Local Residents Aid With CAP After Crash Of Jet Airliner

Explosion With Fatal Crash For 81 Aboard Airline Jet Seen Throughout Newark Area; Civil Air Patrol Assists With Search, Investigation At Site Of Tragedy

Local residents assisted with Civil Air Patrol community guard duty, and search of the site after a Boeing 707-320 Pan American airliner bound from Puerto Rico to Philadelphia, burst into flames and crashed at 9 o'clock Sunday night during an electrical rainstorm in a field between U. S. Route 40 and the new turnpike, killing all 81 persons aboard. The explosion was heard throughout the Newark area, and the crash was seen by many residents. The wreckage was found about 10 miles from the airport.

Two Guernseys In Local University Herd Classed In Top One Per Cent For Breed

Two Guernseys from the University of Delaware's purebred herd in Newark have been classified in the top one per cent of all the cows of that breed. Nineteen others were classified "very good," which means they are among the top 16 per cent.

The classification program was conducted by a representative of the American Guernsey Cattle Club at an open house on the University farm last week.

Open house was to give university students and dairy breeders opportunity to see the recently consolidated Guernsey herd and watch them being classified.

Through provisions of the will of the late Harold Shutt of Chadds Ford, Pa., the university received the nationally known Spar Hill Guernsey herd a few weeks ago. Since space was limited at the university farm it became necessary to sell some of the animals from this herd and some from the university's existing herd. Terry, Successor To Fisher On U. D. Board Of Trustees

Board Approves Expansion Of Mitchell Hall; Plans Of New Dorm, Enrollment

Elected to a six-year term as a member of the University of Delaware board of trustees, Dover Attorney N. Maxson Terry succeeds the late George M. Fisher, a trustee from 1939 until his death last July.

Walter J. Beadie, Wilmington, R. R. M. Carpenter, Jr., Montchanin, Joseph L. Marshall, Lewes, and Warren C. Newton, Bridgeville, were reelected.

At Saturday's semi-annual meeting on the university campus, plans and allocation of funds for enlarging Mitchell Hall were approved, and principal campus plans for a new dormitory complex — Gilbert Hall — were accepted.

Terry, chairman of the State Highway Commission, is also president of the Delaware State Bar Association.

A graduate of Princeton Preparatory School, he received his bachelor's degree in business administration and his law degree at Washington and Lee University; was admitted to the Delaware bar in 1929; and last June, was admitted to the bar of the U. S. Supreme Court.

Trustees approved a functional plan for the addition of two wings to Mitchell Hall.

The wings, with 600-sq. ft. will provide 10 offices; two classrooms; workshop and storage areas for costume and set construction; and six recording booths for corrective speech practice. The stage will be redesigned and enlarged, and the entire building air conditioned, with \$440,000 for the entire project.

Trustees approved plans to modify the design of Gilbert Hall, similar to Harrington and Russell dormitories, with capacity increased from 350 to 651 beds. Other new features include family-size quarters for a full-time residence hall adviser, a larger number of single rooms, and elimination of a long, central corridor.

To finance the construction of the new structure, trustees empowered university officials to apply for a self-liquidating loan of \$1,500 from the Housing and Home Finance Administration.

In effort to meet rising enrollment pressures, trustees approved three operating policies for 1964-65:

1. Limiting out-of-state students to 280 in an anticipated entering class of 1,350.
2. Restricting admission of "limit-of-program" students (those not fully qualified academically) to those who successfully completed prescribed summer session courses.
3. Priority on admission of Delaware residents will be given to those fully qualified, and if enrollments exceed facilities and staff, limited program students may be asked to wait until February, 1965 to enter the university.

Proceeding with plans and selection of a site for another new dormitory to be opened in 1965.

If you think agriculture is just for men, you may get an argument from Theodora Wang, a junior in the University of Delaware's school of agriculture.

Not only has Miss Wang invaded a predominantly male field, but she has achieved a distinguished record. Now in her third year of studies, Miss Wang is a dean's list student, and the top student majoring in horticulture, according to Dr. Charles W. Dunham, her advisor and professor of horticulture.

Teddy, as she is known to her friends, is not a bookish female. Her out-of-class activities include membership in Beta Beta Beta, the national biological honorary society, dormitory activities and work on the business staff of the University of Delaware yearbook.

As one of six female students in a school of agriculture enrollment of 260, Teddy could have gone to an out-of-state school, but she notes that the men don't seem to mind the girls, either — except to complain that there aren't enough of them.

Choosing to attend a state university near her home in Tenafly, N. J., Teddy could have gone to Penn State or Rutgers, but she chose the University of Delaware because of its smaller size and the promise of better contacts with professors.

"I didn't want to get lost in the crowd, or become a number of a kind," she says. With her academic record, she surely won't get lost in any crowd, even after school days are completed. She plans to attend graduate school, and hopes to do research on plants for the U. S. government.

School Bus Needs For Newark Cited At Board Meeting

H. Lewis Miller, administrative assistant for business management, explained the need for more school buses at last Tuesday night's meeting of the Newark Board of Education.

The board told Miller and Supl. William E. Shure to make every effort to get enough buses for 1964-65 to carry all students at one time.

Shure said buses have been able to get children to school this year by making two runs. This has led to varying starting and finishing times for district schools.

The State Board of Education agreed at its Nov. 21 meeting that Newark did not have enough buses.

The bus that carries 75 has one of the longest trips in the district. It is rated to carry 60 elementary students and starts in the south-west part of the district. It has 62 passengers when it gets to Ogletown Junior High School to unload 33. It then picks up more senior high students and has 75 to unload at Christiana High School.

The State Board, which pays all costs of school buses, voted last month to study a costly plan to end overcrowding in fast-growing districts.

Council Zones 12.1-Acre Site For Apartment House Project

Tract Between Elkton, Willa Roads Rezoned To Permit Apartments; Vote On Proposed City Charter Referendum Deferred To Jan. 13; Director Of Planning Employed

A 12.1-acre tract between Willa and Elkton roads, just north of the Binns development, was rezoned from RS to RM to permit apartment house construction; newly employed Planning Director John Griesbaum was introduced; and action on the proposed city charter was deferred at the regular meeting of Newark City Council last Monday night.

Rezoning of the 12.1-acre tract owned by the Wilmington Catholic Diocese was accomplished by a 6-0 vote at a deferred and rescheduled reading of the ordinance with Councilman Charles J. Shepherd absent. A 20-acre park area to the northeast of the tract was established with rezoning for the apartment project.

Council also rezoned from Business A to RM, a 21-acre plot adjoining the Chrysler property at 638 South College Avenue, and deferred action on a proposal to rezone from RS to RM, 1.78 acres, the rear of the College Towne Apartments on Elkton Road, until the Jan. 27 meeting.

An ordinance establishing a 45-ft. setback for all construction on the west side of Elkton Road between West Park Place and Barksdale Road, was approved by a 5-1 vote with Councilman Lefroy C. Hill, Jr., dissenting. A former "final" reading of this ordinance was invalid for lack of advertising time.

"Has the state given any indication when they are going to build?" Councilman Hill asked concerning the setback to provide for a proposed street widening and service road in this area. At Councilman Joseph A. Shields' suggestion, the matter is to be reconsidered in three months.

An ordinance waiving requirements for sidewalks, paved gutters, and curbs, with 24-ft. width cul-de-sac, on interior streets in RFD-zoned residential areas, was approved by a 4-2 vote with Hill and Councilman William M. Coverdale opposing the measure.

"I see no reason why our city should set standards as its own standard to annexation," Coverdale said.

"Our city has arrived at a point where we need to think of change," Mayor Carl S. Rankin said, citing Christine Minor as a residential development of low density population that minimum zoning has proven satisfactory.

Artesian Granted Water Sale Rights Over City Claims

Artesian Water Company, a Newport-based public utility, can extend its service into areas claimed by Newark, the State Supreme Court has ruled.

The decision affirmed a June 23, 1962, Public Service Commission ruling, which has been contested by the City of Newark.

The PSC held that Artesian could expand service from the upper Pike Creek area to Polly Drummond Hill Road and build a 2-million-gallon storage tank on Crow Hill behind Roseville Park.

Newark, also in the water business, contends that the PSC ruling allowed Artesian to infringe on the city's exclusive right to serve the area.

The city took the case to Superior Court which upheld the PSC ruling in March. The State Supreme Court opinion, handed down last Friday, upheld the Superior Court's findings.

According to the high court opinion, "A careful review of the record in this case convinces us that the findings and rulings of the Public Service Commission are supported by substantial evidence and are not against the weight of the evidence."

The contested service area includes land that a group of builders plan to use for a suburban development for about 15,000 persons.

In its 1962 ruling, the PSC said, "We do not believe that Newark should be permitted to preempt thousands of acres of undeveloped land north and west of the Robert Kirkwood Highway, extending to the Pennsylvania line, merely on the basis of its present service on Robert Kirkwood Highway."

Newark contended the PSC apparently favored granting the territory to Artesian because it legally can control the company's activities but cannot control the city's.

Artesian replied that the ruling merely put it and the city on an equal footing, giving both the right to service the area.

MUCH ADO ABOUT SOMETHING
 About once or twice a month some starry-eyed citizen forward and proposes to hold funeral rites for an infant and unborn child. The notion that tuberculosis is "conquerable" and now belongs wholly to the past is tempting one that some people are reluctant to let the medical facts stand in its way.
 The medical facts are there, and so are the public statistics; more than 50,000 new cases and nearly 10,000 deaths from TB in the United States every year. There are still plenty of people aware of this fact, and eager to do something about it. Even a look at some of their activities shows that vigorous action is being taken against this disease.
 In Indianapolis, for instance, a group of dedicated people through their local tuberculosis association recently launched an intensive campaign of neighborhood chest examinations, during which more than 5,500 persons of themselves of this form of TB checkup.
 In Kentucky an emergency fund was established so that TB patients could get free transportation to and from clinics and hospitals.

Of which invites two conclusions — that there is still much TB around, and that enough people still know it and are concerned about it to justify hopes of ultimate victory.

60,000 In State Receive Vaccine At Sunday Clinics

Type 3 Sabin Oral Vaccine Offered With State-Wide Polio Immunization Drive

Some 60,000 Delawareans received Type 3 Sabin oral vaccine last Sunday at 50 clinics throughout the state. Two clinics were conducted in the Newark area.

Dr. Henry H. Stroud, state chairman of the polio immunization campaign, said that 32,776 persons were counted at the clinics — an increase of 1,587 over the 31,189 who turned out Nov. 3, when Type 1 vaccine was given.

The Medical Society of Delaware, gratified at the response, immediately announced that five make-up clinics would be conducted this week for persons unable to attend Sunday's clinics.

Make-up clinics are being held Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Public and State Board of Health buildings, Wilmington; the New Castle County Health Unit, Emily P. Biesel Hospital; State Board of Health Building in Dover; and Sussex County Health Unit in Georgetown.

Sunday's clinic was the second in a series of three. The final clinic when Type 2 vaccine will be administered, will be held Jan. 19.

The annual report of the Newark Planning Commission was accepted, and a Planning Commission recommendation for a new restrictive business zoning — BL — was referred back to the commission with proposed exclusion of all multiple dwellings from such business areas.

The Planning Commission recommendation for construction of a Delaware Water Company reservoir on the firm's property in Arbour Park, was approved by a 5-1 vote with Councilwoman Betty M. McClelland in opposition.

City Manager J. Francis Neide said the company supplied the city with some water, and the tank was needed to provide adequate pressure.

Contracts were awarded at the city manager's recommendation, for municipal purchase of traffic light equipment at Capitol Trail and South Dilwyn Road at a cost of \$3,009.91 to replace state emergency equipment; for cast iron pipe at the low bid of \$2,234; for a police patrol car from Hollywood-Parkins at the low bid of \$1,912.84; for an additional dump truck for the street crew at the low bid of \$5,481.77 from Wm. H. Porter, Inc., and for a storm sewer on Delaware Avenue between Haines Street and Chinese Alley to relieve Main Street flooding, at the low bid of \$4,769.75.

A contract for purchase of fire hydrants and valves at a cost of \$1,000 was also awarded.

Dan Suppe, guard, was named to the first team, and Harvey Folk, quarterback, and Mike Walker, tackle, won second team positions. Selected at guard with Suppe, is Edward W. Roberts, Jr., Senford, while first team All-State ends are Charles L. Graham, Jason, and Allen T. Green, Claymont; Tackles Andrew M. Bartholomew, Sales, and Walter Brown, Jr., Howard; Center John P. Holloway, Sales; and a backfield of William Clark, Jr., Middletown; Ralph Donofrio, Jr., Archmere; James E. Layfield, Jr., Millsboro's state scoring champion; and Charles Mikolajewski, Jr., Salesman.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Leo Suppe of 1025 Barkdale Road, Suppe at 6-1 and 180-lbs., scored 21 points for the Yellowjackets during the 1963 season, including a touchdown and a 31-yard field goal.

He kicked all of Newark's extra points; was a defensive linebacker, and "the toughest lineman I've had," Hoffman said.

Folk, who quarterbacked the Yellowjackets to the conference crown, was shifted from his regular two-season post as a star halfback when Newark's Norris Saunders was unable to take over the starting quarter post because of a summer softball shoulder injury.

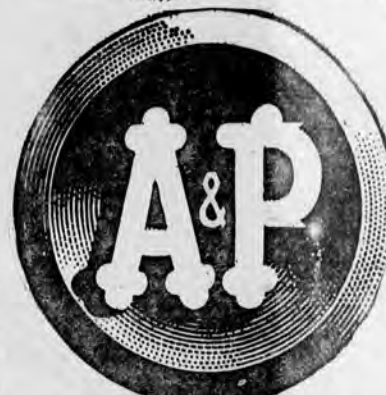
