Commuter Rush To Grow Here; Newark May Benefit Solution Proposed By C. of C. From Housing Bill Before U.S. Congress

About 40 percent of the persons now employed in Newark commute daily from out of town and the percentage probably will jump sharply when proposed new defense plants open here. It was disclosed at a meeting on Newark's traffic problems sponsored last Thursday night by the Chamber of Commerce.

A wealth of figures, bringing the town's future traffic problems into sharp relief, was given by the speakers, who represented local industry, business, labor and the Town Council.

Councilman Carl S. Rankin said the Chrysler tank plant, now under construction here, will employ 9000 employees in three shifts. Most of these will be commuters, he said, due to the local labor shortage. To ease the rush-hour congestion sure to result, he advised opening of new routes around the town and the placing of traffic lights at the following intersections: Main Street and South College Avenue, East Park and South College, and the B. and O. crossing on Main Street.

Councilman Frank Durnall said he had been reliably informed that the proposed DuPont Company office building, north of town, will employ 2,000 persons within two years, causing an additional flow of commuters through Newark. He urged the extension of East Cleveland Avenue from Chapel Street to Capitol Trail. Portions of the extension not in the town limits should be carried out by the State Highway Department, he said.

Howard Ferguson, who represented local industry at the meeting, said the larger firms here already are staggering their shifts to avoid the 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. rush hours. He said the Chrysler Corporation has been requested to join in the program.

Franklin Shenker, who represented the Danitza Hosiery union, reported that a number of Main Street store owners have vacant areas which could serve as parking lots. He said the Town Council is willing to assist financially with improvements if the lots are made available to the public.

Homer Seeley, representative of the Wilmington section, American Society of Civil Engineers, advised opening a by-pass route skirting the eastern and southern edges of town to the Chrysler tank plant. This is the most logical solution to the community's problem, he said. He added that both Cleveland Avenue and East Park Place should be cut through to Capitol Trail. Traffic to the proposed DuPont office building could, he said, be directed north of town over state roads.

Statistics on the number of cars currently using major thoroughfares here every 24 hours were given. Capitol Trail, the eastern entrance to town, is used by 4,314 cars daily; Christina Road, 2,085; Elkton Road, 1,722; West Main Street, 1,217; New London Road, 1,010; Glasgow Road, 1,857.

**Mayor To Cooperate On

The Mayor, who could not give an assurance that such a project is possible, is seeking more information on current housing conditions in the Negro community, it was said.

**No Results On Fluorine
Test For 5 To 10 Years**

Dr. Francis B. Cramer, of the Bio-Chemical Research Foundation was incorrectly quoted this week as saying that a 60 percent reduction in the rate of dental caries has occurred here as a result of the fluoridation of the town's water.

He explained yesterday that no reliable results are available yet on the fluorine experiment and that none are likely to be for years. Only children who drink the treated water while their teeth are in the formative stage are affected, he said.

Results will become apparent five to ten years from now, he added.

Sen. Frear Says Town May Become Eligible For Gov't Aid

Newark may benefit from a defense housing bill now before Congress, U. S. Senator J. Allen Frear, Jr. (D-Del.) said in a talk this week.

The proposed law, Senator Frear explained, is aimed not only at providing necessary housing for defense workers but also affects financing community utilities such as water and sewer systems and hospital care.

If the bill becomes law, the federal government would provide housing for defense workers in communities unable to obtain it through private enterprise or other means. This was done in World War II, he added.

He cited Newark as an area where defense housing might become a "serious problem" and he said the town could benefit from the proposed law. He expressed the hope that local builders through private means can handle the requirements, but he added that "there ought to be safeguards in case they cannot."

New credit controls in the federal government's general housing program will be eased in defense areas where housing shortages exist, Senator Frear said. He further stressed that the Defense Housing Bill will not provide money or loans for community facilities.

Volunteer workers hope to place the booklet in every Newark home.

The educational phase of the crusade is being combined with a fund raising drive. Contributions to help fight cancer through research, service to patients and education, may be addressed to Cancer, Newark, Del. Checks should be made out to "Cancer." The goal for Delaware is \$75,000.

Carvel To Talk At Inaugural Of U. of D. President April 20

Dr. Perkins To Be Installed
At Ceremonies On
Campus

Gov. Elbert N. Carvel will deliver the state's official greetings to Dr. John A. Perkins at the latter's formal inaugural as twenty-first president of the University of Delaware, in ceremonies on the Newark campus, Friday afternoon, April 20.

The inauguration will begin at 2:45 p.m. with an academic procession of the faculty across the campus from Wolf Hall to the front of University Hall. In case of inclement weather, the outdoor program will be cancelled and the exercise will be held in nearby Mitchell Hall.

Dr. W. Owen Sypher, university professor emeritus and a former president, will welcome the guests. Greetings to President Perkins on behalf of the student body will be expressed by Samuel J. Talucci, president of the Student Government Association. On behalf of the alumnae and alumni speakers will be Mrs. T. Muncy Keith of Wilmington and Milton L. Draper of Newark. The faculty's greetings will be delivered by Dr. Augustus H. Able, associate professor of English.

Dr. Perkins will be inducted officially into office by former Judge Hugh B. Morris, president of the board of trustees. The university's president, who has held office since last Nov. 1, will then deliver the principal address of the ceremony.

The invocation will be spoken by the Most Rev. Edmund J. Fitzmaurice, bishop of the Roman Catholic diocese of Wilmington, and the benediction will be asked by the Right Rev. Arthur R. McKinstry, bishop of the Protestant Episcopal diocese of Delaware.

Hill Defeats Battersby By 38 Majority; 2 Returned To Office

Dr. John R. Downes And Samuel Diehl Win By Substantial
Margins In Tuesday's Town Election;
Total Of 1431 Votes Cast

Donald F. Hill, a newcomer to local politics, won out by 38 votes over veteran Town Councilman Norman Battersby in the annual municipal election here Tuesday night.

Dr. John R. Downes and Samuel Diehl were returned to office by substantial majorities in the other contests on the ticket.

A total of 1431 valid votes were cast, well below the 1,955 filed in last year's mayoralty campaign but still high for an off-year election.

In a 3-way Eastern District fight, Mr. Hill, a department manager for Sears Roebuck Company, Wilmington, earned 160 votes against 122 for Battersby, the senior member of Council, who was seeking his fifth term. The third candidate, Harry Dawson, drew 43 ballots.

A native of Newark, Mr. Hill, who lives at 312 East Park Place, said he became interested only recently in town affairs, and, after attending several sessions, decided to file.

In the middle district, Samuel Diehl was elected to his second term, getting 308 votes against 241 for his long-opponent, George Jackson.

Dr. Downes, retired physician, who was appointed to Council a few months ago to fill the unexpired term of Robert C. Lewis, earned a 193 majority over George Wilson, civic leader in the Negro community. Dr. Downes, who thus was elected to his first full term, received 375 votes against 182 for Wilson.

The new Councilmen will be formally installed at an organizational meeting of Council on April 17. As is customary, the session, which deals with municipal job appointments and questions of salary for town personnel, will be closed to the public.

The resignation of Miss M. Jean Lee as state 4-H Club Specialist was announced this week by George M. Worrlow, director of the Agricultural Extension Service at the University of Delaware.

She is a graduate of Iowa State College, Ames, Iowa, where she majored in child development. Before coming to Delaware in 1947 she worked in that field.

During her stay in Delaware the 4-H program has gone forward, said Director Worrlow. The number of clubs and the total enrollment has increased, and the leadership and the leader training program has been greatly strengthened.

A successor to Miss Lee has not been named.

**PTA To Hear Facts On Proposed
Cut In School Appropriations**

Reductions in proposed legislative appropriations for the Newark school district and details of the future school building program here will be discussed at the April meeting of the Newark Parent Teachers Association next Thursday at 8 p.m. in the high school auditorium.

The reductions, if carried through, could threaten the efficient operation of the school district, Wilmer E. Shue, superintendent, said this week. He explained that the district's original request for delayed repairs to various buildings has been cut from \$102,713 to \$20,950. The reduction, he said, was made by state authorities.

If the reduced figure is approved by the state legislature, Mr. Shue stressed, it will mean insufficient funds to carry out necessary maintenance to buildings of the district. The original request was intended to cover costs of such projects as modernizing the heating and electrical wiring system of the

main high school building, the installation of ventilation and new lighting in the New London Avenue Building, and the installation of pavements on Hanes Street and Lovette Avenue.

Mr. Shue added that the funds requested to renovate the Delaware Avenue and the old Main Street buildings to provide additional elementary classrooms for the expected enrollment jump next term have been "lost in the shuffle" at Dover.

Details of the proposed school building program for the Newark district will be outlined at the session by members of the school board.

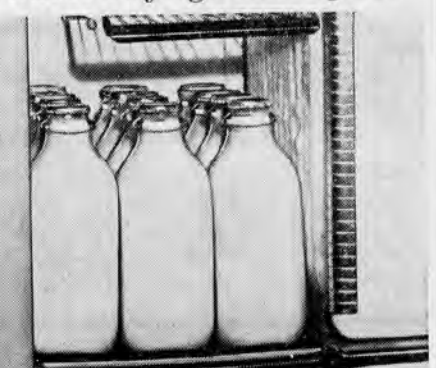

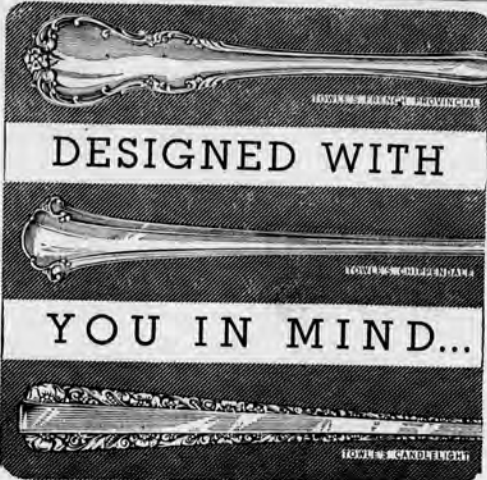

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Bergelin To Study New Zealand Volcanic Areas
