in mind that artistic programs run better on a color monitor—some even require it—and music programs require some sound capability.

Never buy a program just because a famous character appears on the box. Some companies that spend large sums purchasing the rights to use a famous character offer software products that are rather simplistic and not as well produced as products from companies whose names you don't recognize. Ask teachers or computer-smart friends, Good Housekeeping advised, about which manufacturers produce high-quality software for kids.





## Paul Erdman Becker, Jr., 77, Pearl Harbor survivor

**N**EWARK RESIDENT, PAUL ERDMAN BECKER, JR., died Nov. 18, 1994, of a heart attack following heart surgery at Christiana Hospital.

Mr. Becker, 77, was a retired Marine Corps lieutenant colonel, Pearl Harbor survivor and former University of Delaware treasurer. Raised in Bridgeport, Conn., Mr. Becker joined the Marines after graduating from the Naval Academy in 1938. He served in New London, Conn. before going to Hawaii in 1940, where he served in security at Pearl Harbor.

During the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, he was in the Marine barracks next to Hickam Air Field. The barracks were destroyed but he escaped uninjured.

After the attack he helped set up security for an expected second attack. He later served at Midway for a year and then returned to Pearl Harbor, where he was in charge of building Maui Airport.

In 1944, he took charge of the Marine prison at Hart's Island in Long Island Sound, near New York City. He then was sent to China, where he was one of the Americans evacuated before the Communist takeover. After serving as a legal officer in Guam, he was assigned to Marine Corps headquarters near Washington in 1949 to serve as a congressional liaison.

During the Korean War, he headed the Marine Corps personnel plans and policy unit which handled staffing for the invasion of Inchon.

In 1952, he became financial services chief at

the Marine supply depot in Barstow, Calif. He then joined the staff at Camp Pendleton, Calif. in 1954. After attending Armed Forces Staff College in Norfolk, Va., from 1956-57, he served as a battalion commander with the Eighth Marine Division at Camp Lejeune, N.C. He retired in 1960 as the division's executive officer.

After retiring, he became controller at the University of Delaware. He was later named business manager and was its treasurer when he retired in 1980. He remained a loyal Blue Hen football fan.

Mr. Becker was listed in Who's Who in American Finance and Industry and Who's Who in College Administration. In 1966, he earned a master's degree in business administration from the university by taking night courses.

He was a member of Newark's St. Thomas Episcopal Church.

He is survived by his wife, Claire Becker; three sons, Kip, a professor at Boston University, Kenneth of Wilmington and Raymond of Elkton, Md.; a sister, Florence Dautel of Bridgeport, Conn.; and four grandchildren.

A service was held Nov. 22 at St. Thomas Episcopal Church, Newark and his ashes will be placed at the U.S. Naval Academy.

The family suggests contributions to the Paul Becker Memorial Fund at St. Thomas Episcopal Church, Newark.

## William J. Matwey Sr., 78, pattern maker

Bear resident, William J. Matwey Sr. died Nov. 11, 1994, of cancer at the home of his daughter, Joanne Samans, of Kimberton, Newark.




