1664 FIRST HORSE CARS CROSS WILMINGTON'S THOROUGHFARES—June 28, City officials and officers of the company made the first official trip over the full length of the line-from the P. B. & W. Railroad Station at Front and French Streets to the B. & O. Middle Station at Delaware Ave. and Union. Thirty-five horses and seven cars were placed in service. This route today is part of the No. 10 line.



TRACTION COMPANY ENVISIONS THE FUTURE OF THE GASOLINE BUS—The Wilmington and Philadelphia Traction Company (now Delaware Coach Co.) formed the Delaware Bus Company and began the operation of a bus line between Wilmington and Newark, over practically the same route used today. This company was one of the first in the country to envision the future of rubbertired vehicles.

Foresight, at this time, in ordering new coaches and new gas buses, beyond actual needs, made it possible for Wilmington to enjoy reasonably good service during the hectic transportation period following Pearl Harbor.




