BOND DRIVE TOTAL IS \$40,418.75 2ND WEEK

Figures Are
Cash Turned In—
Pledge Count
When Bonds Sold

At the end of the second week of the Sixth War Bond Drive, it is reported by A. Frank Fader, general chairman, that the Newark workers have actually sold \$40,418.75 in "E" Bonds. Sale of bonds the past week totaled \$20,162.50 while the first week figure was \$12,256.25.

Newark's quota for the "E" bond sale is set at \$125,000 for the Sixth War Bond Drive and the committee in charge of the campaign expects to have Newark over-the-top as quickly as possible.

The figures given represent the amount of actual cash received from the sale of the bonds and not the maturity value, according to a statement from Mr. Fader who stated that the pledges just don't count until the bonds are bought. Credit for pledges will be given as soon as the bonds are purchased.

The sale of all types of Bonds, including "E" Bonds to December 2 for Newark and vicinity is \$379,373.25 according to figures released this week.

Every effort is being made by the volunteer workers to contact each home in the Newark area by the sixteenth of December and Mr. Fader is high in his praise of the effort being put forth to make this Sixth War Bond Drive a great success.

FARMERS TO RECEIVE CROP LOANS

Office Is
Opened At
Dover P. O.

Applications for 1945 crop loans are now being accepted by Field Supervisor W. Fred Rickards, of the Emergency Crop Loan Office, in the Post Office Building at Dover. It was stated that advances on 1945 crop loans in Delaware are being made earlier than usual this year in order to allow farmers to buy fertilizer during November and December, and store it on their farms for spring planting.

The Emergency Crop Loan Office makes loans up to \$400 to those farmers, either land owners or tenants, who are eligible and advances will be made on these loans immediately so that fertilizer may be purchased on a cash basis.

Security required is a first lien on 1945 crops. The interest rate is 4 percent per year and loans made at this time are to be repaid from the sale of crops next summer and fall.

Gunner's Mate 2nd Class Ralph Skillman, recently reported missing in action has been officially reported as having been killed in action, according to word received today by his grandmother, Mrs. George Sands of East Main Street.

Mrs. Sands stated that she had received word from the Captain of the ship on which young Skillman was serving that the boy had been officially reported killed and that he had died gallantly in action but due to military requirements details of his death would have to be withheld until after the war.

The youth was 19 years old and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph M. Skillman and was a graduate of the Newark High School and before entering the service was employed at the Continental-Diamond Fibre Company.

NEWARK COUNCIL IN MONTHLY SESSION

Town Council
Purchases
\$20,000 In
War Bonds

The Newark Town Council held their regular monthly meeting in the council rooms on Monday night with Mayor Charles C. Hubert presiding. Other councilmen present were Herman Wolston, Norris N. Wright, Norman E. Battersby and George E. Ramsey.

The Council voted to purchase \$20,000 in Sixth War Bonds. This will make a total of \$80,000 worth of War Bonds held by the local town council.

Town treasurer George E. Ramsey reported a cash balance on hand as of October 31 of \$65,656.85; receipts for the month of November were \$15,964.22, making a total of \$81,621.07; disbursements for the month, including the purchase of \$20,000 in Sixth War Bonds was \$30,501.49 leaving a total cash balance on hand November 30 of \$51,119.58, plus \$80,000 in War Bonds giving the town a cash worth of \$131,119.58.

The sale of electric current for the month amounted to \$6,218.85; electric power receipts amounted to \$1,817.66; water receipts were \$6,943.98.

The council set Wednesday and Thursday, December 20 and 21 as clean-up days for the removal of rubbish and trash at which time all residents are requested to have their trash on the curb in front of their homes.

Town supervisor George E. Ramsey reported that the water line on New London Road had been extended to Green's Lane. White lines have been painted on Main Street and Elkton Road and all white lines for pedestrians had been painted at intersections.

Five 25-mile-per-hour signs have been placed on Main Street, Elkton Road and South College Avenue. Five new Stop Signs have been placed at intersections. Eight old trees have been removed throughout the town.

The town sewer system has been surveyed and survey made for a new sludge bed at sewer plant.

There were 14,852,300 gallons of water pumped in November. This is an increase of 78,200 gallons over November, 1943.

Chief of Police William H. Cunningham reported 45 arrests for the month of November with fines collected amounting to \$554.00. Two cases were dismissed and one was committed to the workhouse in default of fines.

TRUST FUND SET UP FOR PUBLIC PLAYGROUND

E. L. Richards' Estate Provides
\$1,000 For Free
Social Center

Word has been received by Mayor Charles C. Hubert and members of the Newark Town Council that the late E. L. Richards' will set aside a sum of money to be used by the town to provide a public playground for the town.

Part of a paragraph from the late Mr. Richards' deed reads as follows: "If at any time within five years from the date of Settlor's death any representative group of citizens of the town of Newark, in the county of New Castle and State of Delaware, shall raise by popular subscription or otherwise a fund for the purpose of purchasing a suitable plot of ground to be given to the said Town of Newark for the purpose of providing a free public Social Center or Playground, and if in such case the municipal authorities of said Town, by a proper ordinance, shall evidence their willingness to accept said plot of ground and perpetually to maintain the same as a Social Center and Playground as aforesaid, then Trustees shall subscribe to said fund the sum of One Thousand Dollars, to be paid out of the principal of this trust, but only on condition that the full amount necessary in the judgment of Trustees to accomplish the purpose of providing the Social Center and Playground aforesaid shall be fully subscribed and paid."

This generous bequest on the part of one of Newark's best loved citizens is a step in the right direction and should be given careful consideration by both the governing body of the town and everyone who has the interest of all the local children at heart.

Letters from citizens of the town expressing their views on this important matter will receive space in this paper and this matter should be taken up during the winter months so that the project could be ready for the children in the spring and summer.

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DENNISON STATE CORN CHAMPION

122.11 Bushels
Are Yielded
Per Acre

John W. Dennison, a farmer living near Hockessin, New Castle County, Delaware, has just won the state championship for the biggest bushel yield per acre in the national DeKalb hybrid corn growing contest. Farmers from 18 corn producing states and Canada entered the contest, which is sponsored by the DeKalb Agricultural Association. Mr. Dennison's yield was 122.11 bushels per acre.

The Delaware champion, as well as the DeKalb national man, woman, and junior champions will be honored at a luncheon at the Stevens Hotel in Chicago Monday, December 11th.

George L. Renner of Sioux Falls, So. Dakota is the 1944 national champion with a yield of 178.09 bushels per acre. The national junior champion is Arthur Elso of Elm Creek, Buffalo county, Nebraska, a 14 year old school boy who had the fine yield of 150.47 bushels per acre.

Mrs. Bertha Den Adel of Leighton, Mahaska county, Iowa, is the woman champion with a yield of 145.34 bushels per acre.

Little Elk Tribe from Cherry Hill participated in the parade with their famous boat in the lead. They brought with them the Elkton Band. Members of Andastaka Tribe from Newport; Little Bear Tribe from Bear Station; and WaWa Tribe from Union brought large delegations and preceded the Minnehaha Tribe which turned out in large force with their band. A dozen or so "papooses" wrapped in varicolored blankets loaned by kindly Red Men or indulgent mothers brought up the rear.

Interesting Highlights In the Development of WILMINGTON'S TRANSPORTATION SYSTEM



1864 **FIRST HORSE CARS CROSS WILMINGTON'S THOROUGHFARES**—June 28, City officials and officers of the company made the first official trip over the full length of the line—from the P. B. & W. Railroad Station at Front and French Streets to the B. & O. Middle Station at Delaware Ave. and Union. Thirty-five horses and seven cars were placed in service. This route today is part of the No. 10 line.

Abraham Lincoln was renominated for the presidency.



1888 **STREET RAILWAY LINES ELECTRIFIED**—This improvement was opposed by those who feared the "ravages of electricity"—was sanctioned by those who objected to the hard work the 166 horses had to perform. Progress prevailed. On March 8, the first electric trolley moved through the streets. Wilmington was one of the first cities in the country to enjoy electric street car service.

Delaware's Thomas F. Bayard was Secretary of State under President Grover Cleveland.



1901 **THE SUMMER CARS** played an important part in the community life. They were the people's pleasure vehicle as well as main means of transportation. "Trolley party" cars were in great demand in the evening. The city's transportation system had begun to reach out. Plans were made for a double track to Shellpot—a single route to Chester—new routes were under consideration.

President McKinley was assassinated. Theodore Roosevelt became President.



1925 **TRACTION COMPANY ENVISIONS THE FUTURE OF THE GASOLINE BUS**—The Wilmington and Philadelphia Traction Company (now Delaware Coach Co.) formed the Delaware Bus Company and began the operation of a bus line between Wilmington and Newark, over practically the same route used today. This company was one of the first in the country to envision the future of rubber-tired vehicles.

William Jennings Bryan, "the great Commoner," died on July 26. The Governor of Delaware was Robert P. Robinson. Wilmington's Mayor was George W. K. Forrest.



1930 **MODERN STREET CARS PUT INTO SERVICE**—Despite unsettled economic conditions, Wilmington's railway equipment was completely modernized. 32 street cars, the most modern type available, were placed in service early in the year. Residents of Wilmington will today remember these cars, painted in two shades of yellow, because they served the city for a full decade.

During 1930, the economic depression in this country deepened. In Wilmington, the new Y. M. C. A. Building and the addition to the Delaware Trust Building were completed.



1940 **TROLLEY COACHES REPLACE STREET CARS.** On January 7th, street cars disappeared from the streets of Wilmington. Following two years of research and preparations, the actual work of modernization was accomplished in three months. Wilmington was the first large city in the country in which the complete change-over was made at one time. Foresight, at this time, in ordering new coaches and new gas buses, beyond actual needs, made it possible for Wilmington to enjoy reasonably good service during the hectic transportation period following Pearl Harbor.

Franklin Delano Roosevelt was re-elected President of the United States. Walter W. Bacon elected Governor of Delaware.

DELAWARE FARM FRONT THIS WEEK

Farmers' Week Training Course
January 8-12

The War Food Administration has announced that Good and Choice butcher hogs weighing from 200 to 270 pounds instead of from 200 to 240 pounds will be supported at \$12.50 (Chicago basis) until June 30, 1945. Since October 1, price support has applied only to 200 to 240 pound hogs. Previous to October 1 hogs weighing 200 to 270 pounds were supported.

The War Food Administration has announced partial revocation of WFO 9 which controls distribution and use of protein meals, removing manufacturer's quotas and all inventory provisions but retaining set-aside and distribution provisions. This Order has been in effect since December 18, 1943. The following modifications are effective immediately: (1) Feed manufacturers are no longer limited in their use of protein meals in manufacture of mixed feeds. (2) Restrictions on amount of protein meals which can be held in inventory are discontinued. (3) Certificates of compliance are no longer required from purchasers of protein meal except for linseed oil meal, which is covered by a special order issued October 18, 1944.

Loans on sweet potatoes will be available to producers, cooperative associations, and dealers, November 15. Loans will be available on cured sweet potatoes packed in standard crates, baskets, or hampers, in lots of 1,000 bushels or more at the following rates: For U. S. No. 1 grade, November 15 through December 31, \$1.50 per bushel; January, \$1.65 per bushel; February, \$1.75 per bushel. For U. S. No. 2 grade, remaining not less than 75 percent of U. S. No. 1 quality, 15 cents per bushel less than the rates for U. S. No. 1 grade.

The schedule of training courses for Farmers' Week is as follows: Egg production, Monday, January 8; Broiler production, Tuesday, January 9; Dairy production, Wednesday, January 10; Fruit production, Thursday, January 11; Turkey production, Thursday, January 11; Vegetable production, Friday, January 12. Plan to attend the sessions of particular interest to you—anyone interested in agriculture is welcome and there are no fees for this brief training course of lectures, exhibits, demonstrations, and discussions on the important production factors in these outstanding agricultural enterprises. The program begins at 10 o'clock each day. Write the College of Agriculture in Newark for more information.

Enter the competition for ribbons and cash prizes at the Delaware Crop Improvement Association's 36th Annual Exhibit at the Armory in Dover, December 14, 15, and 16. Premium lists available from county extension staff members or from the Secretary of the Delaware Crop Improvement Association, Box 150, Newark, Delaware. Entries for the show must be in the hands of the Secretary at the Armory by 2 o'clock Thursday afternoon, December 14.

The War Food Administration will distribute immediately among certified growers of fresh green peas, sweet corn, and snap beans, copies of an agreement designed to enable them to receive reimbursement payments for eligible civilian sales of these frozen vegetables based upon the difference between grower support prices paid to growers and 1942 average price reflected in civilian ceilings for such products. Under the reimbursement program, payments will be made to certified growers (including those that grow their own vegetables) who have purchased green peas, sweet corn, and snap beans from growers at appropriate grower support prices and whose plants have been certified for freezing by State Agricultural Conservation Committees in the State in which each plant is located. Payments will be made on the basis of eligible sales of frozen products, or on such other basis as may be authorized by the Commodity Credit Corporation.

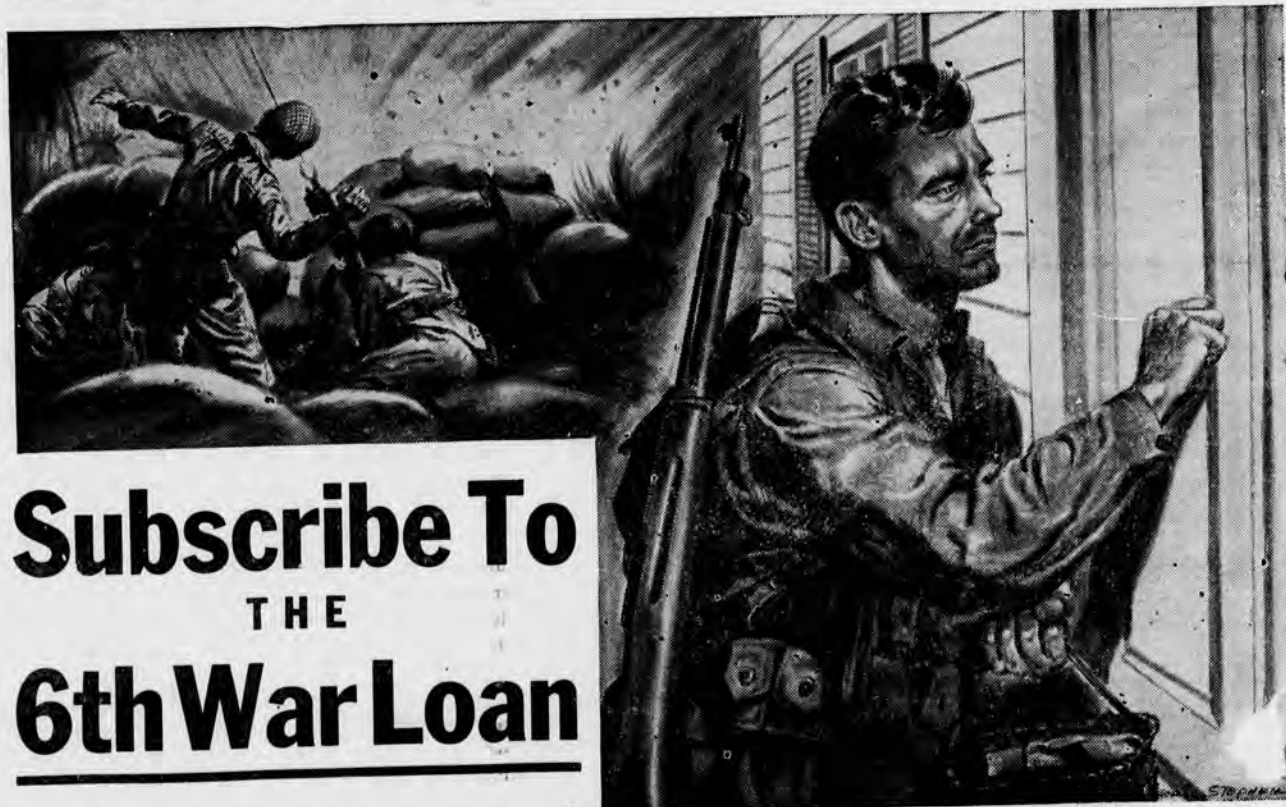
