Travel plaza closing for 10 months



The clock is ticketing on a Delaware landmark.
On Sept. 8 at 1 a.m., the Delaware Department of Transportation (DelDOT) and contractor HMSHost Corporation will close that haven of I-95 highway fare, the

Delaware Welcome Center.

That will clear the way for

construction of a new travel plaza near Newark.

As early as next summer, travelers will see a 42,000-square-foot main building and 5,700 square-foot gas station, including a convenience store and 21 fuel pumps that will also include high-speed diesel fuel dispensers.

The main facility will incorporate many elements of Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) standards in design and construction. Energy and water conservation equipment and fixtures will be used

35% water rate hike could come in Oct.

The Newark City Council, Monday night, introduced an ordinance that could bring higher water costs to Newark residents.

In a memorandum to the mayor and council, Finance Director Dennis McFarland recommended a 35 percent increase in retail water rates, effective October 1.

McFarland stated several reasons for the increase, as follows:

 Revenues have been depressed due to consumption which has been 7.3 percent below budgeted volumes for the first six months of the year.

 The need for increased investment in the water infrastructure over the next few years to maintain service lev-

• The need to recover city overhead costs from the water utility.

• The need to recover increased operation & maintenance costs which were not collected under the water rates adopted earlier this year.

• The need to achieve a 20 percent operating margin in the water utility in compliance with the city's financial policies that were adopted earlier this year.

According to estimates by McFarland, the 35 percent

Partner benefits approved

In a unanimous vote, the Newark City Council approved granting funeral and emergency leave benefits to city employees with domestic partners.

Speaking at the request

of council, Assistant to the City Manager Charles Zusag addressed the issue, both verbally, and in a memorandum he submitted on March 4.


In the memo, Zusag quoted city ordinances that allow emergency and funeral leave for family members, including spouses.

The council, at the urging

of Councilman Ezra Temko, explored the definition of "spouse" and wants to expand it to include domestic partnerships. At present, spouse has been meant as "legally married opposite sex partner."

The problem the city council is facing is defining a

Graffiti artist tags mayor's law office

Newark Police are investigating more instances of graffiti along Main St. Several businesses, including Mayor Vance Funk's law office, were victims of vandalism last week.

Funk reported seeing an unknown design spray painted on the dumpster behind his office at 273 E. Main St. The dumpster belongs to Mid Atlantic Waste Systems of Easton, Md. The mayor stated that he checks his property daily for damage and that the incident occurred between 5 pm, August 6 and 8 am, August 7. Digital photos were taken and entered into a central database for comparison.

Another spray paint tag was found at the rear wall of the Copy Maven, located at 136 E. Main St. Officers observed the word "RAID" sprayed in bub-ble letters and in brown paint. Another smaller tag, "RKY6", also in brown paint, was found on a stairwell 20 feet away. Owners estimated that the graffiti was placed between August

2 and August 4. A criminal mischief report was reported by Sante Fe Restaurant at 190 E. Main St. in response to several designs scratched into two windows. Police discovered a large design



Hotel becomes a hot topic

rospects of a high rise (at least by Newark standards) hotel in Newark have some neighbors upset.

You can't blame them.

The College Avenue gateway into Newark has two aging motels that are adequately maintained, but have become obsolete in the current environment. Both have outside room doors that are harder to police for noise, drugs and other activities, even when management keeps a close eye on the proceedings. Many travelers now insist on the security of a controlled entrance or entrances and a number of large chains are pulling franchises for properties, with the outside doors.

The presence of hotels with outside room doors, naturally enough, leads to more complaints from neighbors, some of whom reside a short distance away.

Another worry is traffic.

The owners of one of the motels, a renovated Howard Johnson's, want to erect a Candlewood Suites hotel on a portion of the property at Welsh Tract Road and College Avenue (Route 896).

The Candlewood would have controlled entrances.

A big worry among neighbors is traffic, although it is hard to see how the suite hotel will have much of an impact. The neighborhood behind the hotel is adjacent to an industrial park and that has led to a lot of traffic in the residential area over the years. Sadly, fewer people work in that area these days. Add in the closing of the Chrysler plant and things are probably a little too

quiet on College Avenue.

There is also the problem of 18-wheelers making U turns. That was an issue long before the hotel proposal appeared. Ditto for pedes-trians. DelDOT and the city need to do some work to deal with this long-running issue.

The Delaware Department of Transportation will perform traffic studies and my guess is that the site will pass the test.

One thing residents of the area must realize (and their local representatives need to tell their constituents the unvarnished truth) is that city government can do little to halt development of the site.

Current zoning allows for multi-story building, as dem-

onstrated by the two newer hotels up the street. If developers meet city codes, council has to approve plans, or face legal action.

If you look at the total picture, the hotel will be a winwin for all concerned.

The worst thing that could happen along College Avenue is for lodging properties to become run down and end up as locations for drugs and prostitution.

New hotels and the eventual end of outside entrances will reduce noise and other nuisance problems.

The project, if built, would mean the end of the Friendly's, a local gathering spot for breakfast, but the overall impact will be positive for all concerned.

On the minus side, Candlewood suites - which would target the short-stay market for businesspeople, as well as those visiting Michael or Megan at UD - would add to a bulging inventory of rooms in the area.

But the decision of whether another hotel is needed is best left to the free market. Lenders will take a much closer look at the numbers in the current environment and if everything adds up, we could see another lodging establishment in a year or two.

domestic partnership.

In his memo, Zusag outlined several considerations, including:

• Both parties sharing the same residence for at least 12 months and intending to do so permanently.

 Both parties are at least 18 years old and are mentally competent to enter into a contract.

 Both employee and domestic partner are not related by blood to a degree of closeness that would prohibit marriage in the state in which they reside. Neither is married to someone else.

 Neither is currently in a domestic partnership with someone else.

• The employee and domestic partner are either (a) financially interdependent and jointly responsible for each other's welfare and financial obligations, or (b) the domestic partner is financially dependent on the city employee in accordance with the IRS definition of "qualifying relative."

• The employee and domestic partner consider themselves to be members of each other's immediate family.

· They have signed an affi-

davit or other document certifying their relationship.

 An employee and domestic partner may be of the same or opposite sex.

At the suggestion of City Solicitor Roger Akin, Council voted that the definition of domestic partner will be the responsibility of the City Manager.

The amount of funeral and emergency leave granted will be up to three or four days, depending on the nature of the relationship of the relative.

One of the next steps for domestic partners will be getting medical and dental coverage.

Zusag reported that Blue Cross Blue Shield of Delaware will provide medical benefits to domestic partners at no additional cost. Council was skeptical and asked if it is possible that Blue Cross could pull a "bait and switch." Zusag assured members that it is the job of his liaison with Blue Cross to prevent such measures. According to Zusag, and if approved, medical coverage for domestic partners could be instituted on January 1, 2010.

There had been concern among unions representing city workers that extending benefits to domestic partners would raise health insurance premiums, with the city passing along those costs to employees.

The City of Wilmington and New Castle County already include domestic partners in their benefit packages. In addition, the General Assembly extended anti-discrimination legislation to include the gay and lesbian communities.

throughout the facility, along with local stone and recycled materials.

The design, with its generous use of glass, drew some criticism because it did not reflect the architectural style seen in Maryland travel pla-

DelDOT and HMSHost will work with the Delaware Economic Development Office (DEDO), the Wilmington Convention & Visitors Bureau and other tourism agencies to create a new Delaware State Visitor Center, within the travel plaza.

The Visitor Center will provide information on local and statewide attractions, events and activities. An upgrade to the parking lot will include a new truck parking area, a new Sunoco gas service station and an A Plus Convenience Store.

This site will be environmentally friendly with the addition of 50 spaces of Cabaire truck parking with electrification hookups that halt pollution from idling tractor-tailers.

One of the retail stores will be "Postcards from Delaware"— home to Delaware products that highlight the state's heritage and culture.

Approximately 250 jobs will be created throughout the renovation timeframe. When complete, the new Welcome Center will employ 225 HMSHost workers.

Beginning in June of next year, HMSHost will stagger the openings, delivering the Sunoco gas station and the A Plus convenience store first, followed by new food and retail sites.

Food outlets and retailers will include: Baja Fresh, Z Market, Starbucks Coffee, Burger King, Brioche Dorée Bakery Café, Cinnabon/Carvel and Famous Famiglia Pizza.

increase will generate approximately \$1.5 million in additional revenues. City customers can expect their water bill to rise about \$20 and pay a typical bill of \$77 per quarter. Non-residents would pay an additional \$27 and expect a typical bill of \$104 per quarter. These figures are based on using 200 cubic feet of water per quarter.

With the hike in place, the City can expect a projected operating margin of 13%. According to the memo, a 45% increase in rates would get the margin to 20%. If the proposed 35% raise had been in place since the beginning of the year, the net operating margin would have been 20%.

gested that the council must act quickly in an effort to "minimize the revenue shortfall on 2009 and to insure that financial results in 2010 for the water utility are acceptable."

The Council has set a second reading of this proposal for their August 24 meeting that could lead to a vote on the rate hike.

The rate hike also comes as private utilities adjacent to the city are also seeking big rate increases, due to rising costs for utilities, modernization of plant and equipment and the need to expand supplies.

Council has also proposed, for first reading, amendments to Chapters 2 and 20 of the Motor Vehicle & Traffic Code of Newark that will significantly increase the fines and court costs for DUI offenses. The proposal aligns Newark's rules with recent legislation signed by Gov, Jack Markell. The first amendment states,

"Court costs for a first offender's election of rehabilitation program for operating a vehicle under the influence of alcohol or drugs as... \$250." This is up from an original fee of \$35.

The second amendment will increase first offense fines to a range of no less than \$500 and no more than \$1,500 and second offense fines from \$750 to \$2,500. The original section quotes fee ranges of \$230 and \$1,130 and \$575 and \$2,300, respectively. The second reading for the amendments will be at the August 24 Council meeting.

Council members also approved an amendment that will raise the monetary threshold for property misdemeanor crimes. The limit will be raised from \$1,000 to \$1,500. This is also designed to align the city with state law.

Approval was granted for a minor subdivision of a vacant, wooded lot owned by John Mayer that will divide the site into five single-family lots for development by Robert Scott McKeown. The 1.76 acre property is located at the northwest corner of Woodlawn and Elm Avenues.





Moore demanded that Whittle tell her who the woman was and began to shout at him. Moore parked the minivan in front of the McDonald's, where Whittle left to enter the restaurant.

Moore went inside and began to scream, curse, and hit Whittle, leaving her two children in the minivan. Customers intervened and escorted Moore outside. Moore returned to confront Whittle, and employees called the police. When they arrived, Moore was crying in her car and did not want to cooperate with officers. She tried to drive off, but was stopped by police and taken into custody.

In the cruiser, Moore became agitated and attempted to kick out the driver's side rear window, knocking it off its track. Whittle stated that he did not want to press charges. Video footage clearly showed Moore hitting and yelling at Whittle. Moore was charged with disorderly conduct, criminal mischief under \$1,000 (the damage to the window), offensive touching, and two counts of endangering the welfare of a child.

Newark cyclist killed

A Newark man was killed in a van-cycle crash near Middletown on Monday. He was identified as as 25-yearold Daniel Worden.

Delaware State Police reported that Tara Dalik, 39, of Middletown was driving her 2008 Dodge Grand Caravan southbound on Old Corbit Road, near Middletown on Monday. Officers were told a 2007 Suzuki motorcycle ridden by Worden, was traveling northbound on Old Corbit Road, popping a wheelie, and approached a slower moving vehicle from behind.

Witnesses said Worden lowered the front wheel to the pavement and accelerated as the motorcycle started to pass the slower vehicle to the left on the two-lane road.

The van and the motorcycle were now approaching head on. The operator of the van applied her brakes and came to a sudden stop. The operator of the bike dropped the motorcycle on its side on the ground and began to slide on the wet roadway. The two vehicles then collided.

The motorcycle operator was ejected from the bike. He was wearing a helmet and was pronounced dead at the scene.

Dalik was not injured. The crash remains under investigation.

Suspects leap from bank roof, rob woman

UD ranks 31st in Forbes.com ranking

The University of Delaware ranks 31st among the 100 top public colleges and universities in the U.S., according to a new assessment by Forbes.com, the online publication of the biweekly business magazine Forbes.

In compiling its second annual "America's Best Colleges" guide, Forbes.com worked with the Center for College Affordability and Productivity to rank 600 undergraduate institutions. The rankings were determined by a combination of such factors as student evaluations of courses and faculty, the success of a school's graduates, the amount

of debt students incur and the institution's graduation rates. The guide's top three public colleges were, in order, the U.S. Military Academy at West Point (which also ranked first overall among the 600 institutions), the U.S. Air Force Academy (No. 7 overall) and the U.S. Naval Academy (No. 30 overall). UD was listed as No. 217 in the overall rankings that encompass public and private institutions.


In the assessment of public colleges, Delaware was immediately preceded by the State University of New York Binghamton (28), the University of Georgia (29) and Western State College of Colorado (30) and was followed by the University of Texas Pan American (32), Florida State University (33) and the University of Colorado at Denver (34).

"To our way of thinking, a good college is one that meets student needs," the editors of the Forbes.com report wrote. "While some college rankings are based partly on school reputation as evaluated by college administrators and on the amount of money spent, we focus on things which directly concern incoming stu-dents." The report said that 25 percent of each school's rating was based on student evaluations that were posted on the Web site RateMyProfessors.com, with another 25 percent based on success after graduation. That success was measured through a combination of the percentage of graduates listed in Who's

Who in America and the average salaries of graduates, as reported by Payscale.com. The rankings also were determined by including the estimated amount of student debt after four years, the graduation rate - a combination of the school's actual gradua-tion rate and the gap between the average rate and a predicted rate based on various characteristics of the school - and the percentage of students and faculty who have won nationally competitive awards such as Rhodes Scholarships.

It is important to note that if a school appears on this list at all, that indicates it meets a certain level of quality," the report said, adding that the Center for College Affordability and Productivity ranked only the top 15 percent of the more than 4,000 college campuses in the United States.

Yellowjackets will rely on youth on the gridiron

oach Butch Simpson will enter his 33rd season at the helm of the Newark Yellowjackets football program having lost two first-team All-State play-

ers in running back Brandon Norwood and offensive lineman Malcolm Bunche.

But perhaps more critical than either of those two individuals, is the loss of a group of nearly

30 seniors and the leadership and experience that walked off the field with them following last year's first-round playoff loss to William Penn.

"We have just five seniors with significant playing experience returning," Simpson said. "There are certainly plenty of opportunities for underclassmen to earn playing time." One of those players will be sophomore Taylor Reynolds, who returns at the quarterback position having played under center for most of last season. And while Reynolds' role as a passer was somewhat limited last year, Simpson is confident his agile quarterback will provide the balance on offense he is looking for.

"Reynolds has gotten bigger and stronger and is a fierce competitor," he said. "If the line protects him and we catch the ball, we will be a much more balanced team on offense than we were last year."

Seniors Carmen Caserta and Mercedes Brown return to anchor an inexperienced offensive line which graduated four players who received postseason honors. They, along with senior fullback David Witmer, will try to give Reynolds the time needed to find his receivers, four of whom return with some playing experience: senior Cam Mitchell, juniors Jake Milstead and Micah Thomas, and sophomore Xavier Griffin.

uation of Norwood, who plans to play at Salisbury University this fall, has created the opportunity for an underclassman to step in and win the job at starting running back. The leading candidates are junior Elliot Webster and sophomores Adam Aconomos and Jordan Imeokparia.

"We might be more of a power running team this year compared to last year," Simpson said.

Defensively, all five returning seniors are expected to start. Brown, Witmer and Javon Harley will anchor the defensive line, while Paul Barbas returns at defensive back and Casertas will see action at linebacker.

Sophomore Mike Powers is expected to win the kicking job and junior Jake Milstead will handle the punting duties as well as hold for extra point with a grin.

When camp opens on Aug 15, Simpson expects nearly 100 players to join his loyal coaching staff, which includes longdefensive time coordinator Mike Brogan, who has been at Simpson's side since 1986. Barry Zehnder and Mike Albertson, both who

played for Simpson, will join the Yellowjackets' coaching staff after serving as assistants at Glasgow last season."

"We are in a nice situation where I don't have to beg players to play or coaches to coach," he said. "It's an honor to have former players come home and join us. I hope they always feel welcome."

Newark opens up its season on September 11 when the Yellowjackets host Concord at 7 p.m, Simpson will be looking for his Delaware-best 251st win as head coach of the storied program, which has captured ten state champion-ships during his tenure. But despite his past successes and growing number of years of experience, Simpson enters this season with as much enthusiasm as he did his first.

"It's all I know. I don't golf and don't play softball any more," Simpson joked when asked what keeps bringing him back. "But seriously, the kids keep me alive. I feel like I can still relate and the loyalty of my coaching staff has created a wonderful working environment. All of those things inspire me to accept the challenge each season."





Newark's industrial job losses below state norm

Industrial employment in Delaware fell 8.6% over the past twelve months according to the 2010 Delaware Manufacturers Register, an industrial directory published annually by Manufacturers' News, Inc. (MNI) Evanston, IL. Despite the closing of the Chrysler plant, Newark's job losses were below the state average

MNI reports Delaware lost 4,090 industrial jobs and 31 manufacturers between May 2008 and May 2009, the sharpest decline MNI has ever reported in the thirteen years it has been tracking the state's industry. Manufacturers' News reports Delaware is now home to 824 manufacturers

employing 43,359 workers. "As with the entire nation, the recession continues to affect Delaware's industrial employment, with the auto industry and sectors related to the housing market taking the biggest hit," says Tom Dubin, president of the publishing company. The transportation equipment sector saw one of the worst drops in employment over the year, down 44% following the closure of Chrysler's Newark assem-bly plant and GM's assembly plant in Wilmington. Lumber and wood saw a 26% drop. MNI reports Delaware's top industrial sector remains manufacturing, chemicals accounting for 12,300 of the state's jobs, down 2.4%

over the year. Second-ranked food products accounts for 9,061 jobs, with no significant change reported, while printing/publishing represents 2,463 of the state's manufacturing jobs, down 9.8%. Losses were seen in most of Delaware's industrial sectors and included paper products, down 54%; textiles/apparel down 30%; stone/clay/glass down 17%; furniture/fixtures down 6.4%; primary metals down 4.5%; primary met-als down 4.5%; fabricated metals down 3.5% and rub-ber/plastics down 1.3%. Bright spots for the state include the expansion of petrochemical company LyondellBasell Industries, and the expansion of a Kraft Foods plant in Dover that resulted in 40 new jobs. MNI's city data shows Wilmington is the state's top city for manufacturing employment, home to 13,761 jobs, down 2.7% over the year. Second-ranked Newark accounts for 5,865 jobs, with employment down 19% over the past twelve months. New Castle is home to 3,549 industrial jobs, down 11% over the year. Georgetown accounts for 2,748 jobs, down 3.6%, while Milford is home to 2,402, down 2%, with no change reported. n the late 19th century, Delaware was king of peach production, in the United States and the world. Throughout southern Delaware, towns were born as farmers planted huge orchards and the railroad pushed south. At the peak of production in 1875, nearly six million bushels of Delaware peaches were shipped to market.

By 1895, Delaware orchards contained more than 800,000 peach trees and the legislature voted to adopt the peach blossom as the state flower.

On Saturday, August 15, Middletown will celebrate the Delaware peach at the 16th annual Old-Tyme Peach Festival.
